If federal funds are obtained, they shall be used to defray the costs of the project described in these Acts, not to expand its scope.



5. BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS Wetlands License 10-0858

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works assess compensation of \$584,850 for previously-approved Wetlands License 10-0858 which authorized Cordish Power Plant Number Two, LLC to construct a fixed timber platform and two walkways over navigable State waters, specifically, at the Inner Harbor, Patapsco River, Baltimore City. The compensation will be put into the Wetlands and Waterways Fund. The Department of the Environment fully concurs with this recommendation.

Background: Reference is made to Secretary's Agenda, Item 17 (April 20, 2011) in which the Board considered the application for a wetlands license authorizing the construction of a 3,342 square foot pier to accommodate a non-water dependent purpose, *i.e.*, an outdoor dining area with temporary coverings, a bar, tables, and chairs. In granting the license, the Board required the applicant to: "(1) pay \$11,508 into the Tidal Wetlands Fund to mitigate impacts to tidal wetlands; and (2) return to the Board at a later date to have compensation assessed for using State property to create upland."

The Board issued the license before compensation was calculated and assessed because the applicant requested to proceed with construction during the building season in time to open for the prime tourist season. At the time of Board review, the applicant was still in the process of obtaining the two appraisals required for assessing compensation. The Board's action did indeed allow the licensee's tenant to open Dick's Last Resort for the 2011 summer season.

Compensation: The Board may require compensation for "licensed fill or other type of encroachment" in an amount "equivalent to the fair market value of the wetlands affected or upland created." COMAR 23.02.04.15B(1). The Wetlands Administrator "shall determine the fair market value of the licensed area before and after improvement, with the values being based on the value of the adjacent upland parcel . . . on the higher of two appraisals obtained by the licensee." COMAR 23.02.04.15B(2).

Background:

- July 30, 1997 (Secretary's Agenda Item 2): The Board authorized Cordish Power Plant LP to construct three floating platforms. See 97-WL-1616. One of the platforms is a precursor to the deck at issue here and was authorized to be 100' long by 40' wide (4,000 square feet).
- April 2000: The Wetlands Administrator, at the licensee's request, reduced the floating-platform size to 75' long by 45' wide (3,375 square feet).
- May 15, 2000: The Wetlands Administrator, at the licensee's request, revised the license to allow the floating-platform to be a fixed pier.
- The final pier, which is the precursor to this application, is located in front of Phillips Seafood (formerly ESPN Zone). The pier is 75' long by 59' wide (4,453 square feet). This size pier exceeds the license specifications, thus violating the existing license.



9. MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT Maryland Used Tire Cleanup and Recycling Fund

Recommendation: The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE), in coordination with the Maryland Environmental Service (MES), recommends approval of the following scrap tire tockpile cleanup and project/cleanup development costs:

A. Tyler Towing/Clarksville Scrap Tire Stockpile Cleanup

\$ 200,000

The Tyler Towing/Clarksville Scrap Tire Stockpile, located in Clarksville, Howard County, is estimated to contain 61,100 scrap tires in stockpiles scattered around the property and mixed with soil and solid waste in a berm that surrounds the 5.85-acre property. The stockpiles are located near a small stream that borders the southern and western edges of the site. The property, previously used as an automobile junkyard, is currently unoccupied. MDE has obtained liens against the property and will pursue cost recovery after the cleanup is complete.

B. MES Scrap Tire Project and Cleanup Development for FY2012

\$ 100,000

MES will provide informational services to the public regarding all aspects of scrap tire recycling, and develop projects in accordance with MDE's plans for scrap tire recycling. MES will initiate and develop plans for scrap tire stockpile cleanups as directed by MDE. MES will keep appraised of technology developments and opportunities for scrap tire demonstration projects and innovative uses and recycling for scrap tires.

10. MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve paying \$557,000 to the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency for the State's 10 % share of remedial design costs for the Ordnance Products, Inc. Superfund Remedial Action in Mechanics Valley, Cecil County. (Legislative District 35A)

Description: The Ordnance Products, Inc. site is an orphaned federal superfund site. The EPA added this site to the National Priorities List in September 1997 with Maryland's concurrence. As required by the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA), Maryland is obligated to pay 10% of the costs to design and construct the remedial systems and 100% of expenses to operate and maintain the remedial systems. This Item requests approval to pay the State's design and construction cost-share. At a later date, the State will have to pay the operations and maintenance costs.

Background: An ordnance component manufacturing facility operated on the 95-acre site from 1960 to 1972. Waste from the manufacturing process was either buried onsite in open pits or discharged to five unlined surface impoundments. This waste includes drums of solvents and acids, detonators, and grenade fuses.

On-site groundwater and soil are contaminated with chlorinated volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and perchlorate, a chemical used in explosives manufacturing. Residential water supply wells located near the site are affected. The EPA maintains treatment systems on impacted wells to provide safe drinking water to residents, and samples affected wells on a quarterly basis.

The EPA and MDE entered into a Record of Decision on September 30, 2006. The estimated cost of the remedial action is \$5,570,000. This estimate includes funding for contingencies and for construction management services. The EPA completed the remedial design and is currently implementing the remedial action at the site.

Phase One – Soil Contamination. The remedial action is in two phases. The first phase was to remediate soil contamination by clearing unexploded ordnance, munitions of explosive concern, and contaminated soils. Design was completed in late 2010 and construction was completed in June 2011. Phase One costs were \$1.7 million, making the State's 10% share \$170,000.

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10. MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT (cont'd)

Phase Two – Groundwater Contamination. The second phase of the remedial activity addresses groundwater contamination from the chlorinated solvents and perchlorate. The remedial design and construction will include constructing a groundwater treatment system, installing potable water lines, and conducting soil flushing operations. Phase Two design is currently underway.

Operations and Maintenance. This Item does not include the operation and maintenance costs for the Site's remedial activities. The State is responsible for 100% of the O&M costs associated with inspection and maintenance of the groundwater treatment system, the potable water lines, and the soil flushing operations. The operations and maintenance activities to cover the Phase One and Phase Two remedial actions are estimated to be \$5.2 million over the next 30 years.

REMARKS: Belt filter presses are used to process wastewater solids (i.e. sludge) for reuse/disposal. The existing presses are over 25 years old and many of the major components have started to fail. Inability to process sludge could lead to NPDES permit violations. These presses are no longer sold in the USA and certain parts are only available through the original equipment manufacturer located in Germany. This contractor is the only authorized repair representative in the USA. When completed, the presses will be like new. Rebuilding the presses will save approximately \$200,000 compared to the price of installing new units.



Teackle Mansion is a magnificent five-part federal style brick mansion, built between 1802 and 1819 by Littleton Dennis Teackle, a merchant and member of the Maryland House of Delegates, and his wife Elizabeth Upshur Teackle. The property was subdivided into lots after the Teackles died and the property passed through several owners (being occupied as apartments) before the property passed into the of nonprofit ownership in the 1960s. Since then both the Somerset County Historical Society, Inc., as the owner, and the Friends of Teackle Mansion, Inc., as a key partner in the fundraising and rehabilitation efforts, have undertaken extensive research and rehabilitation work both in the 1960s and beginning again in 1998. Recently a geothermal heating and cooling system was installed, and the final phase, the rehabilitation of the interior, is currently underway. Work is ongoing using a team of specialty contractors and consultants who have been involved with this phase of rehabilitation since 1998. The borrower has successfully completed other rehabilitation projects at the Mansion using MHT capital grants and Maryland Heritage Areas Authority grants.

REMARKS:

Nature of Emergency: The University commissioned an engineering study based on problems in the Murphy Fine Arts Building.

- The welding, ceramics, and sculpture, paint, and photo labs have substantial air-quality problems. Some spaces, when in use, occasionally exceed the OSHA standard for particulate matter. Air systems for these spaces were not in negative pressure when in use, allowing the fumes to migrate throughout the building. In addition, the ventilation systems of these spaces were integral with the ventilation of the main building, instead of being separate, further distributing the fumes throughout the building.
- The welding lab as installed was unsafe and could not be made safe. The equipment from this space was removed entirely to prevent unsafe use.
- The sculpture and ceramics labs are above the James E. Lewis Art Museum. To properly clean the floors in the labs they should be "flooded" with water. When this occurs, the penetrations in the floor leaks the cleaning water into the museum space below. This creates a problem in the museum when the floors are washed. Some of the penetrations have been sealed. The work will include repairing floor drains and adding leak detectors and drip pans below the drain lines, in the ceilings of the museum to catch any water which may leak through. The floors will also be replaced with a new epoxy floor system to better seal the space in the labs.

Spectrum Engineers completed the retrofit/replacement design March 28, 2012. The University put the project out to bid the following day. The University is working diligently to complete this work over the summer so as not to interrupt Spring or Fall semester classes; to that end, the University is issuing two Notices-to-Proceed. The initial NTP authorizes the contractor to begin paperwork, engineering, submit submittals/shop drawings and order equipment on long-lead items. This work occurred during Spring semester. The second NTP will authorize the contractor to begin the physical work on the building. The University had to expedite the work or risk cancellation of Fall semester classes or having to rent off-campus space because there is no alternative space available on campus.

Copies of the solicitation notice were sent directly to 56 prospective vendors, 25 of which are Maryland firms and 18 are MBEs. A copy of the solicitation was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Four proposals were received in response to the RFP, all of which were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. The Segal Company (Segal) was ranked overall #1 with the second technically ranked offer and second lowest price. Although Segal was ranked second technically, it was judged to be very close to the #1 ranked technical offeror. Financially, there was an 8% difference between the financial price offered by Segal and the #1 ranked technical offeror. The narrow technical superiority of the #1 ranked technical offeror was not judged to outweigh the 8% higher price. Segal had the second lowest financial price. There was only a 1% difference in the price between the #1 financially ranked offeror and Segal; however, this lowest priced offeror was ranked technically #4. The technical differences between Segal and the #4 ranked technical offeror were judged to outweigh the 1% difference in price. Therefore, award is recommended to The Segal Company as having submitted the most advantageous offer to the State.

The purpose of this contract is to provide consultant and actuarial services to the State Employee and Retiree Health and Welfare Benefits Program. These services include: assistance with annual health plan rate setting; annual OPEB (Other Post-Employment Benefits) valuation, Retiree Drug Subsidy, technical assistance and support in connection with the re-procurement of various State health plan contracts; assistance with compliance and regulatory changes; in addition to trend analysis of healthcare legislation.

The #1 ranked technical Offeror, who was ranked #3 overall, filed a protest on 10/3/2011 in response to the new contract award recommendation to another vendor. On 10/14/2011, this same Offeror filed a supplemental protest. DBM denied both protests on 11/9/2011. On 11/21/2011, the Offeror filed an appeal of the protest denial with the Maryland State Board of Contact Appeals (MSBCA). The Offeror, without explanation, withdrew its appeal, and on 5/15/2012, the MSBCA dismissed the appeal with prejudice. REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The Medical Care Programs (MCP) Office of Systems, Operations and Pharmacy (the Department) has the responsibility of entering confidential data from Medical Assistance claim forms into the Maryland Medicaid Information System (MMIS) for processing payments. Currently, the Department has a backlog of claims and cannot hire additional permanent staff to bring this project up to date. All claims must be keyed into the system before a provider can be paid for services rendered. It is imperative that the claims are entered as quickly as possible.

Goodwill Works of the Chesapeake, Inc. (Goodwill Works) will continue to provide 13 people to input data from claim forms into the mainframe system.

Employees working under this contract must be screened, assessed and tested to ensure the Department will receive the highest standards in productivity and employee excellence. Goodwill Works guarantees all staff members presented to work at DHMH headquarters will be able to perform the data entry keypunch function as requested. Occasionally, as requested, Goodwill Works staff also assists in sorting and opening mail.

A copy of the solicitation notice was mailed directly to one prospective vendor, the incumbent. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP; however, one of the proposals was deemed not to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award due to MBE issues. Of the two remaining proposals, award is recommended to St. Paul Computer Center, Inc. t/a The St. Paul Group, the incumbent. The St. Paul Group was ranked #1 overall with the higher technical ranking and the higher price. The superiority of The St. Paul Group's technical proposal outweighed the 11% difference in the evaluated price of the lower priced Offeror.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to exercise the second and final one-year renewal option as contained in the original contract to assist the Department in identifying legally liable third parties for Medicaid recipients. The Third Party Liability (TPL) contract is vital to the Department in avoiding and recovering payments that are not the responsibility of Medical Assistance. Further, TPL determination and recovery activities are required by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and by Federal law.

This contract provides services that cannot be performed by the Department. Specifically, data agreements with more than a thousand insurers, third party administrators, and other potentially responsible third parties are necessary to perform this service. Additionally, this contract provides the experience and IT infrastructure that enables the exchange of data between the Department's Maryland Medicaid Information System (MMIS) and the contractor to identify claims that are the responsibility of third parties. The TPL contract is revenue generating -- it is an indefinite quantity, fixed unit price contract, whereby the Contractor is paid for the actual recovery amounts and at the unit prices (rates of recovery) that are fixed in the contract. The costs avoided and the funds successfully recovered far exceed the cost of the contract. All of the State paid funds are returned to the General Fund.

The Department has identified a need to contract for the mass-tort data requests because it does not have the data mining capacity required for these kinds of cases or the claims review capacity to review and value the large amount of data that makes up these cases. The contractor performs this service in a number of other states and has verifiable experience in this area.

Since this is the last renewal option for this contract the Department will re-solicit for these services during the renewal period. A new contract is expected to be in place prior to the expiration of this contract.

In addition, some of these renewal options contain: (1) a rate increase of up to 1%, approved by the General Assembly during the FY2012 Special Legislative Session; and (2) an increase or decrease in the number of child placement agency beds.

CPA Programs are defined in COMAR 07.02.21.03B (17) as a 24-hour substitute care program, operated by a licensed child placement agency or local department of social services, for children with serious emotional, behavioral, medical, or psychological condition.

Contract details are as follows (and in Attachment 1):

- 42 contracts will receive an up to 1% rate increase, approved by the General Assembly during the FY 2012 Special Legislative Session.;
 - 6 of these contracts will also receive reductions in the number of contracted beds; and,
 - 4 of these contracts will also receive increases in the number of contracted beds:
- 6 contracts did not receive a rate increase due to failure to submit timely budgets to the IRC:
- 2 contracts were not renewed due to contract performance violations and COMAR requirements violations; and,
- 2 contracts were not renewed due to lack of placements; therefore, the Providers voluntarily closed.

The total bed change for these renewal options is a reduction of 453 child care beds. The total amount of the 48 renewal options assumes that each slot purchased will be occupied by a child for all 12 months of the renewal option period from 7/1/2012 through 6/30/2013. Based upon history, this is unlikely to occur. Additionally, these are reimbursement contracts. The Providers are paid solely for the actual children placed with them during the year, and then only for the actual number of days each child is with the Providers.

The service Providers in this request were obtained through a non-competitive negotiation process. The procurement law provides for procuring certain human, social and educational services under the State Finance and Procurement article Section 13-106 and COMAR 21.14.01.03G.

The Governor's Office For Children (GOC) is the single point of entry for private Providers interested in supplying care under approved negotiated rates for youth of the various State agencies. These Providers have rates that have been approved by the Interagency Rates Committee.

Procurement with these service Providers has complied with the Law's requirement for Non-Competitive Negotiated Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services. In accordance with COMAR 21.14.01.04, below are reasons for this method of procurement:

- 1. DHR's Procurement Officer and Secretary have determined that although there are several potential service Providers, the demand for Providers exceed the supply, thus making competitive sealed procurements inappropriate.
- 2. The services are for child placement agency foster care and the licensing standards are found in COMAR 07.02.11, 07.02.13, 07.02.21 and 07.02.23.
- 3. Neither DHR nor GOC, on behalf of the Sub-cabinet, has the facilities or personnel to provide this type of service for these 2,693 youth committed to DHR to be served under these contracts. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the State that DHR contracts for these services.

The DHMH Office of Health Services (OHS) is charged with the task of administering the dental program for 450,000 Medicaid children, pregnant women and adults in the Rare and Expensive Case Management (REM) program. The goal of this contract is to increase the number of Maryland citizens who are able to access and receive quality dental services through the Medicaid program.

There has been an increase of 16% in Medicaid enrollment in the dental program since this contract started, and the Department is anticipating another 8% increase during the one-year renewal option period. REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The existing contract scope of work has allowed the Office of Real Estate (ORE) to adequately meet the needs of the Secretary's Office in real estate joint development, disposition and acquisition activities. During the initial term of this contract, however, it was realized that additional elements of scope would have made the contract more comprehensive thereby better serving the Department. As such, MDOT is requesting approval to modify the contract.

The contract modifications include the addition of expanded survey and environmental portions of the existing scopes and the related labor categories to allow ORE to continue meeting the needs of the Secretary's Office in real estate joint development, disposition and acquisition activities, under the existing Contract. Current projects foreseen to utilize the modified scope of services include the potential acquisition of the former Curtis Bay Army Depot from the General Services Administration, the Cambridge Marine Terminal Project, and several Transit Oriented Development projects. These projects may present some potential challenges relating to the environment.

The RFP issued in January 2010 resulted in the award of the management consulting contract to Laisar Management Group, LLC (Laisar). Since then, GOMA has been managing the Contractor, Laisar, to ensure that the Lottery Commission receives bi-annual updates, as required under the VLT law, regarding the MBE activity associated with the VLT facilities as they are developed, constructed and opened for business. Laisar receives, verifies and compiles MBE payment data from monthly reports submitted by the three current licensees and each MBE subcontractor. The data is used for the purpose of determining compliance with the MBE requirements that are part of the licensee's agreement with the State. Periodic site inspections are also performed to ensure that MBEs are actually providing materials, supplies and services as agreed.

In Section 2.1.2 of the RFP, potential offerors were notified that GOMA reserved the right to modify the contract to add MBE oversight of the two locations not yet awarded by the Lottery Location Commission, and that the modification may be subject to Board of Public Works approval. The firm fixed price negotiated per the terms of the RFP/contract for both additional VLT locations is considered fair and reasonable, and is consistent with the pricing for the three existing VLT locations.

During the 2011 legislative session, the VLT law was amended to require GOMA to continue monitoring MBE activity related to the ongoing operations of the five VLT facilities through 2018. In light of the timeline for the development and opening of the two new locations, it is currently anticipated that GOMA will need to continue to outsource the monitoring function beyond the expiration of the final option period. GOMA is prepared to begin the procurement process in the fall in order to have a new management consulting contract in place by 7/1/2013. if necessary.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval of a modification to extend the current contract by five months in order to complete the procurement and award a new contract.

The success of the Maryland Tobacco Quitline can be directly attributed to Alere Wellbeing, Inc., formally known as Free and Clear, Inc., which has been the Quitline Contractor since its inception on June 1, 2006. The call volume has significantly increased recently related to various national media events and campaigns, anticipated upcoming national campaigns, and state campaigns supported through federal funding to promote Quitline services. The most significant is the new national campaign through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) promoting the national number 1-800-QUIT-NOW. The 12-week campaign launched on March 19th with a 217% increase in calls on that day alone compared to the Monday prior and has a substantial media buy in Maryland. The Maryland Tobacco Quitline had an 87% increase in call volume from February 2012 to March 2012.

Supplemental funding provided through CDC from the Federal Prevention and Public Health Funds require vendor reporting and services to go beyond the current contract end date. Calls to National Cancer Institute's portal, 1-800-QUIT-NOW, have doubled since the launch of the campaign, showing the largest jump in call volume in the portal's seven year history. Starting a new contract in the middle of a national campaign may result in data and service inaccuracies and interruptions.

Since the launch of the Maryland Tobacco Quitline in 2006, Maryland has seen an average annual call volume of approximately 14,000. Call volume fluctuates with increased media on local, state, and national levels. The Quitline has served over 76,000 residents since inception. Marylanders who have used the Quitline obtained quit rates seven times higher than the average rates of non-assisted quits. Furthermore, 98% of callers reported being satisfied with Quitline services. A broader overview of Quitline services, as well as actual Maryland success stories from the Quitline can be found at www.SmokingStopsHere.com

Maryland has seen great success with the Quitline as the top recorded way callers report hearing about the Quitline is from "friends and family". If this contract cannot be modified, the Quitline could shut down and residents may no longer find this service as a trusted provider.

This modification is in the best interest of the State to ensure the continued success of the Quitline while the procurement is completed. The solicitation was published in May 2012, and the procurement will be completed with a new award recommendation to be approved by the BPW in October 2012 for a 12/1/2012 start date.

On June 29, 2011, a Novation Agreement was executed changing the Contractor's name from Free and Clear, Inc. to Alere Wellbeing, Inc.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:

With the implementation of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), there are several changes that need to be implemented under the Medicaid Pharmacy Program. Some of these changes were implemented in 2010 and 2011. Others will be implemented over the next 20 months. Among those changes that will be implemented in the next 20 months are:

- 1. Prescriber Enrollment: All providers that prescribe drugs must be enrolled in the same Medicaid program that the beneficiary whose drugs are prescribed for is enrolled with (implementation effective immediately); and
- 2. Extend Medicaid benefits to "childless" adults: In Maryland, these beneficiaries are currently enrolled in the Primary Adult Care (PAC) program. Under the ACA (implementation effective January 2014), there will be no longer need for the PAC program; therefore, the PAC program will be terminated by January 2014.

Furthermore, the Medicaid Enterprise Restructuring Project (MERP) is just under way, and it is expected that it will be implemented and be fully operational around October 2014. During the 30 month implementation period of MERP, the Medicaid Pharmacy Program staff will need to be fully engaged and involved with the MERP vendor, so the MERP requirements related to the Medicaid Pharmacy program, including interfaces of claims, rebates and accounts receivables are identified, developed and tested; and so the new system will be fully functional and able to interface with the POS system once it goes live. It is expected that the final requirements related to the interfaces with the POS system will be defined and finalized in the Fall 2013.

ITEM: 24-S-MOD (Cont.)

The current POS contract with Xerox State Healthcare LLC (formerly ACS State Healthcare LLC) is set to expire on July 31, 2013. The contract involves pharmacy claims processing (including necessary Prospective Drug Utilization Review edits), pharmacy drug rebate management and PAC Eligibility Determination services. Based on the factors identified above and for the reasons that are listed below, the Maryland Medicaid Pharmacy Program is requesting an upgrade of the current POS system to a newer, more efficient and productive claims processing system and extend the current contract with the Contractor for 24 months. These reasons are:

- 1. An extension of the current contract is unavoidable minimally until January 2014 (until the ACA provision which extends benefits to "childless" adults is implemented). As stated above, this contract provides PAC Eligibility Determination services. The PAC eligibility system is part of the current POS system.
- 2. Section 6401 of the ACA requires that under Medicaid, Providers that prescribe drugs must be enrolled in the same Medicaid Program that the beneficiary whose drugs are prescribed for is enrolled with. In order to comply with this requirement, the Program is implementing several changes, including changes that affect claims processing at the POS. Therefore, a contract modification to make changes to the pharmacy claims processing system is inevitable.
- 3. The Program has the opportunity to make an investment with a strong, predictable payback starting in January 2013. It is projected that the new system and a 24-month contract extension with the Contractor will yield savings to the Program of approximately \$1.3 M in General Funds.
- 4. Although the MERP transition period will last until October 2014, the specifications related to the Pharmacy POS interfaces, which are necessary in order for the Program to issue a new POS RFP, will not be known or finalized until sometime in the Fall 2013. Once these requirements are finalized the Program can focus on the issuance of a new POS Request for Proposals, with the most up-to-date and accurate interface and other pharmacy requirements for the new POS vendor.

As part of the FY2013 cost containment initiative, the Program must implement policy changes affecting the prescribing of Antipsychotic Drugs. The changes will include clinical review of Preferred Drug List edit denials for antipsychotic drugs.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to add one bed for a severely medically fragile youth. This youth is currently at Lifeline, Inc. awaiting placement at another Lifeline, Inc. location that is not currently part of this Contract. The modification will cover the additional expenses of 24/7 nursing care required for this youth and provide continuity of care to transition into the adult system when she becomes age appropriate. LifeLine Inc. has been approved by the Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) and has an adult program that this youth will be able to transition into at the appropriate time. This youth requires continuity and familiarity with nursing care in her current placement which is consistent with the treatment plan. It is, therefore, in the best interests of the child and the State not to disrupt the current placement or change the existing provider of nursing services.

Additionally, DHR is requesting approval to modify the current contract by reducing the number of child care beds from 59 to 12 through the elimination of 16 service locations. Over the last 14 months, Lifeline, Inc. has been unable to fill beds at these 16 locations. As a result, it has 'terminated the leases and will discontinue providing services at these locations.

The elimination of 47 beds and the addition of one bed for the severely medically fragile youth produce a revised total contract amount of \$10,428,857. This amount assumes that the slots purchased will be occupied by the youth for the entire contracted period. This is a reimbursement contract. The vendor is paid solely for the actual children placed during the year, and then only for the actual number of days the children are with the Provider.

COMAR 14.31.06.01 articulates the standards that must be met and maintained by residential child care programs for children and youth. These requirements are designed to protect the health, safety, and well being of children placed in residential child care programs.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:

Request for approval to extend the contract by six months in order to continue the existing inmate pharmacy services Contract. Pending the appeal by the incumbent for this contract, Correct Rx, with the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals (MSBCA), this modification is needed to continue inmate pharmacy services. If a decision by the MSBCA has not been issued during this extension period, the Department may request approval by the BPW for an additional extension period.

Also, an additional \$1.6M is being requested to pay for the inmate pharmacy services through the remaining three weeks of FY2012.

Correct Rx filed a protest of the solicitation for a new contract for this service on December 21, 2010. This protest was in addition to protests filed by the incumbent against the previous DPSCS procurement in October and November 2010 for the same general purpose, contesting the cancellation of the solicitation issued in January 2010 and seeking the reinstatement of an award from that procurement. The first two protests were denied by DPSCS in November 2010.

In November 2010, Correct Rx appealed these denials to the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals (MSBCA). A hearing before the MSBCA was scheduled for May 11, 2011; however, on that date Correct Rx withdrew its appeal and the MSBCA dismissed the appeal with prejudice, meaning it could not be reinstated. Since the December 21st protest was essentially on the same grounds as the appeal that was withdrawn on May 11, 2011, the Department anticipated that this December 21st protest would also be withdrawn, however it was not. On July 29, 2011, the Department issued a Final Decision denying this protest. The incumbent appealed the Department's Final Decision on August 8, 2011. At this time, a hearing has not been scheduled for this appeal.

In addition, on February 17, 2011 the incumbent filed a "letter of concern" regarding the solicitation. This letter included the statement, "This letter is not a protest of improprieties in the solicitation." On March 9, 2011, the incumbent filed a second letter that was described as being a supplement to the February 17th letter. This March 9th letter also stated that the incumbent reserved the right to file a protest in the future. However, no additional correspondence identified as a protest was received from the incumbent prior to the receipt of proposals in September 2011. The Department carefully considered the content of these letters and issued amendments to the RFP on June 9, 2011 and August 25, 2011 specifically addressing the concerns that were determined to be valid. On September 15, 2011, Correct Rx requested official responses to the letters of concern. The Department deemed it advisable to treat both of the letters as protests, despite the fact that the letters stated otherwise. The above chronology accounts for the six-month time period between the filing of the "protests" and the Department's issuance of the Final Decision. The Procurement Officer treated these complaints related to the solicitation as protests and upheld in part (the portions included in the June 9th and August 25th amendments) and denied in part (the portions not included in RFP amendments), both of them in a Final Decision dated September 19, 2011. The incumbent appealed the September 19, 2011 Final Decision on September 29, 2011. At this time, a hearing has not been scheduled for this appeal.

On December 1, 2011, the Department notified Correct Rx and the other non-selected offerors of the recommended award of a new contract for this service to an offeror other than Correct Rx. On December 8, 2011 Correct Rx protested the recommended award. On December 19, 2011, Correct Rx filed an additional protest based upon information provided to it in its debriefing held on December 12, 2011. The response denying these two protests was issued on March 13, 2012. The incumbent appealed this Final Decision on March 23, 2012. At this time, a hearing has not been scheduled for this appeal either.

REMARKS: The Division of Unemployment Insurance (UI) requires a full-time Project Manager (PM) certified by the Project Management Institute. The PM is required to manage UI's major information technology project under the direction of DoIT. UI is replacing the existing mainframe computer system with more current technology. This project will include a set of requirements for the three UI functional areas (Benefits, Contributions [Employers' Taxes], and Appeals).

A notice of availability of the Request for Proposals was posted on *eMaryland Marketplace* and 110 vendors were notified of the solicitation. A copy was sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs. Seven proposals were received. Two proposals were disqualified for not meeting the minimum qualifications.

AP Ventures was ranked number one overall with the highest ranked technical offer and the highest financial offer. AP Venture's nominee, Dr. Huston, met and exceeded all requirements. He had superior qualifications, a strong command of project management principles, and an impressive understanding of information technologies. Dr. Huston worked with the states of Florida and California and had experience with state consortiums. No apparent weaknesses surfaced in either AP Ventures' written proposal or Dr. Huston's interviews.

Dr. Huston is the strongest candidate for the position. His 35 years of experience with numerous government projects, including consortium-based stakeholder projects, as well as the interpersonal skills he demonstrated in the interview persuaded the evaluation committee that he was the best choice for the position and the most advantageous offer to the State.

No MBE participation goal was established because one PM is being requested for this work with the UI team and members of other states. The PM will review use cases, business rules and gap analysis to establish a final requirement for the modernization of the existing system. This work does not lend itself to any subcontracting opportunities.

REMARKS: The Engineer's Estimate for the first task under this contract was estimated at \$250,000. The bid price has been confirmed from the lowest bidder.

This Solicitation was advertised in eMaryland Marketplace and on MTA's Web Site. Ninety-four (94) firms received bid packages; Sixty-three (63) were Maryland firms. A total of seven (7) bids were received and opened publicly; two (2) bids were found non-responsive.

This IFB solicitation undertaken by the MTA for an ancillary services contract will be awarded to more than one bidder. There will be a secondary competition for each task order. The first task order under the contract will be awarded to the responsible bidder with the lowest responsive bid based on the bid submitted for the sample task, as provided in the solicitation. The first task order was for the rehabilitation of the bus-rail connector walk at North Avenue. The task includes: moving and removing existing signs and debris: building dry-stack masonry retaining walls; building masonry steps; removing and rebuilding parking lot curbs; restoring paving; grading and paving the walkway; building the timber stairs; building the concrete connector walk at the stair base, and shortening a steel car barrier and placing new steel support posts. Additionally, there will be some landscape restoration, seeding, and planting. The lowest bid amount for the sample task does not represent the total amount for which the contract could be awarded because each bidder will have an opportunity to compete for subsequent tasks issued by the MTA. In addition, each Contractor will only be compensated for the actual work, satisfactorily completed and accepted, on a task-by-task and item by item basis, as required by the MTA and in accordance with the General Provisions and Special Provisions of this contract.

REMARKS: The work performed under this Contract includes the furnishing of services necessary for the accomplishment of miscellaneous minor construction, repair, and maintenance work for the Administration's Metro Rail System.

This contract is critical to the maintenance of an operating rail transit system. Having an ancillary contract of a sufficient size is crucial to Metro's efforts to expeditiously correct any deficiencies, defects, or failures to better ensure the safe movement of our trains for our patrons. The depletion of \$2,140,566 in expenditures before the expiration of this contract was due to an influx of Federal

Stimulus money through Project 8016, which included station deep cleaning, painting, equipment upgrades and maintenance in the Metro Subway System. This work accounted for 35% of the total value of this contract. In addition to the Federal Stimulus spending, due to the delay in the replacement of the Portal Interlocking, a task was developed to stabilize the ballast which ensured the rail remain stable, thus ensuring the safe operational movement of our revenue vehicles in the area of the existing interlocking, at a cost of \$101,979 or approximately 1.6% of the total value of this contract. Additionally, Metro was instructed to utilize this contract for the rehabilitation of 99,000 linear feet of third rail cover board that was damaged in the February 2010 snowstorm expending \$432,222 to date, with an additional \$131,582 allocated for the coming months to accomplish this safety critical initiative. These expenditures and allocations account for another 9.2% of the total value of the contract, and in total, the Federal Stimulus expenditures and trackwork related initiatives that have been accomplished account for 45.8% of the total value of the contract. As a result of these extenuating circumstances, Metro has expended its ancillary contract authority in roughly half of the time that was anticipated.

Currently Metro has nearly \$4,000,000 in projects that have been planned and developed, and is awaiting a contract through which to perform them. Work under this contract may include electrical repairs and upgrades, potentially including fixture, cabling, and light pole replacement, as well as utility excavation and servicing; concrete repairs, potentially including spall, curb, and sidewalk repair, and tunnel grouting; HVAC work, potentially including fan, air handler, compressor, and filter replacement or repair; plumbing work, potentially including pipe and fitting replacement or repair; track work, potentially including rail welding, ballast tamping, and tie replacement; access control work, potentially including roll-up door repair, door replacement, gate and fence repair, or work relating to the Administration's RFID system; minor construction, potentially including painting, cleaning, drywall repair or replacement, signage, stair and floor repairs, and window repair and replacement; and potentially any other services related to the preservation or enhancement of the Administration's Metro system. In addition, this ancillary contract is used for the resolution of minor and major safety related conditions and maintenance issues which arise frequently due to the age and size of the Metro Subway system.

The MTA Procurement Division in conjunction with Legal Counsel is working on improving the ancillary process. The MTA anticipates initiating a new solicitation for Metro Rail System in approximately seven to eight months.

PROPERTY LOCATION:

The Property is located in the southwest quadrant of the MD 355 interchange with Montrose Parkway in Montgomery County.

EXPLANATION: Approval is requested for the disposition of an SHA-owned parcel (the "Property") in fee simple to Montgomery County pursuant to Section 8-309 of the Transportation Article, which provides for the conveyance of surplus land to counties for a public purpose. In this case, the public purpose is a transit-oriented development (TOD), as defined by Section 7-101 (m) of the Transportation Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, allowing MDOT to use its resources in support of realizing TOD.

Conditions of this sale are established in two agreements, which address State interests regarding the use of the Property and proceeds from its sale. After acquiring the Property from the State, Montgomery County will sell it to a developer - Federal Realty Investment Trust (FRIT) – which will construct TOD. The first agreement, among FRIT, Montgomery County and MDOT, requires that the Property be used for TOD. The second agreement, between MDOT and Montgomery County, requires the proceeds of the County/FRIT transaction be directed for State-approved purposes in support of the State/local initiative to promote White Flint TOD. This transaction will result in the State providing \$21 million in proceeds for TOD-supportive infrastructure. See below (Special Conditions) for further explanation.

The Property consists of parts of four parcels of land totaling 3.73 acres +/- which were acquired by the SHA between 1971 and 1974 for the purpose of building an east-west highway. In 2010 construction of the adjacent section of Montrose Parkway was completed and the Property was declared excess to the needs of the SHA. An additional perpetual easement, located on the contiguous privately-owned parcel to the south, has also been declared extra by SHA and will be conveyed with the Property. The total area to be conveyed, including the 0.11 acres +/- easement, is 3.84 acres +/-.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS: The Property is located within the White Flint Sector Plan area, which has been envisioned as a model of smart growth. Through increased building density, strategic infrastructure improvements and additional public amenities, the Sector Plan will transform an auto-oriented suburban development pattern into an urban center of residences and businesses where people walk to work, shops and transit.

In support of the County's vision for TOD in White Flint, the Montgomery County Executive and the MDOT Secretary have designated a White Flint Transit-Oriented Development Area, as permitted under Transportation Article 7-101 (m)(3) of the of the Annotated Code of Maryland. The Designation was recommended by the Governor's Smart Growth Subcabinet. Under MDOT's TOD Designation program, the State and local governments co-designate projects or areas that are good examples of TOD and will be backed by State/local/private partnering efforts. In White Flint, both Montgomery County and the private sector are making substantial infrastructure investments to realize TOD, including the 212 construction of a grid-system of roadways to disperse traffic and create a more pedestrian-friendly

environment around existing and planned transit services. Through developer contributions, county appropriations and a special taxing district implemented by the local government, approximately \$820 million in transportation infrastructure improvements are planned to realize TOD in White Flint. The County-approved Sector Plan targets an increase in the percentage of non-auto trips in the area (transit, bike, walking, rideshare) from 26 percent to 50 percent.

The terms of the conveyance have been defined in a two-party agreement, which was executed by the Montgomery County Executive and MDOT Secretary on May 02, 2012. The property is being conveyed to the County at the lesser of the appraised value or the State's cost plus interest and administrative costs.

Subsequent to the conveyance of the Property to the County, the County intends to immediately convey the Property to Federal Realty Investment Trust (FRIT), a Maryland real estate investment trust, for a negotiated price of \$23,250,000. This amount is greater than the SHA appraised value of \$21,720,000. The terms of the County's conveyance to FRIT are defined in a three-party agreement, which was executed by the Montgomery County Executive and MDOT Secretary and Federal Realty Investment Trust Legal Counsel on May 02, 2012.

Under an agreement with MDOT that controls the use of funds from the sale to FRIT, the County will invest the net proceeds in a Public Parking Garage or other infrastructure improvements that support TOD in the White Flint TOD Area. The funds will be held in escrow and their disbursement is subject to State approval, as defined in the two-party agreement between MDOT and the County. The parking garage will replace parking at the North Bethesda Conference Center that will be displaced by the construction of the road-grid system.

The Property is the final parcel to be acquired by FRIT as part of an assemblage on which a TOD project is planned. At full build-out, the project will include approximately 3.44 million square feet of mixed-use development (retail/residential/office) on 24.4 acres. The project has received Preliminary Plan approval, conditioned upon FRIT's dedication of the following rights-of-way to SHA: 75' from centerline along Montrose Parkway and 81' from centerline along Rockville Pike (MD 355). The dedications total .17 acres +/-.

STATE CLEARINGHOUSE: On March 2, 2012, in accordance with Code of Maryland Regulation (COMAR) 34.02.02.04-.07, the State Clearinghouse recommended to declare the Property surplus to the State, and to offer to convey the Property to the County pursuant to Section 8-309(g) of the Transportation Article.

LEGISLATIVE NOTICE: Notice was sent to the House Appropriations Committee and Senate Budget & Taxation Committee on February 27, 2012 in accordance with Section 10-305 of the State Finance & Procurement Article. The 45-day required notice period ended on April 12, 2012 and the Budget Committees approved the proposed sale on May 16, 2012.





Approval is requested for a State grant of \$96,125.00 to assist Housing Unlimited, Inc. (HUI), a nonprofit organization, in the cost of acquiring a two-bedroom/two bathroom condominium at 18711 Sparkling Water Dr., Unit K, Germantown, MD. The condominium will house two individuals with psychiatric disabilities. The contract price is \$127,217.00. This home is part of the Moderately Priced Dwelling Unit (MPDU) program in Montgomery County. Housing units that are part of this program contain a 30-year restrictive covenant that prohibits their sale on the open market. During that period, the units can be offered only to a population pre-qualified by Montgomery County for less than market rates.

Established in 1994, Housing Unlimited, Inc. provides permanent, affordable, independent housing in Montgomery County for single adults with psychiatric disabilities. Currently, HUI has a three-year waiting list of 250-300 low-income adults with mental illness who are in need of permanent, affordable housing. The tenants who will reside in this home will pay 35 percent of their net income for rent and utilities. The income for the majority of HUI tenants is Supplemental Security Income (SSI), and the maximum SSI payment for an individual is currently \$674.00 a month. In addition to these funds, Montgomery County provides \$200.00 a month for each client through the Montgomery County Rental Assistance Program.

In accordance with Subtitle 6 of the Health-General Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the Board's approval is further contingent upon the State's right of recovery being included in the Deed(s) or otherwise recorded among the Land Records of Montgomery County.

No State funds will be disbursed until the grantee has presented suitable evidence to the Comptroller that it has expended the required matching funds for this project. After the grantee has met this requirement, all future invoices will be submitted to the Comptroller, who will disburse the State portion in amounts equal to the invoices submitted.
