5. MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve a **new loan** up to \$12,000,000 to the Port Deposit Water and Sewer Authority (Authority) for the **Port Deposit New Wastewater Treatment Plant** project in Cecil County. (Legislative District 34B). The loan will be repaid in a period not to exceed 20 years following project completion, at an interest rate of 50% of the average of the Bond Buyer 11-Bond Index for the month preceding loan closing. Based upon this formula, recent loan recipients have received a 2.40% interest rate. To secure this debt, the Authority will provide a revenue pledge funded solely by sewer connection fees. The Authority will deposit all sewer connection fees collected to a Trustee to pay the debt service on this loan. The Authority will further secure its revenue stream by requiring developers to purchase a minimum number of sewer connections annually for the first 7-years, backed by a Letter of Credit in an initial amount of \$5 million, which amount shall decline over the 7-year period.

Project Description: The project entails planning, design and construction of a new wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) to replace the existing aging Port Deposit WWTP to meet existing and projected future needs. The proposed WWTP upgrade will also increase the Town's WWTP capacity from 0.150 mgd to 0.700 mgd. The proposed project will involve nutrient removal to meet NPDES permit required nutrient loading caps of 6,100 lbs/yr for total nitrogen or TN of 2.86 mg/l, and 457 lbs/yr total phosphorus or TP of 0.21 mg/l. The treated wastewater from the new Port Deposit WWTP will continue to be discharged to the Susquehanna River and ultimately to the Chesapeake Bay.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A Notice of the Request For Proposals (RFP) was published on e*MarylandMarketplace.com* and the DHMH websites. The solicitation was directly mailed to 17 prospective offerors, of which three were Maryland businesses and none were MBEs.

The Thomas B. Finan Center (the Center) operates an 88-bed psychiatric facility located in Cumberland, Maryland. The Center serves adult and aged populations from Allegany, Washington, Frederick and Garrett counties. The Dietary Services Program provides services to the entire Center, which, in addition to the Finan Center, includes the Joseph D. Brandenburg Center, the Massie Unit, and two Jackson Units, all of which are located on the grounds of the Center. The Brandenburg Center has 25 beds and treats developmentally disabled individuals. The Massie Unit has 24 beds and treats adults for drug and alcohol abuse. The two Jackson Units have 40 beds and treat adolescents for drug and alcohol abuse. In total, the dietary services program serves a combined total for the Centers/units of up to 177 residents.

Based on the history of limited responses to solicitations for this service (frequently only 1 response has been received), the Department anticipated a low response. This is due both to the type of service and the location of the facilities involved. Only one potential offeror attended the Pre-Proposal Conference. Minutes were forwarded to all vendors who were mailed a Letter of Notice. The facilities attempted to ascertain the reason for the low response via phone calls and requested the return of the "Notice to Vendors/Contractors" document; however only one response was received stating the vendor did not have available time to submit a proposal.

The single submitted proposal in response to the RFP was from the incumbent. The technical proposal was deemed to be acceptable. In addition, the offeror was determined to be responsible, the financial offer was considered fair and reasonable and other potential offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation.

The incumbent has provided these services for more than 12 years for the Centers, and has been providing similar services to two other DHMH facilities: Upper Shore Community Mental Health Center in Chestertown and the Walter P. Carter Center in Baltimore.

The services provided are for cooking/food prep, food purchases and personnel. A search of MDOT's website for certified MBEs for dietetic/dietary services and uniform services found no MBEs. Since there are no certified minority businesses that could perform a portion of the services, no MBE participation goal was established.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The Office of Systems, Operations and Pharmacy (the Department) has the responsibility of entering confidential data from Medical Assistance claim forms into the Maryland Medicaid Information System (MMIS) for processing payments. Currently, the Department has a backlog of claims and cannot hire additional permanent staff to bring this project up to date. All claims must be keyed into the system before a provider can be paid for services rendered. It is imperative that the claims are entered as quickly as possible.

Goodwill Works of the Chesapeake, Inc. (Goodwill Works) will provide 13 people to input data from claims forms into the mainframe system. Employees working for the Department must be screened, assessed and tested to ensure the Department will receive the highest standards in productivity and employee excellence. Goodwill Works guarantees all staff members presented to work at DHMH headquarters will be able to perform the data entry keypunch function as requested. Occasionally, as requested, Goodwill Works staff also assists in sorting and opening mail.

Currently the staff from Goodwill Works is performing data entry on the backlog of claims. The staff has provided satisfactory service. If a staff member is deemed unsatisfactory (in terms of either performance or behavior) the staff member is replaced within seventy-two hours. The management team at Goodwill Works keeps close tabs on its employees and addresses any issues with staff immediately. The Department, therefore, recommends approval of this contract because of the vendor's satisfactory performance on previous contracts and the cost effectiveness to the State.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The Anne Arundel County Department of Social Services (AADSS), a local department of DHR, is the court-appointed guardian of a 15-year-old boy who is severely disabled and thus medically fragile. In 1995, this youth was placed in, and has continuously resided in, a treatment foster care home. Also in 1995, the Circuit Court for Anne Arundel County (Case No. A-1995-00057) ordered AADSS to secure private duty nursing services 24 hours per day/7 days per week due to extraordinary medical needs; and granted the permanent foster care parents the authority to make medical decisions on behalf of the juvenile. To insure continuity of care and to lessen circumstances that could cause a temporary lapse in service, the Court has ordered that AADSS continue to provide 24 hours nursing services to meet the needs of this medically fragile child.

The incumbent vendor has been providing services to the child since 2006. In accordance with COMAR 21.05.05.02B and 21.14.01.06C Sole Source, Non-Competitive Procurements, the Department of Human Resources has determined that it is in the best interest of the State of Maryland to continue providing uninterrupted private nursing services to the 15 year old boy. In the opinion of the child's social worker, to alter the existing nursing services would derail the continuity of care he has received over the last two years. Therefore, AADSS is requesting a sole source contract to provide these services. The cost of this procurement is considered fair and reasonable.

COMAR 14.31.06.01 articulates the standards that must be met and maintained by residential child care programs for children and youth. These requirements are designed to protect the health, safety, and well being of children placed in residential child care programs.

RCC programs are defined in COMAR 01.04.03B(17)(a) as "an entity that provides for children 24-hour-per-day care within a structured set of services and activities..."

CPA Programs are defined in COMAR 07.02.21.03B (17) as a 24-hour substitute care program, operated by a licensed child placement agency or local department of social services, for children with serious emotional, behavioral, medical, or psychological condition.

The following list details the three categories of foster care services:

Of the 103 Contractors, 101 are incumbents. Seraaj Family Homes, Inc. and Between Friends, Inc. are new Contractors for the CPA services. The total award amount of \$213,300,434 for the base term assumes that each bed purchased will be occupied by a child for the full year of the Contracts. Based on history, this is unlikely to occur. These are reimbursements contracts. The vendors are paid solely for the actual children placed with them during the year, and then only for the actual number of days each child is with the vendor.

The amount for the option period is an estimated cost. The Interagency Rates Committee does not issue the actual rates until June of each year. For several years the anticipated cost has been determined by adding 6.5% to the prior years' annual rates. This calculation was used to estimate the option amounts.

ITEM: 4-S (Cont.)

The procurement law provides for procuring certain human, social and educational services under the State Finance and Procurement article Section 13-106 and COMAR 21.14.01.04 (Non-Competitive Negotiated Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services). The service providers in this request were obtained through a non-competitive negotiation process.

The Governor's Office for Children (GOC) is the single point of entry for private providers interested in supplying care under approved negotiated rates for youth of the various State agencies. These providers have rates that have been approved by the Interagency Rates Committee.

Procurement with these service providers has complied with the Law's requirement for Non-Competitive Negotiation Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services. In accordance with COMAR 21.14.01.04, below are reasons for this method of procurement:

- DHR's Procurement Officer and Secretary have determined that although there are several potential service providers, the demand for providers exceed the supply, thus making competitive sealed procurements inappropriate.
- 2. The services are for residential and treatment foster care and the licensing standards are found in COMAR 07.02.11, 07.02.13, 07.02.21 and 07.02.23.
- 3. Neither DHR nor GOC, has the facilities or personnel to provide this type of service for the 3,335 youth committed to DHR to be served under this contract. Therefore, it is in the best interest of the State that DHR contract for these services.

The procurement method used for these contracts is Non Competitive Negotiated Procurement of Human, Social or Educational Services and therefore no solicitation process occurs. The solicitation process is when the State normally introduces or recommends an MBE Goal. Because of the complexity of the rate setting process with the Interagency Rates Committee (IRC) and licensing requirements with DHR's Office of Licensing and Monitoring (OLM), provider budgets are not available to the Program and Procurement for further negotiation of MBE Goals for the current fiscal year.

Unfortunately, the 103 contracts presented in this agenda item are not all inclusive of the foster care maintenance contracts to be effective 7/1/2008. There are approximately 76 additional contracts to be submitted to the Board of Public Works (BPW) for approval. Due to the numerous steps required to achieve initiatives and resolve issues, the processing of the

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) was advertised on the *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and the DPSCS websites. Copies of the IFB notice were directly sent to 15 prospective vendors, all of which were Maryland Certified Small Businesses. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

This is a SBR solicitation which will result in one person providing services. Accordingly, there were no subcontracting opportunities, so no MBE participation goal was established for this solicitation.

A Pre-Bid Conference was held with six prospective vendors present. Three bids were received in response to the IFB. The lowest bidder was determined to be not-responsible because it could not provide financial statements and its bid was rejected. Selection for award went to the next lowest bidder, which was judged to be responsible and whose bid was deemed to be responsive.

The bid prices were based upon a model in the IFB for an hourly rate times 936 hours of services per year for five years. However, it has now been determined that the Department can only afford 900 hours of services per year, so the five year award amount for which approval is requested is \$202,500, rather than the \$210,600 amount as contained on the bidder's price form and as indicated on the Attachment.

Because of the low response to this solicitation, vendors not submitting bids were contacted to obtain information based on the "Notice to Vendors/Contractors" form. Of the nine vendors contacted only two responded. One vendor stated it did not have enough time to evaluate employees and rates in order to bid, but welcomed an opportunity to bid in the future. The other vendor stated the current contract rate was lower than its rates and it would not be economical feasible/profitable for it to bid.

In 1993, BCDC began an Acupuncture Substance Abuse Treatment Program for Female Offenders. In 1996, a similar program for male offenders was instituted. Offenders tend to exhibit poly-drug abuse and often times have a long history of heroin, cocaine, alcohol, and marijuana abuse. BCDC offers a "model" jail-based treatment program combining cognitive behavioral treatment and acupuncture. The jail-based program includes acupuncture, substance abuse education and counseling, life skills counseling and overdose education and prevention.

In Baltimore City there is a high rate of criminal behavior that is directly related to illicit drug use. It is estimated that over 80% of individuals in Maryland's prison system have a drug dependence diagnosis. Offenders who have committed non-violent drug related crimes or have violated their probation because of drug use may be sentenced through the drug court versus criminal court. These drug court offenders are eligible for the Treatment Services program which will provide acupuncture for up to 75 male inmates per month at the BCDC.

Representatives from two firms attended the pre-proposal conference, but only one vendor submitted a response to this solicitation effort. A survey of the non-responding vendors resulted in two replies that disclosed the following reasons for not participating: too busy at this time; other contractual obligations preclude participation at this time; not engaged in this type of work; and project too large.

The ALT-MSA is an alternative learning assessment for students with significant cognitive disabilities who cannot participate in the general Maryland School Assessment (MSA) test even with accommodations. The ALT-MSA, which will be administered to approximately 50,000 such cognitively disabled Maryland students over a five year period, is a key mandatory component of the State's Education Accountability Program – as required by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB) and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA). All students in grades 3 - 8 and 10 in Maryland participate in either the Maryland School Assessment or the ALT-MSA.

Participation in the ALT-MSA is determined by the grade that a student would normally be in based on his or her age, rather than his or her level of cognitive functioning. The ALT-MSA consists of portfolio artifacts for reading and mathematics that are collected during the period from October - February each year. Each student portfolio also includes a videotape of the student engaged in a task representing one of his or her reading or mathematics or science mastery goals. Services of this contract include the designing and development of the tests, storing and management of test materials, scoring of the tests, and analysis and reporting of test results.

The RFP was sent to 72 potential contractors, of which 23 were Maryland firms and nine were MBE firms. A copy of the RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Two offers were received in response to this solicitation. However, one vendor was deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award due to not meeting the MBE requirements. DBED received the following responses as to why other vendors chose not to respond to the solicitation:

- · Unable to meet the requirements in time;
- Other commitments;
- · Required longer time frame in order to provide comparable proposal; and
- · Looking for a larger sized job.

The only acceptable offer was from the incumbent, C.R. Dynamics & Associates, Inc. The technical proposal was deemed to be acceptable and the financial offer was considered fair and reasonable and a good value to the State. It was also determined that other potential offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation. Therefore award is recommended to the incumbent.

The purpose of this contract is to have a full-service call center provide information to callers in response to direct response ads and all toll-free numbers advertised to promote Tourism, Film and the Arts' marketing and advertising programs and tools.

The Maryland Office of Tourism Development (MOTD) spends approximately \$3 million per year in advertising on print, TV, radio and the Web. The call volume peaks during the year when the advertising campaign runs, usually in the months of September, October, November, and March, April and May. Each ad has a unique toll free number so that MOTD can track the responses to that particular advertisement. In FY 2007 MOTD's advertising campaign produced more than 260,000 inquiries, which represents the bulk of calls that come into the call center.

The advertising campaign is targeted to consumers that are 25-64 years old, have a household income of \$60,000, and live within 400 miles of the State. Seventy-five percent (75%) of visitors to Maryland destinations come from outside the State.

According to research by MOTD, spending by Maryland's visitors generates nearly \$11.4 billion in tourism-related expenditures per year and more than \$85.4 million in tax revenue per year for the State and its jurisdictions. MOTD research also indicates a return on investment whereby for every \$1 invested in aggressive promotion of tourism, visitors return \$28.24 to the State in expenditures.

MDTrips is the consumer database used by MOTD and the Call Center staff to enter caller information and orders for leads (generated from advertising in various publications, TV and/or Radio) into the database. Orders and caller information can be tracked with assigned tracking numbers associated with the 800 lines and advertisements utilizing this database which provides real-time information processing and on-line reporting.

DJS will determine future costs for FY09 and may be able to apply for grant funding directly from OJJDP.

The development of performance based standards are essential for the safe operation of DJS youth facilities with professionally trained staff that address the health, educational and treatment needs of the youth residing at the facilities.

Because of the specialized nature of the services being provided, subcontracting was determined to be impractical as all work is performed directly by the contractor's staff; accordingly, no MBE participation goal was established.

The Para-Docs system was installed five years ago through a small procurement for a pilot program. Accordingly, it is in the best interest of the State to award a sole source contract to Dayspring Enterprises LLC to support the migration and document management workflow.

Migration is when one application is moved from one platform to another. In the case of MIA, all of the applications were moved from the old Microsoft Windows NT platforms to Windows 2003 or Linux. This effort has led to further consolidations and MIA is migrating some applications to others servers. The end result will be fewer platforms and a more reliable infrastructure.

MIA has implemented a document management workflow system that allows all kinds of forms and correspondences to be scanned, Optical Character Recognized (OCR), and electronically filed. The events that occur when documents are received are used to alert end users to tasks that they need to perform – this is the workflow. For example, a Life and Health regulator writes a letter to a Producer; the workflow goes to "waiting response from company" and stays there until the company's letter is received in response and the workflow is "response received", so a workflow inbox can alert the Regulator to what s/he should tend to that day.

There were eight proposals received for this solicitation effort of which six were not susceptible of being selected for award due to lack of experience working with Oracle financials and human resource software modules. The RFP required 3-5 years experience with the Oracle modules.

The recommended offeror, Alverest, not only demonstrated a thorough understanding of the nature and scope of the work and MSDE business norms, but also, produced proven experience and exemplary personnel certified in Oracle financials that will fill the job roles. Although Alverest was ranked second financially, the technical superiority of Alverest was determined to outweigh the 15% price difference of the technically lower ranked offeror.

MSDE has implemented the modules of the Oracle financial database system to support Departmental financial reporting and human resource modules including payroll, time keeping and time management. The purpose of this contract is to engage a contractor to provide comprehensive maintenance and support of the system to include database administration, programming services, resolving production problems, designing solutions based on mandated requirements, upgrading the system as required and ensuring uninterrupted performance of the system. Oracle was installed almost five years ago through a piggyback on the University System of Maryland contract.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to exercise the second of three one-year renewal options as contained in the original contract for electronic in-home detention monitoring as an alternative to incarceration for the Dept. of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) only.

Originally, this contract was procured and awarded by DBM for use by the DPSCS and the Department of Juvenile Services (DJS). As of 7/1/2006 the contract was modified to assign DPSCS as the lead agency for this contract, both for its own needs and those of DJS. However, DJS has stopped using leased monitoring equipment as provided under this contract. DJS purchased the monitoring equipment it uses and has entered into a separate contract for the maintenance of that equipment; refer to the 2/14/2007 DBM BPW Agenda Item 9-IT.

Because of the technical scope of the contract, DPSCS believes it is in the best interest of the State to exercise the renewal option. Further, the prices under the contract have not increased and it is felt that the prices are still fair and reasonable. Further, DPSCS has an excellent working relationship with BI, Inc. The vendor is quick to respond when issues arise and is even willing to go beyond the requirements of the contract to satisfy the needs of the State. BI, Inc. continues to provide the most up to date equipment, which has proven to be very reliable and dependable, and its technical support staff are competent and responsive on a 24/7 basis.

The total expenditure for the first one-year renewal option (FY08) will be approximately \$265,000. If DPSCS continues to lease equipment at the same level during the second one-year renewal option, it is expected that the FY09 annual expenditure will be approximately \$287,000. Therefore, no additional funding is being requested for the second one-year renewal option since the \$1.0 million approved for the first one-year renewal option will not be exceeded.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval of a modification to extend the contract term from 7/1/2008 to 12/31/2008. The scope of the contract, terms and conditions remain the same. The additional six months with up to three month-to-month options are needed to avoid a lapse in service, await resolution of a protest pending with the Maryland State Board of Contract Appeals and complete the 150 days transition period.

It was anticipated that the previous modification would provide sufficient time to complete the procurement and have a new contract in place prior to the expiration of the current contract. However it has taken longer than expected due to the impending protest. DLLR anticipated presenting an award recommendation at the 12/12/2007 Board of Public Works meeting; however, a protest was received on 11/21/2007 and denied on 12/21/2007. An appeal of the denial was filed with the Appeals Board on 1/3/2008 with a hearing scheduled for 6/19/2008.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: This is the fifth year that an inflation adjustment increase is required for this contract which is due to the contract extension until 6/30/2008. The current Consumer Price Index (CPI) adjustment increase in this modification request is 4.0%.

With this adjustment, the application of the price change formula stated in the contract gives the contractor an additional 4.0% increase for each meal that the contractor is required to provide. The result is the per-meal price will increase from \$1.670 to \$1.737. The additional month cost is \$0.668 x 633,330 average meals per month = \$42,306 per month. For five months the total amount is therefore estimated to be \$211,532.

This item was not submitted to the Board prior to the February start-date due to the fact that the current CPI figures needed to calculate the price change were not available until late March of 2008.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to extend the contract by six months in order to allow time to complete the procurement process and award a new contract. Unfortunately, the procurement process has taken longer than expected. This is a very complex contract covering dietary operations that feed over 7,000 inmates and detainees held in eight facilities of both the Division of Pretrial Detention and the Division of Correction for three shifts each day, every day of the year.

The RFP process required significantly more time and effort to ensure the vendor community clearly understood the services needed by the State. This same scrutiny will be used during the evaluation process to verify the vendor proposals are reasonably susceptible of being recommended for award. It is the opinion of the DPSCS operating and procurement staff that this extension will provide sufficient time to complete the remaining steps of the procurement process and have an agenda item presented to the Board with a recommendation for award before the end of this extension.

The current contractor, Compass Group USA, Inc., has provided satisfactory services for the eight Baltimore region DOC facilities since February 2003. By continuing services with this contractor the State will receive the benefit of exemplary food services, maintenance, and upgrades to food prep facilities, while allowing for the successful procurement of a new contract.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The existing contract provides full-service fulfillment services including advertising development; direct and special mailings; survey mailings; merchandising; and warehouse/inventory services in response to direct response advertisements placed to promote DFTA's marketing and advertising programs and tools. DBED is currently in the process of awarding new contracts for advertising services, media placement services and call center services. These three contracts will begin 7/1/2008.

It is necessary to extend the existing contract for fulfillment services to enable the new contractors for advertising, media placement and call center to be transitioned and operating prior to awarding a new fulfillment center contractor. This overlap will allow the fall campaign strategies to be completed prior to the start of the fulfillment contract and provide the Division of Tourism, Film & the Arts (DTFA) time to train the fulfillment contractor's staff on the new strategies.

DBED is currently soliciting proposals under the Small Business Reserve Program for a new fulfillment services contract to begin upon the completion of this modification, on 11/1/2008.

DTFA spends approximately \$4 million per year in advertising campaigns on print, TV, radio and the Web. The advertising campaigns are targeted to consumers that are 25-64 years old; have a household income of \$60,000 or more; and live within 400 miles of Maryland. Seventy-five percent of visitors to Maryland destinations come from outside of Maryland. Fulfillment services under this contract are a result of inquiries received in response to advertisements placed and answered through a Call Center operated by another contractor.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to implement three modifications to the Contract. The modifications are detailed as follows:

1. Modifications to CARES and SAIL for Real-Time Interface

This modification to the current system addresses the creation of an interface between CARES and SAIL that will improve DHR's customer service. In addition, this initiative will continue and expand the partnership with DHR's Community Based Organizations (CBOs) which includes outreach to Maryland's historically difficult-to-reach and hard-to-serve populations.

The CARES system supports eligibility determinations for many public assistance programs including Food Stamps, Medicaid, and Temporary Cash Assistance. The SAIL system is a publicly facing web-based system that allows clients to apply for services online. This interface will allow the automated transfer of the client's application to the CARES system, and eliminate redundant data entry.

With this modification, DHR expects to create a real-time interface between the SAIL and CARES systems that will allow all applications, interim changes, and determinations that are completed in SAIL to automatically be sent to the CARES system. DHR anticipates that this

interface will reduce the costs associated with printing of documents from SAIL and redundant data entry, and increase worker productivity by streamlining caseworkers' workload distribution.

For all data collected from SAIL, a real time interface will be developed between SAIL and CARES to transfer the requested data. This data includes SAIL applications, interim changes and redeterminations. A sub-system within CARES for the selection of SAIL data, and subsequent population onto CARES data collection screens will be created, as well as alerts for workers and reports to track SAIL activity and status as identified by FIA. Applicable security protocols will be established, monitored, and maintained to assure data integrity and appropriate access privileges.

2. Modifications to MD CHESSIE System

The modifications to MD CHESSIE are in two parts. The first part is to eliminate the On-Demand Payments enhancement. The second part is to add two enhancements: Contacts and Program Assignment to replace On-Demand Payments.

The MD CHESSIE On-Demand Payments enhancement was originally requested in order for payments to be made available on demand to non-providers; in other words, to modify the system to allow workers the flexibility to reimburse staff or clients eligible for Independent Living services. However, as Social Services Administration (SSA) staff began meeting to develop the business requirements for the enhancement, staff determined that there was actually no need for an additional or other payment method. Through the Service Log functionality, the existing payment methods within MD CHESSIE are capable of making the necessary one-time-only payments to satisfy the business requirements of On-Demand Payments.

In addition, research and analysis was conducted on the actual number of reimbursements of this type issued annually. Due to the limited number of transactions, the cost of the system changes would significantly outweigh any benefit to the investment. Therefore, after developing preliminary requirements and discussing the business need, the Social Services Administration decided not move forward with On-Demand Payment but to utilize the existing functionality within MD CHESSIE to accomplish the process.

ITEM: 19-IT-MOD (Cont.)

SSA has identified and prioritized two enhancements to replace On-Demand Payments: Contacts and Program Assignment.

Staff members require Contacts functionality that is nimble and grows as the case evolves. Workers need to be able to read and understand the sequence of events/contacts in a case as they occur and accompany case happenings. The manner in which MD CHESSIE currently processes and manages Contacts does not fully support the Local Departments of Social Service (LDSS) current daily business processes. This enhancement will provide MD CHESSIE users the ability to enter, view, and print Contacts as a running log. It will also allow Contacts information to populate across modules and be shared on related investigations and cases, and will require Baltimore City users to complete fields related to the LJ vs. Massinga legal settlement resulting in more accurate information.

Program Assignment is an integral part of the MD CHESSIE system. It drives the types of services and funding selectable in the Service Log, the interfaces with the Client Information System (CIS), the Child Support Enforcement System (CSES), and CARES, as well as MD CHESSIE management and statistical reports. Program Assignment functionality currently has limited edits, resulting in incidents of inconsistent Program Assignments across cases, multiple Program Assignments, and incorrect Program Assignments.

This enhancement will strengthen edits, resulting in improved Program Assignments, as well as correct Program Assignment dates. These improvements will allow workers to more effectively account for the whereabouts of the children in care, align the correct services and funding with families, produce reliable management and statistical reports, and provide correct information for the interfaces.

With this contract modification, DHR is requesting approval to use the \$451,960 originally allocated for On-Demand Payments for the two enhancements Social Services Administration staff has identified to replace On-Demand: Contacts and Program Assignment. The estimated cost for the two enhancements replacing On-Demand Payment is \$755,568 which is an additional \$303,608 over the available \$451,960.

The Contacts enhancement will be completed first using part of the available funds (\$131,868). The Program Assignment enhancement is expected to be split into two phases. The first phase will use the rest of the available funds from the On-Demand program (\$320,092). The second phase will be completed pending the Joint Chairman's Report release of the final \$303,608 needed for the completion of the enhancement.

DESCRIPTION: That the Board of Public Works approve the transfer, as described, of antivirals Tamiflu® and Relenza® that the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene acquired from the manufacturers through United States Department of Health and Human Services contracts.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: DHMH proposes this transaction to expand the State's stockpile of anti-viral medications. Application of the federal Centers for Disease Control's models indicates that a flu pandemic could affect 30% of Maryland's workforce and would significantly increase morbidity and mortality rates. One way that Maryland is preparing for such an emergency is to work proactively with local government and private-sector entities to prevent a widespread deterioration in critical public services and utilities.

Following federal guidelines, DHMH identified *critical infrastructure partners* who are responsible for assuring continued access to food, water, electricity, banking, telecommunication, and other vital services in the event of a flu pandemic. Each partner, in turn, identifies essential personnel who would be called upon during a pandemic to provide critical State and local services and to maintain Statewide access to key private sector resources. The State plan contemplates that those essential personnel will receive priority access to antiviral medications (for treatment only).

ITEM: 21-GM (Cont.)

The United States, through the Department of Health and Human Services, negotiated agreements with two manufacturers of antiviral medications believed to be effective against the H5N1 strain of influenza ("avian flu"). This program will expire on June 28, 2008. The federal contracts permit states to purchase the antivirals directly from the manufacturers at deeply discounted prices. To the extent that funds were available, DHMH has purchased antivirals. However, Maryland has authority remaining to purchase \$5,447,535 worth of antivirals but only if the purchases are completed by June 28, 2008.

Through the federal program, HHS also instructed state health officers to determine commitment levels from counties and to notify critical infrastructure partners of the availability of the antivirals. DHMH has obtained commitments from public and private entities to purchase the antivirals. If the Board of Public Works approves this transaction, DHMH will authorize delivery of the antivirals to the appropriate critical infrastructure partners. These partners will then store and dispense antivirals, according to specific guidelines, in the event that the State declares a pandemic outbreak.

The federal contracts allow Maryland to significantly expand current treatment stockpiles. Expanding existing stockpiles and pre-positioning these medications with critical infrastructure partners will strengthen Maryland's overall public health response capacity. Specific medication distribution arrangements are consistent with Maryland's pandemic influenza plans. Authorizing distribution of these treatment supplies to essential personnel and their immediate families will help sustain a viable workforce in those industries that are critical to the entire community. Dedicating a limited portion of the State's stockpile to critical infrastructure employees is fully consistent with current emergency response plans. The Governor retains his catastrophic health emergency powers to reallocate these supplies if necessary.

If this Item is approved, DHMH will purchase Maryland's remaining allocation of antivirals using funds from its critical infrastructure partners. DHMH will then grant a conditional right of priority access to the antivirals to the critical infrastructure partners. If a partner requests, DHMH will transfer title to the antivirals to the partner. Absent such request, the State will maintain title to the anti-virals. In either event, control of the antivirals will still reside with DHMH because the partner may not use or dispose of the antivirals except with the approval of DHMH during a pandemic influenza outbreak.

The 2008 General Assembly passed SB442 – Environment – Clean Air Permit Fees, increasing permit fees to restore the regulatory capacity for the air pollution control program. MDE will use the revenues to restore capacity of the permitting and licensing functions, and to more adequately implement technically complex air pollution control regulatory programs through full implementation of the Healthy Air Act.

Three PHE III positions will review data, evaluate potential enforcement cases, and inspect a variety of sources of emissions of toxic air pollutants. One PHE III will develop and issue air quality permits to ensure that new and modified sources of air emissions do not emit pollutants at levels that will cause air quality standards to be violated, and will ensure timely issuance of operating permits for major emissions sources. The Natural Resources Planner will implement clean air plans related to Maryland's need to achieve the ambient air quality standard for fine particles. The Statistician will evaluate stored ambient air quality data and toxic air pollutants. These evaluations will allow the Department to be better informed as it develops programs and policies to reduce air pollution and will aid the Department in reassessing the placement of its air monitors.

Revised bidding documents were issued to all five original bidders and on April 23, 2008 five revised bids were received. An evaluation of the revised bids determined that the low bid submitted by Bay Utilities, LLC was responsive and within the available project funds.

The Sassafras Natural Resources Management Area consists of 991 acres adjacent to Turner's Creek and the Sassafras River in northern Kent County. This Phase I project will provide improved access and parking conditions for hikers and hunters. The Phase II project to develop a day use area will start design in June 2008.

Board of Public Works approval is also requested for the transfer of \$150,109 from Program Open Space (POS) Contingency Fund Item 256, FY99 to POS Capital Improvement Item 274, FY00 to supplement the prior year appropriation for this capital project. 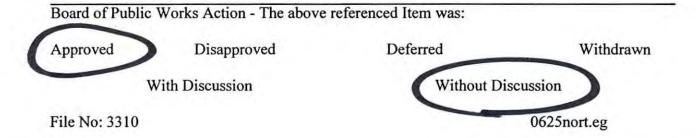

The Department of Juvenile Services requests Board of Public Works approval of the transfer of the State's right of recovery on real property located in Carroll County under the Juvenile Services Facilities Capital Program from the current grantees/transferors, Bowling Brook Preparatory School, Inc. ("Bowling Brook"), a nonprofit organization, the Raymond I. Richardson Foundation, a nonprofit organization, and Walden Real Estate, Inc., a Maryland corporation, to new grantees/transferees, Rite of Passage, Inc. ("ROP") a for profit organization, and Butte Holdings LLC ("Butte"), a for profit organization. This request to the Board is made in accordance with Human Services Article, § 9-406, Annotated Code of Maryland.

Approval of this action pursuant to the Human Services Article, § 9-406, will permit the transferors and transferees to proceed with the sale of the subject property located in Keymar, Carroll County, Maryland. Approval will also permit ROP and Butte to establish a juvenile facility and juvenile programs as defined in the Human Services Article § 9-401 to serve vulnerable Maryland children who might otherwise need to be placed out of state for rehabilitation services over the thirty term required under the capital grant to and including September, 2034.

Reference is made to the following Board of Public Works meetings wherein approval was granted to Bowling Brook to construct and renovate certain properties:

<u>March 8, 1989 DGS Item 11-CGL</u>—Board approved a grant of \$600,000 to design, construct and equip a thirty-six bed community residence for adolescents on property known as 999 Crouse Mill Road, Keymar, Maryland.

<u>December 12, 2001 DGS Item 34-CGL</u>—Board approved a grant of \$525,000 to renovate and convert facilities on the Bowling Brook campus to provide expanded and improved dining, classroom and student union space on the property known as Crouse Mill Road and 999 Crouse Mill Road, Keymar, Maryland.

October 15, 2003 DGS Item 7-CGL — Board approved a grant of \$404,694 to construct a two-story, forty-eight bed dormitory on the property known as Crouse Mill Road and 999 Crouse Mill Road, Keymar, Maryland.

<u>September 8, 2004 DGS Item 36-CGL</u>—Board approved a grant of \$410,057.50 to construct a two-story, forty-eight bed dormitory on the property known as Crouse Mill Road and 999 Crouse Mill Road, Keymar, Maryland and an additional \$64,951.02 for the furnishing and equipping of the new dormitory.

Bowling Brook is a nonprofit corporation which from 1983 to March 9, 2007 provided residential rehabilitative and educational services to young men committed to the care of the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services. The purpose of the organization was to provide staff secure, committed residential services to delinquent young men. The organization addressed academic, vocational and social needs of youth within the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services who might otherwise be placed out of state in order to receive comparable services. Following a child fatality on the Bowling Brook campus in January 2007, Bowling Brook surrendered its license as a residential child care program on March 9, 2007 and ceased operation as a juvenile facility.

As a result of Bowling Brook's surrender of its license, the State filed a Complaint to establish a lien on the subject property which is pending in the Circuit Court for Carroll County. In accordance with the Human Services Article, § 9-405, the State filed Notices of Right of Recovery in the land records of Carroll County with respect to each of the grants.

ROP, a provider of services to adjudicated youth, owns and operates juvenile rehabilitation and education facilities in several states. The Maryland Department of Juvenile Services currently has an agreement with ROP to place committed Maryland youth in ROP's out of state facilities.

In consideration of the Board's approval of this request, ROP has agreed to assume ownership of the property and the operation of the former Bowling Brook campus as a juvenile facility. This will ensure that the property will continue to provide residential, rehabilitative, educational and vocational services to youth committed to the care of Maryland Department of Juvenile Services.

Over the past nineteen years, the Board has approved grants for Bowling Brook totaling \$2,004,702.52. These grants have permitted Bowling Brook to construct or renovate several academic, recreational, administrative and residential buildings on the Carroll County property to serve youth committed to the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services. ROP would continue to serve the same population of youth.
