Project Description: The project entails the planning, design and construction of Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) facilities at the existing 7.5 million gallons per day (mgd) Parkway Wastewater Treatment Plant. Upon completion of the ENR facilities, the plant will achieve effluent quality with annual average nutrient goals of 3.0 mg/l for Total Nitrogen (TN) and 0.3 mg/l for Total Phosphorous (TP), which represents a 62.5% reduction in TN and 70% reduction in TP. These improvements will significantly reduce nutrients discharged to the Patuxent River and the Chesapeake Bay.

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve a new grant up to \$48,000 to Maryland Environmental Service for the Maryland Correctional Institute Wastewater Treatment Plant Enhanced Nutrient Removal Upgrade project in Washington County. The source of these grant funds is the Bay Restoration Fund. (Legislative District 2B)

Project Description: The project entails multi phase funding of the planning, design and construction phases to upgrade the Maryland Correctional Institute's Wastewater Treatment Plant for Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) at the existing capacity of 1.6 million gallons per day (mgd). Currently, the project is in the planning phase which includes a feasibility study. This study will determine the most appropriate and cost effective technology and types of modifications required at the Maryland Correctional Institute Wastewater Treatment Plant to achieve effluent with 3.0 mg/l Total Nitrogen and a Total Phosphorous of 0.3 mg/l. After the upgrades, the nitrogen discharge will be reduced by 62.5 percent and phosphorous discharge by 85 percent, significantly reducing nutrients discharged to Antietam Creek and ultimately to the Chesapeake Bay.



(Legislative District 4A)

Project Description: The project entails the planning, design and construction of Biological Nutrient Removal and Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) facilities at the existing 0.75 million gallons per day (mgd) Emmitsburg Wastewater Treatment Plant. The planning study recommended a Biolac Reactor System followed by Denitrification Filters including Secondary Clarifiers, RAS Pumping System, Aerobic Digesters, Sludge Dewatering Influent Screening and Grit Removal facility. This project will achieve an effluent with Total Nitrogen of 3.0 mg/l and a Total Phosphorous of 0.3 mg/l. The purpose of the project is to reduce nutrients to the Upper Monocacy River, the Potomac River and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay.

These upgrades will allow the WWTP to achieve the effluent concentration goal of 3.0 mg/l for total nitrogen and permitted total nitrogen loading cap of 4.37 million lbs per year, significantly reducing the nutrients discharged to Potomac River and the Chesapeake Bay. The plant is currently achieving phosphorus reductions beyond the goal of 0.3 mg/l as its discharge permit requires the plant to achieve a monthly average of 0.18 mg/l for total phosphorus.

The loan enabled Pumpkin Genius to finance the furnishing, fixture and equipment for a start-up Italian restaurant, located at 303 High Street, Cambridge. DHCD has a UCC security interest in the collateral. Pumpkin Genius leased space from NOVO Development Corporation, which is owned by Brett Summers. To induce the Pumpkin Genius to rent space, Summers provided DHCD a limited guaranty of the loan in the amount of \$67,000. Pumpkin Genius has permanently closed the restaurant and has asked for and been awarded protection under Chapter 7 of the bankruptcy code. Both Pumpkin Genius and Summers failed to make payments due and owing meaning the note and guaranty are in default.

DHCD has accelerated the balance due under the note and guaranty. Summers requested that DHCD forbear from filing suit against him and from otherwise exercising its rights and remedies under the guaranty; DHCD has agreed to forbear from filing suit against Summers as long as Summers strictly complies with the forbearance agreement.

Summers agrees to pay, over time, \$67,000 to DHCD plus an additional sum of \$29,580, the full appraised value of the collateral, in connection with the private UCC sale of the collateral. The equipment will remain in the premises and will be used by the next tenant.

BACKGROUND: In 1992, DHCD lent the borrower \$523,300. The loan was used to finance the construction and permanent financing of a portion of St. Martin's House in Caroline County, which consists of one building with four wings. Three wings each contain four bedrooms and communal living areas providing transitional housing for homeless women and their children, and staff quarters are located in the fourth wing. The project is situated on an acre which is part of a larger site containing several hundred acres in owned by the Benedictine Sisters of St. Gertrude's Monastery. This site includes a monastery, a school, a food distribution center and a thrift store. The loan is secured by a leasehold deed of trust, granting DHCD a security interest in the ground lease between the Benedictine Sisters and the borrower that requires payments of \$1.00 per year and runs to 2047. The improvements are leased back to the Benedictine Sisters, who operate the facility and programs for the residents, under the terms of a sublease that requires rent payments to the borrower in the amount necessary to cover mandatory payments on the loan.

BACKGROUND: (cont'd) The loan term is 40 years, maturing on June 1, 2033. The Borrower was required to use a portion of the loan proceeds to purchase the U. S. Treasury Bond to be held in the name of DHCD at a price that resulted in a face value of \$362,000 at a yield to maturity of 7.65%. The Treasury Bond was purchased for a term of 29 years; therefore, the loan term extended beyond the original term. Upon maturity and redemption of the bond in 2021, the loan documents require that the proceeds be reinvested in a replacement zero coupon Treasury Bond with a maturity date that coincides with the maturity of the deed of trust note in 2033. The proceeds from the sale of the Treasury Bond should provide funds in an amount sufficient to purchase the substitute bond, to pay down a portion of the outstanding principal balance of the loan and to provide a small amount of operating funds to the borrower.

As structured, the Treasury Bond is to be redeemed in 2021 for the par value of \$362,000 and the substitute bond is to be purchased. Considering the yield/value fluctuations of the bond market, there is no guarantee that that the sale of the Treasury Bond in 2021 would provide sufficient funds to purchase the substitute bond in the full amount of the outstanding principal balance. The proposed sale of the Treasury Bond at this time simply accelerates the liquidation in order to take advantage of the increased market value of the Treasury Bond resulting from the extraordinarily low yields that currently exist. DHCD's secured position will be improved by the proposed sale and substitution in the respect that the par value of the substitute bond will be equal to the outstanding principal balance of the loan after the principal payment made with a portion of the sale proceeds. It is anticipated that the sale of the Treasury Bond will generate sufficient proceeds to reduce the principal balance of the loan to approximately \$463,000 and to purchase a substitute bond with that face value. As a result, the substitute bond will fully secure the principal amount of the loan due at maturity. Residual sale proceeds will be used in the operation of the project.

MARKET VALUE: The improvements consist of a one-story building with four wings, each with four bedrooms. The three residential wings containing 4 bedrooms each also contain shared living areas, and to a lesser degree shared bathing/showering facilities. The layout and location of the project is well-suited to the targeted use as transitional housing, but is less so for a conventional tenant population. The configuration of the improvements, combined with the fact that the borrower has use of the project pursuant to the terms of a ground lease, make it extremely difficult to develop a credible estimate of the value of the collateral for the loan.

As a result of these utility charges, TMG must charge a higher rent to attract Broadway productions, which rent is higher than competing venues. TMG indicates that by entering into this agreement, it will be able to function more competitively in its market.

Nature of Emergency: In May 2011 information came to light as a result of the US raid on the compound of Usama Bin Laden which revealed that passenger train traffic moving over waterways was under threat from Al Qaeda terrorists. It is well established that transportation networks have been targeted in the past by terrorists with deadly results and disruption to normal activity. The Maryland Natural Resources Police are building out a radar/camera surveillance system for Maryland waterways but a gap exists in the monitoring of the waterways in the Northeast corridor. This emergency procurement supported the effort to expand capacity to provide real-time surveillance of this transportation corridor. The location of the areas to be observed, required the use long range radar and cameras to provide sufficient surveillance capacities. These sensors will report back to the NRP Command Center at Sandy Point State Park; if suspicious vessels or other activity is detected, appropriate law enforcement authorities will be alerted.

Basis for Selection: Radar: Navassist is the only company registered to do business in Maryland that provides the SSR Engineering radar processors that are used in the MLEIN system.

Cameras: Vumii Imaging had been selected to provide a camera with Night Vision capabilities out to 1.8 miles for the National Capital Region. Two of the targets to be observed were within that range. The laser illuminator camera provides excellent threat assessment capabilities at such range.

Reason for Late Report: This procurement involved multiple entities and manufacturers; delivery and installation of equipment and training of staff required more time than anticipated.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on both the DGS website and *eMarylandMarketplace.com*, which directly solicited [577] prospective vendors, [116] of which are small businesses and [155] are certified minority businesses. The RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Two proposals were received in response to the RFP and both were deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Periscope Holdings, Inc. (Periscope) was ranked #1 technically and had the lower price; therefore, award is recommended to Periscope with the overall #1 ranking. Periscope demonstrated its ability to address the service needs required throughout the State efficiently and effectively, which should result in greater savings potential out of the transaction process, and provide the best value to the State.

By statute, all State and local jurisdiction's solicitations with an estimated value greater than \$15,000 and local jurisdiction's solicitations with an estimated value greater than \$25,000 must be solicited on eMarylandMarketplace.com (eMM), with certain exceptions such as emergency procurements. eMM is the only recognized bidder registration platform for the State and it electronically distributes bid notices to registered vendors whose profiles match the requirement being sought. The State currently uses eMM to solicit, receive and tabulate bids, and post notices of awards from bids. The State currently contracts with Deloitt & Touche to support and maintain the software for eMM. The current eMM maintenance contract expires on 12/31/2011. The eMM applications are hosted by MDOT on its servers at the MDOT Data Center. The Department of General Services (DGS) administers eMM. In the most recent fiscal year, 7/1/2009 – 6/30/2010, over 5,219 solicitations were posted on eMM. From 7/7/2009 – 1/6/2011, the value of the awards reported out of eMM was \$2,754,447,611.

This new contract will address the concerns of the 2007 Governor's Transition Report which called for an "overhaul" of eMM, citing the lack of an eCatalog function, the lack of audit capabilities on contract purchases, eMM's limited reporting capabilities, and a need to make the system more user friendly which may also facilitate increased small business participation. The RFP incorporated these concerns and the solutions proposed address the deficiencies cited in the Governor's Transition Report.

The recommended solution provides all of the functionality of the eMM, and also includes eCatalog functionality, provides for enhanced business intelligence and reporting capabilities, is scalable, provides greater transfer of data from and into ADPICS, has the ability to track and audit contract purchases, has intuitive ease of use, and also provides additional functionality not currently available in eMM to facilitate efficient and effective procurement and purchasing practices. The go-live date of the service would be on or before 1/1/2012. The expected 4 ½ month period between the date of contract award and the go-live date will be for contract start-up activities.

Along with the proposed service, the Offerors provided a transaction processing fee to be assessed on the awarded vendors on the value of purchases awarded on DGS controlled contracts. Both Offerors proposed a 1% fee. All new DGS controlled contracts awarded after 8/15/2011 will require the awardees to post their products into the new eCatalog and will contain notice of the 1% fee requirement. This fee will be paid by each contractor to DGS, based upon the value of all orders placed by State agencies against each contract. Vendors holding existing DGS controlled contracts will also be asked to participate in the new eCatalog system and pay the 1% user fee. Due to the increased functionality of the new eCatalog system, it is expected that many existing contractors will voluntarily agree to use the eCatalog and pay the 1% user fee because they will save at least that percentage through the elimination of the need for order entry and the separate generation of invoices, and through automated inventory entries, all of which are features of the eCatalog system.

The typical annual value of spend resulting from DGS controlled contracts is approximately \$120,000,000. This 1% User Processing Fee would generate an estimated \$1,200,000 per year. This would provide sufficient funds to pay for the service and resources to administrate the contract. There is currently no appropriation for the services to be performed under this contract. Any generated User Processing Fees in excess of what is needed to pay for the new system will go into the General Fund.

The Maryland SFP Code Ann. § 13-226 authorizes a primary procurement unit, in this case DGS, to conduct all elements of the procurement of a contract by electronic means. The term "Procurement" is defined to include, not only the solicitation, bidding, award and execution of the contract, but also, the administration of the contract, which includes the placements of orders against DGS-controlled electronically procured contracts, upon which the 1% Processing Fee will be assessed.

A 15% MBE participation goal was established for this contract; however, the recommended Offeror has committed to a 30% MBE participation goal.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and posted on the DHR website. A Notice of Intent to Solicit was mailed to 132 vendors, of which 113 are Maryland firms and 35 are MBEs. A copy of the RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

This RFP is to acquire services to provide eligible Temporary Cash Assistance (TCA) customers with safe, low-cost, reliable Maryland State inspected motor vehicles in order to achieve or maintain full time employment.

One proposal was received in response to the RFP, and it was determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. In addition, the Offeror was determined to be responsible, the financial offer was considered fair and reasonable, and it was determined that other potential offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation. Therefore, award is recommended to Vehicles for Change, Inc. (VFC), the sole Offeror.

Other Maryland dealerships and a transportation companies were contacted to determine why they did not submit proposals in response to this solicitation; however, no responses were received. Only two vendors attended the Pre-Proposal Conference held on 10/18/2010.

TAP services shall be provided through a single flat fee per vehicle for a not-to-exceed total of 91 vehicles per year for the base contract period (\$3325) and the renewal option periods (Option #1 = \$3650 and Option #2 = \$4025). Vehicles to be used for TAP include compact cars, small Minivans, small SUVs and small Pickup Trucks. The single flat fee per vehicle is inclusive of all activities associated with:

- The payment of Taxes, Tags and Title;
- A 6 Months or 12,000 Miles Warranty;
- A Maryland State Motor Vehicle Inspection;
- The Original Car Owner's Manual, if available, or the Contractor's Car Care Guide;
- · Financing Services;
- Delivery Services;
- · The reporting and submission of Deliverables; and
- The Price to put the Vehicle on the Road (Repair Costs: Parts and Labor).

In addition, VFC will provide a mandatory two-hour car orientation class to educate customers on the care of their vehicles and warranty services.

Each customer receiving a vehicle is responsible for paying a portion of the "Price to put the Vehicle on the Road", which is not to exceed 50% of the parts and labor repair costs up to a maximum of \$1,000. VFC is required to provide a copy of the vehicle's bill of sale (if purchased) and actual repair costs (parts and labor) in conjunction with submission of the Monthly Invoice. VFC proposed that the majority of the vehicles used in TAP will be obtained by donation. The Department is responsible for the payment of the balance of the flat fee (minus the customer's portion of the repair costs) upon submission of a monthly invoice.

Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) customers and former TANF customers who have a bona-fide job offer or have a job but did not have transportation or reliable transportation have benefited from such assistance in the past. These jobs are usually during non-traditional hours or are not accessible to public transportation or require the customers to travel more than 3-4 hours by bus to get to the job. Usually, these jobs have paid \$10.00 per hour or more. This type of assistance also ensures customers remain off TCA rolls or helps customers get off of TCA permanently.

The calculated savings to the State with this contract for a household of three is \$6,888 per year, and even more for larger households. (This calculation is determined by the number of people who have received cars through one of these programs multiplied by the monthly TCA grant for a three person Household times 12.) This type of program has been successfully implemented in Garrett County, Carroll County and Baltimore City.

The core services for this Contract are vehicle distribution and vehicle parts. There are few MBEs which provide these services in the State of Maryland. For this reason, a MBE participation goal of 5% was established for this contract. VFC will receive part-time staffing from the MBE subcontractor to assist the TAP customers. The staff will collaborate with the local departments to assist in identifying and securing qualified applicants. They will review applications and will act as the sole contact for TAP customers when they are approved to receive a vehicle. The staff will also conduct the car orientation classes and be the contact person once the TAP customers take ownership of their vehicles.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised in *eMarylandMarketplace.com*, posted on DHCD's website, submitted to Governor's Office of Minority Affairs (GOMA), and mailed directly to 44 prospective vendors, of which eight are Maryland firms and four are MBEs.

DHCD received four offers in response to the RFP, but only three were deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. One offeror was rejected for failure to provide complete MBE documents. DHCD returned the unopened financial proposal to the rejected offeror.

Of the three remaining offers, the proposal from M & T Bank was ranked first overall with the first-ranked technical proposal and the second lowest price. The proposal ranking second overall and second technically was significantly higher in price than the other two offers. The proposal with the lowest price was ranked third technically and third overall. The slight difference in price (14% or \$683,753) between M & T Bank and the lowest price offer did not offset the difference in the technical proposals. Therefore, M & T Bank is the recommended awardee with the most advantageous offer to the State.

M & T Bank's strength is its extensive experience servicing loans that are comparable to CDA's single family bond portfolio. M & T has serviced single family mortgage loan portfolios for more than 30 years, maintained Fannie Mae and FHA approvals and has extensive experience servicing large quantities of loan types for all private insurers, including FHA, VA, Rural Housing Services, and bond and private insurance companies. M & T is staffed with experienced personnel in sufficient numbers to manage a portfolio the size of CDA's portfolio, and has mortgage industry standard servicing software. M &T has low delinquency rates for the loans it services, a result of its very strong loss mitigation resources and proactive mitigation strategies. Although its offices are in Buffalo, New York, M &T has a strong local presence in Maryland through its 205 full service branches in Maryland, which will provide easy access for DHCD's borrowers to pay their mortgages and assist in any borrower inquiries. It is the second largest deposit taker in the Maryland.

ITEM: 3-S (Cont.)

The purpose of this Contract is to add a servicer to share servicing responsibilities as currently being provided by Bogman, Inc. In today's mortgage servicing environment two servicers are needed to balance the workload associated with administering the 16,000 loans in the Maryland Mortgage Program portfolio while ensuring new and evolving best practices are implemented. Having two servicers will allow DHCD to benchmark and compare the performance of these two servicers against each other and industry indicators to enable maximum performance for the Maryland Mortgage Program portfolio.

As loan servicer, M & T Bank will provide servicing of single family housing loans funded in connection with the issuance of revenue bonds and subordinate loans from other sources. M & T Bank will maintain records, collect and remit payments, collect and manage escrows (including the payment of insurance and taxes), respond to borrowers' inquiries, perform loss mitigation, process claims and engage in other loan servicing activities. The addition of M & T Bank to DHCD's loan servicing team will increase DHCD's ability to improve the loan portfolio, assist and expedite interaction with both current and delinquent borrowers, and provide an additional benchmark to evaluate the quality of loan servicing regarding the two servicers. A great deal of special attention and timely asset management is essential for success in the current, very volatile housing environment; having additional resources in the form of M &T Bank enhances DHCD's ability to pursue significant remedies for Maryland homeowners.

A 25% MBE participation goal was established for this contract. M & T Bank requested a 24% waiver, and after careful consideration, DHCD determined that the documentation submitted in support of the waiver request represented a good faith effort. DHCD approved M & T Bank's waiver request.

On 6/6/2011, DHCD received a protest from one of the potential MBE subcontractors that was contacted by M & T Bank in making a good faith effort to obtain MBE participation and was not selected by M & T Bank to be a subcontractor. On 6/15/2011, DHCD informed the MBE subcontractor that it failed to qualify as an "interested party" per COMAR 21.10.02.01.A because it was not an actual or prospective bidder, offeror, or contractor, and therefore lacked standing to file a protest of the proposed contract award to M & T Bank. Accordingly, DHCD informed the potential MBE subcontractor that DHCD would take no action regarding the claim. The potential subcontractor appealed DHCD's decision to take no action to the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals (MSBCA) on 6/16/2011. REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) was advertised on *eMarylandmarketplace.com* (eMM). Through eMM, 141 prospective vendors received the solicitation, of which 75 are Maryland firms and included 61 MBEs. Copies of the solicitation notice were mailed directly to two prospective vendors, both of which are Maryland minority businesses. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Bidders could bid on one, two or all three regions, but were requested to submit separate bids for each region. Four bidders responded to the IFB for all three regions. Therefore, 12 bids were received in response to the IFB. The breakdown per region is shown below and in the Attachment.

Western Region: one of four bids was deemed technically unacceptable; Central Region: two of four bids were deemed technically unacceptable; and Eastern Region: one of four bids was deemed technically unacceptable.

The 1996 Amendments to the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) reaffirmed the importance of source water protection as the first step in protecting drinking water quality. The SDWA mandated that each State develop a formal Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP). Maryland's SWAP was approved by EPA in November 1999. MDE has prepared Source Water Assessment Reports for all public drinking water systems in Maryland. These reports define the boundaries of areas providing source water for public drinking water systems, identify the significant potential sources of contamination within the defined areas, and evaluate the susceptibility of each public water system to the identified contaminants. Each Source Water Assessment Report also includes recommendations for management of the assessment areas and is intended to assist local jurisdictions in implementing a Source Water Protection Program (SWPP). The foundation for such a program is a partnership among State and local governments, water suppliers, consumers, residents and businesses in the source water protection areas. While many jurisdictions recognize the need to protect their water sources, they often do not have the resources to develop and implement specific plans for doing so.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) is requesting retroactive approval of a contract to conduct the Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey under the biennial Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey (MYRBS) program. If this contract is not approved, the State of Maryland will not have youth health risk data for 2011. This will result in a loss of trend data and noncompliance with Maryland law. Additionally, the lack of current MYRBS data could adversely impact the ability of State and local agencies to apply for federal and other grants.

A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on eMarylandMarketplace.com. Copies of the solicitation notice were emailed directly to 18 prospective vendors, seven of which are Maryland firms and included three MBEs. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Five proposals were received in response to the RFP. However, only two of the proposals were deemed to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Award was recommended to Macro International Inc. (Macro) as being the most advantageous Offeror to the State with the #1 ranked technical offer and the lower price. Macro was notified in March 2011 that it was the recommended awardee and was sent a copy of the contract to sign. There were communication issues that created some confusion regarding administration and authorization of the contract; thus, permission to proceed with preliminary and essential survey work was provided to Macro prior to the Board of Public Works (BPW) approval. Therefore, during the months of April and May 2011, Macro surveyed students in grades 9 - 12 in 25 Maryland public high schools in 14 counties. The survey was administered to meet the tight timelines established by Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as explained below. There was only a narrow window of time to survey the students and forward the data to CDC by June. CDC is currently requesting the data from all of the states.

When MSDE realized what had happened, work was immediately stopped to await BPW approval of the contract. At this point, Macro has not completed the compilation of the data to send to the CDC and has not been paid for the work performed to date. Approval of this voidable contract, will allow MSDE to pay Macro and allow Macro to continue with the time sensitive work, which will allow MSDE to obtain additional federal funding coming later in August 2011.

The Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey (MYRBS) is part of the Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBSS) developed in 1990 by the CDC. CDC provides administrative guidelines for conducting the survey and strongly recommends that the survey be administered during the spring of the survey year (March - May) to ensure that the collected data are forwarded to CDC by June of the same year for the results to be analyzed and a report issued. Therefore, it is imperative that a contractor adhere to CDC's schedule. Failure to comply with these timelines will cause a state to be omitted from the national results. Each state is required to pay for the survey with CDC contributing approximately \$45,000 to \$50,000 to each participating state.

The MYRBS mandated by House Bill 358 (Acts of 2004) requiring MSDE to establish procedures for the administration of the survey, is conducted biennially with statistical analysis support from the CDC. This survey is the second series of three biennial surveys being conducted by MSDE since the Bill was passed. MYBRS will be administered to approximately 2,500 students in grades 9, 10, 11 and 12 in approximately 30 Maryland public schools. The survey provides information on the nature, extent, and trends in alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use, harassment, nutritional habits and chronic youth health issues in Maryland. The result of the survey assists in planning effective strategies and programs to prevent or discourage improper behavior and abuses among adolescents. The survey results also assist MSDE in program planning and implementation efforts, including determining priorities and resource allocations, identifying specific objectives, and developing effective prevention strategies by Maryland State and local government agencies and Maryland communities.

Since this is a biennial survey, the base contract survey was conducted in FY2011 (4/1/2011-3/31/2012) and the two renewal option year surveys, if exercised contingent upon availability of funding, will be conducted in FY2013 (4/1/2013-3/31/2014) for the first renewal option and FY2015 (4/1/2015-3/31/2016) for the second renewal option.

The MYRBS consists of a booklet of questionnaires completed by survey participants. The survey data collected is then sent to the CDC for preliminary statistical analysis and the result is incorporated into various reports for review by MSDE and other stakeholders.

DGS anticipates having a new contract award recommendation to the BPW in November 2011 for a 1/1/2012 start date.

A Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace* and the DGS bid board on 5/16/2011. A single offer was received on the due date of 6/10/2011 from the incumbent, Play and Learn Centers, Inc. During the technical evaluation it was discovered that the MBE Utilization and Fair Solicitation Affidavit was not filled out completely. After consultation with the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) and the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs (GOMA), it was determined that Play and Learn Centers, Inc.'s proposal was not susceptible of being selected for award pursuant to COMAR 21.11.03.09 C (6) and 21.06.02.03 (B) (2). Because only one offer was received, the services performed under this contract must be re-procured.

Previously, Offerors had to submit responses for both Centers. In order to stimulate competition the new solicitation will give Offerors the opportunity to bid on the Annapolis and Crownsville Child Care Centers individually and together, with an award(s) made to individual Centers or both Centers, based on the proposal determined to be the most advantageous to the State considering technical and financial factors as set forth in the RFP.

Play and Learn Centers, Inc. has provided day care services as required under the contract for the State since 1991 in Crownsville and 2002 in Annapolis, Maryland. DGS has not received a complaint or concerns regarding any aspect of its performance. The vendor has provided several letters of compliments from parents expressing the love and care their children have received from Play and Learn Centers, Inc. In several cases, the children were enrolled for several years and graduated to kindergarten. The Maryland State Department of Education – Office of Child Care, which currently is responsible for Child Care Services, and the Department of Human Resources – Child Care Administration, which previously was responsible for Child Care Services, have performed yearly Child Care Center Inspections. The inspection reports for the last five years have shown the Centers to be in compliance.

The Centers offer safe, high quality services that are affordable and convenient to State employees, as well as the general public. Children of State employees are given first priority to receive services under this contract. The Annapolis Center has space and equipment to accommodate 102 children; and the Crownsville Center has space and equipment to accommodate up to 100 children from infant to school age.

Although the original contract had no MBE participation goal during the second renewal option Play and Learn Centers, Inc. stated that the Centers would make a good faith effort to purchase toys, games, supplies and food from minority-owned and operated businesses in the State of Maryland. Play and Learn Centers, Inc. has also made efforts to subcontract with minority owned and operated businesses for janitorial services, trash collection, building improvements and maintenance, etc.

This contract provides for residential child care services for developmentally disabled children in accordance with all relevant licensing laws and regulations for children placed by local departments of social services.

Although CIS & H, Inc. is currently licensed by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) for 18 child care beds, in the sealed proposal in response to the RFP issued November 2010 CIS & H, Inc. requested 21 child care beds. During the RFP evaluation period, CIS & H, Inc. requested an increase in its capacity from 18 to 21 by the licensing agency. However, it did not follow through with the necessary inspections to grant the increase; therefore, the licensed capacity remained unchanged for this provider. However, the Department awarded 21 beds based on the proposal for 21 beds.

Upon realizing the discrepancy, the Department prepared a modification to the contract to reflect the reduction in CIS & H, Inc.'s capacity as per the license issued by the DHMH. Failure to adjust the contracted number of beds may result in adverse audit findings.

Since the contract began in April 2011, during various periods up to the present, a total of 15 children were served by the Provider. Because the contract is a not-to-exceed amount based upon all beds being filled for the entire duration of the contract, the total contract value will actually be approximately \$210,000 less based upon the price of 15 beds for 5 months (4/1/2011 – 8/31/2011) being only \$525,019 versus the price of 21 beds being \$735,026.

Copies of the solicitation notice were mailed directly to six prospective vendors, one of which is a Maryland firm, and included no MBEs. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Five offers were received for this contract. One offeror requested to withdraw its offer prior to oral presentations. The remaining four were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award (see Attachment). PHH Arval, Inc. (PHH) was ranked #2 technically and had the lowest price. The #1 technically ranked offeror had the third lowest price. Financial factors were given greater weight than technical factors in the overall award determination. Therefore, PHH is recommended for the award of this contract as providing the most advantageous offer to the State.

The contract for which approval is being requested will continue to provide access to a repair and maintenance service network of national and local Maryland vendors for servicing State-owned cars, light trucks, vans and medium and heavy-duty trucks. It also provides for an accident management program to manage reporting and repair of all vehicle accidents and vandalism claims by participating State agencies. The term dates include a seven week transition period from the incumbent to the new Contractor.

The State owns approximately 8,700 vehicles; of this number, approximately 5,400 currently participate in the maintenance program. The approximately 3,300 remaining vehicles are maintained using State-owned repair facilities.

The requested \$46,000,000 approval amount of this item is estimated. Approximately \$43,560,000 of this amount is estimated to be reimbursements for the actual cost of maintenance and repairs to State vehicles by participating facilities. The financial offer in the Attachment was based upon a model in the RFP for evaluation purposes for a five-year period for administrative fees. The development of a proton treatment center in the Biopark will establish UMB and the School of Medicine as one of the leading centers for cancer clinical care, research and education in the world. The proposed proton treatment center will be the fifth on the east coast and the first, and probably the only, facility in the Baltimore/ Washington Region. The Proton Treatment Center will be a radiation oncology treatment center. An on-site extended stay hotel, for use by patients and companies located in the BioPark, may also be developed as part of the project.

Twenty-three firms responded to the solicitation and were evaluated by an Evaluation and Selection Committee. Fourteen offerors were found to be technically acceptable and were requested to submit price proposals consisting of a hourly rates for various consulting services. The University recommends award of master contracts to thirteen of the fourteen firms. The fourteenth is not recommended for award because its hourly rates were significantly higher than those firms who are recommended.

As USM institutions identify specific higher education ERP services they require, that institution would solicit those services on a task order basis. The buying institution would provide a statement of requirements for higher education ERP consulting services to one or more of the master contractors determined by the services required and the services provided by the master contractor(s). The master contractors would respond by providing a task order proposal including a price quotation consisted with the hourly rates it quoted when responding to the original solicitation. Individual task order agreements between the institution and selected master contractor would not be brought back to the Board of Public Works. There is no obligation that a USM institution enter into a task order for any of the services provided by the master contractors nor does the USM guarantee a minimum fee or number of task orders of any kind under the master contracts. Projects will be managed by each campus' Office of Information Technology Services with procurement support from the University's Procurement Department.

Award is being recommended to 13 companies of which 8 are Maryland Small Businesses and one is also a Maryland State Certified Minority Business Enterprise. To attract small and minority businesses, the USM unbundled the requirements for the services to include both smaller engagements, such as training, adhoc consulting and staff augmentation, as well as full, complex implementations and upgrade projects. Generally, the companies fall into two categories. The first includes major or full service consulting firms that specialize in support for higher education ERP (primarily PeopleSoft) implementations, upgrades, upgrade labs and training and have a significant number of highly experienced consultants in both technical and functional areas. The second includes niche firms having higher education experience with smaller numbers of staffs with specialized skill sets that may be needed in specific technical areas or could be used for short-term staff augmentation.

The Clearinghouse recommended the University contact the Oil Control Program at the Maryland Department of the Environment concerning the removal and cleanup of an underground petroleum storage tank. The University has completed the removal and cleanup of the underground petroleum storage tank.

Once the site is cleared, it will be held for future University development.

REMARKS: The extension for four months to allow time to complete the procurement process and award a new contract is necessary because the procurement process has taken much longer than expected. This is a very complex contract covering electronic monitoring services for over 375 offenders who are under the direct supervision of the Division of Parole and Probation.

The RFP process requires significant time and effort to ensure the vendor community clearly understands the services needed by the State. In addition, the scope of the solicitation was revised to include both the GPS and Radio Frequency aspect of electronic monitoring services which were previously procured through a separate contract. DPSCS worked diligently with DoIT to ensure that the specifications include all of DPSCS requirements; the solicitation was released June 17. It is the opinion of the DPSCS operating and procurement staff that this extension will provide sufficient time to complete the procurement process and have an Agenda Item presented to the Board with a recommendation for award before the end of this extension.

BI Inc. has consistently provided the required services for the Division of Parole and Probation since 2/1/2006. By continuing services with this contractor, the State will receive the benefit of exemplary electronic monitoring services while allowing for the successful procurement of a new contract.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: In 2010, the State completed a competitive procurement for software for a new State personnel system that included the evaluation of software for recruitment and examination of prospective State job applicants. The State determined that the software package offered by DLT Solutions, Inc. ("DLT"), which consisted of PeopleSoft enterprise software and, for recruitment and examination, JobApps, Inc. ("JobApps") software, best met the State's requirements. In March 2010, the State and DLT entered into a contract that included the eventual purchase of the JobAps software ("DLT Contract"). However, upon later examination of the procurement file and prior to the purchase of any software, it was determined DLT made two late modifications to its offer that increased its price by \$1.4 million. Because those modifications did not make its terms more favorable to the State and had not, pursuant to COMAR 21.05.02.10.B., properly been approved, DoIT concluded that the DLT Contract was void. In a February 2011 letter, following several requests that DLT honor its pre-modifications price, and DLT's refusal to do so, the State informed DLT that the DLT Contract was void and that ratification of the DLT Contract was not in the State's best interests. DLT has not challenged that determination.

Having previously concluded that the JobAps software best met the State's requirements for recruitment and examination, and that the JobAps/PeopleSoft software combination was superior to the software packages offered by the two other offerors, The State sought, as a sole source procurement, a proposal from JobAps for its software, as well as for services to implement that software. JobAps, Inc. is the only permanently authorized seller of its software, and JobAps does not authorize any other parties to provide implementation services, installation, integretation or operations and maintenance support of their public sector products.

This contract with JobAps is to implement a web-enabled, public-facing Statewide Recruitment and Examination SaaS, standard process workflow and integration with backend systems. Its embedded process workflow and other automated features will replace many time-consuming, often redundant manual processes and agency-specific legacy silo systems. The system includes robust reporting functionality to support the State's statutory and business intelligence analysis requirements.

It is also the initial phase of the Statewide Personnel System implementation. Included in the contract is the later integration with the PeopleSoft HCM implementation planned for Go-Live in FY14.

The JobAps System will:

- 1. Enable agency human resources and recruitment personnel to substantially automate many of the recruitment related processes including approval of job requisitions, creation of job announcements and selection plans.
- 2. Provide centralized and agency-specific website views of job opportunities for the public.
- 3. Give the public the ability to apply for jobs online and store their recruitment profiles to enable easier application for different job opportunities and eliminate the need for agency human resource personnel to manually key employment applications.
- 4. Accommodate the differing recruitment requirements of civilian and sworn officer agency recruitment processes.
- 5. Provide the ability to develop, publish and deliver employment tests.
- 6. Give job applicants the ability to identify and schedule testing without contacting agency human resources.
- 7. Provide the ability to score and band applicants.
- 8. Integrate with backend position control and hiring systems for better control and reduction of redundant processes.
- 9. Provide robust reporting functionality to support agency specific and aggregate statewide statutory reporting and business intelligence analysis requirements.

There are 54 State agencies and 173 distinct departments/offices within those agencies that are "in scope" and will use the JobAps system.

The MBE goal established for this Contract was 6%. The area of on-site Project Manager is the only area in which subcontracting opportunities exist for these proprietary software services.

REMARKS: The State desires to promote citizen, business and government efficiency by making new services available online anytime/anywhere and enhancing the desirability and efficiency of providing existing online services to business and Maryland residents. This contract provides enterprise-wide eGovernment (eGov) services that are available for all State agencies, boards and commissions.

The eGov contract provides for the design, development, hosting, operation and maintenance of eGov products and services via a funding model that leverages fees for select services to pay for other non-fee-based services. This model will leverage a small number of commercially-valuable services desired by the private sector and pool the fees generated from the purchase of those services into a special contractor-owned and managed fund created for the contract. The fund will be used exclusively to deliver eGov services for all agencies across State government on a work order basis.

Approximately 24 states currently use the self-funded eGov model and typically deploy 10 to 20 new eGov services per year. Because so many other states have adopted this model, the proposed vendor, NIC, has a large catalog of applications already developed that may be beneficial to the State for no additional cost to Maryland.

DoIT will work with the contractor to establish an eGov Governance Board made up of key State IT and business leaders. This Board will encourage collaboration between agencies to identify and recommend new services and enhancements and determine priorities, including which new services will provided for a fee and which will be offered at no cost. Services will be developed and managed at the direction of the State and the State will maintain ownership of all State data. The contractor oversees the electronic delivery of services and information by providing application development and support, common payment processing, integration with existing systems; security; hosting, marketing, and financial audit reporting to maintain exact investment and return of State fees generated by electronic transactions. As such, the contractor will adhere to all State privacy and security guidelines.

As the eGov Governance Board determines what services and applications to pursue, they will do so by submitting individual Work Orders to NIC. Using the examples of the other 24 states who have implemented this eGov model, Work Orders most commonly fall into two categories:

DoIT will manage the eGov Master Contract, but services will be solicited by individual State agencies, depending upon their needs. This contract may also be used by counties, municipalities, and other non-State governments or agencies.

One proposal was received in response to the RFP, and was deemed reasonably susceptible of being recommended for award. No Bid responses were received from two firms that attended the pre-proposal conference stating reasons of no guarantee of work orders, exceptions to the State's terms and conditions, inexperience, no guarantee of return on hosting services in a timely manner, and the lack of a mandatory use by State agencies.

NICUSA, Inc. was recommended for award based on its demonstrated strengths of having the experience, capability, a clear understanding and methodology to perform these services, having excellent references for providing hosting and managed services, applications development and framework models, and its demonstrated ability to address service needs throughout the State efficiently and effectively. The evaluation committee determined that the proposal submitted by NICUSA, Inc. will provide the best value to the State.

The Offeror has committed to the MBE subcontracting goal of 30% for the aggregate of all Time and Materials Work Order Agreements under the Master Contract. The State will assess the potential for additional MBE subcontractor participation for each work order request issued.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Esri, is the sole source provider of all U.S. domestic Enterprise License Agreements (ELA) for the software contemplated in the contract, and is the only source that can grant the right to copy and deploy Esri software as well as offer manufacturer proprietary software maintenance and support under an ELA.

Geographic Information Systems (GIS) technology has rapidly become a strategic and core business enabler for state government, while serving as an invaluable analytical and communications tool deployed by state agencies in conjunction their interactions with other state resources and external constituents. Mapping products are becoming increasingly more integrated in the StateStat process, as well as in publicly-consumable applications developed in conjunction with the Maryland.gov web portal. Today, scores of live, dynamic maps can be readily accessed on the State's official website (e.g., AgPrint, GreenPrint, GrowthPrint, Stream Health, Recovery, Budget, Energy, Broadband, PlanMaryland, VisitMaryland, etc.).

Virtually all State GIS applications are built upon Esri technology platforms and products. Esri has evolved to become the State's de facto GIS standard. By standardizing on Esri GIS, the State's numerous agencies and business partners are able to keep the geospatial train on the same gauge of track, thereby securing the benefits of consolidation, interoperability and cost efficiency.

Historically, Maryland has not optimized its cost benefit potential in the GIS marketplace. Purchasing practice in this area has been typically agency-siloed, on-demand and uncoordinated. This has also created ancillary issues ranging from the preservation of outdated and obsolete GIS software products on one end, to the inability to obtain necessary support and maintenance for newer products on the other end. In addition, the haphazard buying patterns have not typically offered the best price discounts.

In response to these opportunities and issues, Esri and the State have worked together to forge an ELA that provides for widespread GIS software use and support across State agencies. The advantages of the ELA are numerous: lower unit cost of Esri software; fixed predictable overall costs over the life of the agreement; flexibility to deploy Esri software products when and where needed; streamlined procurement processes; increased leverage for achieving statewide GIS standards and interoperability; offer of GIS to agencies that may otherwise not afford to implement; and, the continuous support of the geospatial data and mapping requirements driven by agency and administration initiatives.

ITEM: 4-IT (Cont.)

After numerous iterations, the final price of the Esri ELA was negotiated to a level approximately equivalent to current spend for Esri products and support, notwithstanding a nominal annual price escalation permitted during the life of the contract. The major cost benefit of the ELA is its offer of unlimited usage of Esri mainstream software products, upgrades, maintenance and support for a fixed price. This arrangement not only economically facilitates the anticipated uptick in GIS usage within the primary GIS agencies, but it encourages utilization in the smaller or current non-GIS user agencies who now have a much more attractive cost entry point. The upshot is that an increasing level of deployment of Esri technology throughout State government will result in lower unit cost of each product and/or instance.

Under the proposed contract, the State will acquire only Esri software products, maintenance and support services that are unique and proprietary to the vendor and not available from an alternate source. Esri, as owner and manufacturer, is the sole source provider of all U.S. domestic ELAs for the software contemplated in the contract, and is the only source that can grant the right to copy and deploy Esri software as well as offer manufacturer proprietary software maintenance and support under an ELA. The State definition of "sole source" applies.

There are 56 state agencies and entities named in the Esri ELA with the option to add others. The fixed contract cost will be distributed to each agency in a proportion to its level of license consumption. DoIT will be responsible for Esri ELA contract administration, management and oversight.

For Fiscal Year 2012, funds are being moved from all of the agencies currently paying for Esri products into DoIT for payment of this contract. Beginning in FY2013, funds will be budgeted in the DoIT Reimbursable program for this purpose, as is done with telecommunications and networkMarylandTM costs.

Master Contract Background:

The 21 qualified offerors were deemed responsible and are recommended for award to receive a Master Contract. Of these 21 recommended contractors, 15 are Maryland resident businesses, four are Small Businesses and two are MBEs (see Attachment 2).

This Master Contract encompasses the following three functional areas:

Functional Area I – Two-Way Radio Equipment
Functional Area II – Communications Consoles and Associated Equipment
Functional Area III – Installation, Repair and Preventive Maintenance Services

This Master Contract is structured to be adaptable to rapidly changing technology by allowing Master Contractors the option to add additional manufacturers' product lines throughout the term of the Master Contract as they become authorized to sell those lines.

There is a second level of competition through a Purchase Order Request for Proposals (PORFP) process for all two-way radio equipment, communications consoles and installation/repair/maintenance services offered under this contract. A PORFP is sent to all Master Contractors awarded a Master Contract within the appropriate functional area who are authorized to provide the equipment and/or services for the requested manufacturer(s) product line.

In addition, selected PORFPs can be designated as Small Business Reserve (SBR) competitions. For SBR designated PORFPs, each Master Contractor that is a small business will be able to compete within its approved functional area.

This procurement vehicle was designed to provide State agencies with a wide selection of Master Contractors who offer an extensive variety of two-way radio equipment. As a result of the awards from this solicitation, State agencies will obtain mobile radio equipment; communications consoles and associated equipment; and installation, repair and preventive maintenance services quickly and efficiently by issuing PORFPs specific to agencies' needs. This contracting vehicle is also available to Maryland local and County government jurisdictions.

MBE subcontracting goals of 25% will be applied to each individual PORFP for Functional Area III. An MBE goal was only applied to Functional Area III because the other two functional areas involve purely the provision of hardware, which does not afford any subcontracting opportunities.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The State was awarded a federal grant to extend middle-mile broadband infrastructure in the 23 counties, the City of Baltimore, and the City of Annapolis through implementation of the One Maryland Broadband Network (OMBN). The federal grant is from through the U.S. Department of Commerce's Broadband Technology Opportunities Program. The OMBN will use the grant funds to install approximately 1,294 miles of fiber optic cable, much of it in rural and underserved communities throughout the State, to bring Internet access to more than 1,000 community institutions and link together three independent broadband networks. Expanding broadband is crucial to help to create jobs, improve public safety, increase educational opportunities, improve health care delivery, and improve infrastructure for the Defense Base Realignment and Closure.

ITEM: 6-IT (cont'd)

Reference is made to DoIT Item 7-IT (June 15, 2011) in which the Board approved the award of a contract to OFS Fitel, LLC for the required fiber optic cabling. However, OFS Fitel, LLC could not make delivery by the dates the State required to meet the federal grant construction deadlines.

DoIT determined to issue this procurement to enable the State to start the fiber optic cable installation sooner. A notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bid was advertised on eMarylandMarketplace.com and on DoIT's website. In addition, the IFB was sent directly to 3 prospective vendors, all Original Equipment Manufacturers. Martelecom, LLC, a MBE, was the only bidder.

This procurement enables the State to quickly obtain approximately 72 miles of cable and be able to start the project approximately two months sooner than by waiting for OFS Fitel's fiber optic cable. It is important to receive these materials as soon as possible to meet the grant's August 2013 construction deadline.

This Solicitation was advertised on eMM and on the MAA Website. The solicitation was sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs and four (4) minority business associations on June 20, 2011. There were ten (10) direct solicitations sent to Minority Business Firms on June 22, 2011. Twenty-Eight (28) sets of specifications were sold and nine (9) firms submitted bids. The award is being ecommended to the three (3) responsible bidders with the lowest responsive bids based on the aggregate total of five (5) tasks consistent with the contract basis of award language.

In an effort to promote competition and control costs, after award contractors will be required to compete on specific individual tasks. Each task will be competed and the tasks will be assigned on a low bid basis. MAA reserves the right to award any task to one of the successful contractors when a specific expertise is required or when the continuation of a prior task is required.



Most of these projects are less than the \$200,000.00 BPW threshold and with the funding being mine reclamation funds operating funds, they are not submitted for Board approval. Most of the work on these projects is limited to specific elements of mine reclamation, sludge removal, recapture of water run-off, and capping of the mines. Only a few firms respond to the solicitation and most are smaller firms, located in the western portion of Maryland. The last two projects completed by our offices received responses from only two firms.

A survey of potential bidders indicated that they were otherwise committed or were too short on manpower to undertake the work at this time.

The government estimate was \$68,000.00. The difference between the estimate and bid cost is attributable to the fact that the cost for removal of significant sludge deposits from existing settling ponds was inadvertently omitted from the estimate. With this cost accounted for, the bid amount is considered fair and reasonable, and is within available funding.

The project site is located approximately 1.5 miles southeast of Lonaconing. Buffalo 422 is a forfeited mine site that underwent reclamation work in 2008.

As stated in the description above, it has been found that the existing water treatment system that neutralizes acid mine run-off before discharging into Jackson Run and Georges Creek is not meeting newly adapted EPA discharge requirements. This project will upgrade the treatment facilities to bring the site within compliance standards.

Background/History Reference is made to Item 2-GM of the Department of General Services Action Agenda of 12/16//2009 wherein the Board of Public Works approved a three year Interagency Agreement to facilitate the development of a new state-of-the-art Public Health Laboratory in the Science + Technology Park @ Johns Hopkins in East Baltimore. This agreement activated the use of \$6.45 million in pre-development funds appropriated by the Maryland General Assembly for the preparation of preliminary plans to construct the new lab.

The Board of Public Works is now requested to approve an occupancy lease with an initial term of twenty (20) years between the State of Maryland to the use of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) as Tenant and Maryland Economic Development Corporation (MEDCO) as Landlord. DHMH's lease will be used by MEDCO to facilitate the sale of MEDCO tax exempt bonds for the purposes of constructing and equipping the new Public Health Laboratory.

TENANT LEASE

Special Conditions MEDCO shall cause to be constructed a five (5) story 234,000 gross square foot building designed to the LEED Silver Certification criteria. The project will meet State and City MBE/WBE requirements. Total project costs are estimated at \$165,000,000.00 including the land acquisition and preparation costs but not including capitalized interest costs.

MEDCO shall issue and sell Series 2011 bonds in the approximate aggregate principal amount of \$186 million, not to exceed \$200 million, for an anticipated term of 20 years, at an estimated interest cost of 4.59% (as of February 2011). Closing on the bonds is expected to occur as early as October, 2011. Interest will be paid with bond proceeds commencing on bond issuance with DHMH's rent commencing approximately June 1, 2014 or with completion of the facility and DHMH taking occupancy. MEDCO's final bond maturity is expected to occur on or about October 1, 2031.

Bond closing and closing on the property are expected to occur simultaneously. The schedule currently anticipates the award of the construction contract on or about September 30, 2011; the completion and commission of the lab on or about February 21, 2014; and full occupancy and operation on or about April 27, 2014.

DHMH shall have the option to renew this Lease, beyond the initial term, for one (1) additional twenty (20) year period and for three (3) separate but immediately consecutive additional ten (10) year periods. After the bonds are paid in full, MEDCO will cease charging Base Rent for the property and DHMH will only be responsible for Additional Rent consisting of primarily standard operating costs and reserves. Base Rent and Additional Rent will remain contingent upon sufficient appropriations and the lease is terminable for failure to appropriate, acts of condemnation, and/or in the event of a casualty.

Additional Rent will be all operating costs to keep and maintain the facility, including property management fees, infrastructure use fees, and a fee to MEDCO of \$100,000.00 per year during construction, reducing to \$50,000.00 per year once construction is complete. Additional rent will include an Operating reserve fund of \$0.45 per square foot increased annually by 3% to be held by bond trustee and Repair and Replacement fund of \$3.00 per square foot increased annually by 3% to be held by Trustee. Both the operating reserve and the repair and replacement reserve are for the use by DHMH and if unused during DHMH's tenancy, would revert to State.

Although DHMH has negotiated an option to purchase the facility for an amount equal to the bonds outstanding at the time of the purchase, plus other incidental costs, the facility is anticipated to remain under the ownership and control of MEDCO for the facility's functional life and tenancy by DHMH.

During the period of construction, MEDCO shall cause the contractor or others to maintain, as a cost of the Project, (i) Builder's Risk Insurance; (ii) commercial general liability insurance; (iii) business automobile insurance; (iv) umbrella liability insurance; (v) workers compensation and employer's liability insurance; and (vi) environmental impairment liability insurance. MEDCO anticipates that the insurance may be handled via a Contractor Controlled Insurance Program (CCIP). Following completion, DHMH will carry hazard insurance or self insurance with respect to the facility in the amounts customarily maintained for such a facility.

Pursuant to the provisions of State Finance and Procurement Article, Section 12-204(d), the Capital Debt Affordability Committee has certified to the Governor and the General Assembly that the total amount of new State debt to be incurred by the lease may prudently be authorized. Pursuant to the provisions of State Finance and Procurement Article, Section 11-203(a)(2)(ii) this lease is exempt from Division II of the State Finance and Procurement Article.

Except for acts of gross negligence, DHMH shall indemnify the Landlord and the Trustee for its use of the facility to the extent permitted under the Maryland Torts Claim Act and subject to appropriation.
