The Board was also advised by Mr. Millstone that all items submitted and recommended on his Agenda for purchase through the Central Purchasing Bureau have been screened and conform with the equipment for which the above Bond issue funds were provided.

The Board was further advised of the provision of Section 8 of Chapter 743 of the Acts of 1965 (General Construction Loan of 1965) reading as follows:

And Be It Further Enacted, That if any Federal Grant is or becomes available to any of the State Colleges, the University of Maryland, Morgan State College or St. Mary's College of Maryland for Capital Improvements, which grant is to pay a portion of the cost of such improvements as set out in this Act for any of these Institutions, then the State appropriation herein provided for any such Capital Improvements in each instance shall be reduced by an amount equal to the amount of the Federal Grant.

"And Be It Further Enacted That where Federal Funds may be available to help accomplish any specific projects in this Act, the suing department or agency shall be obligated to seek the allocation of such Federal Funds to apply to the cost of the particular project. In seeking approval of the Board of Public Works for award of a contract under a specific appropriation under this Act, the suing department or agency shall formally advise the Board of Public Works that efforts have been made through proper administrative procedures to obtain such Federal funds and the reason, if any, why the Federal funds were not obtained. Availability of Federal Funds where allocated is intended to defray the cost of the approved project, not expand its scope, except in the case of projects of the Department of Forests and Parks, Department of Natural Resources. These later projects may be expanded in scope beyond that proposed in the specific appropriation in this Act if the addition of Federal Funds makes this possible, but not beyond the total park acreage or as evident from the master plan for State Parks and Recreation areas as adopted by the Department of Forests and Parks, Department of Natural Resources."

RULES GOVERNING THE OPERATION OF

THE STATE'S HEALTH HAZARD ABATEMENT GRANT PROGRAM

PROPOSAL TO THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

December 6, 1978

A. Federal Grants

- 1. All projects requesting assistance under this program will be systematically screened by the Environmental Health Administration to determine if Federal funds may be available from:
 - U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)
 - U. S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA)
 - U. S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration (EDA)
 - U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
 Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC)
- 2. a. If a timely and sufficient Federal grant from any of the sources listed in Rule #1 above appears to be available, applicants will be directed to investigate further those sources of funding. State technical assistance will be provided, if necessary. The thoroughness of the "investigation" required will be determined by the Environmental Health Administration in consultation with the Department of State Planning (DSP). When appropriate, the Environmental Health Administration will include the project on the EPA Priority List.
 - b. A "timely and sufficient Federal grant" is one which would allow:
 - (a) Construction to proceed within two years and (b) allow the "local share" to be amortized by fair and reasonable charges to the properties served, and (c) be consistent with a complete facilities plan.

A loan from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration does not constitute a "grant" for the purposes of these Rules.

B. State Grants

- 3. In order for projects to be recommended for a State Health Hazard Abatement Grant without Federal funding, it must be determined that:
 - a. They cannot be Federally funded in accordance with Rules 1 and 2.
 - b. They are included on a list of projects to be developed by the Environmental Health Administration. This list shall be based upon projects identified by each Local Health Officer, and included in the "annual inventory" which is part of the county water and sewer plan, which contains specific locations where failing or inadequate individual sewerage systems occur, and proposed solutions. Within each county, the Local Health Officer shall rank projects consistent with criteria provided by the Environmental Health Administration.
- When requesting Board of Public Works' approval of a Health Hazard Abatement Crant, without Federal funding, the Environmental Health Administration will provide in writing the basis for its determination that timely and sufficient Federal funds are not available, or that the project is ineligible for Federal funds.

C. Prior Approval

5. After the effective date of these rules, initation of construction (EPA Step III equivalent) prior to grant approval by the Board of Public Works will disqualify the project for a grant.

D. Eligible Costs

6. Eligible costs shall be as defined in the Environmental Health Administration's "Guidelines for Sewerage Construction Grants" in effect at the time of award, and as further defined in this Rule.

- work force and shall be eligible for Health Hazard Abatement Grant participation subject to prior approval by the Environmental Health Administration. Prior to approval of force account work, the Environmental Health Administration shall document, based on evidence provided by the grantee (1) that such work is directly related to the project, (2) that the grantee has adequate and competent staff to do the work, and (3) that accomplishing the work by force account is cost effective. The Environmental Health Administration shall have the responsibility and authority to approve force account work. Force account, in this case, is considered to be in lieu of contractural or consultant services for the work to be performed.
- the lateral sewer and the building lot property line. House connections are considered an eligible cost of the Health Hazard Abatement Grant project, provided that the Environmental Health Administration determines that owners of properties existing at the time construction is initiated are not charged by the grantee for their specific connections, or if they are, such charges are appropriately reduced as the result of the grant.

 Above house connections shall be funded only within a public right-of-way.
- c. The eligible cost for determining the Health Hazard Abatement Grant shall be the cost (including facilities planning, design and construction) of the minimum size of the most cost-effective project to serve only the health problem area as determined by the Environmental Health Administration. Cost-effectiveness determination shall be based on documented evidence that feasible alternative solutions have been considered and evaluated in accord with the EPA definition of cost effectiveness.

E. Consultant Services

- 7. a. Consultant services for Health Hazard Abatement projects shall be selected in accordance with appropriate U. S. Environmental Protection Agency regulations except that the full requirements shall apply regardless of the population of the grantee's jurisdiction.
- b. Grantees which have selected a consultant prior to the effective date of this policy are exempted from Rule 7a. However, the consultant contract must relate to the specific project for which funding is requested.
- c. The Environmental Health Administration may waive Rule 7a. for grantees which can demonstrate that they do not have adequate, competent, full-time professional staff to follow the full procurement procedures.
- d. The Environmental Health Administration shall review and approve the proposed cost of all consultant contracts, including those granted a waiver under Rules 7b. and 7c. before submitting a request for grant funding to the Board of Public Works.

F. Construction Contracts

8. Construction contract services for Health Hazard Abatement projects shall be selected in accordance with appropriate U. S. Environmental Protection Agency Regulations.

G. Deficit Adjustments

- 9. The amount of the Health Hazard Abatement Grant shall not be greater than the "deficit" in THE ELIGIBLE PROJECT COSTS which shall be determined as follows:
 - a. TOTAL ELIGIBLE PROJECT COSTS are determined as in Rule 6.
 - "fair and reasonable" charges to the service area occupants based on ability to pay, property values, statewide averages, etc. (Presently around \$2.00/front foot); however, revenues accrued or potentially accruable from vacant lots abutting the sewer line by "fair and reasonable" charges (commensurate with zoning, etc.) will be used to calculate the amount of the deficit.
 - c. Subtract the amount that can be amortized by "fair and reasonable" area charges from the TOTAL ELIGIBLE PROJECT COST.
 - d. The State Grant shall not exceed $87\frac{2}{25}$ of the eligible costs as defined in Rule 6.

Discussion

The Department of State Planning feels that the "fair and reasonable charges" which can be collected should be subtracted from the project's total <u>eligible</u> costs to determine the grant amount. If there are project costs that are not eligible for a State Grant-in-Aid, the local government should be responsible for funding those in whatever way it wishes. Calculating the grant based on all costs, whether eligible or not, is the same as granting funds for ineligible costs. The DSP method will result in allowing available funds to be of assistance to a greater number of projects throughout the State.

Discussion

It is the Environmental Health Administration's position that total project costs and revenues must be considered when computing the project deficit and State grant amounts. If, in fact, revenues are based on "fair and reasonable" charges to the users and the total local share of project costs are borne by these same users (as is customary), the addition of ineligible costs to the local share will result in "unfair and unreasonable" charges. While it might appear that using total cost results in a State grant for ineligible work, using an upper limit of 87% of eligible costs ensures that local funds support all ineligible and at least 12% of the eligible costs.

H. Administration

- Health Administration in the application of these rules. - 11. All grants approved under this program shall be subject to the following condition:

If an audit by the State indicates that the sum of the State grant and project-related charges exceed the cost of the project, such excess will be reimbursed to the State for disposition in accordance with the applicable bond authorization act."

- 12. All projects must comply with all applicable State and Federal laws.
- 13. Any of the above rules may be waived by the Board of Public Works for a specific project based on a recommendation by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene that a public health hazard requiring immediate correction exists in the project area or the Board determines extraordinary circumstances dictate that such waiver would be in the best interest of the State.
- 14. These Rules supersede the Directive of the Board of Public Works dated May 5, 1978.

26. JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY BYOLOGY LABORATORY LOAN OF 1977:

Submission of a report by the City of Baltimere in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 729 of the laws of Maryland of 1977 which authorized the creation of a State debt in the amount of \$1,500,000, to be known as the Johns Hopkins University Biology Laboratory Loan of 1977. The proceeds of this loan are to be used for the planning, design, construction, and equipping of a biology laboratory and teaching facility at the Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland, subject to the requirement that the Johns Hopkins University provide a certain sum for the same purpose by a certain date.

The payment of any funds under the provisions of this Act shall be contingent upon the provision by the Johns Hopkins University of funds, supplementary to this appropriation, in the amount of \$4,100,000. The Johns Hopkins University shall have until June 1, 1979 to present evidence satisfactory to the Board of Public Works that it has raised these funds.

The 1977 Act of the General Assembly authorized this assistance to Johns Hopkins to be effective July 1, 1978 rather than authorizing its effectiveness in the year of its enactment as is customary.

The University was agreeable to this timing and has been proceeding with the construction of the building utilizing University funds first and relying on the State funds for the final phase. The University has reported that Biology Building is 95% completed with occupancy expected early in 1979. University expenditures to date toward this construction have totaled \$3,867,857. In addition to these University funds, they have received to date \$1,253,478 from the Seeley G. Mudd Fund, Los Angeles, California. There remains to be paid on the commitment of the Mudd Fund a balance of \$246,522. This will make the total contribution of the Mudd Fund at \$1,500,000.

27. MARYLAND ENVIRONMENTAL TRUST:

Location of Site: The property is located in Harford County, immediately northeast of Aberdeen city line. The property can be located on Tax Map #52, as Parcel #256, and also on Harford County Soil Survey map #38. The house is known as "Swansbury".

Land Use and Description: The Grantors own 98.85 acres, of which 83.85 acres are covered by the easement. The easement site's southeastern edge abuts the B & O Railroad line; between this track and Route 40 to the southeast the grantors own 14.89 acres. The Amtrack mainline lies to the southeast of Route 40. Structures include "Swansbury", built around 1800, a single-family residence built in 1965; a wash house, barracks, and smokehouse of historical interest; accessory structures for livestock. The historic structures may soon be nominated for the National Register of Historic Places.

Approximately 40 acres are under cultivation; mature mixed hardwood species occupy 40 acres along the western side of the property.

Regional Land Use and Description: The 40-acre woodland separates the site from a subdivision with lots ranging from one-half acre to five acres but averaging one or two acres.

On the northern and eastern sides the site is bordered by Silver Farms, Inc., 343.57 acres of crop and woodlands. Further to the east, on Robin Hood Road and along Swansbury Creek, are scattered residences and one trailer park. Swansbury Creek is a very attractive natural area.

There is no significant development in the immediate area; most development seems to be occurring near Havre de Grace on the western side of Aberdeen.

Farm Operations: C. B. Osborn, Jr. farms the 40 acres, owns considerable acreage in the county, and works 3,000 acres in Harford and Cecil Counties. This land has grown field corn, wheat, sweet peas, and soybeans, but in recent years, the only crop has been field corn. The long-term average yield has been 85-100 bushels per acre; the best yield is around 115 bushels/acre.

The bulk of the easement site is zoned R2 (Urban Residential) which permits a minimum lot size of 10,000 square feet per unit. This classification permits single-family dwellings and all uses permitted in R-1 districts. There are accessory and conditional uses also.

A 400-foot wide sector along the B & O Railroad Track is zoned M-2 (General Industrial). The list of permitted uses is very inclusive but requires a buffer of 300 feet from any R. district. Consequently, three hundred of the four hundred feet of this sector would have to be devoted to non-industrial use.

If the entire easement site were developed to the maximum density of four units per acre, approximately 335 single-family residences could be erected.

Local Real Estate Assessment: Except for 1.5 acres devoted to the house sites, the land under easement is assessed as farmland. The easement will not reduce the real estate tax assessment.

Reservation of Rights: To erect one aditional single-family dwelling.

<u>Legal Form and Sufficiency:</u> The Assistant Attorney General assigned to the Department of Natural Resources approved this easement for legal form and sufficiency.

28. STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM:

Consistent with Section 5-301, sub-paragraph (f) (2) of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the Interagency Committee for Public School Construction recommends to the Board of Public Works the adoption of the following amendment to the "Rules, Regulations, and Procedures for the Administration of the School Construction Program" as revised and adopted on September 7, 1977.

Under Section 5, <u>ELIGIBLE EXPENDITURES</u>, paragraph e), add the following new sub-paragraph:

- "e-5) If a project which combines the renovation of and addition(s) to an existing school is justified by:
 - e-5-a) student enrollment which will exceed the rated capacity of the existing school for a period of at least the next five years and/or by,
 - e-5-b) a substantial change in the type of general use (elementary, middle, junior, senior, special education, vocational) proposed for the school,

then a maximum cost greater than that provided for by Section 5, e-2), may be allowed by the Committee. Otherwise, modernizations including additions shall be governed by Section 5, e-2), unless waived by the Board of Public Works based on a recommendation by the Interagency Committee that Section 5, e-2) will result in a substantial educational deficiency in the school program."

Each local education agency and local government was informed of this intention to amend the Rules. Notification was in writing dated August 25, 1978. As of October 22, 1978, nine school superintendents took objection to the adoption of the above-referenced amendment. The Executive Director of the Maryland Association of Counties also commented adversely.

Dear Mr. Middleton:

The Board of Public Works has been requested to adopt an amendment to the "Rules, Regulations and Procedures for the Administration of the School Construction Program."

The existing regulations (Section 5-C) provide for 100 percent funding of "Construction Contracts for independent and exclusive additions to existing school buildings" while Section 5-E(2) provides a 60 percent funding limit for remodeling an existing building. The amendment would change Section 5 to include additions to existing schools under the 60 percent rule now in effect for renovations of existing schools.

We must oppose this amendment. Once again, additional costs are being forced upon the local governing bodies under the auspices of a program which was designed to lift this burden from local government. Furthermore, while the costs are being forced upon us, we are not provided with any degree of additional control over the program.

We must oppose this amendment, not only from the financial aspect, but from a philosophical standpoint as well. Someone must decide if the State of Maryland wants to have a school construction program. The continued erosion of the program brought about by the Interagency Committee amendments causes one to wonder where the program is headed.

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS BY DAVID B. STURTEVANT, ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE MARYLAND ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES, DECEMBER 6, 1978.

SUBJECT: Proposed Addition to Section 5(e) of the School Construction Rules and Regulations.

GOVERNOR LEE, COMPTROLLER GOLDSTEIN, TREASURER JAMES.....

I AM DAVID B. STURTEVANT, ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE

MARYLAND ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES. I AM HERE TODAY TO REPRESENT

THE 23 COUNTIES AND BALTIMORE CITY. WE THANK YOU FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO PRESENT OUR VIEWS ON THE PROPOSED REVISION OF THE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION REGULATIONS.

AT THE OUTSET, LET ME MAKE IT CLEAR THAT THE ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES IS UNALTERABLY OPPOSED TO THE AMENDMENT OFFERED BY THE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION AND WILL OFFER INSTEAD A SUBSTITUTE AMENDMENT, WE KNOW WILL CLARIFY THE PROBLEM AT HAND AND CLEAR UP WHAT WE WILL SHOW IS A MISINTERPRETATION OF THE CURRENT RULES AND REGULATIONS.

IN ORDER TO DO THIS, A LITTLE BACKGROUND INFORMATION IS NECESSARY.

ON JANUARY 14, 1976, GOVERNOR MANDEL CREATED "THE COMMISSION TO STUDY THE REVISION OF THE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM." THE COMMISSION WAS CAPABLY CHAIRED BY TREASURER JAMES, WORKED THROUGH 1976 AND ISSUED ITS FINAL REPORT ON JANUARY 15, 1977. ON JULY 8, 1977 AND SEPTEMBER 7, 1977, THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS MET, HEARD TESTIMONY, REVIEWED AND AMENDED THE NEW RULES AND REGULATIONS SUBMITTED BY THE COMMISSION, AND ADOPTED AN AMENDED VERSION OF THE RULES AND REGULATIONS IN SEPTEMBER OF 1977.

SHORTLY AFTER THE NEW RULES AND REGULATIONS WERE ADOPTED, THE LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCIES BEGAN SUBMITTING THEIR REQUESTS FOR funding of school construction projects to the IAC for funding IN THE 1978-79 FISCAL YEAR. IT WAS THEN THAT THE PROBLEM BECAME APPARENT. THE IAC RULED THAT IN PROJECTS WHICH INCLUDED REQUESTS FOR FUNDING FOR RENOVATION OF AN EXISTING SCHOOL BUILDING AND AN ADDITION TO THE SAME BUILDING WOULD BE FUNDED AT ONLY 60% OF THE COST OF CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW BUILDING FOR BOTH PARTS OF THE PRO-JECT. THIS INTERPRETATION IS CLEARLY POINTED OUT IN A LETTER FROM MR. RITTER TO DR. GORDON ANDERSON, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS FOR FREDERICK COUNTY, IN RESPONSE TO HIS REQUEST FOR FUNDING OF AN ADDITION TO AND RENOVATION OF THE BRUNSWICK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL. THE LETTER IS DATED JANUARY 17, 1978, AND APPEARS IN YOUR PACKET AS EXHIBIT I. I WOULD LIKE TO CALL YOUR ATTENTION TO THE FINAL PARAGRAPH OF THAT LETTER WHERE MR. RITTER STATES CLEARLY THAT THE PROJECT, IF AND WHEN IT IS FUNDED, CAN ONLY BE AT THE 60% LEVEL FOR BOTH THE ADDITION AND RENOVATION.

In order to arrive at such a conclusion, the IAC has ruled that Section 5(e) of the regulations governs both the construction and renovation portion of the project. Please turn to Exhibit II in your packet which shows the current Section 5 of the rules and regulations in their entirity. I would like each of you to note Section 5(e) in its current form. This Section clearly indicates that it governs contracts for "modernization and remodeling" only.

Sections e-1 through e-4 disallows State participation in modernization or remodeling projects for buildings or portions in use fifteen years or less, establishes a maximum State participation for "remodeling a school building or parts thereof,"

Allows Demolition costs as eligible expenditures and disallows

THE COSTS OF MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR. NO WHERE DOES SECTION (E)

REFER TO ANY SQUARE FOOTAGE BEING ADDED TO THE BUILDING. THERE
FORE, SECTION (E) DOES NOT RESTRICT STATE FUNDING FOR THE ADDITION

PORTION OF A PROJECT.

THE ONLY WAY THAT SUCH AN INTERPRETATION CAN BE JUSTIFIED IS TO BELIEVE THAT THE WORDS "MODERNIZATION OR REMODELING" SOME-HOW CONNOTE OR DENOTE AN ADDITION TO AN EXISTING STRUCTURE IN TERMS OF SQUARE FOOTAGE.

WE BELIEVE THAT THIS INTERPRETATION OF THE TWO WORDS IN QUESTION IS INCORRECT FOR THE FOLLOWING REASONS.

FIRST, THE SHORTER OXFORD ENGLISH DICTIONARY ON HISTORICAL PRINCIPLES DEFINES "MODERN" AS "NOW EXISTING, OF OR PERTAINING TO PRESENT AND RECENT TIMES; ORIGINATING IN THE PRESENT AGE OR PERIOD." THE WORD MODERNIZE" IS DEFINED "TO MAKE OR RENDER MODERN; TO GIVE A MODERN CHARACTER OR APPEARANCE TO."

THE DEFINITION OF THE WORD "REMODEL" FROM WEBSTER'S THIRD INTERNATIONAL UNABRIDGED DICTIONARY IS "TO MODEL ANEW; RECONSTRUCT." AGAIN, THE WORD CLEARLY INDICATES A CHANGE MADE TO AN EXISTING STRUCTURE AND DOES NOT REFER TO OR MEAN AN ADDITION TO AN EXISTING STRUCTURE.

THEREFORE, THE DICTIONARY DEFINITIONS DO NOT SUPPORT THE CONTENTION THAT SECTION 5(E) SHOULD BE APPLIED TO THE ADDITION PORTION OF THE PROJECT.

Secondly, Section 5(c) clearly does apply to any additions to an existing school building. Let me call your attention to Section 5(c) of the Existing Regulations in Exhibit II. It clearly points out that additions are eligible for full State funding within the restrictions of the remainder of Sections 5(f) through (k) and Section 6. Section 5(c) clearly excludes "any alteration"

OF THE EXISTING BUILDING, EXCEPT FOR THAT LIMITED REQUIRED TO PHYSICALLY INTEGRATE THE PROPOSED ADDITION TO THE EXISTING FACILITY." THIS STATEMENT SHOWS THAT AN ADDITION AND RENOVATION PROJECT DONE TO THE SAME STRUCTURE ARE SEPERATE AND DISTINCT FOR FUNDING PURPOSES.

THIRDLY, THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION TO STUDY REVISION OF THE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM CLEARLY SEPARATES THE FUNDING RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE STATE INTO THREE CATEGORIES FOUND IN EXHIBIT III. CATEGORY 1 SHOWS THE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROJECTS THAT WOULD CONTINUE TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR FULL STATE FUNDING EXCEPT FOR THE NEW COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES SUCH AS SITE PURCHASE, ARCHITECTS' AND ENGINEERS' FEES ETC. CATEGORY 2 ESTABLISHES PROJECTS THAT WOULD BE ELIGIBLE FOR PARTIAL STATE FUNDING AND CATEGORY 3 INDICATES THOSE EXPENDITURES THAT WOULD BE INELIGIBLE.

These recommendations seem to be in conflict with themselves in that additions are referred to in Category 1, Part 3, as eligible for full State funding and yet, are referred to again in Category 2, along with renovations and alterations. The Commission's exact wording of Section 5, of their proposed regulations, is found in Exhibit V. Again Section 5(c) and 5(e) are in conflict - both referring to additions.

Section 5(c) makes additions to existing buildings eligible for full State funding and Section 5(e) makes additions to existing buildings eligible for only limited State funding.

However, when the Board of Public Works amended the proposed Rules and Regulations, you changed the wording of Section 5(e) and deleted all references to "additions" Leaving the only reference to additions in Section 5(c). This action cleared up the conflict and established that additions to school buildings would be

'ELIGIBLE FOR FULL STATE FUNDING. (COMPARE EXHIBIT II WITH EXHIBIT V)

Finally, it is totally illogical to allow a project that is simply an addition to an existing building to be funded at 100% of eligible cost but if the addition is done in conjunction with a renovation project, it is only funded at 60% of eligible State costs. This type of policy is counterproductive because it promotes the building of New Facilities rather than renovating and adding onto existing structures. It unfairly penalizes counties that are growing or experiencing shifting populations and have older school buildings that are structurally sound.

IT WILL SERVE TO FORCE LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCIES TO SEEK ONLY AN ADDITION TO A SCHOOL, WHEN AN ADDITION AND A RENOVATION ARE REALLY NEEDED.

In the following year they will then apply for the renovation of the existing structure. In this way, they could save the county 40% on the cost of the addition to the Building.

* * *

THE PROPOSED REVISION TO THE REGULATIONS MERELY SERVES TO CONTINUE THE MISINTERPRETATION OF THE PRESENT RULES AND REGULATIONS. IT ATTEMPTS TO GROUP THE RENOVATION AND ADDITION PORTIONS OF A PROJECT UNDER SECTION 5(e-2) AND STATES THAT THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS "MAY ALLOW" FUNDING GREATER THAN 60% OF THE COST.

As indicated previously, this makes no sense, flies in the face of the Board of Public Works' intent of one year ago, and promotes diseconomy by breaking projects into separate renovation and addition projects which would be more expensive in the long run.

WE, THEREFORE, OFFER A SUBSTITUTE AMENDMENT - EXHIBIT IV IN YOUR PACKAGE.

This amendment will clarify the situation and remove the illogical conflict between Section 5(c) and 5(e) that the Interagency Committee's amendment would promote.

SECONDLY, IT FOLLOWS THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS' INTENT WHEN THE REGULATIONS WERE FIRST ADOPTED.

THIRDLY, IT CLEARLY DEFINES THE STATE'S RESPONSIBILITY AND DOES NOT PUT AN UNFAIR BURDEN ON LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCIES WHOSE POPULATION IS GROWING OR SHIFTING. IT ALSO TREATS A LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY FAIRLY THAT HAS SCHOOLS THAT LACK THE FACILITIES NECESSARY TO PROVIDE THEIR CHILDREN WITH A QUALITY EDUCATION.

WE HOPE YOU WILL GIVE FAVORABLE CONSIDERATION TO OUR PRO-POSED AMENDMENT AND THANK YOU FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY TO BE HEARD. ARE THERE ANY QUESTIONS? SIATE OF MARYLAND

Dear Dr. Anderson:

The Designees have reviewed your letter of January 6, 1978, and do agree in part to the funding allocation which was reflected in Mr Ritter's letter of January 3, 1978.

We have sent you the Designee's recommendations for the FY 79 Capital Improvement Program for the Public School Construction, as presented to the IAC on January 9, 1978, for Frederick County. It was recommended that the Brunswick Elementary School Project receive further funds in the maximum amount of \$1,778,000. This recommended funding is for the building construction, site improvements, contingency, inflation and additional A/E fees as required to supplement the previously approved planning grant. The request for equipment has been deferred.

We do take exception to your interpretation of determining construction costs as per the new Rules and Regulations. The maximum construction allocation is not formulated on the two part cumulative basis of renovation costs at 60% and additions at full cost of a new school. Rather the maximum is determined as a flat 60% of the cost of an equivilent new building, irrespective of the amounts of new additions or renovations proposed. However, the project is not being recommended to be funded on this basis and the question becomes academic in this case.

Hopefully, this satisfies your concern on the matter.

4. NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Prior to June 1 of each year, the State Board of Education shall prepare and forward to the Committee a "Statewide Educational Facilities Needs Assessment". The criteria and procedures for developing the assessment shall be subject to review and comment by the local boards, the governing bodies, the Board of Public Works, and the Committee. The annual reports of the State Board on the assessment shall also be subject to review and comment by the local boards and governing bodies. The Committee shall consider the reports in preparing the annual and long-range school construction programs.

5. ELIGIBLE EXPENDITURES

The following types of capital improvements shall be eligible for State payment if approved in accordance with these regulations:

- a) the cost of first-time site development ten feet beyond the building perimeter and including but not limited to outdoor educational facilities, paving, fencing, water, electric, telephone, sanitary, storm, grading, seeding, sodding, erosion control, and fuel services at a cost not to exceed \$15,000 per acre and limited to site sizes and conditions as follows:
 - a-1) Elementary or Special Education Schools 10 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-2) Middle or Junior High Schools 20 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-3) High Schools 30 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-4) The above acreage limitations relate to that portion of a site for which original development costs will be paid by the State and does not preclude a board of education from

- acquiring larger sites than indicated and paying the additional development costs related thereto.
- a-5) The approved State allowances for landscaping are excluded from site development costs as described herein. The maximum allowance for landscaping shall not exceed \$15,000.
- a-6) In those urban or developed areas where only limited acreage sites are available, an equivalent site development cost as per (a-1), (a-2), and (a-3) may be considered with a written request by the board of education. The Committee shall approve any such equivalent allowance.
- b) construction contracts for new schools for instructional purposes that can be justified because of growth or population shifts.
- existing school buildings such as: gymnasiums, classrooms, auditoriums, media centers, art and music facilities. This category excludes any alteration of the existing building except for that limited work required to physically integrate the proposed addition into the existing facility. However, it does include the cost of the necessary site work in the immediate vicinity of the addition.
- d) construction contracts for new buildings to replace existing obsolete schools in use for 40 years or more. Obsolescence shall be based on educational program requirements and/or structural considerations as determined by the Committee.
 - d-1) the board of education has the option to request the Committee to consider, in lieu of replacing a school building over 40 years old, the renovation of such building,

providing life cycle and cost benefit studies demonstrate the economic feasibility of modernization over replacement, and providing the total renovation construction cost does not exceed the cost of an equivalent new building, which does not include the costs of site development and air conditioning.

- e) construction contracts for modernization or remodeling of an existing school building, in whole or part, with the following exceptions and limitations:
 - e-1) for buildings or portions of a building in use for 15 years or less, there shall be no State participation in the costs of construction.
 - e-2) except as allowed in (d-1), the Committee shall establish a maximum cost of construction for remodeling a school building or parts thereof. The maximum shall be based on a percentage not to exceed 60% of the cost of an equivalent new building.
 - e-3) the maximum allowance shall include the costs of demolition and an amount for contingencies and change orders.
 - e-4) the costs of mere maintenance and repair, as determined by the Committee, shall not be funded by the State as an eligible part of modernization or remodeling.
 - f) the cost of change orders to approved new construction contracts not to exceed: 1-1/2% of the first five million dollars of the contract bid and 1% of the contract exceeding five million dollars.
 - g) the cost of initial built-in equipment as defined in the United States Office of Education "Property Accounting for Local and State School Systems", Bulletin 1959, No. 22.

- h) the cost, as limited herein, of movable equipment as defined in the aforementioned "Property Accounting for Local and State School Systems".
 - h-1) for elementary, middle, and junior high schools, the movable equipment cost for State payment shall not exceed 5.5% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-2) for high schools and special education schools, the movable equipment cost for State payment shall not exceed 6.5% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-3) for vocational schools, the movable equipment costs for State payment shall not exceed 9% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-4) in determining building construction cost, site development costs and regional building cost adjustments shall be excluded.
 - i) the contract costs of installing by moving and relocation modular relocatable classroom buildings.
 - j) the costs of relocating on-site utilities as required to eliminate interference with the building construction.
 - k) the costs of expanding existing on-site sewer or water systems to accommodate additional student capacity.

6. INELIGIBLE EXPENDITURES

The following types of capital improvements and related expenditures will not be funded by the State and shall be assumed as a local responsibility.

a) contracts for the construction of regional or central administrative offices, warehousing, resource, printing, vehicle storage, or maintenance facilities.

models, renderings, cost estimating and cost control or value engineering.

- —Costs of the acquisition or purchase of sites and costs of redevelopment of existing sites.
 - —Demolition of existing on-site structures.
- —Costs of furnishing and installing movable equipment,
 - -Art work required by local ordinance.

Contracts for construction of modernizations by renovation alterations on additions would limit State participation in the cost of the contract on the following basis:

The first \$150,000 of the costs shared on the basis of the equalization percentages of the Basic State Current Expense Aid Formula.

- -Buildings in use 15 years or less, no State payment.
- -Buildings in use 16 to 25 years, State to pay 40 per cent of cost of comparable contemporary construction.
- —Buildings in use 26 to 40 years, State to pay 50 per cent of comparable contemporary construction.
- —Buildings in use for more than 40 years, State to pay 60 per cent of comparable contemporary construction.

In the course of the deliberations, proposals were made by Chairman James for legislation creating a Capital Debt Affordability Committee and to standardize building code regulations for all public school construction.

EXHIBIT III

COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS

The Governor's Commission to Study Revision of the School Construction program makes the following recommendations:

Recommendation No. 1

The Commission recommends that rules, regulations and procedures of the Board of Public Works pertaining to public school construction be revised to alter and redefine what constitutes approved construction or capital improvements costs under the law and to hange certain administrative practices and procedures a the program.

The changes proposed restate what expenditures for school construction and capital improvements are eligible and what are ineligible for State funding in the program. Projects affected by the changes fall into three main categories: (1) those projects of which the State continues to assume a major portion of the costs; (2) those projects to which local government contributions may be increased substantially, and (3) those projects which are defined as ineligible for State funding.

In any discussion of state vs. local responsibility for defraying school construction and capital improvement costs in Maryland, it is well to keep in mind that the School Construction Act itself provides that "the cost of acquiring land shall not be deemed a construction or capital improvement cost and shall not be paid by the State."

Category (1)

In the category of projects of which the State continues to assume a major portion of the costs, revised rules as proposed by the Commission provide for State payment of:

- 1. The cost, with qualifications, of first-time site development. (See Appendix A for qualifications.)
- 2. Construction contracts for new schools for instructional purposes that can be justified because of growth or population shifts.

- 3. Construction contracts for independent and exclusive additions to existing school buildings such as gymnasiums, classrooms, auditoriums, media centers and art and music facilities.
- 4. Construction costs for new buildings to replace existing obsolete schools in use for 50 years or more.

Category (2)

Under the revised rules, the cost of construction contracts for the modernization of buildings by alteration, renovation, and addition would be limited as to State participation in the contract as follows:

- the first \$150,000 of the contract would be shared between the State and local government on an equalization basis, using the same percentages as developed in the Basic State Current Expense Aid Formula;
- (2) for buildings or portions of buildings in use 15 years or less no State participation;
- (3) for buildings or portions of buildings in use 16-25 years 40% of the cost of a comparable new building;
- (4) for buildings or portions of buildings in use 26-40 years 50% of the cost of a comparable new building; and
- (5) for buildings or portions of buildings in use over 40 years 60% of the cost of a comparable new building.

The cost of contract change orders would be eligible for State payment with these limitations: on new construction, 1½ per cent of the first \$5 million of the contract bid and 1 per cent of the remainder; on modernizations, an appropriate percentage not to exceed 5 per cent of the cost of construction.

Category (3)

Construction and capital improvement costs ineligible for State payment, and thus a local responsibility, include:

- 1. Fees for architects, engineers or other consultants.
- 2. Related contracts such as permits, (6) test borings, inspections, soil analysis, bid advertising, water and sewer connection charges, topographical surveys, models, renderings, estimating costs and cost control or value engineering.
- 3. Administrative costs of for developing master plans, programs, educational specifications, inspection of construction or equipment specifications. (6)
- 4. Purchase, lease, repair or maintenance of temporary buildings for pupil housing. (The relocation of State-owned transportable buildings would be eligible for State funding in cases of serious emergency as determined by the Board of Public Works.)
 - 5. Vehicle storage and maintenance. (6)

The cost of initial built-in equipment would be a State expense, but that of movable equipment, with a 15-year life expectance, would be a State-local shared cost, with State payments limited to 4 per cent of construction costs for elementary, middle and junior high schools; to 5 per cent for high schools and special education schools, and to 7.5 per cent for vocational education schools.

Contracts for the construction of regional or central administrative offices and facilities for warehousing, resource and printing up to now have been a State responsibility under the rules, but in fact no such projects have been authorized under the program. Under the proposed rules these projects would be ineligible for State funding.

Miscellaneous Provisions

The Commission is proposing changes in the rules, regulations and procedures beyond those affecting the eligibility of costs for State payment. Among the more significant ones are these:

- 1. The creation of an annual statewide educational facilities needs assessment.
- 2. The requirement that the IAC must submit by September 15 of each year the amount of capital funds available for the upcoming fiscal year.
- 3. The requirement that at the time of the request for construction local boards must certify that funds are, or will be, available.
- 4. The requirement that local boards shall submit and amend annually their master plan. (See Appendix A).

Fiscal Effects of the Proposed Revisions

The effect of adopting the proposed rules with revisions will result in the following approximate transfers of costs from state to local governments:

Architects and engineers fees
 Related costs
 Movable equipment
 2-3%

It is estimated that site acquisition costs, when site acquisition is needed, and optional costs of modernization projects over and above State allowances could result in an additional expense up to 25 percent of the cost of construction. This would include the equalized share of the \$150,000 exclusion in modernization but beyond this would depend upon the extent of local discretion. Obviously the extent to which local governments exercise this discretion will determine in large measure the amount of additional local costs.

Recommendation No. 2

The Commission recommends the enactment of a law creating a Capital Debt Affordability Committee to be responsible for reviewing the size and condition of the State debt and preparing an annual debt affordability analysis.

The committee, a unit of the Executive Department, would consist of the Comptroller of the Treasury, the Treasurer, the Secretary of Budget and Fiscal Planning, the Secretary of State Planning and one person appointed by the Governor. The Chairman of the standing fiscal committees of the General Assembly and the Director of the Department of Fiscal Services would be invited to attend meetings and provide advice and assistance.

The committee would review the size and condition of the State debt on a continuing basis, and before August 1 of each year it would prepare and submit to the Governor its estimate of the maximum amount of new general obligation debt that prudently may be authorized for the next fiscal year.

On or before September 1 of each year, the Governor would prepare a preliminary allocation of new general obligation debt authorization, and each year 20 days after the General Assembly convenes he would submit legislation to fund a consolidated loan budget — for general construction projects, school construction projects and other special projects. The allocation for school projects would be advisory to the Board of Public Works. (See Appendix C).

Recommendation No. 3

In response to testimony complaining of difficulties arising from the multiplicity of local building code regulations, the Commission is recommending that a law be enacted providing that all school construction shall be in accordance with the building codes approved by the Department of General Services and applicable to other State construction. (See Appendix D).

Under Section 5, <u>Eligible Expenditures</u>, paragraph (e), the following new sub-paragraph is proposed as an alternative to the version proposed by the Interagency Committee for the State Public School Construction:

- "(e-5) IF A PROJECT WHICH COMBINES THE RENOVATION OF AND ADDITION(S)
 TO AN EXISTING SCHOOL IS JUSTIFIED BY:
 - (e-5-a) STUDENT ENROLLMENT WHICH WILL EXCEED THE RATED CAPACITY OF THE EXISTING SCHOOL FOR A PERIOD OF AT LEAST THE NEXT FIVE YEARS AND/OR BY.
 - (e-5-b) A SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE IN THE TYPE OF GENERAL USE (ELEMENTARY MIDDLE, JUNIOR, SENIOR, SPECIAL EDUCATION, VOCATION) PROPOSED FOR THE SCHOOL,
 - (e-5-c) SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCY IN THE FACILITY TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL NEEDS."

THEN THE STATE PARTICIPATION FOR THE ADDITION(S) SHALL BE GOVERNED BY SECTION 5(c) AND THE STATE PARTICIPATION FOR THE RENOVATION SHALL BE GOVERNED BY SECTION 5(e-2).

Existing Section 4, "Special Provision for Fiscal Year 1972", in the current amended Rules and Regulations is deleted in its entirety as being no longer or plicable.

5. Eligible Expenditures

The following types of capital improvements shall be eligible for State payment if approved in accordance with these regulations:

- a) the cost of first-time site development ten feet beyond the building perimeter and including but not limited to outdoor educational facilitics, paving, fencing, water, electric, telephone, sanitary, storm, grading, seeding, sodding, erosion control, and fuel services at a cost not to exceed \$15,000 per acre and limited to site sizes and conditions as follows:
 - a-1) Elementary or Special Education Schools
 —10 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-2) Middle or Junior High Schools—20 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-3) High Schools—30 acres plus 1.0 acre per 100 pupils
 - a-4) The above acreage limitations relate to that portion of a site for which original development costs will be paid by the State and does not preclude the LEA from acquiring larger sites than indicated and paying the additional development costs related thereto.
 - a-5) The approved state allowances for landscaping are excluded from site development costs as described herein. The maximum allowance for landscaping shall not exceed \$15,000.
 - a-6) In those urban or developed areas where only limited acreage sites are available, an equivalent site development cost as per (a-1), (a-2), and (a-3) may be considered with a written request by the LEA. The Committee shall approve any such equivalent allowance.
- b) construction contracts for new schools for instructional purposes that can be justified because of growth or population shifts.
- c) construction contracts for independent and exclusive additions to existing school buildings such as: gymnasiums, classrooms, auditoriums, media centers, art and music facilities. This category excludes any alteration of the existing building except for that limited work required to physically integrate the proposed addition

into the existing facility. However, it does include the cost of the necessary site work in the immediate vicinity of the addition.

- d) construction contracts for new buildings to replace existing obsolete schools in use for at least 50 years or more. Obsolescence shall be based on educational program requirements and/or structural considerations as determined by the Committee.
- e) modernizations by alteration, renovation, or addition shall be limited as to a maximum. State participation in the construction cost as follows:
 - e-1) Exclusion: the first \$150,000 of the cost of work for renovation within a remodeling project shall be shared by the State and LEA on the basis of the equalization percentages set forth by the Basic State Current Expense Aid Formula. The State share shall be part of the maximum allocation developed under (e-3), (e-4), and (e-5) and shall not be in addition thereto.
 - e-2) For buildings or portions of buildings in use 15 years or less—no State participation.
 - e-3) For buildings or portions of buildings in use 16-25 years—40% of the cost of a comparable contemporary construction.
 - e-4) For buildings or portions of buildings in use 26-40 years—50% of the cost of a comparable contemporary construction.
 - e-5) For buildings or portions of buildings in use for over 40 years—60% of the cost of a comparable contemporary construction.
 - e-6) Comparable contemporary construction cost for a major remodeling project wherein at least 70% of the existing area of the building is modified shall be determined by multiplying the approved ultimate enrollment times a square foot allowance per pupil times the current cost per square foot of new building construction, excluding site development costs, of the same type under consideration. For lesser remodeling projects, the comparable contemporary construction cost shall be determined by multiplying the current new building square foot cost by the actual gross area directly involved in the project.
 - c-7) The maximum state dollar allocation shall include costs of required demolition.
 - e-8) The maximum state dollar allocations established under (e-3), (e-4), and (e-5) include as a part thereof an appropriate percentage not to exceed 5% of the cost of construction for change orders.

- e-9) The maximum state allocation established under (e-3), (e-4), and (e-5) cannot be used to pay those costs declared to be ineligible expenditures under Section 6.
- f) the cost of change orders to approved new construction contracts not to exceed: 1½% of the first five million dollars of the contract bid and 1% of the contract exceeding five million dollars.
- g) the cost of initial built-in equipment as defined in the United States Office of Education "Property Accounting for Local and State School Systems", Bulletin 1959, No. 22.
- h) the cost, as limited herein, of movable equipment which shall have at least a life expectancy of 15 years and shall further be as defined in the aforementioned "Property Accounting for Local and State School Systems" except where in conflict by the 15 year life requirement.
 - h-1) for elementary, middle, and junior high schools, the movable equipment cost for State payment shall not exceed 4% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-2) for high schools and special education schools, the movable equipment cost for State payment shall not exceed 5% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-3) for vocational schools, the movable equipment costs for State payment shall not exceed 7.5% of the cost of building construction.
 - h-4) in determining building construction cost, site development costs and regional building cost adjustments shall be excluded.

COMMENT:

Existing Section 5, "Special Payment for Fiscal Year 1972", in the current amended Rules and Regulations is deleted in its entirety as being no longer applicable.

Also, existing Section 6, "Eligible Expenditures", is deleted in its entirety and, in lieu thereof, new Section 5, "Eligible Expenditures", is substituted. Herein, those capital improvements eligible for State funding are redefined and limited.

In paragraph (a), the cost of first-time site development is limited to a maximum cost.

A significant change is required by paragraph (e) and sub-paragraphs (e-1), (e-2), (e-3), (e-4), (e-5), (e-6), (e-7), and (e-8), which limits the state participation in the costs of remodeling and modernization projects. Sub-paragraph (e-1) requires a local contribution to the cost of all renovation within a remodeling project.

The cost of change orders to the construction contract is limited for state funding.

Initial built-in equipment is defined.

Movable equipment is redefined and limited as to state participation in the cost thereof in paragraph (h) and sub-paragraphs (h-1), (h-2), (h-3), and (h-4).

The costs of related contracts, leases, relocatable buildings, and A/E fees, now included in existing Section 6, are eliminated as eligible for State funding.

6. Ineligible Expenditures

The following types of capital improvements and related expenditures will not be funded by the State and shall be assumed as a local responsibility.

- a) contracts for the construction of regional or central administrative offices, warehousing, resource, printing, vehicle storage, or maintenance facilities.
- b) A/E or other consultant fees.
- c) related contracts such as: permits, test borings, inspections, soil analysis, bid advertising, water and sewer connection charges, topographical surveys, models, renderings, cost estimating, and cost control or value engineering.
- d) cost of the acquisition or purchase of sites.
- e) contracts for the construction of any work beyond the property lines.
- f) costs of redevelopment of existing sites.
- g) except to accommodate renovation or replacement of school structures, demolition of existing on-site structures.
- h) relocation costs for occupants of a site.
- i) salaries of local employees,
- j) administrative costs for developing master plans, programs, educational specifications, inspection of construction, or equipment specifications.
- k) the costs of furnishing and installing movable equipment in excess of the percentages developed in paragraph (h), section 5.
- 1) art work required by local ordinance.
- m) the cost of the work required by local code authorities and determined to be in excess of the requirements of the current BOCA Building Code and NFPA 101 Life Safety Code.
- n) cost of owner's liability and builder's risk insurance.
- o) costs of relocating existing on-site utilities, except in those cases of utilities relocation required because of interference with the construction of approved additions to an existing school.
- p) costs of replacing existing on-site water or sewer treatment systems.
- q) costs of repair and maintenance work.

In any case, if a local board desires to proceed with a capital improvement all or part of which is

TESTIMONY OF SUSAN R. BUSWELL BEFORE THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS, DECEMBER 6, 1978.

My name is Susan R. Buswell, and I am President of the Maryland Association of Boards of Education. Our Association serves as the voice of local school board members in Maryland.

It is our belief that Maryland's unique state-funded . . . school construction program was designed to relieve local governments of the heavy tax burden imposed by the critical need for school buildings. Implicit in its design was the desire to equalize school facilities across the state and to ensure the policy making role of local boards of education.

Much has been accomplished by the program: an enormous backlog of needed projects has been completed, and, as the James Commission's Report points out, "The buildings erected or improved under the program are of the highest structural and architectural quality and contain educational features of the most advanced type."

You have before you a proposal to change the Rules, Regulations and Procedures for the Administration of the School Construction Program in a very critical area: the distinction between the level of funding of additions to buildings vis a vis renovations of buildings.

You know, because it is your job to resolve them, that the program's history has included many instances of disagreement between the IAC and local school systems as to the proper interpretation of regulations. You have heard today specific examples of those disagreements.

We are concerned that the wording before you is sufficiently vague to cause confusion. For example: it is quite possible that an older elementary school which lacks a gymnasium would be used at its rated capacity for many years. Would the fact that its enrollment does not exceed the rated capacity mean that it could not have an addition? If it does receive the addition of a gymnasium and minor appropriate renovations to the existing facility, which portion of the regulations would be applied, the 60% level of Section 5(e) or the 100% level of Section 5(c)?

We ask that you clarify the language in such a way as to recognize the original intent of facility equalization. Maryland children who attend schools built prior to 1971 should eventually have the same high quality facilities cited by the James Commission as Maryland children who attend schools which were built since 1971.

STATEMENT TO THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

PROPOSED CHANCE IN RULES, REGULATIONS, AND PROCEDURES FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

(re: Addition of Sections e-5-a and e-5-b)

December 6, 1978

Governor Lee, Mr. Goldstein, and Mr. James:

I am M. Thomas Goedeke, Superintendent of the Howard County Public School System.

I wish to make a few comments about the proposed addition of e-5-a and e-5-b to the State School Construction Guidelines, concerning modifications in the definition of eligible expenditures. As we interpret the proposed changes and the manner in which they would be applied, the State will be providing less money for renovation projects which happen to include new additions.

Most of us believe that the original and most important intentions of the State program were to (1) provide additional schools required because of increases in population; (2) remodel older schools; and (3) provide additions where necessary so that programs planned and staffed by the L.E.A.'s could be appropriately housed, e.g., gymnasiums, media centers, art and music rooms, rooms for special education students, etc. The Rules, Regulations, and Procedures for the Public School Construction Program that were approved by the Board of Public Works on September 7, 1977, provide for these varied capital improvements.

We fully recognize the financial difficulties encountered by the State as it implemented those three major thrusts. We know, too, that over the years in which the State Program has been in effect the annual allocations have ranged from a high of approximately \$350 million downward to a tentative recommended

amount of \$50 million for Fiscal Year 1980. All of us fully understand that the high level of funding could not be sustained and that there needed to be more stringent controls to reduce annual allocations. The recent report of the James Commission and the resulting changes in the guidelines on September 7, 1977, clearly reflect this.

In combination, the rules under which we now operate and the restraints from Interagency Committee reviews have had the desired effect of substantially reducing the annual expenditures.

The proposed changes before you today go even beyond what some of us see was the intent of the rules and regulations which you approved on September 7, 1977.

The new sections e-5-a and e-5-b appear to bridge two existing sections of the guidelines concerning projects eligible for State funding -- Section c and Sections e-1, e-2, e-3, and e-4. Section c provides for:

"construction contracts for independent and exclusive additions to existing school buildings such as: gymnasiums, classrooms, auditoriums, media centers, art and music facilities. This category excludes any alteration of the existing building except for that limited work required to physically integrate the proposed addition into the existing facility. However, it does include the cost of the necessary site work in the immediate vicinity of the addition."

Sections e-1, e-2, e-3, and e-4 cite:

- "e) construction contracts for modernization or remodeling of an existing school building, in whole or part, with the following exceptions
 and limitations:
 - e-1) for buildings or portions of a building in use for 15 years or less, there shall be no State participation in the costs of construction.
 - e-2) except as allowed in (d-1), the Committee shall establish a maximum cost of construction for remodeling a school building or parts thereof. The maximum shall be based on a percentage not to exceed 60% of the cost of an equivalent new building.
 - e-3) the maximum allowance shall include the costs of demolition and an amount for contingencies and change orders.
 - e-4) the costs of mere maintenance and repair, as determined by the Committee, shall not be funded by the State as an eligible part of modernization or remodeling.

Thus, present guidelines adequately cover projects entailing new construction and/or remodeling. Now, under the proposal the Interagency Committee is requesting that you approve, the addition of Section e-5 appears to lessen the amount allocated for a project entailing new construction and modernization through alteration of an existing facility:

- "e-5) If a project which combines the renovation of and addition(s) to an existing school is justified by:
 - e-5-a) student enrollment which will exceed the rated capacity of the existing school for a period of at least the next five years and/or by,
 - e-5-b) a substantial change in the type of general use

 (elementary, middle, junior, senior, special education,

 vocational) proposed for the school,

then a maximum cost greater than that provided for by Section 5, e-2), may be allowed by the Committee. Otherwise, modernizations including additions shall be governed by Section 5, e-2), unless waived by the Board of Public Works based on a recommendation by the Interagency Committee that Section 5, e-2) will result in a substantial educational deficiency in the school program."

Permit me to give one example of how we understand implementation of the proposed addition of e-5 to the guidelines would result in loss of State funding for a modernization project entailing new construction and alterations of the existing school. Consider the possible case of a school that lacks necessary facilities such as a gymnasium or classrooms for special programs, and that the present school is educationally obsolete while the structure is deemed to have years of use remaining. Assume further that modernization of the facility, requiring additions for the gymnasium and classrooms for special programs and alterations of the existing structure, has been determined to be economically feasible, in accordance with current rules and regulations. For the hypothetical

elementary school modernization project, the following would apply: 1) the existing facility consists of 23,000 square feet, gross area, 2) new construction costs are \$50 per square foot, and 3) alterations costs are \$30 per square foot (60% of new construction costs).

Elementary School "X" with a design capacity of 570

Allowable gross area

51,300 square feet

Present facility, gross area

23,000 square feet

Allowable addition

28,300 square feet

State Funding under the present (1977) guidelines:

(by 5-e-2) 23,000 sq. ft. of remodeling x \$30 (60% of new construction costs)

\$ 690,000

(by 5-c) 28,300 sq. ft. of new construction x \$50 per sq. ft.

1,415,000

State Funding

\$2,105,000

State Funding under e-5 as proposed, based on a new school of comparable size:

51,300 sq. ft. of new construction x \$50 per sq. ft.

\$2,565,000

State Funding (60% of \$2,565,000)

1,539,000

DIFFERENCE (lesser State Funding)

\$ 566,000

Unless this illustration is incorrect in terms of interpretation given to the current guidelines and the proposed addition of Sections e-5-a and e-5-b, the funding implications are clear.

Needed additions that are a part of a modernization project, but not necessarily described by the severely limited cases provided by e-5-a and e-5-b, should continue to be eligible for State funding in accordance with current guidelines.

We do support the presumed intent of e-5-b for supplemental funding for particularly unique projects as described in the proposed change.

Thank you for this opportunity to present our views to you on this important matter.

Changes to Rules, Regulations And Procedures for the Administration of The State School Construction Program

I AM JO ANN BELL, VICE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY. I AM SPEAKING ON BEHALF OF THE ENTIRE BOARD WHICH RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY TO OPPOSE THE PROPOSED ADDITION TO PARAGRAPH 5 OF THE RULES, REGULATIONS AND PROCEDURES FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE STATE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM.

We have been concerned about the application of the so-called "60% rule" for some time. We first objected to the Interagency Interpretation of the rule during the development of the new rules. In September of this year we again made our concerns known and recommended changes that would provide 100% funding for projects combining both an addition and renovation of the existing building.

Those recommended changes were consistent with the letter and intent of the law which reads in part, "from and after 1 July 71, the State shall pay the costs in excess of available Federal funds of all public school construction projects...".

WE RECEIVED NO RESPONSE FROM THE COMMITTEE OR ITS
DESIGNEES AS A RESULT OF OUR COMMENTS AND NOW WE NOTE THAT THE
PROPOSAL BEFORE THIS BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS IS EXACTLY AS
PRESENTED TO THE COUNTIES IN SEPTEMBER. WE WOULD LIKE TO BELIEVE

THAT A REQUEST FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE STATE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM FOR COMMENT ON A PROPOSED RULE IS NOT A SIMPLE FORMALITY TO COMPLY WITH THE LAW, BUT AN HONEST EFFORT TO GATHER INPUT FROM THE COUNTIES TO AVOID CREATING UNFAIRNESS OR PROBLEMS IN THE FUNDING OF CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS.

IT IS DIFFICULT TO BELIEVE IN THIS CASE.

WE WOULD LIKE TO POINT OUT THAT THE DESIGN OF BOTH ADDITIONS AND RENOVATIONS MUST BE CARRIED OUT IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE APPROVED EDUCATIONAL SPECIFICATIONS. THEREFORE, THERE IS NO INTENT TO PROVIDE MORE THAN THE EDUCATIONAL SPECIFICATIONS REQUIRE. AS A MATTER OF FACT, THE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE WILL NOT ALWAYS ALLOW WHAT THE SPECIFICATIONS REQUIRE BECAUSE SOME DESIGNEES DO NOT APPROVE OR CONCUR WITH THE SPECIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.

WITH RESPECT TO FUNDING, WE AGREE THAT 60% OF THE REPLACE-MENT VALUE IS ADEQUATE, AND IN SOME CASES MORE THAN ADEQUATE FOR MODERNIZATION OR RENOVATION AND OBVIOUSLY 100% FUNDING IS ADEQUATE FOR AN ADDITION. THE PROBLEM ARISES WHEN THE TWO ARE COMBINED AND THE 60% LIMITATION APPLIED TO THE COMBINATION PROJECT.

To correct this problem we now recommend the following changes to the proposed new paragraph 5-e-5:

E-5) No CHANGES

E-5-A) No changes

E-5-B) No changes

ADD A NEW SUBPARAGRAPH E-5-C TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

E-5-c) To correct a significant deficiency in the facility to provide educational needs. Then the State participation for the addition (additions) shall be governed by section 5-c and the State participation for the renovation shall be governed by section 5-e-2.

I THANK YOU FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE OUR CONCERNS KNOWN TO THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS AND ASK THAT YOU SERIOUSLY CONSIDER OUR RECOMMENDATIONS. 

This firm represents Security Administration Services, Inc. ("SASI"), one of the bidders on the above referenced contract which came before the Board on October (5), 1978 (as "Item 56 T Department of Budget and Fiscal Planning Agenda") and was recently rebid by the State Aviation Administration. The apparent low bidder at the second bid opening held on November 14, 1978 was a bidder other than SASI, but SASI wishes to make it clear that the purpose of this letter is not to contest per se the making of that award. However, because of the manner in which this matter has been handled by both the Department of Transportation and the Board of Public Works, which our client believes was grossly unfair to it and detrimental to the State, it feels a responsibility to bring this matter to your attention.

By way of background, the contract in question for security and other related security services at the Glenn L. Martin State Airport was originally advertised for bids to be opened on August 29, 1978, was for a period of two years and, in addition to numerous other substantive and procedural provisions, it required the contractor to furnish at his own expense a performance bond equal to the total contract price and further required that all bids be accompanied by a bid security deposit in the form of a certified check in the amount of five percent of the bid price. The opening of the bids was duly held on August 29, 1978 and a total of three separate bids were received by the State. One bidder, Phelps Protection Systems, was immediately disqualified because it failed to include any bid bond, in

the form of a certified check or otherwise, with its bid. The second, the Liberty Security Services, Inc., was the apparent low bidder, but its bid was accompanied by a certified check in the wrong amount and made payable to the wrong party. The State Aviation Administration ("SAA"), in a demonstration of considerable tolerance of non-compliance with bidding requirements, agreed to waive the bid-bond requirements of the request for bids and allow Liberty to supplement its bid with a proper certified check as originally required; nonetheless, and not-withstanding extensions of time granted by the SAA, several weeks later Liberty apparently notified the SAA that it could not provide the required performance bond and was declared to be in default. Accordingly, SASI was the only bidder which had complied in all respects with the bidding requirements and which was ready, willing and able to proceed thereunder.

A recommendation was then made by the Department of Transportation that the contract be awarded to SASI, and this recommendation duly came before the Board of Public Works on October 5, 1978. The record of that meeting reflects that the members of the Board of Public Works questioned whether a bond was needed for this contract, and deferred making any award. Thereupon, the SAA relet the contract for additional bids, with the contract term reduced from two years to one year, but otherwise with the identical provisions for both bid and performance bonds. At the bid opening on November 14, 1978 three bids were received from SASI, Phelps and an agency which had not previously bid, Dennis, and, as indicated above, the apparent low bidder is Phelps.

The immediate result of the above course of action is that SASI, which is a relatively small, locally-owned business headquartered in the immediate vicinity of the Broadway Market in East Baltimore, has been forced to expend considerable money in order to obtain two bid bonds in the form of certified checks, a performance bond (on which an entire year's premium had to be paid in advance) and additional expenses for attorneys and for its own personnel; this notwithstanding, while it is the only bidder which has consistently complied with the State bidding requirements in regard to this contract, it has not been awarded the contract. This might be understandable if there were any possible advantage which the State did or might obtain from this procedure. To the direct opposite, however, it appears there was not only no such advantage, but the State has instead expended and will continue to expend its own resources unnecessarily and at the same time has greatly compromised the integrity of its competitive bidding processes. Moreover, such conduct has made it extremely likely that at least one prospective bidder--if not many others--will be deterred from bidding on State contracts.

To be more specific, had the contract been awarded to SASI at the October 5, 1978 Board of Public Works meeting, the matter would have been concluded for the entire two year life of the contract. Instead, by deciding to rebid the contract for a one instead of two year period, the State not only caused a second bidding procedure to occur, but also assured that at the end of the one year term a third rebidding procedure for the same contract will be required. Obviously, the State must incur substantial expenses in conducting three separate bidding procedures instead of one.

Secondly, the State has realized no savings from the second rebidding of the contract and will in all probability incur additional expenses upon the third rebidding for the second year of the original contract term. This should have been apparent to the Board of Public Works from the memorandum dated September 25, 1978 from F. G. Blais of the SAA, which was part of the record before the Board of Public Works at its October 5, 1978 meeting. As is set forth in that memorandum and the attached schedule entitled "Minimal Operating Cost Calculations", it was wholly apparent that the original bid submitted by Liberty Security Services, Inc. (and possibly also the bid of the second non-complying bidder, Phelps Protection Systems) was in an amount at which the bidder "could not operate after the beginning of calendar 1979 without coming in with a request for relicf on the labor rates due to the increase in federal minimum wage."

Thirdly, by rebidding the contract the State has presumably excused the forfeiture of the bid bond which it was entitled to as a result of Liberty's default on the contract, thus further penalizing SASI, which complied with all requirements, by making it apparent that its incurrence of expenses in adhering to the rules and obtaining a bid bond was nothing more than a costly exercise in futility.

Fourthly, the award of the contract has been delayed for at least several months—no doubt resulting in further expense to the State—and it may be speculated whether the apparent low bidder will now be able to post the security which it failed to post at the first bidding or whether there will be additional extensions, delays and possibly more rebiddings.

Fifthly, it is apparent that the reduction in the contract term from two years to one does not rectify the concerns expressed by the Board regarding the necessity for bonding, since the contract was rebid with the identical bid bond and performance bond requirements as in the original bidding.

Finally, it is wholly apparent that the State's bidding process has been severely compromised. SASI has at great expense complied with all applicable requirements and has done so on the assumption that these requirements were meaningful and meant what they said. The fact that the bond requirements were retained in the rebidding would seem to confirm this. Yet those bidders who did not do so have been given waivers, extensions and additional opportunities to rebid. The relatively small number of bidders on this and other similar State contracts would seem to confirm the conclusion that SASI is reluctantly forced to make-that the confusion, foot-dragging and mid-stream changes in position (after bidding costs have already been incurred) serve to establish otherwise avoidable roadblocks in the paths of responsible bidders and almost inevitably serve to deter such bidders from competing for State work. In the long run, the absence of such bidders will inevitably inure to the detriment of the citizenry of Maryland.

It is with the hope that the State will profit from the unfortunate handling of this contract and will take appropriate corrective action to prevent its repetition that SASI requests the Board of Public Works give prompt and serious consideration to the above views.

Your letter of November 27, 1978, concerning the above-referenced contract has been referred to this Department for response, concurrent with Board of Public Works consideration of the Department's request for contract award (see Item 23T, DBFP Agenda 12/6/78, copy enclosed).

In essence, the Department's recommendation of contract award to SASI on October 4, 1978, followed the usual course in competitive bid award recommendations, i.e., selection of the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. In this case that was also the high bid, 21% more than the low bid, 11-1/2% more than the next lowest.

The Board of Public Works in considering the recommendation noted the price differential and proceeded to question whether the Department was doing everything possible to make its contracts accessible to smaller firms. Subsequent to the Board's deferral of the Item, State Aviation Administration learned that one of the bonding impediments was the two-year duration of the proposed contract. This problem could be removed simply by making it a one-year contract, with option to renew for the second year. A second step that could be taken in recognition of the Board's concern was to designate the contract as a "Small Business Set Aside."

It was therefore decided to rebid the contract and as a result, three bids were received, all consistent with the bid requirements and all substantially lower than the prior recommended award.

I sincerely hope that your next-to-last paragraph is not reflective of the State's bidding and contract award procedures as perceived by the bidding community. The approval process, at least as applicable to this Department, is mandated by legislation. Further, traditional procurement processes are undergoing modification to adjust to legislation and to expressions of legislative policy direction, as for instance Chapter 724 of the Acts of 1976, Chapters 575 and 872 of the Acts of 1978. Adopting traditional processes to these new directions is not conducive to immediately perfected procedures. However, the problems associated with subject contract are certainly the exception rather than the rule.

Be assured that your letter has received the attention of the Members of the Board of Public Works.

I. HISTORY OF AGREEMENT AE 73-2

On August 24, 1971, the Friendship International Airport Authority selected Friendship Associates, a joint venture of Ewell, Bomhardt & Associates/Howard, Needles, Tammen & Bergendoff/Peterson & Brickbauer, for the design and engineering of the proposed Terminal Expansion Program. The joint venture was selected from a list of 54 organizations expressing interest. The original list had been reduced to a short list as follows:

Tatar and Kelly, Inc., Baltimore, Maryland - Giuliani Associates, Washington, D.C. (a joint venture).

Rogers, Taliaferro, Kostritsky & Lamb, Baltimore, Maryland in association with Parsons, Brinkerhoff, Quade & Douglas, Inc., New York, N.Y., and Burns & McDonald.

Meyers, Ayers and Saint, Baltimore, Maryland in association with Smith, Hinchman and Grylis, Detroit, Michigan.

Ewell, Bomhardt & Associates, Baltimore, Maryland in joint venture with Howard, Needles, Tammen & Bergendoff, New York, N.Y.

Reynolds, Smith & Hills of Florida in joint venture with J. E. Greiner Company, Inc. of Baltimore, Maryland.

The chairman, Mr. William Adelson, designated Authority members Harry Hughes and Dr. Pierce Linaweaver to contact the selected organization and to develop a professional services agreement which would be compatible with both the City of Baltimore and the State of Maryland guidelines for such services. After an agreement had been developed, it was to be presented to the Authority for review and formal acceptance.

During the period September, 1971 - June, 1972, the Airport Authority special committee (Secretary Hughes, Dr. Linaweaver, Mr. Robinson) and representatives of MDOT and the Airport staff worked with the joint venture to produce an agreement that would be responsive to the needs of the proposed program. The first draft was completed on or about October, 1971; the final draft was completed in June, 1972. The basic agreement followed the general format of the new standard agreement form developed by the City. In the Agreement, the architect's basic services were divided into five phases: schematic design phase, design development phase, bidding phase, contract documents phase, and construction phase. These phases conform to the American Institute of Architects nomenclature and, in addition, enable each phase to be correlated with presentation requirements,

cost estimates, approvals, and payments. The Agreement adopted the State fee schedule as outlined in the then-standard format of the Department of General Services (Schedule C, 6-1/2%). No action was taken on signing the Agreement pending results of the proposed sale of Friendship Airport to the State of Maryland.

On July 26, 1972, the Airport was formally transferred by sale to the State of Maryland precluding further action on the proposed A/E contract by the Authority.

After careful evaluation of all alternatives, the SAA recommended to the Secretary, MDOT, that the work of the Authority not be abandoned and that the Contract, as negotiated, be revised to include appropriate General Conditions and to substitute the SAA for the Airport Authority as required throughout the document. Secretary Hughes concurred in the recommendation and, subsequently, Agreement AE 73-2 between the SAA and Friendship Associates was approved by the Board of Public Works on September 15, 1972.

II. SCOPE OF AGREEMENT AE 73-2

Agreement AE 73-2 is an architectural consulting and design services contract. It provides for professional services (five phases) for the Terminal Expansion Program defined in the scope of work as follows:

- 1) The expansion, modification, and rehabilitation of Piers A, B, and C including the construction of additional aircraft apron gate parking positions, apron lighting system, the relocation of some existing gate positions, the upgrading and/or addition of passenger and aircraft service facilities.
- 2) The expansion, modification, and rehabilitation of the main terminal passenger service facilities and utility systems.
- 3) The modification of existing highway access and auto parking facilities to provide the necessary capacity for passenger access to the terminal area considering additionally the proposed rail rapid transit access and external highway improvements.

Agreement AE 73-2 was not based upon a specific design program of the SAA, since none was extant at the time of execution. Rather, the generalized definition of the project above was appended to the Agreement (Item 1A).

The agreed fee for basic design services was indicated as six

and one-half percent of a yet undetermined estimated total project construction cost. Payment provisions under the Agreement were tied to completion of increments of work performed in accordance with the five phases of the A/E services. Provision also was made in the Agreement for payment to the Joint Venture for the performance of additional services.

The Agreement provided for a design period of 370 calendar days (to which 49 days were to be added for reviews by the Administration) for the Schematic, Design Development, and Construction Documents Phases; a total design period of approximately 14 months. Although services also were to be provided during the Bidding and Construction Phases, no time of performance periods were established for those latter two phases.

The Agreement has been amended three times and a fourth amendment is currently proposed. All amendments are in accordance with paragraph 1.7, ADDITIONAL SERVICES. A summary of Amendments No. 1, 2, and 3 and proposed Amendment No. 4 follows.

III. AMENDMENT NO. 1

Paragraph 1.7, ADDITIONAL SERVICES, of Agreement AE 73-2 defines services which are not included in the Basic Services to be provided under the Agreement, and which are not to be performed by the Consultant without the Administration's written authorization to do so. When authorized to perform these additional services by the Administration, the Consultant is to be compensated for their performance at the rates specified in paragraph 5.3 of the Agreement (two and one-half times actual payroll cost plus direct expense).

It was early determined by the Administration and Consultant to formalize the authorization of additional services by issuance of a series of written Task Orders, each of which, numbered sequentially, was written to authorize a specific additional service defined under paragraph 1.7 of the Agreement when such additional service was deemed to be a requirement by the Administration. Prior to issuing a Task Order, the Administration requested a proposal from the Consultant describing the specific additional service to be performed along with an estimate of the cost of providing such service. Authorization to perform the service included a not-to-exceed cost limitation, except in the case of revisions to approved drawings.

Initially, Task Orders were authorized directly by the Administrator, without higher level review or approval, on the basis of advice by MDOT Counsel. In late 1975, it was determined that all Task Orders were to be considered as Change Orders requiring approval of the Board of Public Works. Accordingly, the fifteen Task Orders issued (and performed) up to that time were combined retroactively into Amendment No. 1 to Agreement AE 73-2, with no change

in the description of the additional services performed or in the compensation authorized and paid for those services. Amendment No. 1 to AE 73-2 was approved by the Board of Public Works on January 7, 1976.

Following is a listing of Task Orders contained in Amendment No. 1 with a brief description of the services provided by the Consultant under each.

Task Order No. 1 - Program for the Project (October 30, 1972)

\$ 6,715.24

Services provided included development of a quantitative tabulation of space requirements in the terminal area for periods 1977 and 1982, detailed by function, and including requirements for airlines, SAA, FAA, concessionaires, rental areas, etc. A generalized space allocation drawing relating 1982 space requirements to a Terminal area layout, and a construction cost estimate to support those requirements was prepared. The Program, which was essential to and became the basis for the Terminal Schematic Design, was required to be furnished to the Consultant by the Administration by the terms of Agreement AE 73-2. The Administration. did not have available the resources to prepare the Program. This was an additional service as covered by paragraph 1.7.1, "Programming the Requirements of the Project."

Task Order No. 2 - Economic Feasibility Study of Parking Requirements (October 30, 1972)

\$ 8,539.90

Conduct of an economic feasibility study of parking requirements at BWI Airport for the period 1972 through 1982, to include the use of structural parking, with phased construction concurrent with the expansion of the terminal building and the planned Mass Transit underground station. Study was undertaken to determine how vehicular parking requirements consistent with terminal capacity could be achieved. The Administration did not have resources available to conduct this study. This was an additional service as defined under paragraph 1.7.2, of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 3 - Study of Interim Access to IAB \$ 2,121.73 (February 20, 1973)

Study and recommend alternative means for maintaining continued traffic access to the International Arrivals facility subsequent to the closing of the then-existing terminal service road, which was necessitated by modifications to the then-existing baggage claim area (initiated earlier than and separate from the terminal building expansion program). The Administration did not have resources available to conduct this Study. This was an additional service as defined under paragraph 1.7.2 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 4 - Preliminary Site Feasibility \$ 5,573.49 Study for FAA-Related Facilities (March 19, 1973)

Conduct of a preliminary feasibility study of possible alternative locations for an FAA Control Tower, Radar Site, and related FAA office facilities. Sites studied included the area east of the Westinghouse plant, Cemetery Hill, and the southeast quadrant area of the Airport. Study compared the assets and liabilities of the alternative sites with rankings and recommendations of the alternatives. The Administration did not have resources available to conduct this Study. This was an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.2 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 5 - Design of Interim Access to International Area (May 14, 1973)

\$ 6,270.42

Design for widening of Elm Road between Service Building No. 1 and Oak Road to provide interim access to the International Arrivals Building due to closing of the Terminal Service Road in front of existing terminal building, along with traffic circulation analyses. This was a further development of an alternative studied under Task Order No. 3, not related to development and design of the permanent terminal roadway system. The Administration did not have resources available to accomplish this design. This was an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.3 of Agreement AE 73-2.

To provide services of technical personnel to assist the Administration in conducting field inspection of two construction projects connected with the Improvement Program at BWI Airport. These construction projects, not part of the Terminal Building expansion, were the construction of the Air Cargo Complex, Contracts 112 and 113, and the Runways Overlay, Contract 110. The Administration did not have sufficient technical personnel available to perform the complete inspection services required. This was an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.13 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 7 - Field Surveys, Terminal Building and Access Roads (June 18, 1973)

\$ 32,225.00

Accomplishment of field surveys to ascertain actual as-built conditions in the existing terminal area, and to correct deficiencies and discrepancies in as-built drawings of existing facilities to be modified. Agreement AE 73-2 requires that the Administration furnish at its expense to the Consultant valid as-built drawings and data pertaining to the existing facilities. The Administration did not have resources available to correct and update the existing incomplete and inaccurate data. This was an additional service as defined under paragraph 1.7.4 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 8 - DELETED

Task Order No. 9 - Reproduction and Graphics (April 2, 1974)

\$ 20,000.00

To provide for printing of plans and specifications of certain construction contracts in excess of the number required to be furnished to the Administration under the Agreement, and to provide graphic aid materials, briefing charts, slide projections, and periodic updating and revisions thereof to support

presentations on the Terminal Expansion Program. The Administration does not have facilities for the reproduction and preparation of such items. This is an additional service as defined under paragraphs 1.7.2 and 4.1.2 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 10 - Construction Management Documentation and Contract Format (April 25, 1974)

\$ 4,399.82

documentation for the identification, evaluation, and selection by the Administration of a Construction Manager for the Terminal Expansion Program, to include preparation of a proposed construction manager's scope of services, contract format, qualification statement and evaluation criteria. The Administration did not have sufficient resources to prepare such documentation in-house. This is an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.1 of Agreement AE 73-2.

To assist the Administration in preparing the

Task Order No. 11 - Additional Boring Data (May 2, 1974)

\$ 8,366.00

Performance by a sub-consultant of soil boring tests in the vicinity of the elevated roadway structure, the utility plant, and utility mains routing. Accurate soil conditions were essential to proper design; such information was not available for the areas cited. Agreement AE 73-2 requires that pertinent data describing existing site conditions be furnished by the Administration at its expense to the Consultant. The Administration had no capability for conducting boring tests. This is an additional service as defined by paragraphs 1.7.3 and 1.7.4 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 12 - Landside Development Study for Terminal Expansion Program (June 12, 1974)

\$195,000.00

A study to develop an optimum solution for the landside development of the terminal area, addressing the integration of contemplated future improvements in that area which are separate

from the terminal building but which, if constructed, would be significantly impacted by the terminal building roadway design, therefore involving effective utilization of the total terminal area. These contemplated future developments included the Mass Transit subway station interface, a people mover link to the main railroad line, structural and ground level vehicular parking, a new FAA control tower, automated baggage transfer systems, and the total roadway system serving all components. The Study was accomplished in four phases: I, Planning Framework; II, Concept Alternatives; III, Preliminary Design; and IV, Study Documentation. The Study developed in sufficient detail preliminary design information for all final design activities, such that further development of any future components would result in a total terminal area which reflected a unified aesthetic quality and total functional integration. The Study was necessary to insure that construction of the Terminal Building did not inhibit or conflict with construction later of other required functional elements of the Terminal area. Such information had not been previously developed, and the Administration did not have sufficient resources to conduct the required Study in-house. This was an additional service as defined under paragraphs 1.7.1 and 1.7.2 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 13 - Graphics Design Service (October 8, 1974)

\$136,000.00

To provide by a subcontractor approved by the Administration graphics design services for the Terminal Expansion Program at BWI Airport. The employment of specialist graphics consultant was deemed necessary to develop special graphics systems and signage which would:

- a) Establish a graphic identity for the Airport, in terms of style, symbology, color, and other related design elements.
- b) Define and separate for the public the major areas of Airport activity.
- c) Graphically form the traffic flow patterns which lead the public to these major areas through roadways and architectural spaces.

- d) Treat each area appropriate to its function, by means of two and three dimensional designs.
- e) Provide a documented total graphics system which will enable the Administration to accommodate later expansion and/or changes in terminal activities with appropriate and consistent graphics and signage.

Under the provisions of this Task Order, the Consultant's fee for basic design services is reduced by the amount of design fee directly related to the final approved estimated construction cost of the signing and graphics works in the Terminal Expansion Program, less ten percent to be retained by the Consultant for the administration of the subcontract and the coordination and incorporation of the graphics designs provided by the subconsultant into the terminal construction documents. Specialized graphics design services are not comprehended within the normal basic professional services as defined in paragraph 1.1 of Agreement AE 73-2, and are reimbursable in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4.1.3 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 14 - 1/16-Inch Scale Model of Proposed Terminal Complex (August 7, 1974)

\$ 15,052.70

Provision by subcontract of a 1/16-inch architectural scale model of the proposed Terminal Building and associated parts including space frame and scaled model people, cars, planes, and jetways, to be used by the Administration in informing and orienting of the travelling public and Airport users relative to the nature and extent of the Terminal Expansion Program. This is an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.14 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 15 - Preparation of Lease Agreement Drawings (November 18, 1974)

\$ 2,200.00

To assist the Administration in the preparation of specialized lease agreement drawings for use by the Administration in negotiations with the airlines and other tenants of the Terminal Building. Drawings are prepared at one sixtyfourth inch scale, and subsequently reduced to

8-1/2 x 14 inch sized sheets, and indicate for each air carrier and tenant those areas which are for its exclusive use, plus common use areas. The completed drawings became part of the final tenant lease agreement documentation. The Administration had no resources available in-house for the preparation of these specialized drawings. This is an additional service as defined under paragraph 1.7.1 of Agreement AE 73-2.

Task Order No. 16 - Revisions to Approved Drawings (May 13, 1975)

\$ 20,000.00

To make changes in previously approved plans and specifications when directed by the Administration. Task Order No. 16 as initially included in Amendment No. 1 to Agreement AE 73-2 provided that changes shall include but not be limited to construction Contracts 121, 125 and 136. Changes to all contracts have been directed subsequently citing this Task Order. (Amendment No. 3 to the Agreement, discussed below, expands the earlier financial authorization of Task Order No. 16.) Effecting changes to previously approved drawings and specifications is an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.5 of Agreement AE 73-2.

IV. AMENDMENT NO. 2

Control Tower Cab Replacement Study (August 4, 1976)

\$ 11,585.00

Approved by the Board of Public Works on July 21, 1976. FAA had indicated to the Administration that the existing air traffic control tower would require expansion/replacement in the near future. One alternative to construction of a wholly-new control tower was the replacement of the existing control tower cab, with a new and larger cab conforming to current FAA facilities criteria. To establish whether that alternative was structurally and economically feasible, a Study was directed to determine the feasibility of mounting the proposed FAA standard Welton-Becket Tower Cab on the existing tower shaft, including

the establishment of mechanical and electrical loads for the new cab configuration. The Study further determined what structural, mechanical or electrical modifications would be required in on-going construction contract packages in order that the new cab might subsequently be constructed on the existing tower shaft with minimal disruption of later terminal operations, including the costs thereof. The Administration did not have the resources available in-house to conduct the required Study. This was an additional service as defined by paragraph 1.7.3 of Agreement AE 73-2. This Amendment provided for a lump sum compensation to the Consultant for the performance of these additional services, in lieu of the direct salary cost times two and onehalf method of compensation established in the basic agreement.

V. AMENDMENT NO. 3

Approved by the Board of Public Works on February 15, 1978. Provides for the design costs associated with a) revisions to approved drawings and abandoned engineering not to exceed the amount of \$314,253.01, increased from the \$20,000 amount authorized in Amendment No. 1, b) a special study authorized to restudy the schematic design phase of the terminal at the request of the airlines not to exceed the amount of \$14,903.51, and c) additional design costs associated with the special graphics of the Terminal Expansion Program not to exceed the amount of \$2,133.44. Additionally, Amendment No. 3 clarifies the additional services paragraph (1.7.10) of the Agreement regarding the design of interior furnishings.

A summary of the design costs associated with the revisions to approved drawings follows.

V. AMENDMENT NO. 3

Approved by the Board of Public Works on February 15, 1978. Provides for the design costs associated with a) revisions to approved drawings and abandoned engineering not to exceed the amount of \$314,253.01, increased from the \$20,000 amount authorized in Amendment No. 1, b) a special study authorized to restudy the schematic design phase of the terminal at the request of the airlines not to exceed the amount of \$14,903.51, and c) additional design costs associated with the special graphics of the Terminal Expansion Program not to exceed the amount of \$2,133.44. Additionally, Amendment No. 3 clarifies the additional services paragraph (1.7.10) of the Agreement regarding the design of interior furnishings.

A summary of the design costs associated with the revisions to approved drawings follows.

HOST INTERNATIONAL AREAS $\frac{1}{7776}$

Revisions to the Host lease areas were authorized to accommodate the operational requirements of the tenant not provided for in the original design packages. Host made changes to their lease areas subsequent to award by the Administration of contracts for those areas. This required revisions to the contract documents. All of the changes apply to revisions to electrical power and mechanical support facilities. The design costs, \$28,830.15 to date, will be reimbursed by Host to the Administration.

$\frac{\text{FAA AREA}}{(1/77 - 8/77)}$

Revisions were made to the FAA's Air Controller facilities area at the request of the FAA subsequent to the award of the contract work (Contract No. 128-C). The revisions involved relocation of interior walls and partitions to accommodate new operations equipment requirements. The increase in the facility capability required relocating walls, partitions, and resultant changes in electrical, mechanical, and architectural scope. The design cost for this was \$22,742.15, and will be amortized through adjustments to rental rates paid by the FAA to the Administration.

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS AREA $\frac{3}{7776}$

Revisions were made to the proposed layout of the International Arrivals Area at the request of the Federal Inspection Agencies involved, using carriers, and the Administration. Modifications were made to improve the operational areas of the Customs hall, the U.S. Immigration & Inspection Service area, and the U.S. Public Health Service facility. In addition, the Administration authorized certain design revisions to the approved drawings requested by using carriers which would improve the passenger processing procedures and provide inspection and reboard of incoming passengers where required in a complete security-sterile environment. Minor revisions to improve accessibility of the area to the handicapped also were authorized. The design cost for these revisions is \$24,252.62 and will be recovered through the passenger user rate applicable to this area.

GENERAL AYIATION DISTRICT OFFICE (FAA) 4/(5/75 - 7/75)

Minor revisions to the site location of the FAA GADO facility were found to be necessary subsequent to the award of the contract. The design cost of \$787.63 will be recovered as part of the rental rate agreement with the tenant.

UNITED AIRLINES AREAS $\frac{5}{7775}$

United Airlines requested certain changes in their leased operational areas subsequent to the award of the applicable contract. The design costs for the revisions to date, \$11,185, are reimbursable to the SAA.

TRANS WORLD AIRLINES AREAS 6/(12/75 - 4/77)

TWA requested certain modifications to their leased areas after award of the contract for that space. Design costs have been incurred in the amount of \$4,971.38 and are reimbursable to the Administration.

OTHER TENANT AREA REVISIONS 7/ (7/75 - 9/77)

Revisions of certain areas as temporary use facilities to meet tenant requirements in conjunction with construction phasing were accomplished by the Consultant as authorized by the Administration. Design costs in the amount of \$11,512.83 have been incurred as of this date.

ARINC AREA
$$\frac{8}{(4/77 - 7/77)}$$

Modifications were authorized to contract documents to provide for the Arinc operational facility. The facility, a telephone relay communication center utilized by all tenant airlines, was not a part of the original Terminal concept. The design cost of \$3,941.13 will be recovered under rentals in accordance with the lease agreement between Arinc and SAA.

$$\frac{\text{CONTRACT NO. } 120-\text{A}}{(9/74 - 1/75)} \frac{9}{}$$

The contract documents for this contract were completed but then

became obsolete upon adoption of the fast track concept for construction. This contract, initially planned to be the first one let, was subsequently broken down into two smaller contracts with revised scope of work and relocated facilities. The cost of the redesign under the additional services clause is \$54,565.70.

CONTRACT NO. 121
$$\frac{10}{(2776 - 9/77)}$$

Revisions to the contract documents for Contract No. 121 were approved by the Administration subsequent to the award of the contract. Major revisions were made to the mechanical aspects of the contract in order to resolve critical space conflicts which arose during the early phases of construction in sections of the original terminal building. The cost of the redesign work in the area amounted to \$12,456.63.

Design revisions to Contract No. 123 authorized subsequent to its award amounted to \$16,958.56. The revisions to this access roadway contract involved relocation and extension of service connections and apron areas in the vicinity of the then-under-construction Eastern Air Lines Cargo facility. Certain modifications to Contract No. 123 accommodated interim traffic relocation during the construction period for which provision was not made in the original design package.

CONTRACT NO. 123-B
$$\frac{12}{(8/75-3/77)}$$

This contract provides the access roadway overpass and the elevated roadway system for the Terminal. Design changes related to this contract involved those changes required to accommodate the planned MTA rapid transit line at BWI, and a revision in the abutment sections which provided approximately 9,000 additional square feet of usable area below the elevated roadway. The design costs for changes amounted to \$25,251.43. Partial FAA financial participation in these costs will be sought.

CONTRACT NO. 125
$$\frac{13}{(2/76 - 9/77)}$$

Contract No. 125 provides for the construction of Piers D and E of the Terminal area. Additional design costs in the amount of \$17,467.35 were authorized to this contract subsequent to award to provide an interim baggage roadway and service area necessary to maintain airline operations, revisions to an unassigned area on

Pier D to provide an additional leasable holdroom and gate position, and additions to the PlaneMate service areas in the interim International Arrivals area. In addition, the scope of work was revised to provide for a covered baggage unloading area in the interim area to meet airline operational requirements.

CONTRACT NO. 128-c $\frac{14}{(3/77 - 9/77)}$

Design revisions to the SAA administrative offices have been authorized in the amount of \$23,646.13 to accommodate the expanded requirements for the area. The changes to the floor plan provided for better organizational and operational functioning of the Administration.

VI. PROPOSED AMENDMENT NO. 4

Provides for the design costs associated with revisions to approved drawings not to exceed the amount of \$448,063.24, increased from the \$314,253.01 amount authorized in Amendment No. 3.

A summary of the design costs associated with the revisions to approved drawings follows.

- Revisions to the SAA's third floor area to meet operational requirements of the Administration. The reconfiguration of the International Arrivals Building to allow the area to be utilized as temporary office space.
- These revisions are reimbursable to the SAA through the tenants' rental agreements. The FAA's fourth floor space has been revised to meet their operational requirements and entailed a reconfiguration of certain space. 





Since the last meeting, the required information was furnished to the Board members by the Secretary's letter of 11/21/78 which also transmitted a staff memo explaining the situation in detail. The above is submitted for approval.

This purchase was originally submitted to the Board at its meeting of 8/16/78 as Equipment Item E-22. At that time, the Board approved an award for twenty monkey cages made of stainless steel to Wahmann Manufacturing Company for \$8,386.10. The second low bidder was Research Equipment Co. Inc. for aluminum cages for \$13,480. It was later revealed that the dimensions of Wahmann's cages are not according to specifications, 24" x 26" x 30". This size is necessary because the Federal Animal Welfare Law requires a minimum of 22,500 cubic inches for caging this particular type of primate. The cages to be supplied by Wahmann would be 24" x 26" x 30" which is only 18,720 cubic inches. Wahmann's order therefore, had to be cancelled. This firm does not make cages larger than 18,720 cubic inches. The only manufacturer of the required size is Research Equipment Co., and this firm is willing to provide these aluminum cages at the same price as offered last August. The cages are designed for larger than average-size primates and there is insufficient demand for such cages for other firms to make them.





The deed of conveyance includes an historic preservation easement for the purpose of ensuring the preservation of the unique historic and architectural appearance of the property. 



Reference is made to Item P-10 of this department's agenda for the Board of Public Works meeting of July 26, 1978, wherein the Board deferred action on this sale and directed the Department of Natural Resources to investigate the possibility of using Open Space funds to preserve the farm property. Department of General Services has been informed by the Department of Natural Resources that no funds are available to acquire this property.

Consequently, Board of Public Works approval is now requested for the sale of the former Hazel Lewis property near Walkersville, Frederick County, Maryland. This property was left by the former Mrs. Lewis to the National Wildlife Federation and the University of Maryland as co-residuary legatees. Both legatees have agreed to dispose of the estate and a purchase agreement has been obtained in the amount of \$500,000.

This property is a 170.3 acre dairy farm which is improved by a 3,400 square foot main house, four car garage, two tenant houses, two rental houses, a dairy barn, numerous animal barns and sheds, and two concrete silos.
