Before spending any funds secured under these Acts, the agency or institution shall certify its efforts to the Board of Public Works and state the reason for any failure to obtain federal funds. If federal funds are obtained, they shall be used to defray the costs of the project described in these Acts, not to expand its scope.

2. <u>BONDS</u>

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works authorize for publication in the *Maryland Register* the automatic terminations of State debt authorizations listed below. These terminations reduce the State's authority to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$1,308,038.06 and, at the same time, reduce the State's spending authority as shown for the capital projects listed. The Comptroller notified agencies of impending terminations on a quarterly basis throughout the fiscal year and grantees of impending terminations on June 18, 2010 and January 5, 2011.

The Office of the Comptroller, the State Treasurer's Office, the Department of Budget and Management (Office of Capital Budgeting), and the Department of General Services have reviewed this request and concur.

Background: State law provides "Except to the extent that money authorized by an enabling act for a State project or program has been encumbered by the Board, an authorization of State debt shall automatically terminate 7 years after the date of the authorization, unless...the Board unanimously grants a temporary exception for 1 year."

Authority: Section 8-128, State Finance and Procurement Article, Maryland Code.



REMARKS: The solicitation was advertised on *eMaryland Marketplace* and a copy of the solicitation was sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs. Four proposals were received.

Because there is no meaningful opportunity for MBE subcontracting, the office instead focused on maximizing participation by small and minority businesses as the prime contractor. Certified MBE transcription companies were directly solicited. Hunt Reporting and For the Record are certified small businesses, and For the Record is also a certified MBE.

The RFP stated that technical factors would receive greater consideration than financial factors. The financial proposals are based on an average of 23 meetings per year and 3,600 pages of transcript. Award is recommended to Hunt Reporting which has the top-ranked technical proposal. Hunt's price proposal is competitive and represents only a 5% increase from its current contract. Hunt Reporting, as the incumbent, has been providing excellent service to the Board for many years.

6. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> State Procurement Regulations

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works propose repealing COMAR 21.11.03.14 which prohibits protests of agency Minority Business Enterprise decisions.

Background: The Court of Special Appeals recently concluded that the State Procurement Regulation that bars aggrieved bidders from submitting protests based on MBE issues is inconsistent with the procurement statute and the legislative intent behind it. The court's ruling in Salisbury University v. Joseph M. Zimmer, Inc., September Term 2010 No. 462 (Ct. Spec. App. 5/27/11), invalidated COMAR 21.11.03.14. The court concluded the procurement statute "grants contractors aggrieved by agency MBE decisions the right to submit bid protests; the regulation prohibits them from doing so. The statutory provisions trump the regulation."

Action: Approval of this Item authorizes submission of the regulatory proposal to the AELR Committee and subsequent publication for public comment in the Maryland Register.

State Procurement Regulations

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works propose amendments to the State Procurement Regulations, COMAR Title 21. The 2011 General Assembly amended the State Minority Business Enterprise Law; these statutory changes and agency practices require amendments to COMAR Title 21. The Procurement Advisory Council concurred with this recommendation at its June 24, 2011 meeting.

I. Legislation: Chapters 252 and 253 (Laws of 2011)

- Requires Office of Minority Affairs (GOMA) to establish guidelines for setting MBE subgoals that will be set on procurement-by-procurement basis.
- Codifies MBE waiver reporting requirements.
- Clarifies that MBE participation may be counted only if MBE is performing commercially-useful function on contract.
- Gives agencies, after consultation with GOMA, authority to exclude contracts that would typically have an MBE goal from MBE goal setting.

Proposed COMAR Amendments:

COMAR 21.11.03.01 requires agencies to follow guidelines established by GOMA when setting MBE subgoals. The regulation also requires agencies to work with GOMA to designate that certain contracts be procured without MBE goals.

COMAR 21.11.03.09 reiterates that agencies are to follow GOMA guidelines when setting MBE subgoals.

COMAR 21.11.03.12-1 clarifies that MBE participation may be counted toward meeting a goal only if the MBE is performing a commercially-useful function. The regulation defines "commercially-useful function."

7. <u>BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS</u> State Procurement Regulations

II. Legislation: Chapter 254 (Laws of 2011)

Authorizes bidders/offerors to notify a procuring agency within 72 hours after discovering that an MBE listed as a participant in a bid or proposal is ineligible or unavailable for the work proposed.

Proposed COMAR Amendment:

COMAR 21.11.03.12 authorizes bidders/offerors to request an amendment to the MBE participation schedule after bid/proposal submission if the MBE is unavailable or ineligible to do the work required. The bidder has 72 hours to notify the agency after it makes the determination that an MBE is unavailable or ineligible. Bidders/offerors may submit an amended MBE participation schedule for the agency to consider.

III. Update obsolete notice requirement.

Proposed COMAR Amendments:

COMAR 21.11.03.08 and .09 update solicitation notice requirements to GOMA and delete obsolete references.

Action: Approval of this Item authorizes submission of the regulatory proposal to the AELR Committee and subsequent publication for public comment in the Maryland Register.





REMARKS: The CBEIS parking deck is being turned into a multi-level garage to provide additional parking at the north of campus (immediately north of the CBEIS building). The total garage project is \$6,544,797. Approximately \$1.14 million will be funded from the work deleted relating to the CBEIS parking deck and used toward the CBEIS garage. The balance in the amount of \$5,395,299.00 will be funded by the University.

The construction manager used a combination method of procuring the trade contracts: bidding and negotiating. Six of the fifteen trade categories were bid, due to either their size (\$200,000 or greater) or they involved a significant scope of work change from the on-site trade contractors. The negotiated trades were generally less than \$150,000 each. Post-bid reviews were conducted with each of the low two bidders for each category in the presence of the University's project manager. Barton Malow's fees for the garage are based on the same percentage as the original project and are included in the total \$6.5 million amount.

The Morgan State University Department of Design and Construction Management will manage the Construction Manager's work with procurement support provided by the University's Department of Procurement and Property Control.




BACKGROUND: In November 1990, DHCD made three loans to the Housing Authority of Calvert County: \$353,956 (multi-family bond program); \$1,000,000 (rental housing production program); and \$1,563,085 (partnership rental housing program). The loans enabled the Housing Authority to finance the construction of Calvert Pines II, a 48-unit apartment complex located on 5.5 acres. Calvert Pines II provides housing for low and moderate income families and individuals, with preference given to senior citizens. The loans are secured by first, second, and third lien deeds of trust.

Reference is made to Secretary's Agenda Item 11 (May 21, 2008) in which the Board of Public Works approved the borrower granting: (1) a permanent storm drainage easement; and (2) a temporary grading and construction easement, on Calvert Pines II property in Prince Frederick to facilitate adjacent development. The easement grants are related to a development project that is the subject of a development agreement between the Board of County Commissioners for Calvert County and John M. Gott, Jr., the owner of 90 acres that borders Calvert Pines II. As proposed, the Gott property development consists of a mixture of commercial and residential uses with at least 10% of the residential units to be made available for rental or purchase by households earning no more than 80% of the Calvert County median income. The Housing Authority of Calvert County will receive a payment in the amount of \$10,000 as consideration for granting the easements. The funds will be used to make upgrades at Calvert Pines II. DHCD will receive no payment for permitting the granting of the easements.

DHCD now requests approval to modify the easement grants and to grant new easements, specifically, temporary construction and grading easements, and permanent storm drainage and sewer easements will be granted to the developer, and similar easements and an inspection and maintenance agreement will be granted to the Board of County Commissioners.

MARKET VALUE:

An appraisal of Calvert Pines II prepared by Integra Realty Resources and dated December 18, 2006, estimated the market value with unrestricted rents to be \$1,400,000, and the as-financed value to be \$1,700,000. There continues to be sufficient collateral coverage for the first lien MBP loan and the second lien RHPP loan. The third lien PRHP loan is deferred in perpetuity, unless the property is no longer used as affordable housing. The granting of the easements will have no negative impact on the value of Calvert Pines II.

Neighborhood BusinessWorks Program – Fiscal Year 2011

Recommendation: The Department of Housing and Community Development recommends that the Board of Public Works approve the use of general obligation bond proceeds to fund four loans totaling \$750,000 for Fiscal Year 2011.

The 2010 General Assembly amended the Neighborhood Business Works statute to authorize DHCD to make loans to local microenterprise lenders that in turn make loans to local emerging or expanding micro enterprises. A microenterprise is a small business with five employees or fewer. With this legislative change, the Neighborhood Business Works program can expand its reach to microenterprises without expanding staff, but instead, by forming partnerships with experienced local micro-lenders.

The four borrowers are Maryland non-profit micro-lenders that will serve as DHCD's intermediary in the origination and funding of microenterprise loans. DHCD's portion of the microenterprise loans will not exceed \$35,000 per project.



Background: The Neighborhood Business Development Program, operating as Neighborhood BusinessWorks, was established in 1995 to provide flexible gap financing for small businesses starting up or expanding in locally designated neighborhood revitalization areas throughout Maryland. Loans are made to Maryland-based local development corporations, microenterprises, nonprofit organizations, or small businesses. Loans and grants are made to these organizations whose activities contribute to the broader revitalization of the designated neighborhood (*e.g.*, reuse of vacant/underutilized buildings or providing needed goods or services to area residents). Financing ranges from \$1,000 up to the lesser of (i) \$500,000 or (ii) 50 % of total project costs. Loan applicants must provide a capital cash contribution of at least 5% of the total project cost. Microenterprise loans have a maximum loan amount of \$35,000.

BACKGROUND: In December 1999, DHCD, through its Elderly Housing Rental Program, lent Coldspring LP \$1,000,000 to assist in the development of a 99-unit elderly housing project on 2.814 acres of land located at 4801 Tamarind Road, Baltimore City. Park View at Coldspring has been serving low and moderate-income elderly households since construction completion in 2001. The proposed easement represents 0.204 of an acre and is temporary. The relatively small amount of fallow ground to be included in the temporary easement will have no lasting or significant impact on the DHCD's interest. The existence of the trail should enhance the quality of life of the residents of Park View at Coldspring and may ultimately increase the value of DHCD's security.





The SHOP loans were paid off in December 2009. DHCD's remaining financing on these projects – the two HOME loans – are at 0% interest with repayment deferred until sale, transfer or default. Both HOME loans also require that, at sale, DHCD share in any appreciation in the properties' value. Typically, the amount of DHCD's share would be determined at the time of sale, using the sales price as the appreciated value.

In order to facilitate the sale of these buildings, however, DHCD seeks to release the liens on these two properties at this time. Go-Getters will deliver two new liens in favor of DHCD on two other properties that Go-Getters will acquire in a more suitable location. If DHCD does not receive new collateral for its loans within ten months from the sale date of each building, Go-Getters will be required to pay the debts plus any equity share owed to DHCD. Funds equal to the amount required to pay the debt and the equity participation calculated at the time of sale, if any, will be held in escrow while replacement housing is identified and purchased.



Nature of Emergency: In August 2009, the child's mother voluntarily placed the child into the care and custody of the Charles County Department of Social Services due to the severe and extreme consequences resulting from the child's traumatic brain injury. Because the child poses on-going safety risk to herself and to others, she requires 24-hour supervision. The social services department placed her in a temporary group home in May 2010 while exploring permanent placement opportunities. The child had become increasingly more aggressive since the accident and required professional support to help manage these behaviors. She was in need of a residential program providing treatment and rehabilitative services for individuals with neurological impairments services. The program had to meet her needs both clinically and therapeutically. In August 2010, after exhausting all appropriate placement options in the State, the department entered into a child-specific agreement with Head Injury Rehabilitation and Referral Services (HIRRS) to provide these services. The agreement to provide services lasts until the child turns age 21 on April 19, 2013 (at age 21, she will no longer be under the department's care and custody).

Basis for Selection: HIRRS is the only facility in the State that can address the specific high end treatment needs of the child.

Reason for Lateness: DHR did not report this emergency procurement to the Board of Public Works within the 45 day required reporting period for two reasons. First, the procurement officer did not know the process for emergency procurements, the urgency with which the report must be completed and submitted to the Board, or the duties regarding the placement of children. In addition, the social services department experienced extreme difficulty in getting the required documentation from HIRRS detailing the services being provided to the child.


REMARKS:

Nature of Emergency: The newly-constructed Rockville District Courthouse Multi Service Center is to house the District Court and the Office of the Public Defender, as well as other supporting agencies beginning in June. The old District Court was scheduled to close the week of June 20, 2011 to accommodate access to the new building for tenant agencies and to avoid the adverse affects of moving activity on proceedings in the old buildings. OPD requires moving supplies about two weeks before the move date to ensure employees have the time to pack their offices, shred documents and dispose of articles not being moved.

On about April 13, 2011, OPD learned that the procurement for moving services conducted by the Administrative Office of the Courts did not include OPD offices. After becoming aware that its offices were not included in the Administrative Office of the Courts move, OPD realized there was not enough time to conduct a competitive-sealed procurement before the mandatory moving date. Therefore, OPD declared an emergency and commenced with an emergency procurement.

Basis for Selection: Office Movers Inc. was selected for the completeness of its proposal in addressing the baseline requirements, including the adequacy, timing and deployment of staff, supervision, equipment and supplies; the strict and narrow timeline for the move which had to occur during the same week as, but not compete with, the District Court move during the week when the Court would be closed; and the cost of additional items for which details were requested for separate competitive analysis, including electric service support for modular furniture moves, disconnection and reconnection of IT equipment and packing common space, most notably the file room. The resource allotment and timing for the move was critical to ensure that the OPD office was closed only during the week of the District Court move but after the District Court move, and open and fully-functional by the time the court opened on by June 27. Any delay in the move could have jeopardized OPD's ability to meet its obligations and standards for client representation.

CREP Targeting

The CREP easement program focuses its efforts on "Target Level 1" and "Target Level 2" counties where the easement practices will have the greatest impact on water quality. Targeting for CREP was a multiagency and conservation partnership organization effort that utilized nine high priority, science based, data sets and areas of special consideration developed from the past 10 years of research and study of water quality and natural resource conditions in the State's 134 watersheds. Washington County is a Target Level 2 county.

Easement Valuation System

DNR uses an easement evaluation system based on (1) whether the property is located within a "Target Level 1" or "Target Level 2" county; (2) the width of the buffers and (3) the amount of land in the CREP contract that will be covered by the easement. The program seeks to retain conservation practices beyond the 10- to 15-year contract period available under the federal CREP rental program. The easement acquires development rights and a portion of the agricultural production value beginning at the end of the federal contract term and continuing into perpetuity.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request For Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandmarketplace.com*. Copies of the solicitation notices were mailed directly to 19 prospective agencies, all of which were Maryland organizations and included community-health or hospital based organizations. Federal requirements restrict competition to non-profit organizations. None of the agencies solicited were MDOT certified MBEs. A copy of the RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Two proposals were received in response to the RFP and both were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Community Clinic, Inc. was determined to propose the most advantageous offer to the State with its #1 technical ranking (see Attachment). No financial offers were requested because WIC Program contractors are reimbursed as established in State WIC Regulations (COMAR 10.54.02.18). Therefore, award is recommended to Community Clinic, Inc.

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children provides required health and nutrition services, including supplemental foods such as infant formula, to eligible individuals. Under this federally funded program, the Contractor will be required to determine program eligibility for pregnant, post-partum and breastfeeding women, infants, and children through the fifth birthday, provide nutrition education, make appropriate referrals to health and social service programs for the applicants, and issue "checks" for nutritious supplemental foods using the WIC Management Information system.

As the incumbent, Community Clinic, Inc. is currently providing the same services to its applicants and participants as stated in the RFP. Community Clinic, Inc. was ranked as one of the best of the 18 Maryland local WIC agencies for the services it provides when it was reviewed by the State WIC Program staff, as required by the federal WIC regulations. Some of the reasons for its high ranking are listed below:

- County residents who request appointments are seen earlier at Community Clinic, Inc. than other local WIC agencies.
- Community Clinic, Inc.'s experienced clinic staff provide quality services to its clients in a shorter amount of time than the other local agencies.
- Community Clinic, Inc. has successfully implemented a breastfeeding peer counselor program that uses current and former breastfeeding participants who talk to pregnant women about the rewards of breastfeeding and assist new mothers on how to breastfed.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMaryland Marketplace* and the DHR website. Ninety-six (96) incumbent Contractors (all of which are Maryland-based and seven are MBEs) were directly notified via DHR's "Constant Contact" an electronic e-mail system used to keep in constant contact with Residential Child Care providers, as well as other stakeholders.

In November 2009, DHR issued a RFP to acquire Residential Child Care (RCC) services in Maryland. On 1/19/2010, 106 proposals were received, representing 89 Offerors. On 3/23/2011, the Board of Public Works (BPW) approved 71 contracts for RCC services for a total of 1,376 clients at various locations throughout Maryland (DBM BPW Agenda Item 5-S).

Cedar Ridge Children's Home and School, Inc. (Cedar Ridge) submitted two proposals in response to the Department of Human Resources' RFP for Residential Child Care Services on 1/19/2010. Cedar Ridge submitted proposals in the regular group home and high intensity group home programs for a total of 10 beds. Cedar Ridge proposed to deliver RCC services through two distinct Programs as follows:

- Group Homes To provide general care to youth for the purpose of ensuring their basic needs, well-being and preparing them for independence. Group Homes serve youth who require awake, overnight supervision and have exhibited behaviors that complicate family placement.
- High Intensity Group Homes To serve children and youth presenting emotional and/or behavioral conditions requiring a higher level of structure, supervision, behavior management/modification, and clinical intervention.

In December 2010, the Department notified Cedar Ridge that its proposals were deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. On 1/14/2011, Cedar Ridge was debriefed concerning its non-selection and on 1/20/2011 Cedar Ridge filed two protests with the Procurement Officer. The Department denied both protests. On 3/17/2011, Cedar Ridge filed two appeals with the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals (MSBCA).

There were two issues outstanding with respect to Cedar Ridge's response to integrating children in their own community and making resources and services available to them. First, the RFP requires Contractors to ensure that youth develop and maintain connections and linkages to strengthen relationships in the child's life. Contractors are also required to support and link gay or lesbian children with like organizations and support groups. Second, the RFP requires Contractors to ensure that youth have the opportunity to participate in religious activities of their choice or refrain from participating. Cedar Ridge took some degree of exception to both requirements. In addition to these issues, the RFP requires each Contractor to employ or have access to staff to provide services that address any cultural or language barriers and reinforce the cultural, ethnic and socio-cultural practices of the youth. Cedar Ridge's proposal was inconsistent as to whether it could meet this requirement.

Contractors are required to accept children referred to them without regard to race, sexual orientation, ethnic, religious or cultural background. The exceptions taken by Cedar Ridge to the requirements in the RFP are material to the fair and equitable treatment of all of the Department's children and must be removed unconditionally. In an effort to resolve the outstanding issues on appeal, a settlement proposal was presented by DHR and accepted by Cedar Ridge. In the settlement, Cedar Ridge was requested to submit revised proposals, which addressed the issues above, which will then be incorporated by reference into the contract. At this time, DHR is ready to award a contract to Cedar Ridge for 10 beds. Cedar Ridge filed letters with the MSBCA requesting to dismiss the two appeals. [On 7/13/2011, the MSBCA dismissed both appeals with prejudice.]

The services of Cedar Ridge will be used at the sole discretion of DHR. DHR makes no guarantee as to the number of children/youth to be placed with any of the RCC Contractors. These are Purchase of Care contracts paid on a fee for service basis for the actual children/youth placed in a Contractor's care, and then only for the actual number of days each child is with the Contractor.

The standards that must be met and maintained by residential child care programs for children and youth are delineated in COMAR 14.31.06.01. These requirements are designed to protect the health, safety and well being of children placed in residential child care programs.

COMAR 14.31.02.03B(13) defines RCC programs as "a program of care provided in a residential setting by a provider on a 24-hour basis for longer than 24 hours to a child or children unless otherwise provided by State law."



REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A Notice of the Availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on the DHR web site and *eMarylandMarketplace.com*. Copies of the solicitation notice were directly mailed to 13 potential Offerors, of which seven are Maryland firms and two are MBEs. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Eleven proposals were received in response to the RFP; ten of which were deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. However, after two best and final offers (BAFO) were requested, only two proposals received were within DHR's budget. Calls Plus-AttivaSoft JV, LLC (Calls Plus-AttivaSoft) was ranked #2 technically and had the second lowest price. As described below, award is recommended to Calls Plus-AttivaSoft as being the most advantageous offeror to the State.

Calls Plus-AttivaSoft's joint venture proposal indicated the capacity to perform the contractual requirements. It had a comprehensive technological solution to meet DHR's needs and a competent, experienced project team to oversee Call Center operations. It was determined that Calls Plus-AttivaSoft would be able to perform all services required under the contract. The slight technical differences between the #1 technically ranked incumbent vendor did not off-set the over \$6M (63.4% higher) difference in price. In addition, the 8.7% difference in price between Calls Plus-AttivaSoft and the lowest priced offeror did not off-set the technical differences between these two offerors. The lowest priced offeror was ranked #6 technically.

The purpose of the Customer Call Center is to alleviate staff from being inundated with, and having to respond immediately to, customer inquiries, so that staff time can be devoted to casework, and to ensure that customer inquiries are responded to in a timely and efficient manner. Customer Call Center Services include live operator services, Interactive Voice Response (IVR) services, and receiving and responding to inquiries via facsimile, electronic mail, and U.S. mail.



REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMaryandMarketplace.com* (eMM) and the DHR web site. Notification via eMM of the procurement opportunity was sent to 441 potential offerors. A copy of the solicitation notice was directly mailed to 40 potential offerors, all of which were Maryland firms and seven were MBEs. A copy of the solicitation was sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Two proposals were received in response to the RFP. During the technical evaluation, it was determined that one of the proposals was not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award and this proposal was removed from further consideration. A request for a debriefing was received from this offeror submitting the unacceptable proposal, but the request was rescinded before the debriefing was scheduled. No protest was received from this offeror.

The single acceptable Offeror was determined to be responsible, the financial offer was considered fair and reasonable, and it was determined that other potential offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation. Therefore, award is recommended to The Family Tree, Inc., the incumbent vendor.

One vendor who did not submit an offer responded that other commitments precluded its participation at the time solicitation was issued. Other vendors did not respond as to why they did not submit offers.

The purpose of this contract is to provide community-based Child Maltreatment Prevention Services to serve at-risk families for the purposes of preventing child abuse and neglect. The services to be provided are a toll-free Parent Stressline and Parent Support Groups open to parents statewide and Home Visitation and Parenting Education Classes limited to families residing in Baltimore City, and Baltimore and Prince George's Counties.

The Child Maltreatment Prevention Program offers the following four types of support services to families and parents, with emphasis on families residing in Baltimore City, and Baltimore and Prince George's Counties:

- 1. Parent Stressline is a statewide telephone 24-hour, toll free stressline which will serve as a resource for parents in crisis who may have nowhere else to turn for immediate intervention, information, and/or referrals. The subject matter of the calls may include issues concerning child development, appropriate discipline methods, parent-child interactions, concerns that children have, referrals to social service agencies, or other emergency situations. The Contractor may expect to field approximately 4,700 calls annually.
- 2. Lay Therapy Home Visitation Program is designed to prevent child abuse and/or neglect by improving parents' self-esteem, reducing feelings of isolation, providing viable alternatives to corporal punishment, and strengthening parent-child relationships. This program will serve approximately 110 families annually.
- 3. Parenting Education Classes are designed to teach parenting and child development skills, build self-confidence in parents, and strengthen parent-child relationships. The classes will serve approximately 700 individual parents annually.
- 4. Parent Support Groups are weekly community- based support groups designed for parents who have: 1) abused and/or neglected their children; 2) are at risk for abusing and/or neglecting their children; or 3) feel overwhelmed or isolated and need support to assist them with parenting. The purpose of the groups is to encourage open dialogue and discussions between parents with the assistance of a trained facilitator. This program will serve approximately 500 parents annually.

A 3% MBE participation goal was established for this contract based upon the limited ability to subcontract services. The majority of the funds are allocated to salaries for these services and the amount of office supplies required is minimal. However, the recommended vendor has committed to a 4.3% MBE participation goal.



The overall results of Devaney & Associates, Inc.'s services enabled CSPM to obtain more Prepaid College Trust enrollments during the 2010 2011 enrollment period than for any enrollment period since 2004. REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to extend the term of the current utilization review services contract by six months in order to conduct two new procurements for these services. This modification will allow the continuation of current services, which determine level of need assessments resulting in appropriate amounts of payments for people entering programs. Concurrently, two new procurements are going forward which will potentially increase competition and reduce costs. This will be especially important in view of anticipated increases in clients as a byproduct of additional funding generated by the recently adopted alcohol tax legislation.

The existing Utilization review Services contract has grown unwieldy and inefficient due in part to modifications generated over the years by audit findings and other needs. The intent of the new procurements being prepared will split the Contract into two parts. The first part, Utilization Review will conduct performance audits verifying that referred people are in fact receiving various DDA services, including, but not limited to Community Supported Living Arrangement (CSLA), Individual Support (ISS), Family Support (FSS), and Individual Family Care (IFC) Services.

The second procurement will focus on Level of Need Assessment, which determines rates paid to providers for individual services. The Individual Indicator Rating Scale (IIRS) and the Support Intensity Scale (SIS) are the two principal tools that will be used and evaluated. Properly assessing an individual client's level of need can result in more appropriate levels of reimbursement for all people newly entering services covered under the Fee Payment System (FPS). Under the FPS, payment is made to providers based upon the services delivered and the level of need of the clients receiving these services.



REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to extend the contract term by five months to allow the Frederick County Department of Social Services (FCDSS) to maintain employment services for clients while a new procurement is completed and an award is made.

This Contract prepares and places Temporary Cash Assistance (TCA) and Non-custodial Parent Employment Program (NPEP) customers in jobs that provide independence from welfare; and provides training for Food Stamp Employment Training (FSET) and Able-Bodied Adults without Dependents (ABAWD) customers identified as mandatory work registrants. Marvatemp, Inc. has successfully been providing these services to FCDSS customers. The program services include a week-long classroom experience, which focuses on job readiness training to help assure the success of customers who hope to transition from welfare rolls to financial independence through employment. The Welfare-to-Work Initiative involves working collaboratively with FCDSS to provide a continuum of services, aggressively leveraging resources in order to maximize employment skills, providing community service sites, as well as external work experience opportunities with private employers and other human service and nonprofit agencies, which in turn will lead to identifying potential employment opportunities. In addition, the program's subcontractor, BRIDGES, Inc., also offers a daily job lab option for all of these same customers. The BRIDGES program also provides assistance in placing customers who are asked to do community service work, and acts as a liaison with the employer community for BRIDGES graduates.

Over the past 12 months, the Contractor served approximately 240 TCA clients and 135 FSET/ABAWD clients. Of those clients served, 132 TCA clients have been placed in jobs (a 55% success rate); and 129 FSET/ABAWD clients completed the training program. In addition, 20 NPEP clients were served, and 9 were placed in jobs (a 45% placement rate). DHR is satisfied with the performance of the Contractor for these services.

These services were awarded to Marvatemp, Inc. through a competitive procurement on the 10/31/2007 DBM BPW Agenda, Item 3-S. The two-year contract (11/1/2007 - 10/31/2009) contained a one-year renewal option. However, the Procurement Officer (PO) at FCDSS retired in January 2009. The person that replaced him did not submit the option renewal to DHR in time for presentation to the BPW for approval. As a result, the renewal option was not exercised by DHR/FCDSS prior to the end of the base contract term; however the Contractor continued to provide services for FCDSS. When DHR realized the omission, a retroactive sole source BPW item was submitted for the time period that would have been the one-year renewal option (DBM BPW Agenda 6/9/2010, Item 6-S). The BPW approved this retroactive approval submission.

In order to allow for time to complete the procurement process for a new Contract, DHR requested and received approval for a nine-month modification to the existing contract (DBM BPW Agenda 10/20/2010, Item 4-S-MOD). DHR forwarded the new Request for Proposals (RFP) to DBM for review in December 2010. DBM responded with comments to the RFP in early January 2011, and DHR submitted revisions in April 2011. However, these revisions were not complete to include a new pricing strategy. To this date DHR has not sent the RFP back to DBM for final approval prior to publication. It is currently under review by the Office of the Attorney General, and should be finalized shortly.

It is judged that the five month extension will be a sufficient amount of time to complete the RFP process and have an award recommendation to submit to the BPW in December 2011.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to increase the number of child care beds for three providers, decrease the number of child care beds for three providers for a net increase of 10 beds, and at the same time align the contract rates for all six providers to reflect FY2012 rates established by Interagency Rates Committee (IRC), effective August 1, 2011.

The FY2012 IRC rates were available at the end of June 2011 after the award of the new CPA contracts. Six of the Providers had changes in the bed counts and rates that would take effect on 7/1/2011. Three of the providers currently had children in the beds, so the contracts needed to be modified immediately in order for the providers to continue serving these children at the start of the new contracts on 7/1/2011. DHR, under its delegated authority, approved modifications for three providers for one month, 7/1/2011 - 7/31/2011, in order to maintain services and submit a new modification for the IRC rates and bed counts for the remainder of the terms of the contracts.

The modification details are shown in Attachment 2 and as follows:

- 3 contracts increase the number of child care beds for a total of 31 additional beds;
- 2 contracts decrease the number of child care beds for a total of 19 less beds; and
- 1 contract has a net decrease in the number of child care beds for a total of two less beds through the addition of four beds in one program and the reduction of six beds in another program. The rates for the four beds (\$252,869) are higher than the rates for the six beds (\$239,970); therefore, the modification amount has a net increase of \$12,899.

CPA Programs are defined in COMAR 07.02.21.03B (17) as a 24-hour substitute care program, operated by a licensed child placement agency or local department of social services, for children with serious emotional, behavioral, medical, or psychological condition. 93

The Governor's Office For Children (GOC) is the single point of entry for private providers interested in supplying care under approved negotiated rates for youth of the various State agencies. These providers have rates that have been approved by the Interagency Rates Committee.

Procurement with these service providers has complied with the requirement for Non-Competitive Negotiated Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services. In accordance with COMAR 21.14.01.04, below are reasons for this method of procurement:

- 1. DHR's Procurement Officer and Secretary have determined that although there are several potential service providers, the demand for providers exceed the supply, thus making competitive sealed procurements inappropriate.
- 2. The services are for child placement agency foster care and the licensing standards are found in COMAR 07.02.11, 07.02.13, 07.02.21 and 07.02.23.
- 3. Neither DHR nor GOC, on behalf of the Sub-cabinet, has the facilities or personnel to provide this type of service for the additional10 youth committed to DHR to be served under these contracts. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the State that DHR contracts for these services.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The HSA tests are end-of-course assessments in algebra/data analysis, English, government, and biology that are administered to students in grades 6-12 Statewide. Students are required to take and pass all four assessments or obtain a combined score on all four assessments of 1602 in order receive a high school diploma. Three of the four HSA tests, algebra/data analysis, English and biology are used to fulfill the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001 and adequate yearly progress (AYP) measurement reporting requirement. The AYP is a measurement defined by the federal No Child Left Behind Act that allows the U.S. Department of Education to determine how every public school and school district in the country is performing academically in reading and mathematics according to results on standardized tests.

Included in the HSA is the Mod-HSA assessment which is based on modified academic achievement standards designed for the assessment of students with disabilities receiving special education services who meet specific participation requirements. A student who is eligible for the Mod-HSA will be identified based on his/her individual evaluation information and instructional and service information on his/her Individualized Education Plan (IEP), as required by federal law for special education students. The Mod-HSA differs in format from the HSA in that it provides students access to the grade level content standard that incorporate variations in test delivery to meet the specific learning characteristics of the student.

Due to cuts from the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) FY2012 budget, the government portion of HSA and Mod-HSA taken by all high school students in Maryland will be eliminated beginning with the summer 2011 test administration. Included in the change to the scope of services is a reduction in the quantity of tests to be printed. The net result of the change in the scope of services is an overall contract price reduction of \$2,413,490.

The elimination of the government portion of the assessments will not have an adverse effect on the State's compliance with federal requirements because the government assessment is not a mandatory component of the NCLB Act.

Ultimately, MTA anticipates that snow removal services on the Brunswick and Camden Line will be handled under the third party operator agreement so those new contracts will likely be terminated early – leaving only two contracts – Penn Line North and Penn Line South in place and expiring at the same time. The April 2012 expiration date will allow MTA sufficient time to issue new solicitations for these services.

The current contract of the Irrevocable Offer (IO), signed by all twenty-four members of the E-Z Pass Group is scheduled to expire on August 16, 2011.

The lead agency conducting the new solicitation, New York State Metropolitan Transportation Authority Bridges and Tunnels, follows a procurement process similar to Maryland's.

The E-Z Pass Group is in the evaluation process of reviewing the proposals from a new solicitation. The process was significantly delayed because the E-Z Pass Group added members and by doing so, brought about questions/concerns regarding the governance of these new members. Specifically, whether they would be allowed to participate or be precluded from the procurement process. There were also patent infringement lawsuits between two of the vendors. This document had to incorporate individual requirements for the various agencies within fourteen states.

It is the opinion of the MDTA that the procurement process, including the contract negotiations involving all twenty-four members will take even more considerable time and that one year is the appropriate length of time for this additional procurement activity. The MDTA issues approximately 160,000 transponders per year and this will increase with the opening of the Inter County Connector (ICC).



The Department of General Services on behalf of the Reference Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services issued a Request for Qualifications for the purposes of leasing State land to an entity capable of establishing a renewal energy facility on underutilized State owned land in western Maryland. The lease is intended to support more instate renewable energy generation, put underutilized State property to greater use, and promote the State's environmental, public policy and economic goals.

Maryland Solar, LLC responded seeking to enter into a ground lease agreement for approximately 250 acres of land around the Maryland Correctional Institute. The lease is for a twenty (20) year term and calls for the development and operation of a solar renewal energy facility consisting of approximately 100,000 separate photovoltaic panels.

The Board of Public Works is now requested to approve the land lease with Maryland Solar, LLC.

LANDLORD LEASE

ITEM 12-LL (Cont.)

<u>Remarks</u> Maryland's Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) mandates that 20% of Maryland's electricity be generated from renewable energy source by 2022, which must include at least 2% solar energy. The project will serve as a facilitator to meeting Maryland's RPS. It is anticipated that at peak output, this facility will produce enough electricity to power about 2,250 average homes, displacing approximately 13,900 metric tons of carbon dioxide (CO₂) per year or the equivalent of taking about 2,700 cars off the road, according to the Maryland Energy Administration. At 20MWs, the facility will more than double the amount of solar energy currently on the Maryland grid, estimated by Maryland Energy Administration to be around 15MWs today.

Based on the construction cost estimate of \$70 million, it is anticipated that the facility will create approximately 125 local construction jobs (electricians, installers, laborers) beginning late 2011 through 2012. The average salary (including benefits) will be in the range of \$25.00 are hour.

The third component of this project will include a unique educational element. Maryland Solar LLC. has agreed with Hagerstown Community College to incorporate the development, construction and operation of the project into the Alternative Energy Curriculum at Hagerstown Community College.

Special Conditions

- 1. The lease is for a 20 year term and contains a unilateral right to renew for one five-year term. The lease further provides for a second 5-year renewal term subject to Board approval.
- 2. Prior to commencement of construction, Tenant shall demonstrate to Lessor's reasonable satisfaction that it has sufficient funds, performance bonds and/or completion guarantees to develop, construct, operate, and maintain the facility and improvements.
- 3. Lessee shall have the right to pledge or encumber its leasehold interest in the Demised Premises as security for financing to be obtained by Lessee in connection with the construction or operation of the Solar Project, with the lender able to cure and replace lessee for failure to perform subject to reasonable Lessor approval however, may not encumber the State's underlying fee interest.

- 4. Lessor acknowledges and agrees that if the Solar Project shall not have achieved full commercial operation and the sale of electric power from the Solar Project by 12/31/2012, then at the option of Lessee and upon written notice by Lessee to Lessor, Lessee shall have the right to terminate this Lease, in which event Lessee shall remain obligated for the payment of the prorated rental amounts through the date of Lessee's notice of termination, but Lessee shall not be obligated for the payment of any rent following the date of Lessee's notice of termination. In the event the lease is terminated the lessee shall remove any improvements made to the premises.
- 5. The Tenant shall maintain at its expense, throughout the term-insurance against loss or liability occurring on the Demised Premises, under one or more policies of CGL not less than a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence, \$5,000,000.00 annual aggregate, and shall contain broad form CGL endorsement or its equivalent. Additionally, contractors shall be required to carry Contractors CGL, Builders Risk, Worker Compensation and Automobile Liability insurances.
- 6. Lessee shall consult with and gain approval from Lessor and DGS and shall comply with all local, state and federal codes and requirements. Lessee shall submit plans and other project documentation to Lessor and DGS for its review, comment, and reasonable approval.
- 7. This Lease does not contain a termination for convenience clause.
- 8. Lessor acknowledges and agrees that after the full installation and operation of the contemplated Solar Project, Lessee shall have the right to enter into a limited agricultural sublease with Creek Bound Farms, LLC. Or another qualified farm tenant approved by the Lessor for unused portions of the Demised Premises which shall remain subject to the approval of Lessor, DGS, and the BPW.
- 9. Lessee acknowledges and agrees that so long as this Lease is in effect Lessee will use reasonable efforts to implement, conduct, and/or cause to occur inmate training activities and educational opportunities relating to the renewable energy industry and/or sustainable agriculture with Hagerstown Community college and other interested educational institutions in the area.
- 10. The Lessee shall pay promptly when due, all taxes, fees, or other impositions assessed in connection with the Lessee's use and occupancy of the Demised Premises.

- 11. The Lessee shall be responsible for, and shall defend at Lessor's request, indemnify and hold harmless the State of Maryland, and the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services and its members, officers, and employees against and from, any and all liability or claim of liability (including reasonable attorneys' fees) directly arising out of (a) the Lessee's use, occupancy, conduct, operation or management of the Demised Premises during the Term.
- 12. The Clearinghouse conducted an intergovernmental review of the project under MD 20110325-0601 and has recommended changing the use, and leasing +/- 250 acres of land at the Maryland Correctional Institute for use as a potential renewable energy facility.
- 13. The State disclaims any and all liability under the lease for environmental conditions associated with the Demised Premises.

Background/History Reference is made to Item 2-GM of the Department of General Services Action Agenda of 12/16//2009 wherein the Board of Public Works approved a three year Interagency Agreement to facilitate the development of a new state-of-the-art Public Health Laboratory in the Science + Technology Park @ Johns Hopkins in East Baltimore. This agreement activated the use of \$6.45 million in pre-development funds appropriated by the Maryland General Assembly for the preparation of preliminary plans to construct the new lab.

The Board of Public Works is now requested to approve an occupancy lease with an initial term of twenty (20) years between the State of Maryland to the use of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) as Tenant and Maryland Economic Development Corporation (MEDCO) as Landlord. DHMH's lease will be used by MEDCO to facilitate the sale of MEDCO tax exempt bonds for the purposes of constructing and equipping the new Public Health Laboratory.

Special Conditions MEDCO shall cause to be constructed a five (5) story 234,000 gross square foot building designed to the LEED Silver Certification criteria. The project will meet State and City MBE/WBE requirements. Total project costs are estimated at \$165,000,000.00 including the land acquisition and preparation costs but not including capitalized interest costs.

MEDCO shall issue and sell Series 2011 bonds in the approximate aggregate principal amount of \$186 million, not to exceed \$200 million, for an anticipated term of 20 years, at an estimated interest cost of 4.59% (as of February 2011). Closing on the bonds is expected to occur as early as October, 2011. Interest will be paid with bond proceeds commencing on bond issuance with DHMH's rent commencing approximately June 1, 2014 or with completion of the facility and DHMH taking occupancy. MEDCO's final bond maturity is expected to occur on or about October 1, 2031.

Bond closing and closing on the property are expected to occur simultaneously The schedule currently anticipates the award of the construction contract on or about September 30, 2011; the completion and commission of the lab on or about February 21, 2014; and full occupancy and operation on or about April 27, 2014.

DHMH shall have the option to renew this Lease, beyond the initial term, for one (1) additional twenty (20) year period and for three (3) separate but immediately consecutive additional ten (10) year periods. After the bonds are paid in full, MEDCO will cease charging Base Rent for the property and DHMH will only be responsible for Additional Rent consisting of primarily standard operating costs and reserves. Base Rent and Additional Rent will remain contingent upon sufficient appropriations and the lease is terminable for failure to appropriate, acts of condemnation, and/or in the event of a casualty.

Additional Rent will be all operating costs to keep and maintain the facility, including property management fees, infrastructure use fees, and a fee to MEDCO of \$100,000.00 per year during construction, reducing to \$50,000.00 per year once construction is complete. Additional rent will include an Operating reserve fund of \$0.45 per square foot increased annually by 3% to be held by bond trustee and Repair and Replacement fund of \$3.00 per square foot increased annually by 3% to be held by Trustee. Both the operating reserve and the repair and replacement reserve are for the use by DHMH and if unused during DHMH's tenancy, would revert to State.

Although DHMH has negotiated an option to purchase the facility for an amount equal to the bonds outstanding at the time of the purchase, plus other incidental costs, the facility is anticipated to remain under the ownership and control of MEDCO for the facility's functional life and tenancy by DHMH.

During the period of construction, MEDCO shall cause the contractor or others to maintain, as a cost of the Project, (i) Builder's Risk Insurance; (ii) commercial general liability insurance; (iii) business automobile insurance; (iv) umbrella liability insurance; (v) workers compensation and employer's liability insurance; and (vi) environmental impairment liability insurance. MEDCO anticipates that the insurance may be handled via a Contractor Controlled Insurance Program (CCIP).

Pursuant to the provisions of State Finance and Procurement Article, Section 12-204(d), the Capital Debt Affordability Committee has certified to the Governor and the General Assem⁴ that the total amount of new State debt to be incurred by the lease may prudently be authorized. Pursuant to the provisions of State Finance and Procurement Article, Section 11-203(a)(2)(ii) this lease is exempt from Division II of the State Finance and Procurement Article.

Except for acts of gross negligence, DHMH shall indemnify the Landlord and the Trustee for its use of the facility to the extent permitted under the Maryland Torts Claim Act and subject to appropriation.
