Office of Administrative Hearings Compensation to Erroneously Confined Individual James Langhorne

Remarks: Conviction & Release. On February 3, 1998 Mr. Langhorne was convicted in Baltimore City Circuit Court of murder. His conviction was vacated, and he was released from confinement on February 10, 2025.

Actual Innocence. On February 10, 2025, Mr. Langhorne's conviction was vacated in the Baltimore City Circuit Court pursuant to granting a *Motion to Vacate Judgment* filed by the Baltimore City State's Attorney's Office, and that office subsequently entered a *Nolle Prosequi* in the matter. Before the Office of Administrative Hearings, Mr. Langhorne and the State jointly stipulated to his actual innocence.

Compensation. In its decision, the Administrative Law Judge found that: (1) Mr. Langhorne was confined for 9,870 days, (2) the current annual income figure to use is \$ 101,652.00, and (3) under the statutory formula he is entitled to \$ 2,748,795.00 in compensation.

Recommended Expedited Payment Schedule. Under SFP § 10-501(e), the Board has discretion to set the schedule of payments, within certain boundaries; however, under §10-501(d)(1)(iv) an Administrative Law Judge may recommend expedited payment if they find it is in the best interests of the individual. In exercising its discretion to set payment schedules, the Board obtains a recommendation from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) in light of the Department's insight into what funds are available in current and future fiscal years.

In this matter, the Administrative Law Judge stated, "Although the parties agreed the benefits should be paid on an expedited basis, the parties did not offer or stipulate to any particular payment schedule, and I understood the Claimant's request to be that the Claimant's full amount of compensation should be immediately payable." The Administrative Law Judge recommended payment accordingly after determining that an expedited payment was in the interests of Mr. Langhorne. The Department of Budget & Management has reviewed the Administrative Law Judge's order, and has recommended the expedited 3-year schedule proposed above on this item as both consistent with other expedited payments to exonerees, and reserving budgeted funds to meet the anticipated requirements to pay additional exonerees over the coming fiscal year.

Attorney's Fees. Pursuant to SFP § 10-501(d)(1), the Administrative Law Judge ordered the State to pay to Flowers Keller LLP \$ 4,692.50 as reasonable attorney's fees and expenses associated with this petition.

Remarks: Public Comment to the Board: Since opposition was expressed at the April 15, 2024 MDE hearing, the Wetlands Administration solicited email comments from interested persons and posted MDE's R&R on the Board's website. Wetlands Administration received comments from six respondents in opposition to the project. Mr. Roger Kindler's comments focused on impacts to Chase Creek aesthetics, plastics pollution, and obstacles to navigation. Eric and Elizabeth Rosbog's concerns centered around the project's disruption to ecology and infringement of the riparian rights of neighbors. Charles Iliff's comments centered around the mooring field and DNR's authorization of the 47 mooring buoys. Carol Denny's concerns centered on the project harming local ecology, reducing recreation and negatively impacting aesthetics. It also mentions a living shoreline that may be negatively impacted by this project. Skip Trimble requested information from the State regarding an MDE/DNR meeting about the mooring field and had questions/concerns about inactive mooring buoys.

Wetlands Administrator's Review: The Wetlands Administrator reviewed MDE's R&R, the comments submitted and engaged MDE and DNR in numerous discussions. The below comments are in response to the six respondents.

Disturbance to the creek's aesthetics is open to interpretation, is not easily defined, and this proposal does not differ from other dock/pier proposals that the State commonly authorizes. While current science does raise concerns about plastics pollution in waterways and the ocean, the Administrator is not aware of any evidence of pollution specifically related to the plastics proposed for the floating dock's pontoons. MD DNR is the entity that approves channel navigation for the State, and DNR has confirmed that this proposal maintains navigation.

The Administrator does not believe the ecology of the creek will be harmed by the mooring field and does not agree with the statement that the "riparian rights and development rights" of all the neighboring communities will be "substantially compromised" by this proposal. Their statement that "Chase Creek would become saturated with Pines Community Improvement Association residents at the expense of the other waterfront adjoining residents" is not pertinent to issuance of this wetlands license. The Administrator does not believe recreation or a nearby living shoreline will be negatively impacted by the State issuing this wetland license.

DNR's Regulatory and Legislative Review Division stated that "so long as an individual mooring was in compliance with those requirements (COMAR 08.04.13.02), there would be no violation. We have not applied those individual requirements to cover the totality of a group mooring."

The information requested by Mr. Trimble was provided to him directly. DNR confirmed that they do not check if mooring buoys are actively used when an authorization is provided so a mooring group authorization can include buoys that are not actively used.

Wetlands Administrator's Review (cont'd):

I was satisfied with MDE's comment responses provided in the Report and Recommendation, as well as the information provided by DNR, and believe it is in the best interest of the State and its tidal wetlands to move this project forward to receive a wetlands license.

Conclusion: Based on the record herein, MDE and the Wetlands Administrator concur that the Board should grant the license. The Wetlands Administrator concurs with the following three conditions recommended by MDE that are specific and relevant to the floating dock (#1) and the mooring field (#2 and #3).

Proposed Special Conditions:

- A. The Licensee shall, prior to any boat being moored at the facility, certify to the Water and Science Administration, Tidal Wetlands Division, that dockside sewage pump out facilities to accommodate sewage from vessels using the applicant's marina are installed, operated, and maintained. The facilities shall be connected to a public sewage treatment system serving the area or to an on-site sewage disposal system sized, installed, and operated in compliance with the requirements of the Anne Arundel County Health Department.
- B. The Licensee shall ensure that all moorings have sufficient water depths (minimum of 2 feet at mean low water) to prevent vessels from grounding or resting on the bottom at mean low water.
- C. The Licensee shall ensure that navigation through the mooring field is maintained, and vessels moored within the community mooring field do not impede navigation through the waterway.

Remarks: In 1996, the Department of Housing and Community Development provided HABC with a loan in the original principal amount of \$2,340,000 to assist in the acquisition and development of a total of 36 units of affordable housing contained within 25 properties in Baltimore City known as the Midtown Apartments. Payments on PRHP loans are deferred in perpetuity if the project complies with the requirements of the loan program.

Due to increased crime, prolonged vacancy, deferred maintenance, lack of capital improvements and inadequate maintenance policies & procedures, HABC allowed many of properties to deteriorate. In 2017, HABC began to assess the condition of its housing stock. HABC concluded that the location of several properties in high crime areas coupled with obsolete physical conditions, made keeping the properties in the current state a non-viable option.

Remarks (cont'd):

HABC determined that the costs to renovate all of the units were too exorbitant considering the distressed neighborhood. In particular, HABC has identified 15 of the total 36 units in the properties as units that it believes are not economically viable for rehabilitation and continued occupancy. Remarks (cont'd):

HABC's failure to renovate and operate <u>all</u> of the properties is a default under the loan documents. In lieu of placing the loan in default, demanding repayment and, if necessary, foreclosing on all of the properties in the Project, DHCD has reached the terms of an agreement with HABC whereby, among other things, HABC will repay a total of \$975,000 (41.67% of the outstanding principal balance of the loan). In return, and subject to BPW approval, the Department of Housing and Community Development will forgive a pro rata portion of accrued and continuing interest through consummation of the terms of the agreement, and, upon receipt of the payment, the Department will release its liens on fifteen units.

HABC will continue to be bound by the terms of the loan documents and restrictive covenants on the remaining properties.

The loan is non-recourse, meaning that the Department's recourse for recovery of the outstanding balance of the debt is the foreclosure and sale of the properties. The Department does not believe this course of action will have a materially beneficial result on the amount of funds received by the Department, and could negatively impact the tenants in the remaining properties as foreclosure would terminate the affordability restrictions on the properties.

In addition, the payment to be made by HABC is in excess of the likely recovery that the Department could expect if it were to foreclose on the properties. The aggregate tax assessed values for the properties proposed for release as loan collateral, many of which are not in condition fit for human habitation and need significant rehabilitation, is \$146,000.

This proposal will also result in the elimination of blight caused by the vacant units. In the wake of the devastation of the death of three firefighters killed in a fire of a vacant unit in late 2022, it is imperative that the elimination of vacant units be addressed.

In summary, the forgiveness of interest, and repayment of principal and disposition of DHCD's lien on the Properties, will not have a material fiscal impact on the Department and will benefit the Department, HABC and the tenants in the occupied units in properties.

Board of Public Works approval is required prior to forgiving the accrued interest on the PRHP loan to facilitate the repayment of principal and subsequent disposition of the collateral properties. The Department's agreement to forgive the interest and allow for repayment the PRHP loan, resulting in the release of the Department's liens on the collateral properties, is further subject to HABC's compliance with the terms of its agreement with the Department.

HABC concluded that the location of several properties in high crime areas, coupled with obsolete physical conditions, made keeping the properties in the current state a non-viable option. As of March 2023, all of the properties are vacant.

In return, and subject to Board of Public Works approval, the Department will forgive all accrued and continuing interest through consummation of the terms of the agreement. Upon repayment, the Department's lien on the 20 properties will be released.

The payment to be made by HABC is in excess of the likely recovery that the Department could expect if it were to foreclose on the properties. The aggregate tax assessed values for the properties, many of which are not in condition fit for human habitation and need significant rehabilitation, is \$224,600.

In addition, in the wake of the devastation of the death of three firefighters killed in a fire of a vacant unit in late 2022, it is imperative that the elimination of vacant units be addressed.

In summary, the forgiveness of interest, and repayment of principal and disposition of the Department's lien on the Properties, will not have a material fiscal impact on the Department and will benefit the Department and HABC.

Work will entail various repairs of the wet well & dry well, replacement of old pumps, pipes, steel supports, controls, generators, and other associated appurtenances. New pump units with variable frequency drives (VFDs) control will improve energy efficiency and reduce operational costs. Elimination of existing comminutors will provide additional energy saving. The stations are within the 100-year floodplain and require structural updates for floodproofing to ensure proper protection. Completion of this work will ensure the continued operation and reliability of the sewage system in the Town of Federalsburg, while protecting water quality and public safety. This project will be constructed in accordance with coastal and non-coastal resiliency guidelines developed as part of the Coast Smart Program to reduce risks to such projects.

The project will include a high-temperature thermal hydrolysis solids treatment process to precondition sludge prior to anaerobic digestion, anaerobic digestion facilities, and facilities to provide dewatered Class A Biosolids. In addition, a combined heat and power facility will be constructed to capture the biogas from the digesters to be used for the production of steam and electrical power for the plant. Odor control, process water treatment, generators, and boilers are also included in the project. The anticipated project outcomes are: production of Class A Biosolids for beneficial uses, recovery of renewable energy from biomass and reduction in energy, chemical and sludge disposal costs. The project will help the state achieve its renewable energy goals.

A written agreement between the Maryland Energy Administration and MDE provides funding from the Strategic Energy Investment Fund for this project.

The existing Science Complex is comprised of four buildings: Carnegie, Calloway, Spencer, and Key Halls. The oldest of these buildings (Carnegie Hall) was constructed in 1919 and the newest (Key Hall) in 1964. Spencer Hall was renovated in 1989, and the three other buildings were last renovated in 1992. The renovations were poorly done and created substandard spaces that do not meet modern-day building codes. The mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems in the buildings are obsolete and need to be replaced. There is insufficient space in the Science Complex to appropriately serve the Biology and Chemistry departments due to growth in the science disciplines. In addition, the configuration of the building does not lend itself to the type of instructional and research spaces required to support the University's science programs.

The design is approximately 50% complete. The University expects the MBE participation to remain the same at 40%, as per the contract, through the end of the project. MBE payments made to date equate to 25.61% of total payments made to date to the prime architect. MBE compliance is low as the MBE consultants are performing lightly during this period.

The Morgan State University Office of Design & Construction Management will continue to manage the AE team's work with procurement support from the University's Procurement Office.

Updated Policies: The proposed revisions update certain sections of the current policy to be consistent with State and Federal regulations. These include several standard contract clauses to be incorporated within certain College solicitations and/or contracts. The following is a summary of other substantive changes:

- 1. Section 1.1.5 and 5.4. The College policies are revised to reflect the exemption from Board of Public Works approval for non-general obligation bond funded contract modifications. Any contract for capital improvements or services with a value that exceeds \$1,000,000 (or the current legislated dollar threshold) shall be submitted to the Board of Public Works for review and approval. Under the Code of Maryland section applying to procurements by the College, Board of Public Works approval is not required for contract modifications, approval is required only for initial award of capital improvement contracts and service contracts with a value exceeding \$1,000,000.
- 2. Section 1.3.2. The College polices are revised to add exclusions to procurement rules consistent with similar higher education institutions that include exemptions for Utilities charges, and contracts for Revenue generating operations, Accreditation Fees and Legal Fees.
- 3. Section 2.1 and Appendix A1.2. The College policies are revised to raise the dollar threshold for "Full and Open" competition under the College policy from \$50,000 to \$100,000, which is conservatively less than other public higher education institutions. Increasing the dollar threshold for formal advertising will streamline the procurement process.
- 4. Sections 2.1, 2.2, 2.3 and Appendix A1.2. The College policies are revised to update the advertisement and competition thresholds. Competition is currently required for procurements of between \$5,000 and \$50,000, without full advertising being required. The College will change the current non-advertise public procurement competition threshold from between \$5,000 and \$50,000 to between \$25,000 and \$100,000, these procurement transactions will still require full open competition of at least 3 bid quotes. The preferred but not required lower competition threshold is changed from \$5,000 to \$10,000, this change will require at least two quotes between \$10,000 and \$25,000. These changes are conservative compared to the higher thresholds by other similar higher education institutions described above.

Updated Policies (cont'd):

- 5. Section 4.4. The College policies are revised to increase the dollar threshold for the requirement that all vendors under a multiple award contract be given a fair opportunity to be considered from \$5,000 to \$10,000. This change is consistent with other requirements of the procurement policy regarding competition for procurements under \$10,000.
- 6. Section 5.3. The College polies are revised to increase the dollar threshold for the requirement that a contract have two College signatures from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Raising the contract limit to \$100,000 would expedite the procurement process.
- 7. Section 2.4.1. The College policies are revised to increase the Justification for Other than Full Competition (Sole Source) Procurement Officer signature approval from \$50,000 to \$100,000, consistent with Simplified threshold and the requirement for two signatures on contracts.
- 8. Section 3.3.4. The College policies are also revised for minor language clarifications, which include the following; Bid Evaluation and Award add language to include, "best value" to other than lowest price awards (Section 3.2.10); and Receipt of Proposals add clarity to allow for, "eMaryland Marketplace, eMMA bid submissions".

Remarks: St. Mary's College of Maryland submitted its revisions to the procurement policy for review and approval by the St. Mary's College of Maryland Board of Trustees on May 9, 2025. Additionally, St. Mary's College of Maryland submitted its revisions to the Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive, and Legislative Review (AELR) for consideration on Thursday May 29, 2025.

There is limited compliance to date because construction is in an early phase, and pre-construction had few MBE subconsultants.

Sustainability: In accordance with the Maryland High Performance Building Standards, the new home for the School of Social work prioritizes sustainability with features including

- (a) high-performance building envelope that lowers heating loads by 12% and cooling loads by 4%,
- (b) photovoltaic arrays that will produce 15% of the energy the building uses,
- (c) a green roof garden with extensive plantings and tree cover,
- (d) intensive stormwater management features that minimize rainwater discharge from the site,
- (e) bike lockers with showers for commuters, and
- (f) geo-thermal exchange wells underneath the building that are part of a highly efficient thermal control system that will make it the first operational net-zero emissions building in the USM and downtown Baltimore.

Collectively, all of these actions will reduce the building's annual energy usage by 65%. Thoughtful selection of materials will facilitate a healthy indoor environment and maximize recycled content. To the greatest extent possible, materials shall be sourced responsibly from vendors that maintain transparency and meet testing requirements and standards referenced in the LEED rating system. Waste will be minimized both during construction and throughout operation using a variety of waste reduction and diversion strategies. And notably, the project is also on track to achieve LEED Platinum, the highest level from the U.S. Green Building Council.

Two bids were received on September 25, 2024. One bid was rejected because the bidder failed to submit the required accurate DBE Participation forms as set forth in the solicitation. was determined to be non-responsive because it did not conform to the requirements of the solicitation and rejected pursuant to COMAR 21.06.02.03B(2). No protest was filed.

MAA reached out to non-bidding vendors to ascertain why they did not bid. MAA received two no-bid responses, and both responses received stated that other commitments precluded their participation.

MAA conducted a price analysis against the engineer's estimate for this project which was based on historical pricing of similar new or replacement boarding bridge projects within the past two years. The pricing was 11.6% less than the estimate and the variance was attributed to manufacturing cost fluctuations and work plan efficiencies that allowed for lower costs for some of the project work activities, MAA confirmed TK Airport Solutions Offer price and determined it to be fair and reasonable.

The work under this contract is comprised of the following items: removal and disposal of existing passenger boarding bridges, Supply and installation of new passenger boarding bridges, connecting new passenger boarding bridges to the existing power supply, removal of existing PC Air/400 Hz equipment from existing passenger boarding bridges and reinstallation on new passenger boarding bridges.

The solicitation includes a base bid and three alternates. Alternate No. 1 is the bid price to replace Passenger Boarding Bridge (PBB) at terminal gate B7, Alternate No. 2 is the bid price to replace the PBB at terminal gate B9, and Alternate No. 3 is the bid price to replace the PBB at terminal gate E4. Requesting Agency Remarks: The MAA seeks to purchase two 2027 PL Custom M2 Freightliner Plus Titan Type 1 Medium Duty Ambulances through an ICPA that will replace vehicles that are 10 and 12 years old. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Advisory AC 150/5220-10E provides guidance on the determination for replacement of the fire department vehicles. As stated in 1.4 of the advisory, the vehicles have a service life of 10-12 years. Given that the lead time on vehicles is up to three years, both vehicles will be well beyond life expectancy at the point of replacement. The replacement of these front-line vehicles is essential to the safe and reliable transportation of individuals to area hospitals by BWI Fire Rescue Department (FRD).

MAA conducted market research comparing similar vehicle purchases within the past three years of other Government entities to confirm the cost benefit to the State. Twelve similar units were purchased with slightly different options by Montgomery County Maryland Fire and Rescue Services. The pricing total for all 12 units was \$6,002,496 (\$500,208 each) on August 27, 2024. Low unit pricing is attributed to the ICPA bulk purchasing discounts and the time at which the order was placed.

MAA then compared a similar purchase of one 2024 unit for the Village of North Palm Beach of Florida for a cost of \$619,728.75. The ambulance was equipped in accordance with Village specifications pursuant to pricing established in an existing Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Contract (RFP #110921 - Ambulances and Emergency Medical Services Vehicles). The original procurement of this was completed in 2022.

MAA also compared the project estimate pricing from January 24, 2024, and updated pricing from October 3, 2024, for the PL Custom M2 Freightliner Plus Titan Type 1 Medium Duty Ambulances procurement.

Based on the comparison of pricing, use of the ICPA will provide a minimum cost benefit to the State estimated between 1.5% and 5%.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The solicitation was advertised on March 17, 2025, via eMaryland Marketplace Advantage (eMMA), notifying 250 potential contractors registered under the power supply unit's commodity code, the Maryland Aviation Administration (MAA)'s website, and by way of direct notification to five firms. One bid was received on April 30, 2025.

Interest was high at the beginning with five vendors reporting that they would bid on this solicitation. The Procurement Officer sent out a confirmation email to all bidders on April 11, 2025, and five vendors confirmed that they would be bidding on this solicitation. There was no indication that the bid needed to be extended due to the amount of confirmed interest.

Subsequently, based on the feedback received on the No Bid Form, four of the five vendors declined to submit a bid response for the following reasons: two firms stated the bond requirement was too expensive; another firm stated they would have to subcontract the scope of work for the Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM), thus, increasing costs to which they would be non-competitive; and one firm stated they do not have the necessary equipment, labor and capital required. MAA will evaluate and consider reducing the bond requirements in the future depending on the risk to the traveling public as it relates to the critical nature of the project.

On April 30, 2025, one bid was received from the incumbent contractor, On Computer Services, LLC dba/Unified Power (Unified Power). Unified Power submitted a responsive bid and is a responsible bidder. Unified Power's bid is considered fair and reasonable based on the proposed hourly rate for each UPS unit. The proposed hourly rates are less than the current hourly rates by \$49 per month, per unit compared to the current contract. This represents \$600.00 cost savings per UPS unit, which is fiscally advantageous to the State.

The MAA Procurement Review Group reviewed the contract scope of work to determine the potential for establishing Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) and Veteran-Owned Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) participation goals, as well as a Small Business Reserve (SBR) designation. The contract has no subcontractable opportunities, and its scope is considered a single element of work. An eMMA search of small businesses yielded an insufficient number of available certified small businesses with the required manufacturer certification.

Requesting Agency Remarks: This renewal provides for the addition of the salt brining operation to pretreat the public roadways, parking lots, and terminal sidewalks on the upper-level roadway to mitigate icy conditions. This modification is for the safety of the traveling public and may limit any potential accidents. The addition of the salt brining operation will provide BWI Thurgood Marshall with a significant cost savings and the operation is more environmentally friendly when compared to the existing practice of salting of the roadway system.

The brining operation allows Maryland Aviation Administration (MAA) to delay the call out for the contractor for approximately two hours, and one circuit of salt (\$6,000). Depending on the weather forecast this provides MAA with a new savings ranging from \$12,000 to \$60,000 per winter storm. In addition to the financial and environmental benefits, the salt brining operation is a best practice used by the surrounding counties and the State Highway Administration.

This renewal also provides for the addition of snow removal services for the Southwest Airlines Maintenance Hanger Road. The hanger complex is new to BWI Thurgood Marshall. Per MAA's contract with Southwest Airlines, the MAA is responsible for the snow and ice removal of the roadway surfaces leading to and from the aircraft maintenance hangar. Therefore, the MAA must clear this surface during any snow event. Various cold weather conditions such as ice, sleet, and freezing rain may also require use of this contract. Contractors are paid when they perform work. Established rates per hour include the cost for the driver, equipment, and fuel for call out events.

Eastern Excavating & Grading, Inc, has satisfactorily provided all labor, supervision, equipment, materials, insurance, and expertise to perform the landside snow removal from the landside public areas at BWI Thurgood Marshall Airport.

The contract allows a Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase for the renewal period. When the original contract was approved in 2019, a 2.0% CPI was estimated for the option period; the actual CPI for the renewal is 3.5%. In an effort to determine if the renewal price is fair and reasonable, the Procurement Officer researched recently bid projects for snow removal services and found that MAA's renewal line-item price for the dump truck and backhoe snow equipment with labor is 25% less than Philadelphia's Airport price for the same line item under its recently awarded Snow Clearance contract. Therefore, the renewal price is considered fair and reasonable.

The MAA Procurement Review Group reviewed the contract scope of work to determine the potential for establishing Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) and Veteran Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) goals, as well as a Small Business Reserve (SBR) designation. The project was designated Small Business Preference. An MBE participation goal of 27% was established for this contract. Eastern is at an 24% attainment and is anticipated to achieve the 27% goal during the renewal period. No VSBE goal was established.

Requesting Agency Remarks: The MAA is requesting an increase in contract authority, in the amount of \$2,000,000 to cover the current and anticipated spend during the remaining contract duration. Unforeseen circumstances and critical staffing shortages necessitated accelerated contract spending. These circumstances include the cost of the unanticipated cancellation of the original Request for Proposal conducted by MAA to select a concessions program developer in 2022, and then the re-solicitation for a concessions program developer conducted by Maryland Department of Transportation for MAA. This cancellation and re-solicitation resulted in higherthan-anticipated contract task costs. The concession contract associated with the re-solicitation task was approved by the Board of Public Works on February 12, 2025. Adjustments to the implementation timeline required expedited efforts, additional resources and increased contract spending to ensure timely implementation. In addition to ongoing staffing vacancies within MAA, this necessitated additional consultant support to perform essential commercial business functions. These functions included airport commercial facility planning, commercial activity demand forecasting, preparation of solicitation documents, property appraisals, facility condition assessments and feasibility studies for future airport development. The Service Station Partial Termination for Site 1 created a significant disruption. The unexpected termination required immediate action to analyze the impact of this decision, evaluate alternative solutions for providing the needed services at Site 1, and for the contractor to potentially assist with the development and execution of a new solicitation. Increased commercial activities as a result of building reversions and many long-term contracts expiring requiring negotiations have also placed additional demands on MAA staff, which has increased the need for additional support in market analysis, tenant identification, space planning and lease management. The volume of projects and limited staffing necessitate increased reliance on consultants' expertise, increasing contract spend beyond the initial projections.

The additional funding is critical to provide the necessary support to mitigate the impacts of these unforeseen challenges and ensure the successful implementation of MAA's commercial development plans.

MAA is in the process of procuring a new contract for Commercial Facilities and Business Planning at BWI Thurgood Marshall and MTN Airports, which is expected to advertise in the winter of 2025. This will allow for sufficient time to solicit and present the new contract to the BPW for award within the remaining contract period.

Per BPW Advisory 2001-1, the MAA Procurement Review Group reviewed the contract scope of work to determine the potential for establishing Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) and Veteran-Owned Small Business Enterprise (VSBE) participation goals, as well as a Small Business Reserve (SBR) designation. A 27% MBE goal was established for this contract. Landrum and Brown, Inc. is currently achieving 22.42% compliance and anticipates meeting the 27% goal by prioritizing use of the MBE consultants on upcoming projects.

MDTA is requesting approval of this essential modification to ensure the continuation of services for existing assigned tasks, including design and preliminary engineering services for the construction of capital projects, as well as inspection, evaluation, and engineering studies for strategic efforts to maintain MDTA's assets. Additionally, the funding is needed for other critical ongoing tasks. Governor Moore signed an Executive Order on November 17, 2023, that authorizes Project Labor Agreements (PLA) for construction projects. The decision to require the use of a PLA is made on a project-by-project basis after a feasibility study is performed. At the time that this contract was developed, the number of projects MDTA considered for a project labor agreement was small, determined on a case-by-case basis, and outside of the standard project development process. The Executive Order requires that a larger pool of projects consider use of a PLA, becoming a standard consideration in the development of construction projects. Studies performed to consider the use of and demonstrate the benefit of a PLA were not contemplated at the time of contract award and resulted in an increase in contract spend. New regulatory changes in environmental permitting, including resiliency reviews, have necessitated more extensive designs, reviews, and coordination for both new and existing construction projects. There have also been increased wage rates for architectural and engineering design services. Furthermore, there is a heightened focus on project communication for public outreach across various media platforms, leading to increased project development costs. MDTA has determined that the funding for the existing contract will be depleted before the new contract is procured, with an anticipated award date of 2026.

Per BPW Advisory 2001-1, the MDTA Procurement Review Group reviewed the contract scope of work to determine the potential for establishing MBE and VSBE participation goals. A 24% MBE goal was established for the contract. Stantec Consulting Services, Inc./Mead & Hunt, Inc./

Hardesty Hanover, LLC is on target to reach the MBE goal although current compliance is 14.74%. This Contract is currently at 25.4% committed for MBE subconsultants use by the Joint Venture. These contracts enable the MTA to purchase from 10 wheelchair accessible minivan vehicle types, to be supplied throughout the five-year contract for Non-Profit Human Services, LOTS, and a maximum of 163 vehicles can be ordered under the contract. Requesting Agency Remarks: The State of Maryland does not have a certified maintenance facility; therefore, the Maryland Natural Resources Police (NRP) Aviation Unit conducted a national search for its maintenance, repair and overhaul needs. When doing so, NRP used a 100 nautical mile (air miles) radius of the hangar facility in Easton, Maryland, and was able to locate a single Certified Repair Station, Sterling Helicopter, with both Airbus and Safran engine manufacturer certifications to perform services.

When opening the search radius to 400 miles, a second certified Repair Station was identified in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. A third certified Repair Station was identified in Lexington, Kentucky; approximately 405 nautical miles from the hangar facility location.

Based on a breakdown of time, distance, fuel utilization, and driving time for the three Certified Repair Stations mentioned above, Sterling Helicopter is the most efficient and cost-effective location which is most advantageous to the State. Additional benefits to making the sole source award to Sterling Helicopter is the three-hour time frame for which the firm can respond to the Eastern Shore hangar facility to provide customer service should the helicopter not be in appropriate flying conditions. Further, the usual aerial commute to and from a maintenance facility should not exceed 1.5 hours to minimize fuel and labor costs.

Agency Remarks (cont'd):

The cost of these services aligns with previous maintenance contracts held between NRP and Sterling Helicopter over the last nine years. While conducting a fair market analysis, NRP found that Sterling Helicopter holds a contract with Maryland State Police. In the year 2024, the contract value for Maryland State Police was \$1,900,000.00 for helicopter maintenance. MCAC conducted research into the open-source tools and found that no other tool scored as highly, was endorsed by as broad a group of stakeholders, and had as comprehensive coverage.
