Before spending any funds secured under these Acts, the agency or institution shall certify its efforts to the Board of Public Works and state the reason for any failure to obtain federal funds. If federal funds are obtained, they shall be used to defray the costs of the project described in these Acts, not to expand its scope.

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

Remarks: The Maryland Department of Agriculture has determined that each of these projects is eligible for cost-share funds. 3. BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

List of Companies Engaged in Investment Activities in Iran

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works finalize for publication a list of companies engaged in investment activities in Iran. Inclusion on the *Investment Activities in Iran List* would make these businesses ineligible to bid on, submit a proposal for, or enter into or renew a contract with a public body in Maryland for goods or services. Inclusion on the IAI List also bars financial institutions extending credit to those persons in certain situations from contracting with public bodies in the State. The IAI List will be published on the Board of Public Works Web site.

Authority: Investment Activities in Iran Act, Chapter 447 (Laws of 2012), codified at §17-701, State Finance and Procurement Article, Annotated Code of Maryland.

Background: This law requires the Board to use credible public information to create a list of persons who are engaged in investment activities in Iran. The list must be published by December 31, 2012. Engaging in investment activities in Iran is defined as:

- Providing goods or services of at least \$20 million in the energy sector of Iran; or
- For financial institutions, extending credit of at least \$20.0 million to another person for at least 45 days if the person is on the Board of Public Works list and will use the credit to provide goods or services in the energy of Iran.

Before publishing the list, the Board must provide 90 days' written notice that the Board intends to include the person on the list; and that inclusion on the list makes the person ineligible to bid on, submit a proposal for, or renew a contract with a public body for goods or services.

Reference is made to Secretary's Agenda Item 9 (Sept. 19, 2012), in which the Board approved the issuance of a 90-day notice to companies that would be included on the final list. The companies proposed to be listed were given 90 days to provide written documentation demonstrating that they do not engage in investment activities in Iran.

4. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> State Procurement Regulations COMAR 21.05.08.07 (Bid/Proposal Affidavit); COMAR 21.10.02.01(Filing of Protest) Board Advisory 2013-1(Investment Activities in Iran)

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works:

- (1) Propose amendments to and new regulations within COMAR Title 21, State Procurement Regulations, to implement the 2012 Investment Activities in Iran Act; and
- (2) Issue BPW Advisory 2013-1 to provides general guidance to State agencies concerning the Investment Activities in Iran Act.

Authority: Section 17-701, State Finance and Procurement Article, Annotated Code of Maryland. [Chapter 447, Laws of 2012].

Explanation: The proposal would amend regulations concerning the bid/proposal affidavit and the filing of protests to conform COMAR Title 21 to the Investment Activities in Iran Act. Specifically, the regulatory proposal: (1) requires persons bidding on or renewing contracts to certify that they are not engaged in certain investment activities in Iran; and (2) prohibits unsuccessful bidders from filing protests on the basis of a false certification regarding investments in Iran (public bodies are exempt from the protest prohibition).


The Procurement Advisory Council concurred with this proposal at its November 29, 2012 meeting. Approval of this Item will allow submission to the AELR Committee and publication for public comment in the *Maryland Register*.

Background: Chapter 447, Laws of 2012 prohibits a person who engages in investment activities in Iran from bidding on, submitting a proposal for, or renewing a contract for goods and services with a public body in the State. Engaging in investment activities in Iran is defined as:

- Providing goods or services of at least \$20 million in the energy sector of Iran; or
- For financial institutions, extending credit of at least \$20.0 million to another person for at least 45 days if the person is on the Board of Public Works list* and will use the credit to provide goods or services in the energy of Iran.

*The Act requires the Board of Public Works to publish a list of companies engaged in investment activities in Iran. See Secretary's Item 3 on today's Agenda for action on final list.

Beginning January 1, 2013, public bodies must obtain a certification regarding investments in Iran from each bidder or offeror for new contracts and from each contractor seeking to renew a contract. Bidders, offerors, and renewing contractors have to certify that at the time the bid/proposal is submitted or the contract renewed that the company is neither identified on the Investment Activities in Iran list nor engaging in investment activities in Iran.

5. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> State Procurement Regulations: COMAR Title 21

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works propose new regulations and amendments to COMAR Title 21, State Procurement Regulations, to implement 2012 Legislation.

Proposal: Changes to the State Procurement Law that were enacted by the 2012 General Assembly require regulatory action. The Procurement Advisory Council concurred with this recommendation at its November 29, 2012 meeting. Approval of this Item authorizes submission of the regulatory proposal to the AELR Committee and subsequent publication for public comment in the *Maryland Register*.

Chapter 258 requires bidder disclosure of certain information regarding conflict minerals originating in the Democratic Republic of Congo or its neighboring countries.

Chapter 372 establishes environmental standards for electronic products to be used by the State.

6. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> State Procurement Regulations – Minority Business Enterprises: COMAR Title 21

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works propose amendments to COMAR Title 21, State Procurement Regulations, to effect changes to the State's Minority Business Enterprise program.

Background: Changes to the State Procurement Law MBE provisions enacted by the 2012 General Assembly require regulatory action. The Procurement Advisory Council concurred with this recommendation at its November 29, 2012 meeting. Approval of this Item authorizes submission of the regulatory proposal to the AELR Committee and subsequent publication for public comment in the *Maryland Register*.

Authority: Chapter 154, Laws of 2012:

- Requires the Office of Minority Affairs, in consultation with the Department of Transportation and the Attorney General, to establish the overall percentage MBE goal on a biennial basis and to promulgate agency guidelines for setting subgoals.
- Requires that contracts with MBE goals contain a liquidated damages provision for when a contractor fails to comply in good faith.
- Clarifies that MBE solicitation documents are part of the procurement contract.
- Requires bidders to complete a document providing a percentage of the total dollar amount that the bidder agrees will be performed by MBEs.
- Prohibits a contractor from terminating an MBE listed on the participation schedule unless certain conditions are met.
- Requires agencies to monitor contractors' MBE compliance and take corrective action when the contractors do not make good-faith efforts to meet MBE participation goals.
- Clarifies restrictions on the goal-setting process.

NOTE: The legislation also requires the Office of Minority Affairs to adopt regulations setting forth the State's overall MBE goal, and procedures for counting MBE participation. These regulations are not part of the regulatory proposal recommended in this Item.

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6. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> (continued) State Procurement Regulations – Minority Business Enterprises: COMAR Title 21

Proposal:

COMAR 21.11.03.01 deletes restriction on applicability of MBE laws to smaller construction contracts to be consistent with statute.

COMAR 21.11.03.02 requires that agencies attempt to achieve MBE participation goals and subgoals.

COMAR 21.11.03.03 updates references within the regulation.

COMAR 21.11.03.04 clarifies that the Board may develop MBE forms for agency use.

COMAR 21.11.03.07 adds the veterans small business programs as a race neutral measure to increase MBE participation.

COMAR 21.11.03.09 clarifies that agencies may not bundle contracts to preclude MBE or small business participation. The regulation also prohibits the use of quotas; a goal-setting process that relies solely on the State's overall percentage goal; or a goal-setting process that does not incorporate a full analysis of MBE availability and the feasibility of subcontracting.

COMAR 21.11.03.10 confirms that MBE solicitation documents are made part of the procurement contract. The regulation also requires a liquidated damages provision for all contracts containing an MBE goal.

COMAR 21.11.03.12 provides procedures for changes to the MBE participation schedule.

COMAR 21.11.03.13 adds monitoring and collecting data to agency responsibilities for ensuring MBE compliance. Also clarified is the requirement that contractors make good faith efforts to meet MBE goals.

COMAR 21.07.01.14 adds liquidated damages clause as a mandatory contract terms for all contracts with MBE participation goals.

COMAR 21.11.03.09 repeals the requirement that agencies send paper copies of solicitation documents to GOMA. Solicitation documents are more effectively provided electronically through *eMaryland Marketplace* or directly from agencies.

Final Action on Regulations State Tidal Wetlands Licensing Procedures COMAR 23.02.04.15 Compensation

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works take final action to adopt – as proposed – amendments that will conform COMAR 23.02.04.15 to 2012 General Assembly legislation.

Authority: Section 16-205, Environment Article, Annotated Code of Maryland, as amended by Chapter 722 (2012 Laws of Maryland).

Background: Reference is made to Secretary's Agenda Item 7 [June 20, 2012] in which the Board of Public Works approved a regulatory proposal that was subsequently published in 39 Maryland Register 1460-1462 [November 2, 2012]. No public comments were received.

Proposed Amendments to 23.02.04.15:

- Require that all cables, pipelines, or similar structures located on State wetlands be assessed compensation by repealing exemptions to the requirement.
- Increase annual compensation rate for cables, pipelines or similar structures located on State wetlands from \$1.00 to \$2.50 per linear square foot.
- Require that the compensation monies be deposited into the Wetlands and Waterways Program Fund.
- Clarify that the Wetlands Administrator is to obtain two appraisals for licensed fill or encroachment regardless of the property size when assessing compensation for licensed fill or other encroachments.

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve 22 **new grants** up to \$1,092,690 from the Bay Restoration Fund for various Wastewater Treatment Plants (WWTP) Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) projects.

Background: Up to 10% of the annual revenue generated from the wastewater treatment plant users fee may be used for ENR operation and maintenance costs. The Department of the Environment recommends operation and maintenance (O&M) grants at a rate of up to \$18,000 per million gallons per day of design capacity, not to exceed \$216,000 per year per WWTP. ENR technologies have been fully implemented at all of the listed ENR WWTPs and are achieving the goals of effluent levels at or below total nitrogen of 3 mg/l and total phosphorous of 0.3 mg/l. Through the ENR upgrade and proper operation, these WWTPs have been successful in reducing nitrogen discharged to Chesapeake Bay by over 1,300,000 pounds of per year and phosphorus by over 190,000 pounds of per year.

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve further funding up to \$87,975,000 to Baltimore City for the Patapsco Wastewater Treatment Plant Biological Nutrient Removal and Enhanced Nutrient Removal project in Baltimore City. The project involves multiple sources of funding which are being provided over several years based on project schedule.

(Legislative District 46)

A. New Loan up to \$11,260,000 - Water Quality State Revolving Loan Fund. The loan will be repaid over a period not to exceed 20 years following project completion, at an interest rate of 25% of the Average of the Bond Buyer 11-Bond Index for the month preceding loan closing. Based on this formula, recent loan recipients have received a 0.80% interest rate. To secure this debt, the City of Baltimore will deliver to the Maryland Water Quality Financing Administration a revenue bond that is on parity with its outstanding sewer utility revenue bonds which have a first lien on the gross revenues of the system. This loan may involve multiple sources of funding including GO bonds as the required 20% State match to Federal funds.

B. New Loan Forgiveness up to \$1,500,000 – Water Quality State Revolving Loan Fund. This loan will be forgiven as a Disadvantaged Community under the Federal Clean Water Act. The principal forgiveness loan terms are enforceable should there be a programmatic default on the Loan Agreement. This loan may involve multiple sources of funding including GO bonds as the required 20% State match to Federal funds.

C. Grant Increase up to \$75,215,000 - Bay Restoration Fund (BR-NR 02.03). The source of these grant funds is the Bay Restoration Fund. These funds may be expended using multi-year appropriations based on project schedule and will be used for eligible Enhanced Nutrient Removed (ENR) costs, as determined by the Department. The ENR projects may be funded using special funds, revenue bonds or State GO bonds.

Project Description: The proposed project entails the planning, design and construction of Biological Nutrient Removal (BNR) and ENR upgrades and the expansion of the existing 73 million gallons per day (mgd) Patapsco Wastewater Treatment Plant. Upon completion of the BNR and ENR upgrades along with expansion to 81 mgd permitted design capacity, the plant will be capable of achieving an effluent with a Total Nitrogen goal of 3.0 mg/l and a Total Phosphorus of 0.3 mg/l. This will allow 83% reduction in nitrogen and 85% reduction in phosphorus; significantly reducing nutrients to Patapsco River and ultimately to the Chesapeake Bay. This action will primarily fund the work related to contract SC845, which is the Nitrification modifications to existing facilities.

The project was built on one acre of 524+ acres owned by the Benedictine Sisters at St. Gertrude's Monastery. In addition to the project, the grounds also included the monastery, a school, a food distribution center and a thrift store. As collateral for the Loan, the borrower provided DHCD a first lien on the leasehold interest in the real property and assigned the interest in Zero Coupon Treasury Bonds sufficient at maturity to repay the loan.



Since rehabilitation of the building was completed in 1993, the project has been continually and effectively operated as a transitional housing facility receiving satisfactory or better ratings on physical inspections and management reviews. The borrower has provided experience and oversight while the Sisters are responsible for day-to-day operations.

The Sisters now propose to sell 134 acres of the 524-acre parcel to the Benedictine School for Exceptional Children (the Benedictine School), a facility that serves children with autism. The sale includes the project subject to the long term lease provided in 1992 to the Borrower. To facilitate the sale to the Benedictine School, the Sisters request that DHCD release its first lien on the leasehold interest in exchange for a first lien on the remaining 390 acres.

Under the proposal, the loan collateral will be the interest in the Zero Coupon Treasury Bonds which should be sufficient at maturity to repay the remaining principal balance and a first lien interest in the remaining land. The remaining land was appraised in May 2010 in excess of \$2 million. DHCD has determined that the collateral is more than adequate to secure the loan.

REMARKS:

Nature of Emergency: External tank inspection uncovered deficiencies that required immediate closure of the fueling systems and remediation. Immediate repairs to the tanks are needed to provide ethanol fuel to the eastern and southern areas of the State. Repairs include removing leak detectors, correcting venting, reinstalling leak detectors and testing. Work included installing new overfill valves and catch basins, and removing and disposing of unusable fuel in the tanks.

Basis for Selection: Datanet Engineering conducted the inspection of the systems and is knowledgeable of repairs needed to bring the systems on line. The procurement officer concluded that the price was reasonable and bidding it further would not provide a better price or time frame. The tanks were bid separately for a total of \$66,650.

REMARKS:

Nature of Emergency: Federal law affords Maryland the ability to waive Medicare payment rules and develop its own hospital payment rates for all payers. Maryland is the only state in the nation with such a waiver. However, Maryland was at risk of violating certain Medicare waiver requirements. A breach of the Medicare waiver would disrupt financing of the State's hospitals and affect the cost of hospital services for most patients, as well as the incentive for hospitals to provide uncompensated care to indigent patients. This potential adverse impact on the availability of health care across the State would present serious damage to public health, safety and welfare.

While DHMH and the Health Services Cost Review Commission engaged in extensive conversations with the federal government for many months, discussion with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in early November established a specific timetable and outline for an application for a new approach to the Medicare waiver. HSCRC expects to submit a federal demonstration waiver application by December 17.

While HSCRC staff is able to develop the application's technical components, the application project required an expert consultant to serve as the consolidator of the various elements, the source of data verification, and strategic advisor on CMS demonstrations waiver applications. The need for the expert became apparent only in early November.

The compressed timeframe and the importance of preparing a successful application compelled the HSCRC to move forward with an emergency procurement. Failing to do so would pose an unacceptable risk to Maryland's health care system and the millions of Marylanders who depend upon it.

Basis for Selection: With considerable current and relevant experience in assisting states with waiver applications to CMS, Health Management Associates is uniquely qualified to provide these services on a timely basis. Members of the Health Management Associates team have deep experience in hospital finance. They also have the modeling experience to greatly assist in this compressed timeframe. Multiple parties confirm that this firm is ideally suited. Health Management Associates has staff resource able to commit for this time-sensitive engagement.



REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) was advertised on *eMarylandmarketplace.com* and on DBM's Procurement web site. Copies of the solicitation notice are mailed directly to nine prospective vendors, of which five are Maryland firms and included no MBEs. A copy of the IFB was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three bids were received in response to the IFB; all of which were deemed to be responsive. White Glove Drug & Alcohol Testing, Inc. submitted the lowest responsive bid and was deemed to be a responsible bidder. Therefore, White Glove Drug & Alcohol Testing, Inc. is recommended for contract award.

The State of Maryland has been testing applicants and employees for the illegal use of drugs since 1990 to assure its citizens that State employees are not impaired by the illegal use of drugs in the workplace. This practice ensures compliance with the Federal Omnibus Drug Abuse Act of 1988 ("Federal Act") which requires any State receiving Federal funds to establish a drug-free workplace.

The Federal Act also requires the State to have a policy on the use of substances, an employee awareness program and a procedure for employees to report their own convictions. The State conducts testing in seven different situations and for a panel of seven drugs. The contractor will provide all labor on-site at State specified locations and the minimal materials necessary for the collection of urine specimens. The contractor then sends the collected specimens to the State's contracted testing laboratory in pre-paid shipping kits provided by the testing laboratory.

In accordance with Executive Order 01.01.1991.16 and Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) 17.04.09, all applicants for employment in designated sensitive State job categories, as well as State employees in the same sensitive categories, must be tested to detect the illegal use of drugs based on an analysis of a specimen of their urine. In addition, any employee for which there is reasonable suspicion of illegal drug use must be tested. The bulk of the sensitive positions that require testing are Correctional Officers and other personnel of the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS).

ITEM: 1-S (Cont.)

An estimated 6,900 specimen collections and subsequent drug tests will be performed each year. In addition, it is possible that contractor officials will have to appear at administrative and legal proceedings to testify as to the circumstances pertaining to a particular urine collection or the "chain of custody" of that urine specimen. The bid prices were evaluated based upon a model used in the IFB for evaluation purposes. The bid price evaluation model included estimates of the number of regular and emergency (incident related) collections and of preparation time and attendance (testimony) at administrative and legal proceedings. The *Award Amount* above is estimated based on the projected amount of collections and testimony needed for the duration of the five year contract period. Since this is an indefinite quantity, fixed unit price contract, the contractor will be paid for collection services and testimony based on the actual amount and type of services provided at the unit prices that are fixed in the contract.

There is no MBE goal established for this contract for two reasons: (1) there are no subcontracting opportunities. The specimen shipping kit used for each collection is supplied by the State's contracted testing laboratory and the collection sites are on State or local government premises. Accordingly, aside from very minimal supplies such as bluing agent, specimen cups, tape, signs, etc., virtually the entire expense of this contract is for the salaries of the certified personnel who conduct the collection sites; and (2) there is a need to strengthen the legal defensibility of the chain of custody of the samples being collected and tested by having as few vendors as possible involved in this contract. However, White Glove Drug & Alcohol Testing, Inc. is a Maryland certified MBE.

The source of funds for this contract comes from various sources within the specific agencies that request specimen collections under this contract.



REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com*, which electronically distributed the RFP to 77 vendors, including 67 certified minority businesses. The RFP was also reported in the trade periodical *Pensions & Investments On-Line* and made available for review and download at the MSRP Board's website.

Two offers were received in response to the RFP; however, only one was deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. The returned proposal failed to comply with MBE requirements. Nationwide Retirement Solutions, Inc. (Nationwide), the incumbent, was determined to be responsible, the financial offer was considered fair and reasonable, and it was determined that other potential offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation. Therefore, award is recommended to Nationwide as proposing an advantageous offer to the State.

Nationwide's proposal met or exceeded all requirements, and continues the flexible, cooperative approach to plan administration which has been highly valued in the past. Nationwide has also committed to maintaining a substantial presence in the State and, of course, their local office in Hunt Valley, MD. Compared to the expiring contract rate, the difference in cost for State employee participants going forward is estimated to be a savings of five dollars per year per \$10,000 account balance.

The proposed contract award includes a fixed rate fee of 0.09% of the Plans' assets on an annual basis, taken directly from participants' supplemental retirement accounts. Assuming an asset base of \$2.76 billion, the first year value of this contract would approximate \$2,485,800. Subsequent year costs to participants will vary only with changes in their total assets.

As the incumbent, Nationwide has been under five separate contracts with durations of four to 11 years. Currently the fixed charge rate is 0.14% of plans assets annually. From an initial level of over 0.95%, this charge rate has decreased over the past 37 years through negotiations and voluntary concessions as well as scheduled competitive procurements. The successful growth of the Maryland Plans has been the greatest factor in making such cost reductions possible.

By law, all costs of the Maryland supplemental retirement plans must be paid from the participant contributions or their earnings. No State funds may be used to pay the expenses of these plans. In addition to the participant fee proposed for this Plan Administrator Contract, other fees may be collected from participant accounts to support the operations of the Board of Trustees and several related financial service and advisor contracts. Investments offered to MSRP participants bear their own, individual management fees that are published in participant statements and in the MSRP Board's annual reports.

The RFP required the successful Offeror to provide a fidelity bond or an unconditional guaranty of its contractual obligations by a solvent corporate affiliate. In lieu of a bond, this Contract contains an unconditional guaranty of performance by the vendor's parent company, Nationwide Financial Services, Inc. This guaranty is the effective equivalent of a fidelity bond and is broader in scope because it is underwritten by a similar, presumptively solvent entity.

A 15% MBE participation goal established for this contract based upon the limited subcontracting opportunities available and the historic MBE compliance on previous contracts. Nationwide has committed to achieving a 15.12% MBE goal through the use of six MDOT certified MBEs.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The DHMH is requesting the Board of Public Works (BPW) declare this contract void for the following reasons:

- DHMH improperly entered into a contract with the Blind Industries and Services of Maryland (BISM), a Preference Provider, to provide call center services. Even though DHMH had the delegated authority from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) to enter into this contract on its own, no formal contract was ever signed or executed.
- BISM was notified by the DHMH Office of Inspector General (OIG) at the suggestion of the DHMH Office of Procurement to begin providing call center services. Based upon the information received, BISM acted in good faith by providing four operators to make the phone calls and provided the services requested for three months.
- BISM believed a formal contract would be forthcoming based upon conversations with DHMH and did not knowingly contribute to the violation or have any knowledge of the violation before the procurement contract was awarded.

The call center services provided by BISM for the three-month period, while useful in detecting some potential fraud, were deemed to be expensive in comparison to the amount of potential recovery. Therefore, the call center services were discontinued.

The federal government indicated through initiatives that there was a high percentage of fraud, waste and abuse with Durable Medical Equipment (DME) providers. Medicaid and the Office of Inspector General (OIG) met with potential vendors at their request that provided a similar service of phone calls for explanation of benefits on claims submitted to Medicaid. Medicaid and the OIG decided to use BISM for this effort at the suggestion of the DHMH procurement office.

BISM provided four operators to call a specified number of Medicaid recipients that received DME products and to ascertain whether products that were paid for by Medicaid were in fact delivered. The information was then forwarded to the OIG for further review and investigation. 

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) was advertised on the DHMH website, ADAA website, and on *eMaryland marketplace*. In addition, email notifications were sent to eight prospective vendors, all of which are Maryland firms and none are MBEs. A copy of the notice was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

The procurement method used was Multi-Step Competitive Sealed Bidding. An evaluation committee was formed to review the technical qualifications of the bidders, and only after a bidder was deemed technically qualified were the bids opened and recorded. A total of six bids, including the Washington County Health Department (WCHD), were received for this contract. All bidders were deemed technically qualified.

The WCHD submitted a bid to perform the services requested in the IFB, but was not included as part of this agenda item because as a government entity it is exempt from procurement. WCHD will be performing these services through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The Not-to-Exceed (NTE) amount of this contract includes the MOU for services provided by WCHD.

The selected vendors will provide Statewide Residential Behavioral Health Treatment Services for Criminal Justice Patients and Pregnant Women and Women with Children for a varying number of treatment beds, Statewide. Services to Criminal Justice patients will help to meet the demand for court-ordered commitments to substance abuse treatment programs in lieu of incarceration. Services to substance abusing pregnant women and women with children will allow mothers to bring their children into the facility with them for the duration of their treatment. The number of children each patient may bring will depend on a facility's physical limitations, but at a minimum each facility will allow two children for each patient. Each facility will directly provide or arrange for the children's educational, medical, recreational and social needs. Allowing children to enter treatment with their mothers will obviate the need for finding foster care or other child placements, thereby eliminating a major impediment to treatment for this population.

The IFB allowed for awards to multiple vendors statewide for two service categories. Each bidder could submit bids for Category 1: Criminal Justice Services, which required bidders to submit bids for both Level III.3 and Level III.5, and/or Category 2: Pregnant Women and Women with Children Services, which is Level III.3. All six bidders, including WCHD, are recommended for award to provide a varying number of treatment beds to be available for Alcohol & Drug Abuse Administration (ADAA) placements Statewide.



KCN will lease a 40,000 square foot warehouse in Howard County, Maryland dedicated to the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services. This warehouse will create 98 new jobs to include Regional Operations Managers, Warehouse Managers, Warehouse Staff, Order pickers/checkers, Drivers/transportation and Delivery Agents.

The MBE Participation goal was established at 20% of the total cost of goods sold to inmates. The Contractor has committed to meet the full MBE subcontracting goal by utilizing MBE subcontractors to provide staffing and commissary goods from certified minority businesses.





This program will serve male and female youth in need of services to address their specific treatment requirements. This Provider has a facility in Easton, Maryland that provides therapeutic and comprehensive services for youth with developmental disabilities, as well as emotional and behavioral challenges.

DJS is required to have programs for youth to provide both residential and non-residential services and programming for youth who are ordered by the Juvenile Courts to be placed in specific types of programs. Since DJS does not have a sufficient number of State operated programs, private providers have been relied upon to provide the majority of these services and programs. There are approximately 787 youth in other per diem contracted residential programs.

The types of residential programs include: treatment foster care, group homes, therapeutic group homes, shelter homes, residential treatment centers, residential educational programs or schools and independent living programs.

Providers are paid only for the youth placed in the program for the actual number of days they receive services. Daily (Per Diem) rates are paid in accordance with the State's Office of Children through the Interagency Rates Committee (IRC).

These services were procured through a Non-Competitive Negotiated Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services. (See State Finance and Procurement Article 13-106 and COMAR 21.14.01.03 G). The reasons for employing this method of procurement are:



The Thomas B. Finan Center (the Center) operates an 88-bed psychiatric facility located in Cumberland, Maryland. The Center serves adult and aged populations from Allegany, Washington, Frederick and Garrett counties. The Dietary Services Program provides services to the entire Center, which, in addition to the Finan Center, includes the Massie Unit, and two Jackson Units, all of which are located on the grounds of the Center. The Massie Unit has 24 beds and treats adults for drug and alcohol abuse. The two Jackson Units have 40 beds and treat adolescents for drug and alcohol abuse. In total, the dietary services program serves a combined total for the Centers/units of up to 152 residents. The AVP has been closer to the maximum capacity than the original estimates.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to modify 30 of the 35 legal services contracts for the legal representation of Children In Need of Assistance (CINA) and Termination of Parental Rights (TPR) Proceedings statewide to extend the term of the contracts by three months with three one-month renewal options, as well as request retroactive approval to add funding for increased caseloads during the previous year of the contract.

Retroactive approval is being requested to modify six contracts that exceeded the original contract award; the earliest date being 3/1/2012 and spanning until 11/20/2012. Contract amounts were exceeded due to increased caseloads in certain jurisdictions and the resulting caseload assignments that were made by the Courts on an ongoing and daily basis, as well as in part due to the CINA RFP billing structure. Measures have been taken to enhance MLSP's capacity to review and monitor legal services contracts, and jurisdictional caseloads in the future.

ITEM: 13-S-MOD (Cont.)

Reference is made to Item 9-S-MOD on the 12/5/2012 DBM BPW Agenda for legal representation of Indigent Adults involved in Adult Protective Services (APS) Guardianship Hearings and Adult Public Guardianship Review Board Hearings (APGRB). As legal services contracts for DHR's adult and child populations were about to expire within the same time period, DHR decided to solicit for both service areas via one Request for Proposals (RFP). The combined RFP was issued on 8/7/2012, with proposals due on 9/10/2012. Two separate protests from one vendor were received in September and October 2012 regarding alleged ambiguities in the RFP. DHR denied and accepted in part both Protests resulting in the amendment of certain portions of the RFP, including the due date for receipt of proposals. On 10/9/2012, an Appeal to the Protest denial was filed, and then on 10/22/2012 a second Appeal was filed.

To allow time for the Appeals and evaluation process, as well as align the contract terms for adult and child legal services, Maryland Legal Services Program (MLSP) is requesting these modifications for the period 3/1/2013 - 5/31/2013 to complete the procurement process to make new CINA/TPR contract awards. In the event that additional time is needed to complete the procurement process, DHR is requesting Board of Public Works (BPW) approval of the three one-month renewal options, beginning 6/1/2013, that DHR will exercise on a month to month basis without further BPW approval for a possible total extension of six months.

DHR believes that it is in the State's best interest to extend all 35 MLSP contracts for the duration explained above, rather than exercise the remaining two-year renewal option. Five of the contract extensions can be approved under DHR's delegated authority, since they require no additional funding and are for time only. The remaining 30 contracts require BPW approval as additional funding is being added in anticipation of on-going legal representation services for the extension period and/or the amount of funds to be expended during the extension period exceeds DHR's delegated authority. The increased funding directly coincides with the upward trend of cases handled by the Contractors. In addition, the Contractors have maintained the same prices, terms and conditions negotiated for the current renewal option period during the extension period. The breakdown by Contractor is as follows:

DHR is statutorily mandated to ensure the provision of quality legal representation to children in need of assistance, and must compensate attorneys for the representation of a child when the services are the responsibility of the Local Department of Social Services. (See § 3-813, Courts and Judicial Proceedings Article and §5-323, Family Law Article, Annotated Code of Maryland).

MLSP is satisfied that CINA/TPR Contractors continue to provide quality legal representation to Maryland's abused and/or neglected children involved in the foster care system. 

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for retroactive approval of a modification to increase the contract amount by \$56,297 in order to repair and replace inoperable dental equipment.

Correctional Dental Associates (CDA) conducted a physical dental equipment inventory within the first 90-days of their contract commencement date and discovered that various dental equipment needed repair and/or replacement, as well as other equipment that needed to be purchased to meet their contractual obligations. Since the previous agreement contained language that stated that "The Dental Contractor shall maintain and repair all equipment and shall be responsible for the replacement of any equipment, if replacement becomes necessary," DPSCS began negotiations with FCM-MTC Joint Venture, LLC (FCM-MTC), the previous Contractor, for the repairs. This resulted in DPSCS taking \$40,000 in direct damages from FCM-MTC to offset the additional funds needed to repair and/or replace the dental equipment.

To avoid a delay in the delivery of inmate dental services, in March 2011, DPSCS authorized CDA to move forward with the purchase/repair of \$29,138.97 in dental equipment. However, there is still a balance of \$27,158 in equipment/repairs that were also discovered and require repairs or replacement, which brings the total amount needed for this modification to over \$50,000, and therefore requiring Board of Public Works approval.

REQUESTING INSTITUTION REMARKS: The solicitation was advertised in *eMaryland Market Place* and on UMUC's internet *Electronic Bid Board*. Twenty-five agencies responded. Nine were deemed not susceptible of the award as they did not provide the required MBE forms. The other sixteen were evaluated by an Evaluation and Selection Committee. Eight agencies were shortlisted and interviewed by the evaluation committee. Following the interviews, a second-phase technical evaluation was conducted resulting in UMUC further short-listing to seven agencies. Further discussions were held. Site visits to each agency were also conducted. A final technical evaluation was then conducted resulting in all seven firms being requested to submit price proposals. Upon completion of the technical and price evaluation processes, a primary agency has been selected in each marketing category as well as several secondary agencies in three of the four marketing categories.

The solicitation contemplated multiple awards to agencies who could demonstrate expertise in one or more of the marketing categories and who could serve as primary or secondary sources in each of the four categories. The primary vendors will work with the University as the main point of contact for day-to-day marketing efforts within the categories for which they have expertise.





REMARKS: The Rehab program allows the State to recoup funds through the federal reimbursement process for costs paid to providers that are contracted to provide rehabilitative services. These services are provided to Medicaid-eligible children in the State's care and custody who are placed in therapeutic and group home settings. Contracted providers must submit claims every month to DHR electronically. The claims go through an internal quality assurance process and then are submitted electronically to a contractor, who then prepares the claims to be submitted to MMIS for final claims processing and payment.

DHR awarded a previous emergency contract for a 10 month period for these services (Secretary's Agenda Appendix 5, January 25, 2012). On that Agenda DHR informed the Board that a new solicitation was being developed under DoIT's CATS II Master Contract. Reference is also made to Secretary's Agenda Appendix A15 (August 22, 2012) in which DHR reported the award of an emergency nine-month contract to Xerox. At that time, DHR informed the Board that it would be in the best interest of the State to solicit for these services in a stand-alone Request for Proposal instead of under DoIT's Master Contract. Thus, DHR now seeks approval to extend the current contract term for seven months.

The extension will ensure continuity of the State's ability to receive reimbursement for costs incurred in providing services to children in the care and custody of the State. Without this extension, the State would lose approximately \$1.7 million per month in federal reimbursements. The new solicitation is being finalized, and it is anticipated that a new contract will be in place by October 1, 2013.

REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and a copy of the RFP was sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs. Four proposals were received. Two were deemed reasonably susceptible of award; the other two proposals were disqualified for lack of expertise and experience required to perform the services.

Award is recommended to Smith Solutions, Inc. which was ranked number one overall. Smith Solutions technical proposal met all the RFP requirements and demonstrated a system for identifying existing Online Instructional Toolkit items that can be adapted to support or align with the Common Core State Standards. The system aggregates new resources (best practices, lesson seeds, project ideas, simulations, print and video resources) from classroom teachers throughout Maryland as well as, from public domain sources to be included in the Toolkit. In addition, Smith Solutions offered the lower financial proposal.

In August 2010, Maryland was awarded one of the federal government's Race to the Top (RTTT) grants from the U.S. Department of Education. One goal for Maryland's reform agenda is to ensure that all students are fully prepared for college and career in the 21st Century. To that end, the Maryland RTTT application included a proposal to improve instruction through use of data. Maryland intends to use the RTTT funds to bolster the data systems, improve instruction, and attract and maintain a stronger educational workforce.

This contract will develop, implement and manage a high-quality Instructional Improvement System and State Curriculum Management System and expand the Toolkit. Maryland is transitioning to the Common Core State Standards over the four-year RTTT grant. The expanded Toolkit will facilitate the transition to the new State Common Core Curriculum by providing teachers, administrators, students, and parents with curriculum and assessment information and resources that are aligned with the new curriculum for use at the local level. The Curriculum Management System will provide the platform for storage and access to the Toolkit information and resources.

REMARKS: In 2007, the State awarded two-way-radio master contracts to 21 companies. The objective was to enable State agencies to procure mobile radio equipment, communication consoles, and services including installation, repair, and preventive maintenance. The five-year contracts expire on December 31, 2012.

On October 11, 2012, DoIT issued a Request for Proposals to solicit a two-way-radio contract to replace the current one. The award of the new two-way-radio contract is proposed as DoIT Item 5-IT on today's Agenda but the transition period to that contract could take up to three months. DoIT asked all agencies using maintenance services from the existing contract if they need continued service while work is transitioned to the replacement contract. Only SHA needed additional time with existing contractors.

DolT recommends that the three contractors supporting SHA work be extended for three months. This limited work for SHA will be performed without increasing the contract ceiling. No new work, either with SHA or any other agency, will be permitted under this extension. The threemonth extension will enable SHA to provide necessary maintenance and repair of two-way radio equipment while it issues new PORFPs under the Two-Way Radio 2013 Master Contract.

REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and the DoIT website. E-mail notice was delivered to all businesses identified as capable of delivering these services in the Maryland Department of Transportation's Minority Business Enterprise Directory and to seventeen minority business advocacy groups.

DoIT received 25 proposals. A total of $\overline{22}$ qualified offerors are recommended for award of a Master Contract; $\overline{17}$ are Maryland businesses, 7 are small businesses, and 2 are MBEs.

The Master Contract will succeed the current two-way radio master contract, which expires December 31, 2012.

The new Two-Way Radio Master Contract encompasses the following three functional areas:

There will be a second level of competition through PORFP process for all two-way radio equipment and services. For PORFPs designated as Small Business Reserve, only Master Contractors that are DGS-certified as small businesses will compete.

Functional Area III provides the only potential for subcontracting opportunities; an overall MBE subcontractor participation goal of 5% has been established for this Master Contract.


Master Contractors PORFP prices may not exceed the manufacturer's suggested retail price for the hardware being purchased. By use of the competitive PORFP process, prices should be lower than proposed Master Contract pricing.

This procurement vehicle was designed to provide State agencies with a wide selection of Master Contractors who offer an extensive variety of two-way radio equipment and services. State agencies will obtain two-way radio equipment, installation, repair and preventive maintenance services quickly and efficiently by issuing PORFPs specific to each agency's needs. This contracting vehicle is also available to local and county Maryland government jurisdictions.

Executive Branch agencies spent \$31 million on the five-year predecessor contract. Based on this, DoIT recommends that the ceiling of the successor contract be set at \$31 million. Should agencies anticipate spending in excess of this amount and have funding available to do so, DoIT will return to the Board of Public Works with a request to raise the ceiling threshold.



REMARKS: A notice of availability of the Request for Proposal was advertised on *eMaryland Marketplace.com* and on the DPSCS website. Two proposals were received, both of which were determined to be reasonably susceptible of award. Award is recommended to Global Tel*Link (GTL). GTL was ranked number one overall with the higher technical offer and the lower financial offer. The RFP provided that technical factors be given equal weight with financial factors in the overall award determination.

This contract will result in a revenue-producing contract to provide local and long distance, debit/prepaid and collect telephone services to inmates incarcerated in correctional facilities within DPSCS. This contract will also provide for all new equipment and a state-of-the-art inmate telephone system that is user-friendly, controls fraud, and monitors data (calls) real-time through a web-based application.

GTL is the largest inmate telecommunications provider in the country with 58% of the Division of Corrections inmate market. GTL thoroughly demonstrated its ability to handle the State's inmate payphone equipment and services requirements.

Based on the estimated number of calls/minutes in FY 2012, awarding the contract to GTL will decrease costs to inmates and their families by \$5,809,7310.10 and an increase State revenue by approximately \$2,300,000 over the next three years.

On November 19, 2012, the incumbent, Securus Technologies, filed a protest against the award to GTL. DPSCS denied the protest on November 30, 2012.

Securus's appeal of DPSCS's denial was docketed at the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals on December 5, 2012.

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ITEM: 7-IT (Cont'd)

DPSCS recommends award in pending the protest as "execution of the contract without delay is necessary to protect substantial State interests." See COMAR 21.10.02.11.A

The substantial State interests are:

- The new telephone system will significantly enhance public safety and institutional security in important ways.
 - For example, the GTL system will provide previously unavailable investigatory tools for law enforcement, homeland security and corrections officers, offering the State the ability to perform link charting, data mining and intelligence gathering in an efficient manner while using information beyond that contained in inmate telephone records.
 - GTL's Data IQ allows intelligence gathering that not only takes into account the inmate telephone calls but can also span other data sources ranging from financial transactions to visitation records. This analysis of multiple law enforcement databases will revolutionize the approach that the State uses in gathering actionable intelligence to safeguard Maryland residents, and will substantially increase the speed with which investigators can review large amounts of data and reduce staff time now dedicated to laborious investigative work.
 - Maryland will benefit from GTL's existing inmate telephone services in all of the Departments of Correction that border Maryland: Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Washington DC, and Virginia DOC, in addition to the federal Bureau of Prisons. Information sharing among these agencies, available only through GTL's unified databases, will expand the State's intelligence gathering capabilities.
- The new contract will lower inmate telephone rates from existing levels to lower rates. In other states where call rates have been reduced (*e.g.*, California, New York), call volumes have increased, thus increasing communication between the inmate and their friends and family. Increased communication enhances and promotes community re-entry and reduces recidivism.
- Increased revenue to the State.
