

In addition, the reservoir usable storage volume will be increased to 16 million gallons from the current 9 million gallons in order to provide flow equalization and emergency storage.

- A. Estimated \$4,000,000 loan to be repaid over a period not to exceed 20 years following project completion, at an interest rate of 25% of the average of the Bond Buyer 11-Bond Index for the month preceding loan closing. Based on this formula, recent loan recipients have received a 1.10% interest rate. To secure this debt, the City of Baltimore will deliver to the Maryland Water Quality Financing Administration a revenue bond that is on parity with its outstanding sewer utility revenue bonds which have a first lien on the gross revenues of the system.
- **B.** Estimated \$1,300,000 will be Principal Forgiveness loan. This loan will be forgiven as a Disadvantaged Community under the Federal Clean Water Act. The principal forgiveness loan terms are enforceable should there be a programmatic default on the Loan Agreement.

**Project Description:** The project consists of the upgrade and expansion of the existing 73 million gallons per day Patapsco Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). The WWTP upgrade involves the planning, design and construction of BNR and ENR facilities to achieve annual average Total Nitrogen concentrations of 4.0 mg/l, a seasonal TN concentration of 3.0 mg/l from May to October, and annual Total Phosphorous concentration of 0.3 mg/l based on average flows of 81 mgd, that represents an 83% reduction in TN and 85% in TP. This project also involves expansion of plant capacity from 73 mgd to the design capacity of 81 mgd identified in the City's Comprehensive Wastewater Facility Master Plan of 2002. This action will fund the work related to contract SC855, which primarily is the Enhanced Nutrient Removal modifications to existing facilities.





## **20.** STATE TREASURER (cont'd) June 2011 Tax-Exempt Equipment Lease-Purchase Financing

**REMARKS**: The State Treasurer's Office issued an Invitation for Bids for financing on a consolidated basis \$891,526.03 in capital equipment; published it on *eMarylandMarketplace*; posted on the websites for the National Association of State Treasurers and the State Treasurer's Office; and emailed to 30 firms known to be active in financing municipal leases. This Lease-Purchase financing is expected to close no later than June 10, 2011. Eight bids were received on May 20, 2011. Following evaluation, two of the bids were rejected for failure to meet bid requirements. The remaining six bids were evaluated and were weighted based on the actual amounts to be financed and the rates for the respective lease terms of 3 years and 5 years. See the attached Summary of Equipment Schedules.

Rather than utilize a long-term Master Lease, the State Treasurer's Office has determined to periodically consolidate the financing requests for equipment from State agencies and to solicit new equipment lease-purchase financing bids from lessors. This method more appropriately corresponds to current market conditions.

Following the June 2011 Tax-Exempt Equipment Lease-Purchase financing, the remaining balance of the \$100 million originally approved by the Legislative Policy Committee for equipment lease-purchase financing will be approximately \$72.8 million. This authorization expires on June 30, 2011 and the Treasurer has requested approval from the Legislative Policy Committee of \$40 million in new authorizations for the period July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2013.

## 21. MARYLAND ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICE

**Recommendation:** That the Board of Public Works grant Maryland Environmental Service a temporary exception for one year from the automatic termination of funds authorized by the MES Infrastructure Improvement Fund in the Maryland Consolidated Capital Bond Loan of 2004. Chapter 432, Acts of 2004, Maryland Environmental Service UB00 (083 MCCBL 04).

Authority: Section 8-128(c), State Finance and Procurement Article, Annotated Code of Maryland states: "Except to the extent that money authorized by an enabling act for a State project or program has been encumbered by the Board, an authorization of State debt shall automatically terminate 7 years after the date of authorization, unless . . . (2) In an emergency, the Board [of Public Works] unanimously grants a temporary exception for a period of 1 year."

**Background:** The 2004 MCCBL provided funds to the Maryland Environmental Service "to design, construct, and equip capital improvement for State institutions," specifically:

- 1. Springfield Hospital Center. Construct improvements to the water distribution and wastewater system.
- 2. Deep Creek State Park. Design and construct improvements to the water distribution and wastewater treatment facility.
- 3. Western Maryland State Parks. Design and construct improvements to the water and wastewater systems.
- 4. St. Mary's College. Design and construct improvements to the water distribution and wastewater collection system.
- 5. Sandy Point State Park. Construct improvements to the water tower.
- 6. Jessup Correctional Complex. Construct improvements to the water tower.

MES recently became aware of additional areas at Western Maryland State Parks (Deep Creek, Fort Frederick, and Gambrill) that need replacement or rehabilitation. Although projects were undertaken and completed several years ago, the work did not include replacement of the entire distribution and collection systems at these Parks because it was cost prohibitive and unnecessary at the time the work was performed. MES seeks to use the balance of the appropriation in the next year to fix leaking water lines at Deep Creek and continue upgrades to the systems at Gambrill and Fort Frederick State Parks.

**REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:** A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* reaching 786 prospective offerors, of which 382 are registered small businesses and 231 are certified minority businesses. A copy of the solicitation was also provided to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

This is a task order based contract with approved labor categories fixed hourly rates. The contract provides for the redevelopment and implementation of the Maryland Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), the statewide plan dedicated to saving lives and preventing injuries by reducing the number and severity of motor vehicle crashes through the administration of a comprehensive and effective network of traffic safety programs in Maryland. The contractor will provide project management, technical assistance, production coordination, quality control and assurance for all tasks and work activities required to support the SHSP.

A total of five proposals were received in response to the RFP, four of which were deemed reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. One proposal was deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award.

The recommended offeror, Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) was ranked highest technically and had the second lowest price. The lowest priced offeror was ranked technically #4. Technical evaluation factors received greater consideration than price, and SAIC's technical superiority was judged to outweigh the \$67,634 difference in the evaluated financial price of the lowest priced offeror. Some of the strengths of SAIC's well organized proposal included:

- Evidence of SAIC's superb experience in engineering, behavioral highway safety programs, other states' strategic highway safety plans and highway safety grant programs.
- A very good understanding of the current SHSP, including weaknesses that should be addressed as a part of the SHSP update process.

- A coherent plan which included data analysis, application of proven countermeasures and consistent evaluation methods that will assist the State in monitoring the progress toward its goals for traffic safety
- Specific recommendations on data analysis and problem identification to make the most efficient use of available funding.
- A discussion of performance measures and their importance in the implementation of the SHSP and in monitoring its success.
- An explanation of how SAIC would assist the State in leveraging resources in other plans and processes to support SHSP and how funding decision-making processes should be integrated into the implementation of the plan.
- The identification of SAIC's proposed team, which is competent and knowledgeable of proven, cost-effective and innovative highway safety strategies and best practices and is in a position to make immediate contributions to the State on this project.

The renewal option amounts are based upon the changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), capped at a 4% maximum increase as per the terms of the contract. If the options are exercised, the actual renewal option amounts will be determined using the CPI at the end of the base term of the contract for option #1 and the first option for option #2.

The MBE/DBE (Federal Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program) participation goal was established at 25%. SAIC has committed to exceeding the goal by subcontracting 25.41% to certified MBE/DBE firms.

**REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:** A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com*. Copies of the solicitation notice were emailed directly to 23 prospective vendors, 16 of which are Maryland firms, and none are MBEs. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP. All three were deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Parker Forestry Services, Inc. (Parker) was ranked technically #3 and financially #1. Although Parker was the 3<sup>rd</sup> (lowest) technically ranked offeror, it was still judged to be a very capable vendor. In fact, the technical difference among the three offerors was not judged to be sufficient to off-set the difference in price, \$707,139 and \$1,045,140 respectively, between the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> technically ranked offerors and Parker. The #1 ranked technical offeror had the second lowest price; however, the slight technical advantage of the incumbent was not determined to outweigh the \$707,139 lower price of Parker, the #3 ranked technical offeror. The #2 ranked technical offeror had the highest price. Consistent with the judgment that the technical differences were so slight between the #1 and #3 technically ranked offerors, the #2 technical offeror's price was considered too high since it was \$338,001 higher than the #1 ranked technical offeror and \$1,045,140 higher than the #3 ranked technical offeror. Therefore, award is recommended to Parker Forestry Services, Inc., which was determined to provide the most advantageous offer for the State.

This contract will provide forestry management services as it relates to the sale of forest products, the implementation of silvicultural activities and other treatments, in addition to the adherence of forest certification protocols on the Chesapeake and Pocomoke Forest Lands Project. This Project supports sustainable forestry that will promote the local timber industry and contribute to the local economy on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. The contract also provides for the support of diverse plant and animal life and will contribute to improved water quality while providing recreational opportunities.

The contract contains fixed-fee provisions for certain land management services to be provided by the contractor. In addition, for those parcels of land in the Project that are subject to timbering, revenues are generated. During the five-year term of the contract an estimated gross \$9,500,000 in revenue is expected to be received by the State. From the revenue stream, the contractor will be reimbursed for eligible expenses per contract guidelines. Reimbursements are to cover the expenses incurred by the contractor for paying logging contractors for harvesting forest products and for land management expenses. Over the five-year term of the contract an estimated \$5,000,000 in eligible expenses will be paid out. This is based upon historically documented revenue and expense amounts obtained over the five years of the prior contract. The revenue and expense amounts are only estimates that are affected every year by local timber markets and weather conditions. After deducting the estimated \$5 million in eligible expenses and the Contractor's \$1,090,000 fee, it is projected that net contract revenue to the State will be between \$3.4 - \$4 million.

There was no MBE goal established for this contract because a search of the State's MBE Directory by the Department using every service sub-category possible found no certified MBEs for this service.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval of 42 contracts beginning 7/1/2011 for residential and non-residential services for youth referred by DJS. DJS is required to provide both residential and non-residential services and programming for youth who are ordered by the Juvenile Court to be placed in specific types of programs. Since DJS does not have a sufficient number of State operated programs, private providers have been relied upon to provide the majority of these services and programs. The types of residential programs include: treatment foster care, group homes, therapeutic group homes, shelter homes, residential treatment centers, residential educational programs or schools and independent living programs. Home based supervision treatment is also provided. There are approximately 1,078 youth in these programs daily.

For In-State providers, the State's Office of Children, through the Interagency Rates Committee (IRC), sets standardized rates for these services. Similarly, for Out-of-State providers a government organization in the provider's state (the rate setting authority) establishes or approves standardized rates. For both In-State and Out-of-State providers, DJS determines the not to exceed amounts of each contract based upon an estimated number of youth that may require these services annually. Contractors are paid only for the youth placed in the program for the actual number of days they receive services. Daily (Per Diem) rates are paid in accordance with the IRC or the rate setting authority for Out-of-State providers.

MHA contracts with an Administrative Services Organization (ASO), currently ValueOptions (VO), to manage the Public Mental Health System (PMHS). VO's duties under the contract include authorizing and managing inpatient and outpatient services, paying claims, processing all claims with the Medicaid Management Information System (MMIS) to obtain federal funds in accordance with the federal and state Medicaid laws and regulations, conducting audits of programs, performing data analysis and reporting, conducting evaluation activities, and implementing special projects. VO processes claims at no cost to the provider and has the capacity to accept a minimum of five million claims annually in either paper or electronic format.

This contract was modified (see Attachment) to add the ADAA designed and developed Maryland RecoveryNet as an Access to Recovery (ATR) Project to enhance linkages to clinical/recovery support services when programs discharge consumers. The goal is to improve recovery, reduce re-admission rates, and expand the system's capacity to treat more clients. Consumers will be able to be linked not only to substance abuse providers but also to MHA providers. The federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration is funding this project through a grant. This modification allows the ASO to reimburse providers in the RecoveryNet program.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Currently, Maryland participates in a pooling arrangement with eight other states under a single contractor to operate a referred Drug List and negotiate and bill drug manufacturers for supplemental rebates. The benefit of this pooling arrangement is that Maryland can take advantage of the economy of scale due to the large number of Medicaid members covered by all participating states and at the same time make independent decisions that are best for Maryland. Maryland is not bound by decisions or recommendations made by the other participating states. Additional states are anxiously waiting

to join the pool, pending legislative or other authorization within those states.

Maryland has less than 50,000 fee-for-service lives. Without the pooling arrangement some drug manufacturers might consider Maryland too small a player to offer meaningful supplemental rebates. By being part of a multi-state pool, with over 2,300,000 covered lives, however, Maryland is able to benefit from an economy of scale that it could never achieve on its own.

The initial procurement was a sole source due to the pooling arrangement that Maryland has with eight other states and the contractor to operate its Preferred Drug List as well as negotiate and bill for pharmacy supplemental rebates. This arrangement provides the maximum benefit, i.e., economy of scale and strength of multi-states, yet provides Maryland with independent decision making authority. The failure to exercise this option would result in Maryland's inability to maintain considerable cost containment efforts provided thru this contract and result in decreased Maryland Medicaid revenues by the Pharmacy Program (\$9.5M in revenues due to supplemental rebates during CY2010).

#### **CONTRACT DESCRIPTION:**

The Healthy Air Act of 2006 required Maryland to join the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) and on April 20, 2007, Governor O'Malley signed the RGGI Memorandum of Understanding making Maryland a member state. The 10 Northeast and Mid-Atlantic states comprising RGGI implemented the nation's first regional carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) cap-and-trade program to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from power plants utilizing an auction format.

This contract is with RGGI, Inc. The states formed this regional organization, RGGI, Inc., as a non-profit non-stock corporation to provide technical and scientific advisory services to the RGGI States in the development and implementation of a multi-state cap and trade, greenhouse gas control program and to perform administrative services. RGGI, Inc. has or will subcontract for several specific services: auction platform design and implementation; emissions and allowance tracking system; auction verification and market monitoring; and offset system development. This contract represents Maryland's share of the regional expenses.

**REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:** The Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), a market-based carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) cap and trade program designed to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from fossil fuel-fired power plants, commenced on January 1, 2009. Since there are no technological controls available to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions, the program works through a market-based trading program where at least a portion of CO<sub>2</sub> allowances are purchased through auction and the proceeds are used to fund energy efficiency programs, obtaining reduced CO<sub>2</sub> emissions through reduced demand for electricity. The program applies to electric generating units. These units purchase a CO<sub>2</sub> allowance for each ton of CO<sub>2</sub> emitted. States determine whether sources have the required allowances at three year intervals. The program has generated over \$162 million dollars in revenue for the State to fund strategic energy programs.

Agency heads from the primary energy and environmental agencies for the ten RGGI states deliberated at length on how to implement the RGGI program and decided that a regional auction supported by regional database systems offered the best approach for implementation of the program. The regional platform provides a regular and stable setting for electricity generators to purchase CO<sub>2</sub> allowances, dampens price volatility through auctioning allowances, an important consideration to minimize impacts to both electricity generators and consumers, and provides economies of scale in the development of these foundational systems. The regional organization proposed in the RGGI MOU signed by the Governor was the logical choice to implement these regional programs.

Each RGGI state is responsible for subsidizing RGGI, Inc.'s funding needs based upon the percentage of that State's annual allocation from the regional CO<sub>2</sub> allowance cap. Maryland is responsible for funding approximately 20% of RGGI, Inc.'s annual budget, including operating expenses and support of vendor contracts. Most states are depending upon the auction revenue to fund RGGI, Inc. Auction revenues continue to provide funding for this contract.

This contract includes Maryland's share of the regional organization staff and operating expenses, plus Maryland's share of the development costs for several important support systems. These systems include:

- I. Design and operation of a regional emissions and allowance tracking system, for use by the Department in administering the Maryland CO<sub>2</sub> Budget Trading Program and the counterpart programs in other participating states.
- II. Design and operation of a regional allowance auction platform, for use by the Department in administering the Maryland CO<sub>2</sub> Budget Trading Program and the counterpart programs in other participating states.
- III. Development of model offsets consistency applications and model offsets monitoring and verification submittal forms, suitable for customization by the Department for use in administering the offsets component of the Maryland CO<sub>2</sub> Budget Trading Program.
- IV. Market monitoring services for monitoring of both allowance auction conduct and outcomes and monitoring of the secondary allowance markets.

RGGI, Inc. completed development of these systems on schedule, which included the execution of contracts with vendors. To date, 11 auctions have been held and proceeds transferred without any problems. Market monitors have found no evidence of misconduct in the auction process and the financial and allowance transactions have been secure. It is in the best interest of the State to exercise the available one-year renewal option because the price for the renewal option amount is much lower than would be needed to have another auction platform and database that would provide the same level of functionality and security. Additionally, in order for Maryland to auction its allowances on schedule, the system would need to be operational by September 2011. RGGI, Inc. is able to provide the needed services for the lowest price possible, making the one-year renewal option preferable to other alternatives.

The modification is in the best interest of the State because it is more cost effective to continue with the current contract and build upon the system already in place with NCS Pearson, Inc. rather than have a new contract with complex transitional issues. NCS Pearson, Inc. has built the test forms, administration manuals, computer delivery interface, created test items for computer delivery, reports and item analysis programming that is being used currently. If the State were to conduct a procurement for a new contract, all of these deliverables would be developed again from "scratch" rather than being able to build upon the existing deliverables or re-using them for the next test edition year. Additionally, the annual cost quoted for the extension is reasonable because 2010 and 2011 tests included the implementation of MOD-MSA which added 12 more tests at overall costs of \$15,156,982 for 2010 and \$15,041,860 for 2011. ### REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS:

Through the existing contract, CSC provides ongoing technical and business support and maintenance for the Medicaid Management Information System II (MMIS II) and the Electronic Data Interchange Transaction Processing System (EDITPS). As stated in the original solicitation for this contract, "Contractor shall provide [DHMH] with MMIS on-site functional and technical expertise to assist state staff with system and programming specifications, program development, problem determination, interfaces from/to other management applications, program migration, database administration and problem resolution." The Medicaid Program has become increasingly complex, with service changes, eligibility changes, new regulations, and requirements to support Health Information Exchange using Service Oriented Architecture. Adherence to federal rules is necessary to ensure federal funds.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services announced a final rule to implement the provisions of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 that provide incentive payments to adopt and meaningfully use certified electronic health record (EHR) technology. The Medicaid EHR Incentive Program will provide incentive payments to eligible professionals and eligible hospitals as they adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology in their first year of participation.

The eMipp solution is built on a services framework and can integrate with the existing MMIS system, other state systems and Health Information Exchanges. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid has approved this solution for other states and, therefore, it becomes an option for all states to use. CMS has also mandated that Group 4 States enter into testing between July 1, 2011 and August 26, 2011 to qualify for 90% federal funds match. The loss of this solution would slow or possibly halt progress of this project. Without complying with this regulation, Medicaid would be in jeopardy of losing federal funding.

The contractor, CSC, has exceeded the established MBE subcontract goal of 25% The 2006 Agenda Item incorrectly stated the MBE goal was 34.26%. The MBE participation schedule states the vendor will meet a goal of 25%. This correction has been validated by the MBE Liaison Office at DHMH. In 2006, CSC's was the lowest priced proposal submitted and the services performed have always been within budget.

This Contract provides for onsite support for emergency repair, routine maintenance, software modifications, hardware replacement and other support as required by the Light Rail for the Maryland Transit Administration's (MTA) Light Rail Control Integration (LRCI) Project. The Contractor will provide these services on an as-needed basis.

MTA's initial installation of the ARINC Information and Management System (AIMS) Version 5.0 was implemented by ARINC at the Light Rail Division in November 1996. A newer version of AIMS, Version 6.2, was installed at Light Rail as part of the Double Track Project in September 2004. Because of the proprietary nature of the AIMS platform, other software vendors would not have legal access to the customized configuration of the application and data base infrastructure. For Light Rail to receive the necessary support, from a vendor other than ARINC would require total redesign, testing and implementation of new train control management software. Light Rail Operations and Systems Maintenance personnel received the contractually required training from ARINC with initial system installation of the system. The training provided adequate operational and functional knowledge of the system. However, it would be beyond Light Rail's technical expertise to troubleshoot and repair any complex problems that may develop with the database or application software. By exercising this one year option renewal MTA will authorize ARINC, Inc. to provide the necessary maintenance services and ensure the continued compatibility of existing equipment, software and training for the Maryland Transit Administration's, Light Rail Control Integration Project.

REMARKS: The Request for Proposal between Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) and New Flyer of America became effective in 2007. The WMATA contract was awarded in compliance with all FTA mandated clauses. The DBE goals established by WMATA for this contract were approved by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) on October 6, 2009. Although the vendors approved by the FTA are not registered in Maryland, the DBE participation is 11.0% of the estimated contract value.

MTA will purchase 57 Hybrid Diesel Electric Buses manufactured by New Flyer of America by piggybacking on a contract between the Washington Metropolitan Transit Authority (WMATA) and New Flyer. The 57 buses will replace older buses that require extra maintenance time and cost. Replacing the older buses will enable the MTA to meet the needs of riders by providing reliable transportation.

The Contract with New Flyer has been negotiated per COMAR 21.05.09, Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchasing. Utilizing this procurement method will allow the MTA to realize savings in time and money in acquiring the buses. The unit cost of the buses has been reduced to \$647,108.00 from \$677,712.00, a savings of \$30,604 per bus or \$1,744,428 for all 57 buses.

Developing a new solicitation could take the MTA up to two years to prepare specifications, advertise, and award. The buses meet all Federal Transit Administration requirements. In addition the contract with WMATA contains all required Federal clauses and meets the requirements of the FTA's Best Practices Manual for piggyback contracts. 192



#### **BACKGROUND**

#### The Grants

The State granted FCS (Grantee), a non-profit provider of residential child care services since 1896, \$1,252,322.00 in general-obligation bond proceeds for a building to serve adolescent girls who have psychiatric problems.

"To assist in the cost of designing, constructing, and equipping a 34-bed dormitory and an 8-bed independent living unit at 3110 Crittenton Place in Baltimore City."

- A. \$188,615.00 Juvenile Services Capital Facilities Loan of 1988

#### Grant Terms and Conditions

- (1) Grants A and B require Grantee to remain a provider of juvenile and mental health services for a period of thirty (30) years. Failure to do so would constitute a default entitling the State to recover from Grantee an amount calculated according to the statutory formula set out in Maryland Human Services Article § 9-406(d) and Maryland Health General Article § 24-606(g)(2).
  - The BPW previously agreed to subordinate the State's legal and equitable rights to 3110 Crittenton Place, Baltimore City, to a new Deed of Trust in order to enable FCS to restructure its debt and continue to serve Maryland's vulnerable youth. (2/14/07 DGS Agenda, Item 30-CGL)
- (2) Grants A and C agreements contain the standard language that prohibits Grantee from selling, exchanging, giving away, or otherwise transferring or disposing of real or personal property acquired with Grant funds without Board of Public Works approval.

FCS ceased operations and relinquished its license as a residential child care facility as a result of financial hardship, on or about August 31, 2010. FCS efforts to market the real property have been adversely affected by a number of factors including the historical easement, environmental issues (buried oil tanks), restrictive zoning, and the generally deteriorated condition of the improvements. The only firm offer has been that of Dr. Douglas Carroll to purchase the property in "as is" condition for \$740,000 plus \$85,000 to cover standard closing costs, brokers' commissions, and the seller's attorneys' fees. The current owner of the debt, Hamilton Federal Bank, has agreed to compromise its claim which will total \$836,350.67 as of June 1, 2011, in order to allow the sale to proceed.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Departments of General Services, Juvenile Services, and Health and Mental Hygiene recommend granting a conditional waiver of the State's rights of recovery, for good cause shown, conditioned on the current contract of sale between FCS, Dr. Douglas Carroll and Hamilton Bank being finalized and the property being transferred to Dr. Carroll. This recommendation is based on:

- (1) The bonds that funded the grants are no longer outstanding;
- (2) FCS has provided over 100 years of service to Maryland youth with nearly 20 years of service on its 30 year obligation under the terms of the Capital Grants;
- (3) Alternatives to granting a conditional waiver are costly and not in the public interest.
  - a. Pursuing a claim against FCS for default, and locating a buyer willing to offer an amount for the real property in its current devalued condition sufficient to pay the existing loan obligations with Hamilton Federal Bank would result in high costs to the State;
  - b. Allowing the property to proceed to foreclosure will likely not yield a buyer capable of carrying out the substantial rehabilitation necessary to utilize the property resulting in the loss of an historical property, the loss of potential tax revenue, and creating a blight on the community.

Grantee now seeks Board of Public Works approval of its transfer of grant-funded property to Dr. Douglas Carroll. Grantee also seeks Board approval to retain the sale proceeds and use the proceeds to pay Hamilton Federal Bank for existing debt on the grant-funded property, including all closing costs associated with the sale. Grantee acknowledges that the Board's granting of a waiver of the State's interest is conditioned on the agreement of sale, dated May 13, 2011, between FCS, Dr. Douglas Carroll and Hamilton Federal Bank proceeding to settlement and being finalized.
