Dear Secretary McDonald:

On May 21, the Board of Public Works voted to approve a tidal wetlands license in Case No. 05-1226. The applicant, Swan Point Development Corporation, LLC, sought to build a marina and various piers for a proposed 897-acre waterfront development in Charles County. I voted to deny the license because I believe that the project is not in the State's best interest. I indicated at the meeting that I would supplement the record with written comments explaining my vote.

The public policy of the State of Maryland is to preserve wetlands and prevent their despoliation and destruction. A developer who wants to dredge, fill, or construct on tidal wetlands first must obtain a license from the Board. In deciding whether to grant the license, the Board's role is to decide if the license is in the best interest of the State, taking into account the varying ecological, economic, developmental, recreational, and aesthetic values at stake.

I have carefully considered the developer's application, the public testimony before the Board, and the written reports of the Maryland Department of the Environment and the Wetlands Administrator. Upon reviewing the record – and after weighing the ecological, economic, developmental, recreational, and aesthetic factors in the case – I have concluded that the license is not in the best interest of the State.

I greatly appreciate that the developer in this case – together with community members, elected officials, and State and local agencies – have worked diligently to ensure that the project will involve a number of mitigation efforts that lessen or offset some of the harmful environmental impacts. It is clear that the parties have worked together collaboratively, and that the developer has been responsive to community and official input.

On balance, however, I believe that we cannot risk the harm to our environment, scenic coastline, and public safety that the project creates. With respect to environmental harms, we learned that the license will result in the loss of over 100 acres of Forest Interior Dwelling Species (FIDS) habitat and the removal of a sub-colony of Great Blue Heron. In addition, residents testified about their concerns that the licensed activity will damage water quality, wildlife, and submerged aquatic vegetation. We also learned that the developer has not committed to using all pervious pavement, an important component of low impact development. Residents also expressed concerns that the proposed construction will destroy the natural beauty of the scenic coastline, and that the developer has made no commitment to avoid developing Cuba Island. From a public safety standpoint, I am concerned that the proposed project is almost entirely within the flood plain. The Secretary of the Department of the Environment, Shari Wilson, testified that the development would be inundated in the event of a category 2 hurricane.

Our wetlands are in jeopardy of being damaged and destroyed by dredging and filling activities. The destruction and despoliation of wetlands has wide-reaching negative effects on plant and animal habitats, water quality, commerce, recreation, and navigation. In addition, the loss of wetlands reduces our natural protections against flood damage – thus posing a threat to public health and welfare.

We have a responsibility to restore and protect our wetlands and waterways for future generations. On July 1, new legislation to strengthen the State's critical area protections took effect. The law will ensure more adequate protection of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. Among other things, the law increases mandated buffers between new development and the shorelines of tidal waters and wetlands. The shoreline buffer is absolutely critical to improving water quality and habitat protection. The law also allows the Critical Areas Commission to consider important public safety factors related to costal hazards and flooding when it reviews growth allocations.

We must make every effort to ensure that construction on our tidal wetlands occurs only when it is in the State's best interest – taking into account the ecological, economic, developmental, recreational, and aesthetic factors at stake. I do not believe that the application meets this standard and, therefore, I voted to deny the license in this case.

Project Description: The proposed project is to plan and design Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) facilities at the existing 6 million gallons per day Marlay-Taylor Water Reclamation Facility. The planning phase includes engineering evaluations of various technologies to determine the technology and modifications required at the existing wastewater treatment plant to achieve an effluent with total nitrogen goal of 3 mg/l and total phosphorous of 0.3 mg/l. Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works approve a new loan up to \$1,200,000 to Howard County for the Holiday Hills and Riverside Estate Sewer Extension project in Howard County. BACKGROUND: On November 16, 1990, DHCD made three loans to the Housing Authority of Calvert County: \$353,956 (multi-family bond program); \$1,000,000 (rental housing production program); and \$1,563,085 (partnership rental housing program). The loans enabled the Housing Authority to finance the construction of Calvert Pines II, a 48-unit apartment complex located on 5.5 acres. Calvert Pines II provides housing for low and moderate income families and individuals, with preference given to senior citizens. The loans are secured by first, second, and third lien deeds of trust.

The proposed easement agreements are related to a development and construction project that is the subject of a Development Agreement between the Board of County Commissioners for Calvert County and John M. Gott, Jr., the owner of 90 acres that borders Calvert Pines II. As proposed, the Gott property development consists of a mixture of commercial and residential uses with at least 10% of the residential units to be made available for rental or purchase by households earning no more than 80% of the Calvert County median income.

The Housing Authority of Calvert County will receive a payment in the amount of \$10,000 as consideration for granting the easements. The funds will be used to make upgrades at Calvert Pines II. DHCD will receive no payment for permitting the granting of the easements.

Market Value: An appraisal of Calvert Pines II prepared by Integra Realty Resources and dated December 18, 2006, estimated the market value with unrestricted rents to be \$1,400,000, and the "as financed" value to be \$1,700,000. There is sufficient collateral coverage for the first lien loan and the second lien loan. The third lien loan is deferred in perpetuity, unless the property is no longer used as affordable housing. The granting of the easements will have no negative impact on the value of Calvert Pines II.

Market Value. The City, through its Department of Real Estate, obtained two independent appraisals: \$45,000 and \$157,000. DHCD in-house asset management and appraisal staff reviewed the appraisals. Current sales prices for comparable properties were taken into consideration and the exteriors of the properties were visually inspected. The assessed value of the property is \$30,000.

DHCD will retain its first lien position on the remaining 14 properties following the sale and release of 903 West Lexington. Additional security for the loan is provided by a zero coupon bond pledged to DHCD with a market value of \$563,440 as of March 31, 2008.

The vast majority of the properties along the West Lexington corridor in the 600 – 900 blocks are owned by either the City or the University of Maryland. The property is apparently part of an assemblage that is being established for the benefit of University of Maryland Medical System; DHCD deems appropriate the price the City has offered.

15. <u>STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM</u> Public School Construction Capital Improvement Program – Fiscal Year 2009

Recommendation: The Interagency Committee on School Construction recommends that the Board of Public Works approve the State School Construction Program for the Fiscal Year 2009. The Interagency Committee is recommending a total statewide program in the amount of \$340 million.

The proposed \$340 million program comprises:

- Approximately \$225 million previously approved by the Board of Public Works (Secretary's Agenda Item 1, Jan. 30. 2008);
- Additional recommendations for specific projects in the approximate amount of \$102.4 million; and
- Statewide Contingency in the approximate amount of \$12.6 million.

The recommended Program will be funded by \$327.4 million from a proposed new bond authorization and \$12.6 million in reverted funds from the Statewide Contingency Account.

Background: The Interagency Committee has considered each local school system's capital improvement school construction program request submitted for Fiscal Year 2009. After full evaluation including discussion between local representatives and Interagency Committee staff, the Interagency Committee recommends the Fiscal Year 2009 Program to the Board of Public Works. The recommended Program reflects local priorities, while recognizing projects that address the mandates of the Bridge to Excellence in Education Act, urgent major projects that require a high level of State commitment to move forward, the high school science classroom initiative, and the highest priority systemic renovation projects. The Program also includes planning approval for a number of major projects and for projects that will address Bridge to Excellence requirements for full-day kindergarten and for pre-kindergarten for disadvantaged four-year olds. Planning approvals have been recommended in accordance with the Regulations for the Administration of the Public School Construction Program, which require, among other things, that all design costs be paid by the local education agency.

Background: The site consists of 4.97 acres, including a 20,725 square foot educational facility, Dr. Lillie M. Jackson #315 that was originally built in 1979. The facility houses students from #288 Alternative Elementary School. Students are severely disabled and enrollment reflects these students only. #315 no longer exists. The facility is underutilized and has been closed as part of the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners policy to reduce BCPSS facility square footage by 15% before the 2008-2009 school year for more efficient operation of City schools. The building is underutilized and has been operating well under capacity – 13 enrollment in 2006 (12.75% of 102 SRC) and 10 enrollment in 2005 (9.8% of 102 SRC). #288 program relocation to #21 Hilton Elementary School.

At its regular meeting of February 27, 2007, the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners declared this facility surplus to the needs of Baltimore City Public Schools. The City Board requests the Interagency Committee on School Construction and Board of Public Works approval to transfer this facility to the City government. 19. <u>DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES</u> Smith Island Environmental Restoration -- Bonds

Recommendation: That the Board of Public Works grant a temporary exception for one year – until June 1, 2009 – for the following State debt authorization. This exception will retain the State's authority to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$414,619.19 and retain DNR's authority to spend these funds for environmental restoration projects at Smith Island, Somerset County. Loss of State funds could jeopardize matching federal funds. The Department of Budget and Management (Office of Capital Budgeting) has reviewed this request and concurs with the recommendation.

Background: The Smith Island Environmental Restoration Project is a partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Somerset County, and the Maryland Departments of the Environment and Natural Resources. The project was initiated in 2000; two of the phases of work have been completed or are scheduled for construction. However the Corps did not receive authorization from Congress for the final phase until 2008 and is expected to appropriate funding in 2009. The State bond funds will be used to provide a portion of the local matching funds.

State law provides that except for the extent that money authorized by an enabling act for a state program or project has been encumbered by the Board, an authorization of State debt shall automatically terminate 7 years after the date of the authorization, unless, in an emergency, the Board unanimously grants a temporary exception for one year.

Nature of Emergency: The emergency nature of this aerial pesticide application contract is due to the vast size of the treatment area and the need to secure a contractor early so there is sufficient time for both MDA and the contractor to complete all activities to initiate this project. Aerial applications occur in the mid-Atlantic region over a 4-5 week span, usually from late April through the month of May. The specific launch date is dependent on a number of environmental factors relating to temperature, weather and leaf expansion that trigger the emergence and subsequent feeding of the gypsy moth caterpillars. Application must be made to coincide with the active feeding of early stage caterpillars and the residual life of the insecticide in order to control the gypsy moth.

Because of the massive volume of gypsy moth egg masses and acres of forest defoliated in 2007 in Maryland and across neighboring states, concern about the availability of aircraft and licensed pilots to conduct spray services in 2008 arose. A number of entities, particularly in western Maryland, were competing for limited firms and specialized aircraft (helicopters and planes) that can make aerial applications in basically the same time period. Only four Maryland firms and 13 out of state firms are licensed by the State and the Federal Aviation Administration to conduct this work. As a result, it is imperative for Maryland to get its contract "out on the street" early to avoid higher treatment costs per acre and the possibility of not having enough aircraft and pilots available to do the job. This contract requires the contractor(s) to provide at least three helicopters and one plane.

As part of the bid process, MDA had to provide the bidder with maps of proposed spray blocks that showed total acreage of treatment area and location so bidders could review the terrain and congested areas to determine their costs and equipment needs and number and types of permits required from FAA. With a down-sized staff (MDA has less than one half of the staff as in 1994 when 96,000 acres were sprayed) and an uncertainty of funding for the program, MDA was completing egg mass surveys in late December and geo-dating treatment areas through January. To meet the treatment bio-window critical to successfully reduce the gypsy moth population, MDA had to obtain contract bids as soon as the maps of spray blocks were complete in late January. More than 620 spray blocks ranging from 25 acres to 4,000 acres had to be configured detailing the type of aircraft and pesticide selected for the contract. A total of six bids were received from four aerial application firms. Based on the size of the 2008 operation, MDA determined that from the date the contractor selection was made and cost per acre of treatment was established (which in term influences total number of acres sprayed), the contractor needs at least 45 days to apply for and obtain permits and waivers from the FAA to treat congested areas and fly near restricted fly zones. In addition, the contractor must have this time available to custom build their spray equipment (spray booms, nozzles and pumps) to the size and type of treatment required in the contract. As a result, MDA did not have sufficient time to go through the normal bid process but had to obtain competitive spray bids through a truncated process.

REMARKS:

Nature of Emergency: The need for this emergency arises from the federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), which requires providing paratransit services to disabled individuals. MTA's paratransit service must accommodate individuals with disabilities who require the use of public transportation for medical, employment or other purposes and are physically incapable of using the conventional fixed route transit system. This emergency procurement avoids serious damage to the public health, safety and welfare that would result in the disabled population that uses this service should there be a lapse in service. MTA has continually provided this service, and must continue to provide this service without interruption, in part because of the federal statutes governing the service, but also to ensure that individuals most in need of public transportation are not harmed because of delays in the procurement process.

Since notice to proceed for the current emergency contracts was issued in September 2005, delays in the current procurement process have occurred due to a number of factors, the most significant of which are explained in the following narrative:

As a result of the MDLC lawsuit, the MTA needed to ensure that information obtained during the lawsuit that would positively impact the service model, was completely reviewed and incorporated where appropriate. The parties to Smith v. Flanagan arranged to participate in a settlement process using a mutually agreed-upon consultant, TranSystems Corporation. The Board approved the settlement on February 1, 2006. Although the MTA had prepared a Request for Proposal for the continuation of the existing model, in accordance with the settlement agreement, MTA provided a draft RFP to TranSystems for review on June 6, 2006. Comments from the Consultant were received on June 26, 2006 and were examined in detail as to the appropriateness of inclusion. No formal sign-off was received or required from the consultant, but the process under the agreement did include an opportunity for the Plaintiff's to review and comment on the RFP through early September 2006. On July 10, 2006, a new Director of Mobility was hired. It was felt that the new Director should be afforded the opportunity to review all documents, including those changes recommended by the consultant, prior to completion of the RFP document. Accordingly, several meetings were conducted between Procurement and the new Director and staff to review the draft RFP, and on August 25, 2006, a final meeting was held with the Mobility staff to incorporate changes to the RFP.

As a result of the input from those meetings as well as improvements learned from implementation of the new service model, a revised RFP was developed during the October/November 2006 timeframe containing significant improvements to the then current model.

Noteworthy modifications included:

- The flexibility to modify a contractor's number of vehicle service hours beyond a set base level, according to a contractor's achievement of specified performance standards.
- The right to stagger contract periods to facilitate transition.
- The requirement that Contractors will provide an ADA compliant methodology for furnishing non-dedicated service during periods, such as taxi service providers.
- The provision of overflow service for trips not being satisfactorily serviced by the two prime contractors.
- Where contractors are unable to meet agreed upon vehicle hours or a scheduled run, they will be subject to permanently forfeiting the run or the hours.
- A modified thirteen- point requirement list for vehicle drivers.
- Contractor requirement to include in their proposals a methodology for improving turnover ratios.
- Require Contractors to document all vehicle maintenance activity using MAXIMO software provided by MTA.
- Modification of Liquidated damage and incentive language to reflect a higher risk/reward profile.

With the knowledge that a new Administration would be in place by late January 2007, MTA's General Counsel and Assistant Deputy Administrator felt that it would be prudent to brief the incoming Secretary and Administrator on the status of the RFP prior to advertising. MTA's General Counsel briefed the acting Secretary on January 24, 2007, and the Assistant Deputy Administrator issued a briefing paper to the Administrator on March 1, 2007. On March 23, 2007 the RFP was advertised.

The pre-proposal conference was held on April 27, 2007, and over the next several weeks, numerous questions and requests for clarification were received. Also during this period, the Procurement Officer testified before the Ethics Commission on the eligibility of a contractor to submit a proposal in response to the RFP. On September 10, 2007, the Procurement Officer was notified of the results of that hearing. Because of the time required to answer all questions, the proposal due date was extended several times. On July 31, 2007, an addendum was issued changing the due date to September 7, 2007. That addendum answered most of the outstanding questions, and offered documentation on the fleet rosters including mileage and retirement, a table identifying zip codes with more than 1,000 pick ups and drop offs per quarter, and a table showing supplemental service requirements. On August 21, 2007, an addendum was issued with answers to the balance of questions, a revised liquidated damage chart with consultant input. a revised financial proposal in excel format, Title 11 covering vehicle maintenance requirements and a chart showing run hours by provider. After this addendum, there was quite a bit of internal discussion on the fairness of the revised liquidated damages and if they might be considered punitive. As a result, an addendum was issued extending the proposal due date to October 26, 2007. On October 11, 2007, an addendum was issued amending the liquidated damages, updating the latest vehicle hour utilization and adding a definition for "Door-to-Door Assistance" at the request of the Consultant.

Proposals were received on October 26, 2007 and the evaluation Committee has been selected for the Technical and Financial proposals. Our current plan is to issue notice to proceed by May 1, 2008 and to have the transition to new providers (if applicable) in effect by August 1, 2008.

Reason for Selection:

- The MTA service model requires the resources of vendors to supplement MTAs limited resources. Without the vendors, the MTA would lack sufficient resources resulting in customer-scheduling issues, missed trips, bus no shows, and create an unacceptable level of service. In summary, a lack of action by MTA to extend the current contracts will result in serious conditions affecting the safety and welfare of our customers. The following is a list of the issues that MTA and MDOT will likely face should MTA proceed without an emergency procurement.
- ADA is a federal civil rights law prohibiting discrimination against persons with disabilities. A cessation of ADA mandated service would be a violation of the law, and the resulting loss of service would invite additional lawsuits against the State of Maryland.
- MTA would be in non-compliance with FTA / ADA regulations, thereby jeopardizing our federal funding.
- The welfare of the disabled customer community would be seriously harmed as a result of eliminating the community's means of transportation. Many people will not be capable of getting to work or to critical medical appointments.
- The safety, and, in some cases, the lives of our customers would be at risk if their transportation was eliminated.

As the MTA evaluates the proposals and awards new contracts, the potential exists that new vendors could be operating in the Baltimore area. To ensure a smooth transition and avoid serious disruptions in service to MTA customers, the MTA is including a three (3) month transition period to provide for continuity of service should there be a change in service providers. This will allow new vendors to phase in service and become more experienced with the operation.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Notice of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) was advertised on eMarylandMarketplace.com and posted on the Comptroller's Procurement Website. The IFB was directly emailed to four vendors, two of which were Maryland firms and none were MBEs. The IFB was sent via eMarylandMarketplace.com to 11 vendors.

Only one bid was received in response to this solicitation. The recommended contractor, Dunbar Armored, Inc., is deemed responsible and its bid meets the technical requirements set forth in the IFB. Moreover, the price has been deemed fair and reasonable and other prospective bidders had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation.

Dunbar Armored, Inc. is the incumbent contractor and has provided excellent service for the past nine years during the previous contracts. All pick-ups and deliveries have been made according to schedule. They have successfully met the timeframes for same day pick-up in Annapolis and delivery to Baltimore in order to receive the highest possible interest earning on State revenues.

One vendor who was directly emailed submitted a No Bid stating that they were unable to meet the requirement for same day delivery. Inquiries were made to the other two directly solicited vendors. One vendor replied that the timeframe for completion was insufficient. The other vendor did not reply to the inquiry.

This contract is important to the State as the Comptroller of Maryland collects nearly \$15 billion in State revenues each year. Although a large portion of this revenue is received electronically, much still is received in the form of checks. The average daily check deposit is \$10 million for all months except April. In April the average daily check deposit climbs to \$35 million. To ensure that these checks are deposited as quickly as possible and to allow the State Treasurer to maximize the interest earnings on these funds, an armored car service is used to transport these checks to the State Depository Bank each evening so that those funds can be credited the same day.

An MBE subcontract goal was not established for this procurement. It was determined that an MBE subcontract goal would not be attainable due to the fact that services being requested are for an armored car service to pick-up daily deposits in Annapolis and deliver the deposits to the State Depository in Baltimore. The subject matter does not lend itself to subcontracting and there are no ancillary services to be provided. There are 11 Certified MBE's on MDOT's MBE Directory listed as providing this type of service. However, after contacting all 11 vendors, it was determined that none of them specifically provide armored car services. They are more geared to uniformed guard services.

The award of this contract was based on bidders submitting the lowest total monthly cost for collection from each of the 23 MVA locations. One bid was received on time. One bid, from the second incumbent, was received late and was returned unopened. Dunbar Armored submitted the only responsive bid, and is recommended for award.

MVA is dedicated to providing excellent customer service, promoting a safe driving environment, and protecting consumer interests. The MVA collects fees for services provided to customers at MVA that include, but are not limited to: issuance of driver licenses, titles, registrations and tags, driver records etc. This contract provides for the armored car services to pick-up, store, and deposit daily receipts to earn interest collected from MVA's network of facilities to various banks as designated by the MVA. This service ensures the essential protection of State assets.

The award amount for the base period of the contract is based upon the quoted firm fixed monthly rates for each MVA office. The pricing for the renewal period if exercised, will be calculated using the Consumer Price Index (CPI), as specified in the bid documents.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: The notice of the availability of the Request For Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* (EMM) under five different, but related commodity codes. The total number of vendors that received the EMM notice was 487 of which 210 were Maryland firms, 180 were small businesses and 126 were minority businesses (74 of those were both small and minority businesses).

A total of 20 firms attended the pre-proposal conference. Eight proposals were received for these services and seven of them were determined to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award (see Attachment).

As indicated in the Attachment, Design House was both the highest ranked offeror technically and had the lowest financial offer price. Accordingly, Design House's composite score of #1 both technically and financially ranked it number one overall. Design House's years of experience, accompanied with its creative ability and understanding of MVA's marketing challenges, and its lowest price makes its offer the most advantageous to the State. (Maryland's reciprocal preference law was applied to the awardee based on Washington, D.C.'s existing preference laws, and it did not affect the outcome of the awardee's financial proposal.)

One offeror was notified on 2/28/2008 that its proposal was not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. The other six unsuccessful offerors were all notified of their non-selection in certified letters dated 3/31/2008. Four debriefings were requested and provided.

The award amount shown above and the offer amount shown in the Attachment are different. Design House's five-year labor bid of \$593,047.27 represents its fixed hourly labor rates/administrative fees (\$362,906.25) and a media placement commission percentage (\$230,141.02) to perform the "market basket" of tasks that the MVA estimates it will utilize from its advertising and communications agency over the next five years. This represents Design House's in-house labor. The remainder of the contract award amount represents the potential expenditure for outside advertising production and media placement costs, e.g. TV air time.

This contract will allow the MVA to work with an advertising agency to provide a comprehensive, coordinated strategy and all services normally associated with advertising and marketing support for MVA's public awareness effort. The MVA has entered into a joint effort with the District of Columbia, Virginia and the Federal Motor Carrier Agency to curb aggressive driving throughout Maryland and the Capital Beltway area. The Maryland MVA is the lead agency on the public awareness campaign.

Examples of the "market basket" of tasks sought by the MVA to accomplish its public information communication goals include, but are not limited to:

- Assistance in the graphic design, messages and image the MVA is establishing with the public, including collateral materials, website and campaign components;
- Identification and development of the mechanisms available to the MVA to convey its messages, publicize its services, and educate the public on alternative delivery of motor vehicle related services;
- Assistance with the marketing of alternative service delivery systems and identification of how they affect different segments of the driving population;
- Assistance with the design and lay-out of the employee newsletter, The Vehicle;
- Analysis of the effectiveness of MVA marketing and public awareness efforts; and, possibly,
- Assistance with various printing requests on an as-needed basis.

MVA is dedicated to providing excellent customer service, promoting a safe driving environment, and providing a unified message to the public and businesses regarding services it provides, including the legal requirements that must be met to own and operate a motor vehicle in Maryland. MVA also works closely with other jurisdictions on public awareness efforts to notify the public about common problems associated with enforcing driving laws, such as controlling aggressive drivers and drunk driving.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice for the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on both the Authority's website and *eMarylandMarketplace.com*, which directly solicited 271 prospective vendors. Copies of the solicitation notice were mailed directly to 105 prospective vendors, 79 of which were Maryland firms and 100 were MBE firms. A copy was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three proposals were received in response to the RFP. One proposal was deemed not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. The two remaining proposals met the RFP requirements and possessed the expertise and knowledge to conduct the required audits. Clifton Gunderson, LLP was ranked #1 technically because it was determined that it had greater experience in electronic toll auditing, conducting SAS 70 audits, and auditing construction projects. Also Clifton Gunderson, LLP has the resources to draw from on a national level for expertise and knowledge in conducting other audits required by the Authority.

While Clifton Gunderson was ranked higher technically, it had the second ranked financial offer. As stated in the RFP, technical factors had greater weight than financial factors in the overall ranking determination. It was therefore determined that the approximately 4% higher price of Clifton Gunderson, LLP was outweighed by their technical proposal, giving them the #1 overall ranking. Therefore, award is recommended to Clifton Gunderson, LLP.

It is unknown how many audits will be conducted during the term of the contract. Similarly, it is also unknown what the mix of the 5 labor categories required under the contract will be for any given audit. Because of this uncertainty the traditional method of creating a model of assumed usage for the financial proposal was not used. Instead, the financial proposal consisted of a single 5 year blended hourly labor rate. This blended hourly rate is comprised of fixed hourly rates for each of the 5 labor categories, weighted by the percentage of expected usage for each.

The \$500,000 Amount requested for this item is based upon an estimate of roughly \$100,000 being spent for audits for each of the 5 years of the contract. However, the actual expenditure under the contract will depend on the actual audits conducted, which would outline the total numbers of hours to be spent in each labor category, at the fixed hourly rates quoted in the financial proposal.

Two proposals were received in response to the RFP. One of the proposals was determined to be not to be reasonably susceptible of being selected for award for failure to comply with the MBE submission requirements.

The recommended vendor, National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA), will support Commission staff in the production of an annual report series on the quality of commercial Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs) operating in Maryland. Some of the key functions performed by the vendor are data analysis and content development, including targeted research unique to each report, writing, professional editing, and graphic design to add visual clarity to the statistical content.

Since public reporting began in 1997, the annual HMO performance report series consisted of a four-publication set. For this contract, the annual report series has been reduced to three individual reports: the consumer guide (combined with the policy issues report), the employee guide, and the comprehensive report. Each report has a different release date that occurs over the course of a one-year period.

As consumer preferences have shifted toward the Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) model, expansion efforts to include comparative results for this plan type alongside HMO results began in 2006 in preparation for the 2008 report series. The Commission brokered a new public-private partnership with four major health care providers in the State to voluntarily collect and report PPO comparative data in 2008. The providers are Aetna, CareFirst BlueCross BlueShield, CIGNA, and United Healthcare. As it currently stands, Maryland will become the first state in the nation to provide consumers with audited, comparative analysis of clinical and member satisfaction measures for both HMOs and PPOs, giving consumers an opportunity to make distinctions about their health plan choices on factors beyond price.

The St. Mary's County Department of Social Services (SMCDSS) has the responsibility of administering social services programs that protect the children, families, and residents of St. Mary's County. This responsibility includes time beyond the SMCDSS normal business hours on weekdays and on weekends and holidays. The After Hours Crisis Line (AHCL) will respond to calls from the St. Mary's County Control Center, Maryland State Police, Sheriff's Department, or other community agencies and individuals after normal working hours. These calls deal with potential crisis situations, which involve children who are alleged to be abused, neglected, or at risk, adults who are in need of protection, children or adults in foster and adoptive homes certified by the agency, or homeless persons. In some instances, individuals in danger may have to be removed from their homes and placed into temporary safe alternative living situations.

Although only one bid was received in response to the solicitation, other bidders were given a reasonable opportunity to respond. Notices were sent to the bidders directly solicited requesting their reason(s) for not submitting a bid; one vendor, the incumbent vendor, Alexis Zoss, returned a reply stating that other commitments precluded its participation at this time.

The specifications of the IFB required vendors to have an office located close to the population area being served in order to respond quickly to any potential crisis and be knowledgeable of local resources that may be needed in the performance of crisis/placement efforts. It is not clear if potential bidders felt they could not meet these requirements.

The recommended vendor, A & J Shryock, LLC (A & J), has prior experience in After Hours services. The technical offer from A & J reflected a comprehensive and extensive knowledge of problem understanding, job responsibilities, and community resources on the part of the vendor and staff. It also reflected the proven experience and abilities of the vendor to provide services to meet the community's needs for After Hours services, especially the protection of children and vulnerable adults and emergency response to homelessness. The price bid submitted was determined to be fair and reasonable, and within the Department's budget.

Since the contract is for individual personnel, it was determined that there were no opportunities for an MBE sub-contracting goal to be established.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Notices of the availability of the Invitation for Bids (IFB) for all three contracts were advertised on the *eMarylandMarketplace.com* website. Copies of the solicitation notices were mailed or emailed directly to 42 prospective vendors, all of which were Maryland firms, and 20 were small businesses and nine were minority businesses. Copies were also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

Three separate IFBs were solicited allowing vendors to bid on one, two, or all three contracts. Three bids were received in response to each of the three IFBs. Quick Servant Company had the lowest prices for all three contracts and was determined to be a responsible bidder. Therefore, Quick Servant Company is recommended for award of all three contracts.

These contracts are required to insure that the refrigerated commercial food service equipment in all of the MBEP's facilities is in appropriate working order to maintain the ongoing operation of the food service facilities. There are 12 facilities in the Annapolis area, 33 facilities in the Baltimore area, and 37 facilities in the Washington Metro area. The MBEP is responsible for maintaining federally owned equipment. 55 of the 82 facilities being serviced are federal property. The equipment includes large walk-in freezers and refrigerators, merchandisers, deli cases, sandwich units, ice cream makers and ice cream cabinets.

The services to be performed for these contracts consist of ongoing preventive maintenance and repair of all of the equipment, including the requirement to service and repair equipment upon notification of the need for emergency repairs. The vendor must be on call and provide service upon notification. Whereas some of the work for these services might be able to be divided for subcontracting, there are no available MBEs to perform the services.

Even though the Board has never seen these service contracts for approval before, since 1997, Quick Servant Company has been one of the contractors utilized for these services through small procurements. Quick Servant Company's previous performance on these service contracts has been satisfactory by performing scheduled maintenance and emergency repairs on a timely basis with no multiple repairs for the same problems.

The MBEP is a program that is funded through commissions from vending machines on federal property, military bases, Post Offices properties, state property, and from highway rest stops, such as I-95 in Laurel, and set-aside for the blind vendors; the funding for this contract is thus considered to be Special Funds.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request For Proposals (RFP) was published on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and was sent to 315 potential contractors of which 85 were minority businesses. Copies of the solicitation notice were mailed directly to 13 Maryland firms. A copy of the RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

The RFP defined four Functional Areas as shown below encompassing all required services:

I- Creative Services

II- Media Services

III- Public Relations

IV- Research

Offerors were allowed to submit proposals for one, some or all of the Functional Areas and to receive a contract award for one or multiple Functional Areas. However, as described below, no awards are being made for Functional Areas III and IV.

Seven offerors submitted 11 proposals for the individual Functional Areas in response to the RFP. One offeror's single proposal was determined to be not reasonably susceptible of being selected for award for failure to comply with MBE submission requirements and their financial proposal was returned unopened. The breakdown of the remaining proposals is as follows:

In Functional Area I – Creative Services: Four proposals were received. The technical proposal for one of the offerors was deemed not qualified and their financial proposal was returned unopened. The recommended vendor, Trahan Burden & Charles, Inc. (TBC), was ranked #1 technically and had the lowest price.

In Functional Area II – Media Services: Four proposals were received. The recommended vendor, Media Works, LTD, was ranked #1 technically and had the second lowest price. The superior technical offer from Media Works, LTD outweighed their 5% higher price making their offer the most advantageous to the State.

In Functional Area III – Public Relations: Two proposals were received. During the evaluation process it came to light that public relations assistance may not be required for the entire term of the contract. Therefore, Functional Area III was cancelled. This service may be resolicited at a later date for a shorter term.

In Functional Area IV – Research: One proposal was received. However the proposed price for this service exceeded the budgeted amount. Therefore, Functional Area IV was also cancelled.

The Contract for each Functional Area establishes a fixed monthly fee amount that will be paid. The Award Amount is composed of two components as described below:

- Contractor's Fee: This component is the fixed monthly fee, based on the Financial Offers, to be paid to the Contractors for the service to be provided in the appropriate Functional Area.
- DBED's Marketing Budget: This component is the portion of DBED's marketing budget as estimated in the RFP for each Functional Area and is the same regardless of the Contractor selected. The Contractor(s) will be placing and paying for various productions, media buys, and other projects with third-parties. These costs shall be preapproved by DBED and reimbursed at the Contractor's actual cost with no markup allowed. The Marketing Budget for Functional Area I is \$4,000,000; the Functional Area II Marketing Budget is \$18,212,500.

DBED's mission is to function as an economic development catalyst for Maryland by promoting the State as a world-class location for business expansion and retention, film production and as a destination for consumers on vacation and business travel.

The Office of Tourism will be the primary user of this contract to help spur economic vitality to the State through visitor spending. Maryland's latest visitor data confirms that in 2006, Maryland welcomed more than 28 million visitors who generated more than \$11.4 billion in visitor spending. That figure is up from \$10.7 billion the previous calendar year. During 2006, the Maryland tourism industry generated more than \$895 million in State and local taxes and provided more than \$16,000 jobs to Maryland residents.

One of the major components of a healthy tourism economy is the invitation, and a positive response to that invitation, to consumers within our primary market - women 25-64 in households with income of \$60,000 or more and who live within 400 miles of Maryland's borders.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: A notice of the availability of the Request for Proposals (RFP) was advertised on *eMarylandMarketplace.com* and the DBM website. It was also posted on the DBM Bid Board. Copies of the RFP notice were sent directly to 14 prospective vendors, of which 10 were Maryland firms and none were minority businesses. A copy of the RFP was also sent to the Governor's Office of Minority Affairs.

The local telecommunications services consists of the local network lines and local phone service call usage from the phone company to the State offices within the local territories called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). Under the split-up of AT & T that occurred in 1984 LATAs were established for all states to geographically delineate the telecommunications traffic that could be handled by local telephone companies (originally C & P Telephone within Maryland, now Verizon) versus traffic that had to be handled as long distance calls by a non-local telephone company (originally the surviving, greatly reduced, AT & T). In 1984, Maryland was separated into four LATAs, commonly referred to as the Baltimore, Washington, Hagerstown and Salisbury LATAs, to roughly denote the geographic areas each LATA encompassed. These four LATAs still exist today, exactly as first created in 1984.

Under the RFP offerors could propose to serve one, some or all four Maryland LATAs. The specific responses are as follows.

Hagerstown and Salisbury LATAs: Verizon was the only offeror for these LATAs.

Baltimore and Washington LATAs: Three proposals were received for each of these LATAs. However, one of the three offerors for the Baltimore and Washington LATAs was eliminated because it was judged not to be responsible. The two remaining offerors for the Baltimore and Washington LATAs were both judged to be responsible and to have submitted proposals that were reasonably susceptible of being selected for award. Verizon was ranked #1 technically in each of the Baltimore and Washington LATA and was the lower priced offeror in the Washington LATA. Broadview Networks was the lower priced offeror for the Baltimore LATA.

Award Recommendations:

- Verizon is recommended for award of the Hagerstown and Salisbury LATAs because it
 was the only offeror proposing to serve these LATAs. For these LATAs Verizon's price
 has been deemed fair and reasonable and it was determined that other prospective
 offerors had a reasonable opportunity to respond to the solicitation.
- Verizon is recommended for award of the Washington LATA because it had the #1 ranked technical proposal and the lower price on the RFP pricing model.
- Verizon is recommended for award of the Baltimore LATA because overall it was judged to be the more advantageous offeror for this LATA. For the Baltimore LATA Verizon had the #1 technical proposal, but the #2 price proposal. Under the terms of the RFP technical factors had more weight in the award determinations than the price proposal. Verizon's technically superior offer demonstrated a higher level of support and capability to perform this size contract for the State, which was judged to outweigh the 11.8% higher price on the RFP pricing model.

Because Verizon is being recommended for awards in all four LATAs, the four awards are being consolidated into one contract.

The MBE participation goal of 5% was determined based upon analysis of the available subcontracting opportunities for this type of telecommunications business. The majority of the monthly prices are fixed prices for networks and usage due to local calls which may not be subcontracted. The areas identified as being subcontractable were for billing support, software support, and installation.

This contract is also available for use by local governments within Maryland.

The award of this contract was first submitted to appear on the 4/30/2008 DBM BPW Agenda. However, upon notification of its non-selection for the Baltimore LATA Broadview Networks, the only other qualified offeror for this LATA, filed a protest. This protest was filed the same day that the 4/30/2008 agenda was submitted, and with the cooperation of the BPW staff, the item for the proposed contract award was removed from the agenda before it was published. The protest by Broadview of the proposed Baltimore LATA award was denied by the Department on 5/8/2008.

Although no protest was filed by Broadview for the Washington LATA, or by any vendor for the Hagerstown or Salisbury LATAs, because the Baltimore LATA accounts for approximately 88% of the State's expenditures on local access and to maintain the same contract terms for all

Under the provisions of Health-General Article §19-135(d), the Maryland Health Care Commission must implement a system to comparatively evaluate the quality of care and performance of nursing facilities and annually report findings to nursing facilities, Marylanders, and other interested parties. The authorizing legislation requires that, as appropriate, performance information be solicited from consumers and their families. This contract will provide services needed to conduct an annual survey of responsible parties' (family members or designated representatives) experience of the care provided to over 25,000 residents in nursing facilities and produce reports of the results of the survey. The purpose of the comparative evaluation system is to improve the quality of care provided by nursing facilities by establishing a common set of performance measures and disseminating results for use by individuals in making informed healthcare choices. It also serves to identify for each nursing facility areas where improvement is needed.

There is widespread interest in the survey results. The web site that displays the results currently receives nearly 20,000 visits annually. In 2007, there were 13,220 hits on the nursing home website. In the nine months of FY 2008, it has had 14,501 hits. It is expected to have a 15% increase in hits for the year. Traffic on the web site increased from 1,200 visits per month to 1,950 visits per month for the first three months following release of the survey findings in January. The survey also generates significant media interest in print and television making a broad spectrum of Marylanders aware of this information which resides on the Commission's website www.mhcc.maryland.gov as part of the Long-Term and Community-Based Care Guide.

The current contractor is in the best position to identify trends and interpret their meaning for users of the survey (nursing home staff and Maryland consumers), having conducted similar surveys in other states. Resoliciting the scope of work would require the new contractor to learn the protocols, programs and tools requiring additional time and cost for both the contracted staff and Commission staff. Therefore, exercising the renewal option on this contract is believed to be the most cost effective course of action.

Therefore, DHMH's Office of Health Services (OHS) is requesting approval to increase the budgeted amount to allow for additional funds to pay the contractor's fees. The contract is a contingency fee contract, and since 7/1/2004 as a result of Legislative requirement, the vendor's fee is charged to the medical provider, as described below.

OHS has the task of monitoring hospital claims to identify and recover erroneous payments from hospitals. The contractor performs bill audits for inpatient claims paid by the Maryland Medicaid Program hospitals by comparing medical records and hospital itemized bills to the program payment history. The contractor's goal is to find the differences between the records and the bills. The contractor receives a percentage of the total amount recovered. Since 2004, this amount has been charged directly to the hospital and recovered from their future payments.

The total amount recovered for the past two years plus the current year was as follows:

- FY2006 \$1,771,857 with the contractor receiving \$441,101;
- FY2007 \$2,604,545 with the contractor receiving \$599,040; and
- FY2008 \$2,262,447 (through 4/16/08) with the contractor receiving \$520,363.

It is anticipated that the total 2008 FY recovery amount will exceed the FY2007 total.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Veolia Transportation provides shuttle bus services for students, faculty and staff of the Baltimore City Community College (BCCC), using two mini-buses with wheel chair accessibility, between the Liberty and Harbor Campuses. To date, services have been deemed satisfactory and reliable.

The contract's original period of performance for the last renewal option was 4/15/2004 through 4/14/2005. There was a previous request to retroactively approve the extension of performance from 4/15/2005 through 12/31/2007. Additional service between the Liberty Campus and the Rogers Avenue Metro Station parking lot was added from 8/27/2007 through 12/31/2007 to address the parking shortage in the vicinity of the Liberty Campus, which was attributed to ongoing construction on campus and the loss of approximately 300 parking spaces.

During the period from May 2007 through December 2007 there were three failed bid attempts for this service. The first bid attempt was not completed because changing parking and transportation needs at the Liberty Campus due to the construction effected the specifications. The second bid was cancelled, approved by DBM on or about 4/23/07, due to the lack of MBE due diligence by the bidders. The third attempt to bid the service was delayed due to a continued staffing shortage and subsequently failed when the vendor community raised questions about when the Rogers Avenue Metro Station service would end. It is now known that the additional bus service will no longer be needed as of 5/31/2008.

Whereas Mod. #2 ended on 12/31/2007, there was still approximately \$62,700 of available funds from the contract due to suspended bus service during the winter break. The College believed they could extend the contract term in order to utilize these funds with an additional \$25,000 under their own delegation for a three month extension until 3/31/2008. Because the value of Mod #2 was actually over \$90,000, this modification should have been approved by the Board. At this time, it has been calculated that the \$25,000 approved by the College would take the contract through 2/14/2008. Therefore, this modification (Mod. #4) will include the use of the excess funds of \$62,700 not utilized in Mod #2 and the additional request for \$150,000 to reach the new contract end date of 8/8/2008 for a total value of \$212,700.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: Request for approval to modify the existing contract for automated fingerprint services by increasing the available funding due to an increase in the amount of data that is converted from hardcopy fingerprint cards to an electronic format that is compatible with the FBI's electronic format. The modification also involves changing the current method of "Cardscan" processing to a more efficient enhanced software system to allow simultaneous data entry and card scanning.

Since the DPSCS is required by the FBI to submit all fingerprint cards in an electronic format, hardcopy cards must be scanned into the computer to be submitted into the system as if it were captured on a live scan. The process involves scanning the front of the card and waiting for the completion of the scan for the Data Entry staff to enter demographic information on the screen. While the scanning is being processed, the computer is inoperable. The scanning process is very slow and the system does not allow for staff to multi-task. Work is completed one card at a time.

The new enhanced software will allow Data Entry staff to work more efficiently by breaking the workflow into two separate tasks. One task will be the scanning process which will allow mailroom staff to load the card feeders (a new feature) on the scanners with the fingerprint cards as they are received. Once the cards are scanned they will be placed into a work queue for the Data Entry staff to complete task two – entering the demographic information into the computer for the electronic version of the fingerprint cards. Since the scanning is completed on a separate computer as a separate step from the data entry, the two tasks can be done simultaneously.

REQUESTING AGENCY REMARKS: DBM's CCU is responsible for the collection of all delinquent debts, claims and accounts due to the State (other than the majority of taxes owed the State, child support, and certain other debts listed by statute). Typical debts are: college tuition and fees; a small number of student loans; public assistance and food stamp overpayments; Parole and Probation restitution accounts; reimbursement for vehicular damage to State property; bounced checks; reimbursement for care at a State hospital; unpaid workers' compensation insurance premiums; Home Improvement Commission awards; environmental fines; and other miscellaneous debts.

The purpose of this contract is to retain an independent organization to perform collection services on secondary assignments of delinquent debt accounts. Secondary assignments are accounts that have been actively pursued by the CCU for a minimum of six months with no success in locating or otherwise making contact with the debtor.

Prior to CCU's attempts to collect on these accounts, the originating agency will usually have also made some attempt to collect the debt. The accounts are finally turned over to the outside collection contractor for what is actually a third attempt at collecting the debt.

Due to the effective collection efforts of OSI, the Department has received \$193,400,641 during this first renewal period. Because OSI collected more than anticipated in the initial projections reported on the Board item, collection payments to the contractor exceeded the original estimated \$250,000 for this period by \$210,000. OSI receives a 7.9% commission rate on monies actually collected and remitted to the State.

REMARKS: During the removal/demolition of the top layer floor coverings (carpet, wood tile) within this contract, it was discovered that some asbestos-containing tiles in the substrate were no longer adhering to the concrete deck and were coming up with the floor coverings. This dislodging of floor tile exposes the mastic and subjects the tiles to breakage. Since both the mastic and tiles contain asbestos, there may be an increased risk that some of that asbestos could become friable during the demolition process, creating a potential risk of asbestos exposure if not properly abated. While the tiles were adhered and contained by floor coverings, there was essentially no risk of asbestos exposure to personnel within the building. The abatement of all of the exposed asbestos containing tiles and mastic will ensure that there is no increased asbestos-related health risk.

It is imperative that the asbestos be abated in a timely manner to minimize public health risks. The MPA has asked that its contractor, Plano Coudon, obtain prices from licensed, reputable asbestos abatement firms to perform this work. 

Securitas has performed adequately under the terms of the original contract and has adjusted to the changing demands of the MPA such as TWIC, MARSEC certification, and enhanced security guard certification standards. In addition to the enhanced training and credentialing already possessed by Securitas, the MPA will take advantage of limited increases in hourly guard rates as established in the initial contract. In the ever-growing market for security guards, it is estimated that the rate for TWIC-holding guards will increase by 10% to 20% over the next two years. This option will lock the MPA into an increase of 8% over that same time frame.

The Notice of Contracting opportunity was also posted on the DGS Bid Board. In an effort to generate additional interest in the contracting community, the bid due date was also extended. At the end of the solicitation period, however, only one bid was received. Singleton.

The CE being acquired by the State as a result of this agreement will provide excellent protection to the conservation values of 200 acres of waterfront property. Among the provisions of the CE, is the restriction that only one primary residence and only on accessory residence are permitted on the property. Both residences currently exist on the property and under the provisions of the CE relocation from their current location is subject to written approval of the grantees.

BACKGROUND

In 1987 and 1993, the Whipples gifted to The Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) 145 acres and 62 acres of property in Talbot County with over one mile of shoreline fronting Pickering Creek and the Wye East River. The property is forested and provides habitat for numerous species of birds and the Delmarva fox squirrel, a state and federally listed endangered species.

The gift deeds attempted to establish various conservation restrictions against the property and provided that if CBF ceased to use the property for the purposes intended, or ceased to exist as a charitable organization, the property would pass to the National Audubon Society (NAS). Furthermore, if NAS ceased using the property for the purposes intended or ceased to exist, then the property would then pass to the Maryland Environmental Trust (MET), and finally under similar provisions then to the State of Maryland.

Through a series of Confirmatory and Amended Confirmatory Deeds in 1995 and 1999, it was confirmed that CBF had the authority to sell the property subject to the conservation restrictions. As a result, in February 1999, CBF conveyed the former Whipple property to William Larry Singleton, for the sum of \$1,650,000, and subject to the now contested conservation restrictions set forth in the original gift deeds.

William Singleton has now petitioned the court to remove the contested deed restrictions from his property, claiming that the future interests of NAS, MET and the State of Maryland under the gift deeds violate the common law rule against perpetuities, and as such are defective and fail. If successful, Mr. Singleton has indicated his intent to develop the property into residential housing.

After negotiations between the State, MET, NAS, the surviving Ms. Whipple, and Eastern Shore Land Conservancy (ESLC), Mr. Singleton has agreed to enter into a settlement agreement whereby the parties to the petition would agree to the filing of a consent judgment, subject to court approval, that would require the State, MET, and the other parties to quit-claim their potential future interests and contested conservation and enforcement rights in the property, and require Mr. Singleton to execute and deliver a new perpetual conservation easement in favor of MET and ESLC.


