The legislation establishes the OCO as an independent unit of State government, transfers the Juvenile Justice Monitoring Unit (JJMU) from the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) to OCO, including positions and funding, and tasks the new Office with conducting independent reviews and assessments of various programs administered by the state Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS).

Section 21 of Chapter 716 of 2024 (Budget Bill for FY 2025) authorizes \$1 million in FY 2025 special fund appropriation for the OCO to carry out Chapter 836 of 2024, with funding coming from the Performance Incentive Grant Fund. However, the FY 2025 Legislative Appropriation does not include any positions for the Office beyond those transferred from JJMU. The requested three positions in this item include:

- 1. The OCO Director, who will provide independent oversight of the adult corrections system in Maryland and oversee the Juvenile Justice Monitoring Unit, which provides independent oversight of the Department of Juvenile Services.
- 2. The Executive Administrator, which will provide administrative support, facilitate the establishment of the Correctional Ombudsman Advisory Board, initiate the analysis of the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) at Jessup, and initiate the audit of programming and services provided by the Division of Corrections.
- 3. The Budget and Finance Officer, which will provide accounting, budget, procurement, and human resources support for the new Office.

DBM REMARKS: The Secretary of the Department of Budget and Management has certified that funds are available for the new positions for which approval is requested. If the Board approves this request, 3 positions will have been approved within the Rule of 100 for FY 2025.

Recommendation: The Board of Trustees of St. Mary's College of Maryland requests approval to name the Learning Commons as the **Dallas P. Dean Learning Commons**.

Background: Constructed as part of a complex, the Learning Commons was built with cooperative funding between the State of Maryland and the College to offer classroom and office space for the College's Educational Studies department, which includes Special Education and the Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program. Opened in August 2022, the classrooms create flexible environments for MAT students to hone their teaching skills. The building also houses a 24-hour Study Commons area on the first floor to provide all SMCM students with private and collaborative study spaces. A coffee and light snack café share space in the Study Commons area.

Importantly, the building complex comprising the Learning Commons and the Nancy R. and Norton T. Dodge Performing Arts Center was named the American Institute of Architects Maryland Building of the Year in 2023. Each building is LEED Silver-designed.

Dallas Plugge Dean is a 1960 graduate of the St. Mary's Seminary Junior College, earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from American University, and embarked on a distinguished career as an educator. Ms. Dean taught at Rogers Heights Elementary School in Prince George's County, Maryland and retired in 1993 after a 30-year career.

Ms. Dean has long been recognized by members of the St. Mary's College campus community for her leadership, dedication and philanthropy. Ms. Dean, a champion of the College's Educational Studies department, established the Dallas P. Dean Master of Arts in Teaching Scholarship in 2002 to benefit students enrolled in the MAT program who demonstrated academic merit and financial need. In 2014, she created the Dean Current Fund, enabling the Educational Studies department to make emergency assistance awards to Educational Studies minors or students enrolled in the MAT program. According to Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs Katy Arnett (formerly professor and chair of Educational Studies), "Dallas Dean has been a consistent, engaged and very generous supporter of our Master of Arts in Teaching program for many years. The department is regularly humbled by her support of a fund that allows us to help our students with emergency expenses. Along with her annual scholarship dollars, we have increased students' financial access to the MAT program." For her generosity, the department refers to Ms. Dean as their "fairy Godprofessor."

Background (cont'd):

In addition to her named funds, Ms. Dean has a deep sense of duty and loyalty to support the College's top fundraising priorities, initiatives and campaigns. She readily donated to the *\$2.5 Million Capital Campaign Challenge* which helped cement funding for the College's Jamie L. Roberts Stadium and the Nancy R. and Norton T. Dodge Performing Arts Center/Learning Commons complex. For her lifetime giving, Ms. Dean is currently recognized in the President's Circle (\$500,000 - \$999,000). She is also a legacy member of the Mulberry Tree Society, having provided for the College through a substantial planned gift commitment.

Ms. Dean returns to campus every year to partake in Alumni Weekend, and in 2010, she served as a 50th Reunion Class Agent. She makes it a point to join with the greater College community for special celebrations and events, a favorite being the annual River Concert series.

Spanning the decades, Ms. Dean remains close to many alumni and employees of the College, including two of her former scholarship recipients whom she continues to mentor. In light of her inspiring service, Ms. Dean was awarded the Society of the Distinguished Alumni Award in June 2023. For her more than 60 years of service to St. Mary's College, the Board of Trustees bestowed upon her the highest College honor -- the 2023 Order of the Ark and Dove.

For her generosity to and love for the College -- and with an additional donation and pledge that will propel her lifetime giving to near \$2M -- it is fitting to name the Learning Commons at St. Mary's College of Maryland the Dallas P. Dean Learning Commons.

The Board of Trustees met on June 14, 2024, and unanimously approved the naming.

Remarks: On April 8, 2024, the Maryland Stadium Authority and Baltimore City executed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to assist with immediate capital infrastructure improvements to the Baltimore Convention Center. This MOU identified priority projects requiring immediate attention which are included in this approval item.

The Authority recommends awarding a contract to Clark Construction for design and construction services at the Baltimore Convention Center. The procurement process proceeded as follows:

The RFP for this Project was issued on April 11, 2024 via eMaryland Marketplace Advantage, the MSA website and GovDelivery. The procurement followed MSA's Competitive Sealed Proposal process and was based on the requirements outlined in the RFP. The RFP outlines the specific scope of work for the project and describes the requirements for submitting a technical and financial proposal.

A selection committee (hereinafter "the Committee") comprised of members from MSA and the Baltimore City Convention Center was formed to review and evaluate the proposals, oral presentations and all other submissions related to this RFP.

Seven firms submitted technical proposals on May 17, 2024. The Committee evaluated each proposal based on the requirements established in the RFP. Upon completion of proposal evaluations and the review of technical clarifications, the Committee recommended the short-listing of five (5) firms to participate in the oral presentation phase of this procurement. Oral presentations were conducted on June 5, 2024. Upon completion of the oral presentations, the committee short-listed four (4) firms to participate in the financial proposal phase of the procurement. Financial proposals were evaluated and as a result, the Committee is recommending Clark for award, whose technical proposal received highest technical and overall scores, and provided the overall best value for the Project.

Clark Construction committed to meet the overall MBE goal of 30% participation established for construction services.

Remarks: The Stadium Authority recommends CAM Construction Company, Inc. (CAM) for preconstruction services related to the Commodore John Rogers Elementary/Middle School project, and intends to return with a recommendation to award a Guaranteed Maximum Price contract recommendation if the pre-construction performance is satisfactory and an acceptable construction phase bid package is negotiated.

The procurement was initially advertised as a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) in August 2016. Fifteen firms were deemed qualified by the selection committee and given the opportunity to receive the project specific Request for Proposals (RFP), determined by project type and cost categories.

Construction packages were advertised and documents were issued by the CM for trade contractor participation on April 16, 2024 in the following publications: eMaryland Marketplace, MSA's website, and the CM's website, as well as directly solicited to numerous trade contractors.

MSA and the CM conducted pre-bid and site visit meetings at the project site, and all attendees were provided with summary project information and afforded the opportunity to tour the project site. Additionally, outreach and networking opportunities were conducted in advance of the project bidding in October of 2023 at various events such as Associated Builders and Contractors Outreach Event (10/4), the annual Meet the Primes Event (10/11), and the Women in Construction Conference (10/19). These were attended by MSA, numerous trade contractors, and other representatives regarding contracting, MBE participation, and local hiring opportunities.

On April 24, 2024 competitive, sealed trade contractor bids were received and opened at the CM's offices in Ijamsville, Maryland. Post-bid scope review meetings were conducted, and all bid openings and scope reviews were attended by MSA. The CM received 11 bid submissions for the packages solicited and advertised.

Efforts to maximize Maryland's commitment to protecting the environment and incorporating green building standards to reduce the effects on climate change resulted in the project attaining 30% water use reduction, 27% site storm water runoff reduction, and 32% energy savings by using efficient MEP systems, fixtures, and equipment.

Remarks: The Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA) Board recommends Gilbane Building Company for partial pre-construction services for the Renovation Projects at Oriole Park at Camden Yards and intends to return with future recommendations to award several Guaranteed Maximum Price contracts, providing pre-construction performance is satisfactory.

The procurement was initially advertised as a Request for Qualifications on January 5, 2024. MSA prequalified five firms to receive the Requests for Proposals (RFP). Four of the prequalified firms submitted a proposal in response to the RFP issued on February 2, 2024. The Selection Committee held oral presentations with all four Offerors and short listed three of the Offerors to participate in the financial proposal phase of the procurement. Financial proposals included pre-construction fees as well as the construction phase mark ups related to CM fee, CM contingency, and insurance/bonds. After review of the financial proposals and scope of work review, the selection committee selected Gilbane - WarrenBuilds, which had the highest technical and overall scores and provided best value for the Project.

This recommendation is for MSA to spend up to \$400,000 in preconstruction services. MSA will return for authorization to spend the remaining preconstruction fee once the financing/bond plan and/or another funding source is established. This initial phase of the preconstruction services is required to determine a project plan including project estimates. Remarks: Nature of Emergency: The existing 1300 gallon hot water tank supplying hot water to the A-Building of the RCI is well beyond its service life expectancy and is exhibiting signs of imminent catastrophic failure. The tank is currently leaking water and flooding the mechanical room in which it is housed. Two temporary sump pumps have been installed to remove the water as it pools on the floor of the mechanical room.

Emergency services to replace the existing hot water heater supporting the A-Building are necessary to prevent the catastrophic failure of the 1300 gallon hot water tank and to preserve the health and safety of those working in the A-Building. Failure of this vessel will cause interruption to the operations and cause health and sanitation concerns to the kitchen that processes meals and the medical dispensary that provides medical care to the incarcerated individuals housed at RCI. Without access to hot water, the kitchen and medical facilities will be unable to properly wash and sanitize dishes, equipment, & supplies that the incarcerated population and staff need.

This emergency procurement will remove the existing 1300 gallon hot water heater and replace it with four 300 gallon hot water heaters and all associated appurtenances for operation. The new vessels will be ready for operation prior to the removal of the existing unit to ensure minimal interruptions to hot water service. This installation will create a system with redundant operations to avoid total failure of hot water supply in the future.

Basis for Selection: Two vendors were contacted to provide quotes for this emergency service. A good faith effort was put forward by the Department of Public Safety & Correctional Services to solicit competition for this emergency procurement. However, due to the remoteness of the facility, a third vendor could not be identified for direct solicitation. On June 5, 2024, two quotes were received, with Fridinger-Ritchie Co., Inc. submitting the lowest quote.

Requesting Institution Remarks: As a result of the site investigation for existing conditions during preconstruction, an assessment survey concluded that the existing waterline needed to be relocated outside of the new building footprint and the existing electrical duct bank had collapsed in areas and therefore was not suitable to house new electrical cabling. Both the existing utilities will need to be demolished and relocated. This new utility work will also require additional earthwork, hardscaping, and temporary fencing.

Sustainability: Smith Hall will undergo a major renovation/addition to transition from use as a science facility to future use for departments of media arts within the college of fine arts. A major emphasis of the project is to provide a healthy and sustainable environment that supports the university's mission. A renovation project is often inherently more sustainable given the approach reduces the amount of building that is demolished and rebuilt. The building has been a notoriously heavy user of energy - the factors that lead to this are being addressed as part of the renovation process - an uninsulated masonry exterior will be replaced with a highly efficient modern rainscreen that will significantly reduce energy consumption. New Smith Hall will be an all-electric building to allow a "net-zero ready" strategy that is forward looking in its decoupling from fossil fuel energy production. The building will utilize geothermal wells, and a watersource heat pump-based HVAC system that will reduce electricity consumption by 85-90% for building heating and cooling. The project will target LEED gold certification - and maximize potential efforts inherent in the LEED scoring system within the project's available budget. The re-visioned building will reduce the impervious site area while introducing non-irrigated local landscaping and stormwater management facilities. Design is intended to make the building ready for photovoltaic power generation. Finish and material selections will be made with an end goal of providing a healthy environment for occupants.

Requesting Agency Remarks: MDTA is requesting an increase to the contract authority to enable the removal of additional sludge and liquid materials from the FMT; thereby reducing the amount of sediment moving into the Patapsco River. The original annual estimated quantities were 50,000 gallons for sludge removal and 10,000 gallons for liquids; however, actual sludge removal is currently at 1,421,942 gallons and the actual liquid removal is 165,800 gallons. The higher quantities are expected to continue throughout the remainder of the contract.

The quantities are higher than originally estimated due to various factors, such as: the existing wet well pits at FMT have not been completely drained since 2017, as only partial service was received at this tunnel location by a previous contractor whose services have been terminated; the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapse caused additional traffic at FMT with excessive amounts of trash and debris entering the wet well pits; a Baltimore City water leak brought additional liquids to the tunnel; and excessive rain in the Baltimore region have also significantly increased the amount of liquid and sludge that needs to be removed from the wet well pits by utilizing this contract.

No MBE nor VSBE participation goals were established for this contract due to the single element of work outlined in the contract scope of work. Furthermore, one Small Business Reserve (SBR) firm was identified during the Procurement Review Group process, resulting in no SBR designation.

Requesting Agency Remarks: This solicitation was advertised on eMaryland Marketplace Advantage on January 2, 2024, which notified 2,288 vendors. In addition, MPA directly solicited eight vendors that had requested information during outreach events. Representatives of 29 consultants attended the preproposal conference. The advertisement was for two contracts for \$3.5 million each, not to exceed \$7 million in total. MPA received six technical proposals; however, one was deemed not susceptible for award for failure to meet the small business requirement. MPA selected two consultants for contract award. The consultants ranked third and fifth were debriefed at their request. No protests have been received. MPA has determined that the prices negotiated for this contract are fair and reasonable. The labor rates provided are consistent with other recently negotiated awards and with the current contracts for these services.

The consultants under these contracts will provide the MPA with Construction Management Inspection Architectural and Engineering services on an as-needed basis for the planning, development, and design of new MPA facilities and for the improvements of existing facilities for five years.

Per BPW Advisory 2001-1, the MPA Office of Fair Practices and Procurement Review Group reviewed the procurement for potential MBE and VSBE goals and Small Business Reserve (SBR) designation. They determined that an 18% MBE goal should be established. No VSBE goals were established due to the limited number of VSBE firms that could perform the work. This contract was designated as an SBR. Requesting Agency Remarks: In 2019, the Maryland Department of Environment, in coordination with other Maryland agencies and stakeholders propose the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Act (GGRA) to achieve Maryland's goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 40% from 2006 levels by 2030. Under the GGRA, the MTA has committed to a program whereby 50% of its internal combustion engine buses will transition to zero-emission buses by 2030. Legislation in the 2024 session permits for the purchases through fiscal year 2026 of both hybrid and zero emission buses in recognition that supply chain issues continue with the demand of zero emission buses.

In consideration of the state of good repair for the bus fleet, and the safety and operational risks associated with an increasing average age of the bus fleet, it was determined that MTA could not wait to complete another competitive procurement for a multi-year bus buy after the failed procurement in 2023. To do so would leave a large gap in the necessary delivery schedule of new coaches. MTA then considered utilizing an Intergovernmental Cooperative Purchase Agreement (ICPA), to provide a substantially quicker and more cost-efficient procurement process that could fill the gap in new coach deliveries consisting of fifty hybrid buses and twenty battery-electric buses (BEB). MTA identified two potential ICPA BEB contracts, one with the State of Virginia and the other with the State of Washington.

The State of Washington, Department of Enterprise Services (DES) Contract No. 06719 contract requirements are the closest in scope of work to meet MTA's requirements and allows for bus delivery in approximately 24 months from placing the order. Although there is a contract with Virginia, it was more cost effective and efficient to utilize the Washington contract as the pricing to adapt the base bus for Baltimore requirements was less costly.

The Washington contract for BEB has two contractors that can provide the 40-foot buses, New Flyer of America Inc. (New Flyer) and Gillig, Inc., while still being eligible for Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funded contracts. New Flyer was chosen due to fleet standardization. Allowing a third manufacturer into the fleet at this time would cause delays in manufacturing as prototypes would be required before delivery. MTA compared the overall costs to other transit and state agencies which utilized either the Virginia or Washington contracts for their bus purchases. The cost differences are consistent with expectation considering configuration difference. Therefore, the cost is considered fair and reasonable.

In the case of vehicle purchases using federal funding, a transit vehicle manufacturer (TVM) is required per 49 C.F.R. §26.49 to submit a certification that it has complied with FTA's DBE requirements. The FTA assigns and tracks DBE goals. FTA's website contains a list of current certified TVMs. New Flyer's DBE goal for FY2024 is 3.61%.

Entering into an ICPA with Washington to purchase these fifty hybrid electric buses and twenty zero-emission battery operated electric buses through New Flyer will provide cost benefits to the State, promote administrative efficiencies, intergovernmental cooperation, and would not circumvent the State's procurement process. Therefore, MTA request approval of this contract with New Flyer of America Inc., utilizing the ICPA procurement method.

Federal requirements restrict competition to non-profit organizations. Three proposals were received on January 26, 2024 and two were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. One proposal was deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award because the offeror did not meet the minimum requirement of being a non-profit organization. Requesting Agency Remarks: The Office of Medicaid Benefits Management (OMBM) is pleased with the Healthcare Service Partners' performance. Healthcare Service Partners, LLC provides audit reviews of hospital postpaid claims, as required by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid, for overpayment and underpayments, and provides training and education to hospitals to ensure that billing errors do not reoccur. The vendor also provides support to the Department in the hearing process. If this contract is discontinued, recovery of improper payments will cease and leave a large amount of uncovered Medicaid funds. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the State to continue to exercise the contract modification to avoid disruption to the recovery process. During the transition from the Office of the Inspector General to the Office of Medical Benefits Management, a new solicitation was not established in a timely fashion. The RFP for the replacement contract is currently being finalized by MDH.

Healthcare Service Partners, LLC is not meeting the VSBE participation for the contract because the previous VSBE subcontractor went out of business in September 2023. After several attempts to find a replacement they successfully secured a new subcontractor on November 3, 2023. Healthcare Service Partners, LLC submitted a corrective action plan that details the ongoing efforts to fulfill the 1% VSBE participation.

Maryland was separated into four LATAs, Baltimore, Washington, Hagerstown, and Salisbury to coincide with the geographic areas.

Pricing was compared to the current Local Telecommunications Services Contract 2014, and pricing increased an average of 12% to 31% for core services, which aligns with the telecommunications industry standard yearly inflation rate of 3%. The base term is in line with the extended price of all line items being in use for the entirety of the first year. Payment will be made only for the actual amount of services provided. The average spend of the current contract over the past four years is \$3,990,868.34 with a ceiling of \$5,000,000.00 each year. Requesting Agency Remarks: Services provided through this contract are unique and highly specialized to deliver the State a management contractor to oversee all conventional maintenance, repairs, glass replacement, and preventative maintenance. Additionally, the contractor monitors for all original equipment manufacturer recalls, provides maintenance experts through a centralized technical support center to review, and approves maintenance and repair services 24/7/365 (including a toll-free number). The contract also includes emergency road services 24/7/365 for vehicle towing and transportation for State personnel from the accident or breakdown site to a safe and appropriate location. These centralized services are reasonable and applicable. Therefore, continuing these services while the State conducts the new procurement and awards a contract is essential.

The Department of General Services (DGS) released a Request for Proposal in late 2022, and submissions have been received. DGS is finalizing the contract with the potential awardee and anticipates an award by September 2024. The initial delays on this procurement were due to the pandemic and the ability to engage with vendors fully. Additional delays have occurred due to staffing changes, corrective actions taken during the procurement process, and contract negotiations.

Requesting Agency Remarks: DBM issued a Multi-Step Invitation for Bids (MS-IFB) for Pharmacy Benefits Plan Management Services and Pharmacy Purchasing Pool Management to procure services for the State of Maryland in connection with the State Employee and Retiree Health and Welfare Benefits Program and the Maryland Rx Program on January 23, 2024 VIA the eMarylandMarketplace (eMMA).

DBM administers the Plan that covers Active Employees, State Retirees, Satellite Account Employees and Retirees, Direct pay enrollees, and their respective eligible dependents. The plan is self-funded by the State and is an employee-sponsored health plan administered as part of the State Employee and Retiree Health and Welfare Benefits Program. The State requested services to be provided in two Functional Areas. Functional Area (FA) 1 – Active Employees, non-Medicare Retirees, and State of Maryland Rx Purchasing pool. Functional Area (FA) 2 – Medicare Eligible Retirees Employer Group Waiver Program (EGWP). In accordance with Chapter 397 of 2011, the State is in the process of transitioning Medicare-eligible retirees to Medicare Part D effective January 1, 2025. However, FA-2 EGWP has been included on a contingent basis. Thus, the Agency does not plan to execute a notice to proceed for FA-2 EGWP at this time.

The State engaged The Segal Group, Inc. (Segal) as the Department's benefits consultants and Milliman as the reverse auction provider. Both teams actively assisted the State in this procurement as consultants and observers. The State also had several observers monitoring the procurement process, including representatives from the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees of Maryland and the Maryland Prescription Drug Affordability Board.

The State posted the MS-IFB to eMMA on January 23, 2024, and held a pre-bid conference on January 30, 2024. After the pre-bid conference was held, the potential bidders were offered a period of time to identify their questions, and those were submitted to the State on February 13, 2024. The final set of answers to the questions were posted to eMMA on March 27, 2024. Four amendments were issued regarding timelines throughout the Question-and-Answer period, and one amendment was made to Attachment B. These were all posted to eMMA for bidders and the public to view.

The State conducted this procurement in three phases: Minimum Qualifications (Phase I), Participant Bidding Agreement (PBA) (Phase II), and the Reverse Auction (Phase III), consisting of three rounds. The State utilized Milliman's Secure Transfer Portal RFP360 platform to conduct each round of this procurement and bidding process to ensure the results were safely handled and secured.

The final round of bidding closed on May 22, 2024, and results were posted to eMMA, identifying each bidder's identity, on May 28, 2024. MedImpact submitted the lowest total projected cost and is recommended for award. MedImpact's bid over the full seven-year contract term was \$368,724,168.00 lower than CVS's bid, a difference of 15.1%.

Following a thorough review of all information, including consultation with our contractors, the State finds that this is the best outcome, and the results evidence the cost savings contemplated by existing PBM specific legislation. DBM recommends that MedImpact be awarded this contract. On June 4th, 2024, the incumbent Contractor CVS Caremark protested DBM's contract award to MedImpact. DBM denied this protest on June 26th, 2024. An appeal was submitted to the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals (MSBCA) on July 8, 2024, which is technically late. DBM requests that the BPW approve the contract award notwithstanding appeal in order to protect substantial State interests. The substantial State include:

- DBM is statutorily obligated to award this contract via a reverse auction process. There is a statutory requirement to seek savings per Md. State Personnel and Pensions Code Ann. § 2-502.1, and to limit pharmacies from unsustainable reimbursement practices while preventing a reduction in employee benefits to comply with § 2-502.2. A delay in award would frustrate the purpose and intent of the General Assembly in passing these laws.
- Promotes a timely and orderly transition to the new contractor in order to successfully meet Open Enrollment requirements for the Plan Year beginning on January 1, 2025. Transition activities need to begin immediately to avoid increased risks that may be associated with a delay in contract award. An abbreviated implementation could impact eligibility file testing/submission and ID card distribution. DBM cannot accommodate an award later than July due to the time required to finalize operations for Open Enrollment in the fall.
- Cumulative savings on pharmacy and pharmacy benefit management costs over the sevenyear full contract period versus the incumbent contract. Compared to the current contract, the new contract is estimated to save \$1.2 million in calendar year 2025, increasing to \$12 million in calendar year 2026 and \$22 million by 2027. These figures are across all funds, with the General Fund comprising about 60 percent of the total. If the new contract is utilized for its maximum seven-year term, the estimated savings approximate \$282 million (total funds) over the course of the Contract when compared to the current contract.

• The projected savings from the PBM reverse auction procurement is a function of the financial terms achieved through the reverse auction compared to the financial terms inplace today under the current contract. The current contract financial terms have been renegotiated and improved multiple times throughout the life of the contract in order to maintain financial competitiveness. Through this process DBM has maintained a market competitive contract and realized incremental savings beyond the prior procurement process. As a result, the savings from the reverse auction is lower as those savings have been pulled forward and realized sooner.

Per COMAR 21.10.02.11.A(1), the BPW should find that execution of the contract without delay is necessary to protect substantial State interests and authorize the recommended contract notwithstanding protest.
